Use up your colourful left-overs with a neutral shade for a wearable jumper that's great for all the family!

Aran \$ 5.5mm

** Intermediate

Yarn used

Caron Simply Soft 2 (2, 2, 2, 2), (2, 2, 3, 3) balls in Feathered Gray 9794 (MC) 1 (1, 2, 2, 2), (2, 2, 2, 2) balls each in Gold 9782 (CC1), Fuchsia 9764 (CC2) & Cobalt Blue 9784 (CC3)

About the varn

Aran: 288m per 170.1g ball: 100% acrylic

Tension

7 sts x 15 rows = 10 cm measured overmoss-st pattern

Hook used

5.5mm

Other supplies

4 stitch markers tapestry needle


Sizing

S (M, L, XL) (2X, 3X, 4X, 5X) designed to fit with approximately 20cm positive ease at the chest

.......

You can adjust the length by starting the Front and Back panels with more or fewer stitches. These need to be added or removed in multiples of 2. Eight stitches

Schematic



measure approximately 4.5cm.

Sleeve length can be adjusted by working more or fewer rows at the start/end of the sleeve. Three rows measure approximately 2cm.

Carry yarn up the sides of your work rather than cutting every row to reduce the number of ends to weave in.

Change colour on the last yrh of the last st of the row. Front and Back panels are worked

sideways. Shoulder seams are joined, then sleeves are worked onto panels. Beg 2 ch counts as one st. Each ch in moss st patt is counted as a st

Colour sequence

Change colour at the end of every Row throughout pattern. Repeat colour sequence as necessary. MC, CC1, CC2, MC, CC3, CC2, MC, CC3, MC, CC3, CC1, MC, CC2, CC1, MC, CC2,

Stitch pattern

CC3, MC, CC1, CC3

Moss stitch: 2 ch, miss 1 dc, 1 dc into next 1ch-sp, *1 ch, miss 1 dc, 1 dc into next 1chsp; rep from * to end. Turn.

Sizing

Pattern is designed to be unisex. Please choose size based on your chest circumference measurement plus approximately 20cm as sizing differs from our usual range

Garment

Start crocheting...

FRONT PANEL

With MC, chain 104 (110, 116, 116) (124, 126, 128, 132).

Row 1: Starting in 4th ch from hook (missed chs count as first 1ch-sp), 1 dc, *1 ch, miss 1 ch, 1 dc; rep from * to end, change to CC1. Turn. 102 (108, 114, 114) (122, 124, 126, 130) sts

Work another 19 (23, 25, 27) (31, 35, 39, 43) rows in moss st in patt, cont to follow colour sequence throughout.

Neck shaping

Next Row: Work in patt until 4 sts rem (working last dc into 3rd ch-sp from the end of row), change to next colour, leave rem sts unworked. Turn. 98 (104, 110, 110) (118, 120, 122, 126) sts **

Next Row: 3 ch, pm in 3ch-sp just made (counts as 1 st), miss [1 dc, 1 ch, 1 dc], 1 dc into next 1ch-sp, cont in moss st patt to end. Turn. 96 (102, 108, 108) (116, 118, 120, 124) sts

Next Row: Work in moss st patt across, working last dc into marked 3ch-sp, rm.

Centre Front

Work 39 (39, 43, 45) (45, 45, 45, 45) rows in moss st in patt.

Neck shaping

Next Row: Work in moss st patt to end, 2 fdc, changing colour on last fdc. Turn. 98 (104, 110, 110) (118, 120, 122, 126) sts

Next Row: 6 ch, starting in 4th ch from hook, 1 dc, 1 ch, miss 1 ch, 1 dc in last ch, cont in moss st patt to end. 102 (108, 114, 114) (122, 124, 126, 130) sts

Work 19 (23, 25, 27) (31, 35, 39, 43) rows in moss st patt.

Fasten off all colours, leaving a long tail on last row for seaming shoulders.

BACK PANEL

With MC, chain 104 (110, 116, 116) (124, 126, 128, 132).


Work as for Front Panel to **. 98 (104, 110, 110) (118, 120, 122, 126) sts

Centre Back

Work 42 (42, 46, 48) (48, 48, 48, 48) rows in moss-st patt.

Neck shaping

Next Row: 6 ch, starting in 4th ch from hook, 1 dc, 1 ch, miss 1 ch, 1 dc in last



ch, cont in moss st patt to end. Turn. 102 (108, 114, 114) (122, 124, 126, 130) sts

Next Row: 2 ch, miss 1 st, 1 dc in next st, cont in moss st patt across.

Work 19 (23, 25, 27) (31, 35, 39, 43) rows in moss-st patt.

Fasten off all colours.

Joining

Place Front and Back Panels WS tog, aligning shoulders. With MC, starting from outside edge, join the first 20 (24, 26, 28) (32, 36, 40, 44) rows tog using whipstitch. Rep for other shoulder.

Fasten off. Weave in ends.

NECK RIBBING

Join MC at either shoulder seam on neck opening.

Chain 8.

Row 1: Starting in the 2nd ch from hook, working into back bump of chs, 7 sl st, [1 sl st in next st on Body] twice. Turn. 9 sts

Row 2: Miss first 2 sl sts, 7 sl st in BLO. Turn. 7 sts

Row 3: 1 ch, 7 sl st in BLO, [1 sl st in next st on Body] twice.

Rep rows 2-3 until you have worked around entire neck opening.

Fasten off.

Using mattress stitch, seam the 2 ends of ribbing tog.

SLEEVES

These will be worked directly onto the joined Front and Back Panels. Follow colour sequence throughout, starting with MC and changing colour at the end of every row.

With RS of Front Panel facing, count down from shoulder seam 38 (40, 45, 46) (48, 55, 52, 53) sts, pm in next st. Rep for Back Panel. 78 (82, 92, 94) (98, 102, 106, 108) sts from marker to marker, inclusive.

With RS facing, join MC with sl st in first marked st. rm.

Row 1: 2 ch, miss st with join, 1 dc, *1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 dc; rep from * to next marked

st (working last dc into marked st), rm. Turn. 78 (82, 92, 94) (98, 102, 106, 108) sts Rows 2-6: Work in moss st patt to end. (You can work more or fewer rows here if

you need to adjust sleeve length.)

Dec Row: 2 ch, moss-dec, cont in moss st patt across until 3 ch-sps rem, moss-dec, 1 ch, 1 dc into last ch-sp. Turn. 4 sts dec'd, 74 (78, 88, 90) (94, 98, 102, 104) sts

Work 4 (3, 2, 2) (2, 2, 2, 1) rows in moss st patt.

Repeat last 5 (4, 3, 3) (3, 3, 3, 2) rows, 7 (2, 0, 3) (7, 9, 13, 2) more times. 46 (70, 88, 78) (66, 62, 50, 96) sts Work dec row once more. 42 (66, 84, 74) (62, 58, 46, 92) sts

Work 5 (4, 3, 3) (3, 3, 3, 2) rows in moss st patt.

Rep last 6 (5, 4, 4) (4, 4, 4, 3) rows 1 (7, 11, 8) (5, 3, 0, 11) more time(s). 38 (38, 40, 42) (42, 46, 46, 48) sts Work 6 rows in moss st patt. (You can work more or fewer rows here if you need to adjust sleeve length) Block to measurements given on schematic.

Cuff Ribbing

Cuff length can be adjusted by working more or fewer chains.

With RS facing, join MC with sl st in first st at bottom of sleeve. Chain 14.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook and working into the back bump of chs, 13 sl st, [1 sl st in next st on Sleeve] twice. Turn. 15 sts

Row 2: Miss first 2 sl sts, 13 sl st in BLO. Turn. 13 sts

Row 3: 1 ch, 13 sl st in BLO, [1 sl st in next st on Sleeve] twice.

Rep rows 2-3 across last row of Sleeve. Fasten off.

Using mattress stitch, seam the 2 ends of ribbing tog.

Finishing

Using a mattress stitch, seam Front and Back Panels tog from bottom to underarm, then seam Sleeve.

Hem

With RS facing, join MC with sl st at either side seam.

Rnd 1: 1 ch, working in each row end, dc around, join with sl st to beg dc.

Fasten off. Weave in ends.





MACAW-ESOME PARROTS

Use up those oddments of DK to hook a colourful flock of Macaws - a perfect addition to any crochet menagerie

★★ Intermediate

Yarn used

West Yorkshire Spinners Elements DK 1 ball each in 1145 Watermelon (A), 1141 Caribbean Sea (B), 1143 Sweet Nectar (C), 1138 Ocean Spray (D) & 1104 Palm Leaf (E)

About the yarn

DK; 122m per 50g ball; 60% Lyocell, 40% Falkland Islands wool

Tension

28 sts x 22 rows = 10cm measured over dc

Hook used

2mm

Other supplies

2 pairs of 5mm mushroom-shaped amigurumi eye beads or black seed beads sewing thread tapestry needle toy stuffing

Sizing

8cm tall

Leave a long end for parts which require assembly.

Beg 1 ch does not count as a st. Join each rnd with a sl st to beg dc. Make another in the colours of your choice!

Start crocheting...

Head and Body

Worked from the top of Head down.

Rnd 1: With A and working into a magic ring, 6 dc, join with sl st to beg dc. 6 sts Rnd 2: 1 ch, 2 dc in each st around, join.

Rnd 3: 1 ch, [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times, join. 18 sts Rnd 4: 1 ch, [2 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times,

join. 24 sts Rnd 5: 1 ch, [3 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times,

join. 30 sts Rnds 6-10: 1 ch, dc around, join.

Rnd 11: 1 ch, [3 dc, 1 dc2tog] 6 times, join. 24 sts

Rnd 12: 1 ch, [4 dc, 1 dc2tog] 4 times, join.

Rnd 13: 1 ch, [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] 10 times, join. 30 sts

Rnds 14-17: 1 ch, dc around, join.

Rnds 18-19: 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, dc across to last st, 2 dc in last st, join. 34 sts

Rnd 20: 1 ch, dc around, join.

Rnd 21: 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, 14 dc, 2 dc2tog, 14 dc, 2 dc in last st, join.

Rnds 22-24: 1 ch, dc around, join.

Rnd 25: 1 ch, 13 dc, 4 dc2tog, 13 dc, join.

Rnd 26: 1 ch, [3 dc, 1 dc2tog] 6 times, join.

Rnd 27: 1 ch, [2 dc, 1 dc2tog] 6 times, join. 18 sts

Stuff.

Rnd 28: 1 ch, [1 dc, 1 dc2tog] 6 times, join.

Rnd 29: 1 ch, 6 dc2tog, join. 6 sts Fasten off. Weave tail through rem 6 sts and pull tightly to close.

Top Beak

Row 1: With C and working into a magic ring, 2 dc, do not join, do not tighten magic ring yet. Turn.

Row 2: 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, 1 dc. Turn. 3 sts

Row 3: 1 ch, 1 dc, 2 dc in next st, 1 dc.

Row 4: 1 ch, 1 dc, [2 dc in next st] twice, 1 dc. Turn. 6 sts

Row 5: 1 ch, 6 dc.

Fasten off and tighten magic ring for the tip

Bottom Beak

Work as Top Beak through Row 3. 4 sts

Row 4: 1 ch, 4 dc.

Fasten off.

Eyes (make 2)

Rnd 1: With D and working into a magic ring, 6 dc, join. 6 sts

Rnd 2: 1 ch, 2 dc in each st around, join. 12 sts

Fasten off.

Wing

Top Layer (make 2)

Row 1: With A and working into a magic ring, 5 dc, Turn.

Row 2: 1 ch, 1 dc, [2 dc in next st, 1 dc] twice. Turn. 7 sts

Row 3: 1 ch, 7 dc.

Row 4: *Miss next st, [1 dc, 1 htr, 1 tr, 1 htr, 1 dc] in next st; rep from * twice more, 1 sl st in last st.

Fasten off and tighten the ring.

2nd & 3rd Layer

Make 2 each in E & B.

With E or B, work as for Top Layer through Row 2. 7 sts

Row 3: 1 ch, 2 dc, 2 dc in next st, 1 dc, 2 dc in next st, 2 dc. Turn. 9 sts

Row 4: 1 ch, 9 dc. Turn.

Row 5: *Miss next st, [1 dc, 1 htr, 1 tr, 1 htr, 1 dc] in next st; rep from * 3 times more, 1 sl st in last st.

Fasten off.

Tail

With B, work as for Second Layer through Row 3. 9 sts

Rows 4-6: 1 ch, 9 dc. Turn.

Row 7: *Miss next st, [1 dc, 1 htr, 1 tr, 1 htr, 1 dc] in next st; rep from * 3 times more. 1 sl st in last st.

Fasten off.

Foot (make 2)

Row 1: With C and working into a magic ring, 6 dc. Turn. 6 sts

Rows 2-4: 1 ch, 6 dc. Turn. Fasten off.

Making up

Use photo as a guide. Sew three Wing pieces tog to create one Wing and sew a Wing to each side of Body. Sew fastened-off edge of Beaks to Body, starting with Top Beak. Sew an eye bead to centre of each Eye, then sew on either side of Beak. Sew Feet to bottom of Body. Sew Tail to back of Body.





Odds & Ends BLANKET

Use up those odds and ends to hook up a show-stopping blanket that's a pleasure to create

Yarn used

Yarnsmiths Create DK 2 balls in Cream 3050 (MC) 1 ball each in Scarlet Red 3100 (CC1), Burnt Orange 3120 (CC2), Primrose Yellow 3160 (CC3), Light Turquoise 3250 (CC4), Lavender 3360 (CC5), Fondant Pink 3390 (CC6) & Pale Silver 3035 (CC7) Available from

About the yarn

DK; 290m per 100g ball; 100% acrylic

Tension

Each octagon measures approximately 15cm from side to side Each square measures 7cm x 7cm

Hook used

4mm

Other supplies

tapestry needle

Sizing

95x80cm

Beg 3 ch counts as first tr. Beg 1 ch does not count as a st.

If preferred, replace beginning 3 chains with a standing treble when changing colour.

Follow the colourways tables or use your stash to create your own colourways in a mixture of whatever your quantities will allow.

Start crocheting...

Octagon

Make 30, 4 each in colourways A, D, E, F & G; and 5 each in colourways B & C see table.

Rnd 1: With colour for Rnd 1 as shown on Colourways Table and working into a magic ring, 3 ch, 11 tr, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. Fasten off. 12 sts

Rnd 2: Join next colour between any 2 tr, 4 ch (counts as 1 tr and 3 ch), [1 tr between next 2 sts, 1 ch] 11 times, join with sl st in 3rd of beg 4 ch. Fasten off. 12 sts, 12 ch-sps

Rnd 3: Join next colour in any ch-sp, 3 ch, 1 tr into same ch-sp as join, 1 RtrF around next st, [2 tr into next ch-sp, 1 RtrF around next st] 11 times, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. Fasten off. 36 sts

Rnd 4: Join next colour in top of beg 3 ch, 3 ch, 1 tr, 2 RtrF around next RtrF, [2 tr, 2 RtrF around next RtrF] 11 times, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. Fasten off. 48 sts

Rnd 5: Join next colour in any st, 1 ch, 48 dc in BLO, join with sl st to beg dc. Do not fasten off.

Rnd 6: 3 ch, 5 tr, 2 ch, [6 tr, 2 ch] 7 times, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. Fasten off.

Rnd 7: Join next colour in top of beg 3 ch, 3 ch, 5 tr, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] into next ch-sp, *6 tr, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] into next ch-sp; rep from * around, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. Fasten off. 64 sts

Rnd 8: Join next colour in st after any 2chsp, 1 ch, *4 dc, 1 RtrF2tog around centre 2 tr in Rnd 6 (do not miss any sts on Rnd 7), 4 dc, [1 dc, 1 ch, 1 dc] into corner chsp; rep from * around, join with sl st to beg dc. Fasten off. 88 sts

Rnd 9: Join MC in first dc of Rnd 8, 3 ch, 3 tr, 1 RtrF around next RtrF2tog, 4 tr, miss next st, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into corner ch-sp, *miss next st, 4 tr, 1 RtrF around next RtrF2tog, 4 tr, miss next st, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into corner ch-sp; rep from * around, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. 88 sts Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Square

Make 20 as shown on table.

Rnd 1: With colour for Rnd 1 as shown on Squares Colourway Table and working



Rnd 2: Join next colour in st after any 2chsp, 3 ch, 2 tr, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into corner ch-sp, *3 tr, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into corner ch-sp; rep from * around, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. Fasten off. 28 sts

Rnd 3: Join MC in st after any 2ch-sp, 3 ch, 6 tr, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] into corner ch-sp, *7 tr, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] into corner ch-sp; rep from * around, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. Do not fasten off. 36 sts

Rnd 4: 1 ch, 3 dc in BLO, 1 RtrF around centre st in Rnd 2 (directly below), miss next st on Rnd 3, 4 dc in BLO, [1 dc, 1 ch 1 dc] into corner ch-sp, *4 dc in BLO, 1 RtrF around centre st in Rnd 2, miss next st on Rnd 3, 4 dc in BLO, [1 dc, 1 ch 1 dc] into corner ch-sp; rep from * to last st, 1 dc, join with sl st to beg dc. 44 sts Fasten off. Weave in ends.





Making up

Lay Octagons out in five rows of six motifs, ensuring that the same colourways aren't next to each other and swapping them around until you are happy with the balance of colours. Place Squares in the gaps between Octagons similarly experimenting with the colour layout.

With a tapestry needle and MC, sew adjacent motifs tog from the WS and in BLO as follows: Sew each row of five Octagons tog to create six strips, then sew each strip to the next, finish by sewing each Square into its gap. Fasten off. Weave in rem ends.





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KATIEJONES

Crochet queen Katie Jones sat down with us to discuss all things yarn, as well as something exciting coming in issue 100... www.katiejonesknit.co.uk





What inspired you to start crocheting?

Back pain and a love of TV! I trained at uni as a knitter and was mainly a machine knitter. During my studies, I also worked as a production machine knitter for a designer at the same time. This meant that I was at a machine for way too long every day and I started getting really bad back pain from my posture. In order to mix it up, I started including more crochet in my own work as a break, as I could sit in a comfy seat, and I also loved that even if I had to pull long hours, I could do all my uni work in front of the TV - I never looked back. I soon fell so in love with crochet, it wasn't very popular at the time for clothing (this was in 2010) so I liked that it was different. I loved how much control you had with it and how you could sculpt with it, it was a very different process - much more organic than I was used to. And that's why I still love it, I feel I can be free when designing, plus I still love being able to work in front of the TV!



What are your favourite crochet patterns to make?

I love a CAL! I love the community aspect of all working on something together as a group. I did one with Hobbii this year which was so fun, and also terrifying as a designer as it was a mystery CAL. People signed up and were joining in but had no idea of what the end piece they were making, every week I was excited and equally scared if they were going to like and enjoy it! But even with the fear, it's so nice to work together on something.

What are some of the challenges you've faced as a crochet designer?

Paying my bills, but I think this is just the general struggle of a creative freelancer. Making a consistent living can be very challenging and I suppose because of that it's keeping the love of it when it's your job. When the passion that used to relax you from anxiety and stress is the thing that

then can cause this it can be hard. I support my business by lecturing and working on projects for other brands, having your fingers in many pies I think is a must.

What are your plans for the future of your crochet business?

To keep going! Next year marks my 10 years of having a crochet business, it's had many different aspects to it and I have pivoted a few times, but I'm still here and that's my general plan for the future, to keep going! My aim for my business is always to strive to work in a way that makes me happy, brings joy to others and keeps me financially stable, and when it doesn't tick all three of those, I switch it up a bit until it does. I really love showing people how to make things and making that process as accessible as possible, so I hope to do more video work to go with patterns, so that's my current focus.

What is your favourite crochet project that you've ever made?

The one that has meant most to me was all the crochet bits I made for my wedding. It came at a time when I really needed to fall in love with crochet again. I was wrapping up my ready-made pieces brand - this had sucked the love out of crochet for me and I was really lost at what to do. From the outside it looked great as I had just had my Selfridges window display and my collection sold there, but the reality of the business was it was failing and completely unsustainable as a business model. I had no idea what I wanted to do next, so I threw myself into creating the bridal bits just for the love of it and to occupy me from panic, and it was here that I just really fell in love with the colour and the craft and the fun again.

What are some of the challenges facing the crochet industry?

For crafts in general, I think people want to know more about where their materials come from, where their yarn comes from, the factories it's made in and what dyes are used – general transparency and information on this. I think yarn brands need to do better at making this information available.

What are your hopes for the future of crochet?

That people keep making amazing things! I love that it has become more fashionable so a new generation of people are picking up hooks. I think for a lot of these craft skills, my main hope is that they just keep



on being handed down and learned so they don't die off! My other hope is that the industrialisation of crochet is better managed; the negative side of the popularity of crochet is that it appears more on our high streets at ridiculously low prices. The majority is all by hand (you do now get some fake-look crochet which is machine knitted or embroidered) but if it's actually crochet it is done by hand and what we pay for this needs to be addressed, workers producing these pieces need to be earning a fair wage for their labour.

What are some of the benefits of crocheting?

It helps me feel grounded. I get a really busy brain a lot and it helps me focus and relax. My hands always feel like they need to be busy, so it helps me focus that into something more productive than a phone scroll hole! But mainly it allows me to be creative and playful and that brings me joy – that's my biggest benefit of crochet, joy!

How do you think crochet can be used to promote sustainability?

I think crocheting can work towards understanding our clothes/homewares in the same way that growing your own veg in your garden can help with understanding food waste. When you grow your own tomatoes in one pot in your garden, you're never going to become fully self-sufficient - but you develop a much greater understanding of the resources, time and effort it takes to produce something. I think this helps us understand food more and be less wasteful, the same can be said with crocheting. Once you make things yourself, you are aware of the time. materials and skill this takes. I think this then helps you understand and be connected with your clothes more. Being connected helps us care, and hopefully caring more helps us treat people and the planet better.

Anything else you would like to share with our readers?



About the yarn

DK; 200m per 100g ball; 100% cotton

Tension

14 sts = 10cm measured over chain Flowers measure between 3.5cm and 9cm in diameter

Hook used

4mm

Other supplies

A pole/stick to hang your garlands from; one shown is 60cm long x 1cm diameter

Sizing

Finished piece as per sample measures approximately 60cm wide by 70cm long, but finished measurements will depend on the space you are filling

.......

Before you start

The number of flowers made for the sample are shown for each type, but you may like to make more or fewer to suit the space you want to fill. There is plenty of yarn left over after the sample size to make lots more, so you can suit yourself.

The flowers look good hung on each strand at about 12 chains/ 8-9cm apart. For the sample, they are hung in strands of 7 to 8 flowers to get approximately 60-70cm in length. Seven strands are hung in a 60cm width, 8-9cm apart.

Measure the width of your space in cm and divide by eight to give an idea of how many strands might look good.

Measure the length of your space and divide by eight to give an idea of how many



flowers to make for each strand. Multiply these two numbers to get a total number of flowers.

There are six types of flowers, make a similar number of each to get your total.

Start crocheting...

Beg 3 ch counts as first tr. Beg 1 ch does not count as a st.

Flowers

Make as many of each flower as you like, to fill your space.

Change colour on every round for maximum colourful impact and try to use an even amount of each colour overall, saving dark green (Spring) for the vines when making up.

Large Circle (10 made for sample)

Rnd 1: Working into a magic ring, 3 ch, 11 tr, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. 12 sts

Rnd 2: 3 ch, 1 tr in first st, 2 tr in each rem st around, join. 24 sts

Rnd 3: 1 ch (does not count as a st), [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] 12 times, join with sl st to beg dc. 36 sts

Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Small circle (9 made for sample)

Rnds 1-2: Work as for Large Circle. 24 sts Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Semicircle (8 made for sample)

Row 1: Working into a magic ring, 3 ch, 5 tr. Turn. 6 sts

Row 2: 3 ch, 1 tr in first st, 2 tr in each rem st across. Turn. 12 sts

Row 3: 1 ch, [1 dc, 5 ch, starting in 2nd st from hook, 4 sl st] 11 times, 1 dc in last st. Fasten off. Weave in ends.

6-petal flower (10 made for sample)

Rnd 1: Working into a magic ring, 3 ch, 11 tr, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. 12 sts **Rnd 2**: 1 ch, {[1 dc, 3 ch, 2trcl, 3 ch, 1 dc]

Décor

in next st, 1 dc} 6 times, join with sl st to beg dc.

Fasten off. Weave in ends.

5-petal flower (7 made for sample)

Chain 4. Join with sl st in first ch to form

Rnd 1: [6 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook, 1 dc, 1 htr, 1 tr, 1 dtr, 1 ttr, 1 sl st into centre of ring] 5 times.

Fasten off. Weave in ends.

12-petal flower (10 made for sample)

Rnd 1: Working into a magic ring, 3 ch, 11 tr, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. 12 sts Rnd 2: 1 ch, [1 dc, 5 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook, 4 sl st, 1 dc] in next st 12

times, join with sl st to beg dc. Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Making up

Vines

With dark green, chain 10 (or enough to fit around the pole you are using to hang them from), join with a sl st in first ch to form a ring. Cont working ch sts to create desired length, attaching flowers at intervals using a sl st into any st on back of flower and adding leaves as you go by working: 6 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook, 1 dc, 1 htr, 1 tr, 1 htr, 1 dc at any point along the length.

There are an average of 12 chs between each flower, but vary the amount to give a more natural appearance. When you have attached your last flower, turn and work a sl st in each ch st back to the top, then sl st in each ch around the hanging loop.

The semicircle flowers look especially good at the end of the chain as you can sl st into the centre of the magic ring and have them hanging curved edge down.

Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Rep for each strand you are making. I made seven with 7-8 flowers on each strand.

Slide the loop of each strand onto your hanging pole.

Special stitches

2 treble cluster (2trcl): [Yrh, insert hook into st, yrh, pul, yrh, draw through 2 loops] twice, yrh, draw through all 3 loops on hook

Rows 2-49: 2 ch, htr across. Turn.

Row 50: 1 ch, dc across, changing to CC1 in last st. Turn.

Edging

Rnd 1: 1 ch, 67 dc, 3 dc in last st, rotate to work across row ends, miss first row end, 1 dc in each rem row end, rotate to work across foundation ch, 3 dc in first ch, 66 dc, 3 dc in last ch, rotate to work across row ends, miss first row end, 1 dc in each rem row end, 2 dc in first stitch to complete corner, join with sl st to beg dc. 242 sts

Rnd 2: 3 ch (counts as 1 htr, 1 ch), miss next st, {*1 htr, 1 ch, miss next st; rep from * to, corner st, [1 htr, 3 ch, 1 htr] in corner stitch, 1 ch, do not miss next st} 4 times, join with sl st in 2nd of beg 3 ch. 128 sts, 124 1ch-sps

Rnds 3-9: SI st into first 1ch-sp, 3 ch, miss next st, *1 htr into next 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss next st; rep from * to corner 3ch-sp, [1 htr, 3 ch, 1 htr] into 3ch-sp, 1 ch, miss next st} 4 times, **1 htr into next 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss next st; rep from ** to beg, join with sl st in 2nd of beg 3 ch. 156 sts, 152 1ch-sps

Rnd 10: Turn and sl st across to last 3ch-sp made, 1 ch, [3 dc into 3ch-sp, dc in each st and 1ch-sp to next corner 3ch-sp] 3 times, 3 dc into last 3ch-sp, sl st across next 7 sts (htr and 1ch-sps), 2 ch (counts as first htr), htr in each st and 1ch-sp across last side until 6 sts rem (htr and 1ch-sps), leave rem sts unworked. Turn. 308 sts

Beg to work in rows on this edge only (between sl sts on each end for first row). **Rows 11-14:** 2 ch, htr across. Turn. *73 sts* Fasten off. Weave in ends.

CUSHION BACK

With MC and larger hook, chain 76. Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 75 htr. Turn. 75 sts

Row 2: 3 ch (counts as first htr and 1 ch throughout Back), *miss next st, 1 htr, 1 ch; rep from * to last 2 sts, miss next st, 1 htr. Turn. 38 sts

Row 3: 3 ch, 1 bbl into first 1ch-sp, *2 ch, miss next st, 1 bbl into next 1ch-sp; rep from * to last st, 1 htr in last st. Turn. 37 bbl

Row 4: 4 ch (counts as first htr and 2 ch), *miss next bbl, 1 htr into next ch-sp, 2 ch; rep from *to last bbl, miss last bbl, 1 htr in top of beg 3 ch. Turn.

Rep rows 3-4 until work measures 19cm, change to CC10 on last st of last row. With CC10, rep rows 3-4 until work measures 38cm from beg.

Last Row: 1 ch, 1 dc in each st and ch-sp across. Fasten off. 75 sts

Acorn (make 3)

This pattern is worked in the amigurumi style, in a spiral without slip stitching or turning chains. Use a stitch marker or waste yarn to keep track of the first stitch of each round.

Rnd 1: With CC2, smaller hook and working into a magic ring, 3 dc. 3 sts

Rnd 2: 2 dc in each st around. 6 sts

Rnd 3: [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] 3 times. 9 sts

Rnd 4: Dc around. **Rnd 5:** [2 dc, 2 dc in next st] 3 times. *12 sts*

Rnds 6-8: Dc around. Change to CC8 on last st of Row 8.

Rnd 9: Dc around. Beg to stuff.

Rnd 10: [3 dc, 2 dc in next st] 3 times. 15 sts

Rnd 11: Dc around.

Rnd 12: [3 dc, 1 inv-dec] 3 times. 12 sts

Rnd 13: [2 dc, 1 inv-dec] 3 times. 9 sts

Rnd 14: [1 dc, 1 inv-dec] 3 times. 6 sts Fasten off, leaving a 60cm tail. Weave tail through rem 6 sts and pull tightly to close hole. Weave through sts to secure then

Special stitches

5 tr bobble (bbl): [Yrh, insert hook into st, yrh, pul, yrh, draw through 2 loops on hook] 5 times, yrh, draw through all 6 loops on hook

Invisible dc2tog (inv-dec): [Insert hook in FLO of next st] twice (3 loops on hook), yrh, draw through 2 loops, yrh, draw through both loops on hook

Surface crochet: Holding working yarn behind piece and hook in front of piece, insert hook through piece, yrh, draw yarn through piece and loop on hook (as a sl st)

Picot: 3 ch, sl st in 3rd ch from hook

Cushion

place hook into top of Acorn and chain 7 with tail. Fasten off.

Oak Leaf (make 3)

With smaller hook and MC, CC4, CC5, CC6 or CC9, chain 3. Use and change colour at random, as you see in nature.

Row 1: 3 dc in 3rd ch from hook. Turn. 3 sts

Rows 2-6: 1 ch, 3 dc. Turn.

Row 7: 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, 3 dc in next st, 2 dc in last dc. Turn. 7 sts

Row 8: 1 ch, 7 dc. Turn.

Row 9: 6 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook, 5 dc across ch, 7 dc. Turn. *12 sts*

Row 10: 5 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook, 4 dc across ch, 12 dc. Turn. *16 sts*

Row 11: 1 ch, 16 dc. Turn. *16 sts*

Row 12: 1 ch, 16 dc. Turn.

Row 13: 2 ch, miss first 2 sts, 11 dc, 1 sl st, leave rem 2 sts unworked. Turn. *11 sts*

Row 14: 2 ch, miss sl st, 2 htr in next st, 10 dc. Turn. *12 sts*

Row 15: 2 ch, 2 htr in first st, 10 dc, 2 htr in last st. Turn. *14 sts*

Row 16: 2 ch, 1 htr in first st, 2 dc in next st, 10 dc, 2 htr. Turn. *15 sts*

Row 17: 2 ch, miss first st, 12 dc, [2 dc in next st] twice. Turn. *16 sts*

Row 18: 2 ch, 2 htr in 2nd ch from hook, 12 dc, 2 htr in next st, leave rem 3 sts unworked. Turn. *16 sts*

Row 19: 2 ch, miss first 2 sts, 7 dc, 2 dc in next st, 3 dc, leave rem 3 sts unworked. Turn. 12 sts

Row 20: 2 ch, 2 dc in 2nd ch from hook, 12 dc. Turn. *14 sts*

Row 21: 5 ch, 2 htr in 2nd ch from hook, 2 dc in next ch, 2 dc across ch, 13 dc, 1 htr. Turn. *20 sts*

Row 22: 2 ch, 2 dc in first st, 18 dc, 2 htr in last st. Turn. *22 sts*

Row 23: 2 ch, 2 dc in first st, 16 dc, miss last 5 sts. Turn. *18 sts*

Row 24: 1 ch, 16 dc, miss last 2 sts. Turn. *16 sts*

Row 25: 2 ch, miss first 2 sts, 14 dc. Turn. *14 sts*

Row 26: 4 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook, 3 dc across ch, 13 dc, leave last st unworked. Turn. *16 sts*

Rows 27-28: 1 ch, 16 dc. Turn.

Row 29: 2 ch, miss first st, 14 dc, miss last st. Turn. *14 sts*

Row 30: 1 ch, 14 dc.

Row 31: 4 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook 3 htr across ch, 12 htr, miss last 2 sts. Turn. *15 sts*

Row 32: 2 ch, miss first st, 2 dc in next st, 12 dc, miss last st. Turn. 14 sts

Row 33: 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, 12 dc, 2 dc in last st. Turn. *16 sts*

Row 34: 2 ch, 1 htr, 13 dc, miss last 2 sts. Turn. *14 sts*

Row 35: 2 ch, 2 htr in first st, 2 dc in next st, 7 dc, 2 dc in next st, leave rem 4 sts unworked. Turn. *13 sts*

Row 36: 1 ch, miss first st, 12 dc. Turn. *12 sts*

Row 37: 1 ch, 12 dc. Turn.

Row 38: 2 ch, miss first 2 sts, 7 dc, 2 dc in next st, miss last 2 sts. Turn. *9 sts*

Row 39: 2 ch, miss first 2 sts, 7 dc. Turn. *7 st*s

Row 40: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog, 3 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. *5 st*s

Row 41: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog, 1 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. *3 sts*Fasten off.

Large Leaf

Make 12 in mixture of colours With smaller hook, chain 2.

Row 1: 3 dc in 2nd ch from hook. Turn. 3 sts **Row 2:** 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, 3 dc in next st,

2 dc in last st. Turn. *7 sts* **Rows 3-4:** 1 ch, 7 dc. Turn.

Row 5: 1 ch, 3 dc, 2 dc in next st, 3 dc. Turn. 8 sts

Row 6: 1 ch, 8 dc. Turn.

Row 7: 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] 3 times, 2 dc in last st. Turn. *13 sts*

Rows 8-10: 1 ch, 13 dc. Turn.

Row 11: 1 ch, 6 dc, 2 dc in next st, 6 dc. Turn. *14 sts*

Row 12: 1 ch, 14 dc. Turn.

Row 13: 1 ch, 6 dc, [2 dc in next st] twice, 6 dc. Turn. *16 sts*

Row 14: 1 ch, 16 dc. Turn.



Row 15: 1 ch, 7 dc, [2 dc in next st] twice, 7 dc. Turn. *18 sts*

Rows 16-18: 1 ch, 18 dc. Turn.

Row 19: 1 ch, 8 dc, 1 dc2tog, 8 dc. Turn. *17 sts*

Row 20: 1 ch, 8 dc, 1 dc2tog, 7 dc. Turn. 16 sts

Row 21: 1 ch, 7 dc, 1 dc2tog, 7 dc. Turn. *15 st*s

Row 22: 1 ch, 7 dc, 1 dc2tog, 6 dc. Turn.

Row 23: 1 ch, [1 dc2tog, 4 dc] twice, 1 dc2tog. Turn. *11 sts*

Row 24: 1 ch, 11 dc. Turn.

Row 25: 1 ch, 5 dc, 1 dc2tog, 4 dc. Turn.

Row 26: 1 ch, 4 dc, 1 dc2tog, 4 dc. Turn. 9 sts

Row 27: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog, 5 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. *7 sts*

Row 28: 1 ch, [1 dc, 1 dc2tog] twice, 1 dc. Turn. *5 sts*

Row 29: 1 ch, 1 dc, 1 dc3tog, 1 dc. Turn. 3 sts

Row 30: 1 ch, 1 dc3tog. Fasten off. Make in pairs, use colour changes, surface crochet, or simple embroidery to mark leaf veins.

Sew or crochet a pair of leaves tog, placing a piece of crackle paper in between each pair. Leave a long tail for sewing to cushion.


Small Leaf

Make 15 to 20 small leaves in a mixture of colours.

Rows 1-8: As for Large Leaf. *13 sts*

Row 9: 1 ch, 5 dc, 1 dc2tog, 6 dc. Turn. 12 sts

Row 10: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog, 8 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. *10 sts*



Row 11: 1 ch, 3 dc, 1 dc2tog, 5 dc. Turn. 9 sts

Row 12: 1 ch, 9 dc. Turn.

Row 13: 1 ch, 3 dc, 1 dc2tog, 4 dc. Turn.

Row 14: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog, 4 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 6 sts

Row 15: 1 ch, 2 dc, 1 dc2tog, 2 dc. Turn.

Row 16: 1 ch, 1 dc, 1 dc2tog, 2 dc. Turn. 4 sts

Row 17: 1 ch, 1 dc, 1 dc2tog, 1 dc. Turn. 3 sts

Row 18: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog, 1 dc. Turn. 2 sts Row 19: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog. Fasten off. Use surface crochet or simple embroidery to mark veins on leaf, leave a long tail

for sewing.

Horse Chestnut Leaf (make 2)

With CC5 or CC6 and 3mm hook, chain 2.

Row 1: 3 dc in 2nd ch from hook. Turn. 3 sts Row 2: 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, 1 dc, 2 dc in

last st. Turn. 5 sts

Row 3: 1 ch, 2 dc in each st. Turn. 10 sts

Row 4: 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, 1 sl st, [2 dc in next st, 1 sl st] 4 times. Turn. 10 sts

Row 5: 2 ch, 2 htr, leave rem sts unworked. Turn. 2 sts

Row 6: 2 ch, 2 htr. Turn.

Row 7: 2 ch, 1 htr, 1 dc. Turn. 2 sts

Row 8: 2 ch, miss first st, 1 dc. Fasten off.

Row 9: Rejoin yarn with sl st in next unworked dc on Row 4, 2 ch, 2 htr in same st as sl st, 1 htr, leave rem sts unworked. Turn. 3 sts

Row 10: 2 ch, 1 htr, 2 htr in next st, 1 dc. Turn. 4 sts

Row 11: 2 ch, 4 htr. Turn.

Row 12: 2 ch, 2 htr, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 3 sts

Row 13: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog, 1 dc. Fasten off. 2 sts

Row 14: Rejoin yarn with sl st in next unworked dc on Row 4, 2 ch, 2 htr in same st as sl st, 1 htr, 2 htr in next st, leave rem sts unworked. Turn. 5 sts

Rows 15-17: 2 ch, 5 htr. Turn.

Row 18: 1 ch, 1 dc, 3 htr, 1 dc. Turn.

Row 19: 1 ch, miss first st, 1 dc, 1 htr, 1 dc, 1 sl st. Turn. 3 sts

Row 20: 1 ch, miss sl st, 3 dc, miss last sl st. Turn.

Row 21: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog, 1 dc. Turn. 2 sts

Row 22: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 1 st

Row 23: 1 ch, 1 dc. Fasten off.

Row 24: As Row 9.

Rows 25-28: Rep rows 10-13.

Row 29: Rejoin yarn with sl st in next unworked dc on Row 4, 2 ch, 2 htr in same st as sl st. Turn. 2 sts

Rows 30-31: Rep rows 6-7.

Row 32: As Row 8, on last st, change to CC10, sl st around entire edge of Leaf, making a picot at each of the 5 points. Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing.

Hedgehog

This pattern is worked in the amigurumi style.

Rnd 1: With smaller hook, scrap of black yarn and working into a magic ring, 4 dc. 4 sts

Rnd 2: [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] twice, changing toCC2 in last st. 6 sts

Rnd 3: With CC2, 6 dc.

Rnd 4: 2 dc in each st around. 12 sts

Rnd 5: [2 dc in next st, 1 dc] 6 times. 18 sts

Rnd 6: 18 dc.

Insert safety eyes between rnds 2 and 3. Rnd 7: 18 dc, changing to CC8 in last st.

Rnds 8-9: With CC8, 18 dc.

Rnd 10: [2 dc in next st, 2 dc] 6 times. 24 sts

Rnd 11: 24 dc.

Rnd 12: [3 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. *30 sts*

Rnd 13: 30 dc.

Rnd 14: [4 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. *36 sts*

Rnds 15-16: 36 dc.

Rnd 17: [4 dc, 1 dc2tog] 6 times, insert

stuffing and squeaker. 30 sts Rnd 18: [3 dc, 1 dc2tog] 6 times. 24 sts

Rnd 19: [2 dc, 1 dc2tog] 6 times. 18 sts

Rnd 20: [1 dc, 1 dc2tog] 6 times. 12 sts

Rnd 21: 12 dc.

Rnd 22: 6 dc2tog. 6 sts

Finish stuffing, checking squeaker is working, fasten off leaving a long tail. Weave tail through rem 6 sts and pull tightly to close.

Cut fifteen 10-12cm lengths of CC8. Working down centre back of Hedgehog, make a larkshead knot with 1 length in each row of CC8.

Conkers (make 2)

This pattern is worked in the amigurumi style.

Rnd 1: With larger hook, CC2 and working into a magic ring, 6 dc. 6 sts

Rnd 2: 2 dc in each st around.

Rnd 3: [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times, changing to CC8 in last st. 18 sts

Rnd 4: [2 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 24 sts

Rnds 5-7: 24 dc.

Rnd 8: [2 dc, 1 dc2tog] 6 times. 18 sts Beg to stuff, add bell.

Rnd 9: [1 dc, 1 dc2tog] 6 times. 12 sts

Rnd 10: 6 dc2tog. 6 sts

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing. Weave tail through rem 6 sts and pull tightly to close.

Stem

Row 1: Join CC2 with sl st in centre top of Conker, 52 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook, dc to end.

Fasten off. Tie 2 stems tog.

Making up

Weave in all ends and block. With RS tog, sew cushion Panels tog. Turn to RS out, sew toggles on flap firmly, use natural gaps between sts for buttonholes. Position and sew Leaves, Hedgehog, Conkers and Acorn as desired onto Front Panel, using the photograph as a guide. Add piece of A4 crinkle paper inside of the cushion, along with small bag containing weighted pellets (optional).

Lining

Cut one fat quarter at 42.5cm square, cut 2nd fat quarter into two pieces, each 42.5 x 27cm. Hem by using a 1.5cm double fold along one long edge on each piece. Press and place two smaller pieces RS together with hemmed edges overlapping, onto larger square piece. Stitch around pieces. Turn RS out, clip corners and press. Place cushion pad and crinkle paper sheet inside inner cushion bag just made, add small weighted bag, place in crocheted cushion cover and enjoy sensory fun. 🏶





LITTLE FOXY HOODIE

Little ones won't want to take this adorable and soft jacket off this autumn - it's like playing dress up every day!

** Intermediate

Yarn used

King Cole Merino Blend DK 4 (5, 5, 6, 7, 9) balls in Cinnamon 3298 (MC) 1 ball each in Graphite 702 (CC1) & White 001 (CC2)

About the yarn

DK; 104m per 50g ball; 96% wool, 4% viscose

Tension

17 sts x 18 rows = 10cm measured over st patt with larger hook

Hooks used

3.5mm 4mm

Other supplies

locking stitch markers 2mm buttons, quantity as desired oddment of DK-weight light green yarn

Sizing

Sizes 0-6m (6-12m, 12-18m, 18-24m, 2-3y, 4-5y) See table for finished measurements

Hoodie is worked bottom up, with two panels made for the front, one for the back and one for each of the sleeves (worked cuff to shoulder). The hood is made in one separate flat panel which is seamed together to create the hood. A hem, button band and cuff are added to finish. Foxy features are Muzzle, Nose, Ears and Eyes.



Start crocheting...

Beg 1 ch does not count as a st unless otherwise specified. Add a marker to the RS of each piece to help with making up.

BACK

With MC and larger hook, chain 42 (46, 52, 54, 57, 60).

Row 1 (WS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, dc to end. Turn. 41 (45, 51, 53, 56, 59) sts

*Row 2: 1 ch, htr to end. Turn.

Row 3: 1 ch, dc to end. Turn.

Rep rows 2-3 until there are a total of 25 (29, 33, 35, 37, 39) rows, finishing with a rep of Row 3. PM at beg and end of last row for

Sleeve placement.

Cont as set, repeating rows 2-3 until there are a total of 43 (47, 53, 57, 61, 65) rows, finishing with a rep of Row 3. Fasten off.*

FRONT (make 2)

With MC and larger hook, chain 20 (21, 24, 26, 27, 28).

Row 1 (WS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, dc to end. Turn. 19 (20, 23, 25, 26, 27) sts Rep from * to * on Back.

SLEEVES (make 2)

With CC1 and larger hook, chain 26 (28, 28, 29, 29, 31).

Row 1 (WS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, dc to end. Turn. 25 (27, 27, 28, 28, 30) sts

Row 2: 1 ch, htr to end. Turn.

Row 3: 1 ch, 1 dc, 2 dc in next st, dc to end. Turn. 26 (28, 28, 29, 29, 31) sts

Row 4: 1 ch, htr to end. Turn.

Row 5: 1 ch, dc across to last 2 sts, 2 dc in next st, 1 dc in last st. Turn. 27 (29, 29, 30, 30, 32) sts

Rep rows 2-5 until there are a total of 17 (17, 21, 27, 33, 39) rows from beg, ending with a rep of Row 5 (5, 5, 3, 5, 3). Fasten off CC1, leaving a long tail for seaming, 33 (35, 37, 41, 44, 49) sts

Join MC with sl st in first st and cont without shaping as follows:

Row 1: 1 ch, htr to end. Turn. 33 (35, 37,

Cuff

With smaller hook and RS facing, join CC1 with sl st to first foundation ch of Sleeve.

Row 1 (RS): 6 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook, 5 dc, sl st in next 2 sts on underside of foundation ch. Turn. 5 dc, 2 sl sts

Row 2 (WS): Miss 2 sl sts, 5 dc in BLO. Turn 5 sts

Row 3: 1 ch, 5 dc in BLO, sl st in next 2 sts on underside of foundation ch. Turn. 5 dc, 2 sl sts

Rep rows 2-3 around Sleeve.

HOOD

With MC and larger hook, chain 57 (59, 63, 64, 64, 66).

Row 1 (WS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, dc to end. Turn. 56 (58, 62, 63, 63, 65) sts

Row 2: 1 ch, htr to end. Turn.

Row 3: 1 ch, dc to end. Turn.

Rep rows 2-3 until there a total of 31 (33, 35, 35, 37, 37) rows, finishing with a rep of Row 3.

Fasten off.

With RS facing, miss first 19 (19, 21, 21, 21, 22) sts on last row and re-join CC2 with sl st in next st.

Row 1: 1 ch, starting in same st as join, htr in next 18 (20, 20, 21, 21, 21) sts, leave rem 19 (19, 21, 21, 21, 22) sts unworked. Turn. 18 (20, 20, 21, 21, 21) sts

Row 2: 1 ch, dc to end. Turn.

Row 3: 1 ch, htr to end. Turn.

Rep rows 2-3 until there are a total of 20 (20, 22, 22, 24) rows in this narrower section, finishing with a rep of Row 2. Fasten off, block to shape if needed. Make up Hood by seaming row ends of narrower section to adjacent missed sts on Row 31 (33, 35, 35, 37, 37) of beg section, seam both sides with WS facing you.

Edging

With smaller hook and WS facing, join MC with sl st to bottom front of Hood.

Row 1 (WS): Work a row of dc along the front opening of Hood, working evenly into row ends and sts as follows: 32 (34, 36, 38, 38, 40) dc along the first side edge of Hood, 18 (20, 20, 20, 20, 22) dc along top of Hood, then 32 (34, 36, 38, 38, 40) dc along next side edge of Hood. Turn. 82 (88, 92, 96, 96, 102) sts



Row 2 (RS): 6 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook, 5 dc, sl st in next 2 sts on Row 1. Turn. 5 dc, 2 sl sts

Row 3: Miss 2 st sts, 5 dc in BLO. Turn. 5 dc

Row 4: 1 ch, 5 dc in BLO, sl st in next 2 sts on Row 1. Turn. 5 dc, 2 sl sts Rep rows 3-4 around front opening of Hood. Fasten off.

Making up

Place Front Panels onto Back Panel with WS tog. With larger hook, join Front and Back panels tog at shoulders working a sl st seam under one loop from each piece. Working from the outer edge inwards. create a shoulder seam of 4 (5.5, 6.5, 6.5, 7, 7.5) cm or 7 (9, 11, 11, 12, 13) sts, leaving the remainder of the panels un-joined for the neckline. Check Hood placement and sleeve length, if desired, before sewing Hood; ease any rem width necessary if changed from given.

The side and Sleeve seams should be finished using a dc seam working under one loop from each piece, this creates a wonderful flat seam which helps keep the shape of the garment. Using the markers as a guide (match ends of Sleeve to marked row end on Front/Back), sew Sleeves into position along Front and Back Panels. Next, starting at bottom edge of Hoodie, and using dc seam, work up to armpit and then down along Sleeve, changing colour when necessary on Sleeve.

Hem

With RS facing and smaller hook, join MC with sl st at the corner front hem of Hoodie. Work at right angles to the hem and into foundation ch as follows:

Row 1 (RS): 6 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook, 5 dc, sl st in next 2 sts on underside of foundation ch. Turn. 5 dc, 2 sl sts

Row 2: Miss 2 sl sts, 5 dc in BLO. Turn. 5 sts

Row 3: 1 ch, 5 dc in BLO, sl st in next 2 sts on underside of foundation ch. Turn. 5 dc. 2 sl sts

Rep rows 2-3 along hem. Fasten off.



BUTTONBAND First side

With WS facing and smaller hook, join MC with sl st to top (or bottom) of the Front Panel you wish to add buttons to.

Row 1: Evenly place 46 (50, 54, 60, 62, 66) dc across the row ends, ensuring there are an even number of sts at the end. Turn.

Edging

Row 2 (RS): 6 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook, 5 dc, sl st in next 2 sts on Row 1. Turn. 5 dc, 2 sl sts

Row 3 (WS): Miss 2 sl sts, 5 dc in BLO. Turn. 5 sts

Row 4: 1 ch, 5 dc in BLO, sl st in next 2 sts on Row 1. Turn. 5 dc, 2 sl sts Rep rows 3-4 until you reach the bottom (or top) of Front Panel.

Fasten off.

PM indicating where buttons will be attached (first buttonhole will be made in Row 5 of Edging).

Second side

With WS facing and smaller hook, join MC with sl st to bottom (or top) of 2nd Front Panel:

Row 1 (WS): Rep Row 1 of First Side, ensuring there are the same number of sts on both sides.

Add corresponding st markers to Row 1 indicating where buttonholes should be placed.

Edging

Row 2 (RS): As Row 2 of First Side. Row 3 (WS): Miss 2 sts, sl sts, 5 dc in BLO. Turn. 5 sts

Row 4: 1 ch, 5 dc in BLO, sl st in next 2 sts on Row 1. Turn. 5 dc, 2 sl sts

Buttonhole (BH)

BH Row A (WS): Miss 2 sl sts, 1 dc in BLO, 2 ch, miss 2 sts, 2 dc in BLO. Turn. 2 dc, 1 2ch-sp

BH Row B (RS): 1 ch, 2 dc in BLO, 2 dc into 2ch-sp, 1 dc in BLO, sl st in next 2 sts on Row 1. Turn. 5 dc, 2 sl sts

Rep rows 3 and 4, adding a buttonhole when reaching each marked st (replace Row 3 with BH Row A, and Row 4 with BH Row B) to top (or bottom) of Front. Fasten off.

Sew buttons to First Side, lining up with buttonholes.

Nose

With CC1 and smaller hook, chain 4.

Row 1 (RS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 2 dc, 2 dc in last ch. 4 sts

Row 2 (WS): 1 ch, 1 dc, 2 dc in next st, dc to end. 5 sts

Rows 3-4: Rep Row 2. 7 sts Fasten off

Outer Ears (make 2)

With MC and smaller hook, chain 3.

Row 1 (RS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 1 dc, 2 dc in last ch. 3 sts

Row 2 (WS): 1 ch, 1 dc, 2 dc in next st, dc to end. 4 sts

Rows 3-9: Rep Row 2. 11 sts Fasten off.

Inner Ears (make 2)

With CC1 and smaller hook, chain 3.

Rows 1-2: As for Outer Ear. 4 sts

Rows 3-7: As Row 2 of Outer Ear. 9 sts Fasten off.

Making up Ears

Lay Outer Ears RS up, lay Inner Ear on top of Outer Ear with RS up and ear tips even. Sew tog around edge.

Muzzle

Join MC with larger hook to first MC st above CC2 on Hood.

Row 1 (WS): 1 ch, working around posts of MC sts, 18 (20, 20, 21, 21, 21) dc across colour change. 18 (20, 20, 21, 21, 21) sts

Row 2 (RS): 1 ch, 1 htr2tog, dc to last 2 sts, 1 htr2tog. 16 (18, 18, 19, 19, 19) sts

Row 3: 1 ch, dc to end.

Rows 4-17 (19, 19, 19, 19, 19): Rep last 2 rows. 2 (2, 2, 3, 3, 3) sts

Fasten off.

Eyes (make 2)

Rnd 1: With CC1, smaller hook and working into a magic ring, 6 dc, join with sl st to beg dc. 6 sts

Rnd 2: 1 ch (counts as first dc), 1 dc in first st, 2 dc in each st around, join with sl st to beg 1 ch. 12 sts

Fasten off.

Rnd 3: With oddment of light green DK yarn and smaller hook, join with sl st to any st, sl st in next 4 sts. leave rem sts unworked. fasten off (5 green sts), join CC2 with sl st to st before light green section, sl st across light green sts, sl in next st, fasten off, (7 CC2 sts), starting in next st, pul of MC, 1 ch, starting in next st, 4 dc (keep these sts loose, 5 MC sts). Fasten off.

Use yarn tails to tidy up edges where the colours meet.

With CC2 and using photo as a guide, embroider highlights to Eyes.

Finishing

Fold Muzzle down and pin into position, and once happy sew. Using photo as a guide, sew Eyes, Nose and Ears to Hood. Attach Hood as follows: With RS tog, pin foundation row of Hood around neckline, ensuring Hood fronts lie flush with the top of Button Bands. Sew Hood to neckline. Weave in rem ends.



Rnd 1: Working into ring, 3 ch, 2 tr, [3 ch, 3 tr] 3 times, 3 ch, changing to next colour, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. 12 sts

Rnd 2: 4 ch, *miss next 3 sts, [3 tr, 3 ch, 3 tr] into next 3ch-sp, 1 ch; rep from * to last 3 sts, miss last 3 sts, [3 tr, 3 ch, 2 tr] into last 2ch-sp to complete corner, changing to next colour, join with sl st in 4th of beg 4 ch. 24 sts

Rnd 3: 4 ch, *miss next 3 sts, [3 tr, 3 ch, 3 tr] into corner 3ch-sp, 1 ch, miss next 3 sts**, 3 tr into next 1ch-sp, 1 ch; rep from * around ending last rep at **, 2 tr into last 1ch-sp covering joining sl st, changing to MC, join with sl st in 4th of beg 4 ch. 36 sts

Rnd 4: 4 ch, *miss next 3 sts, [3 tr, 3 ch, 3 tr] into corner 3ch-sp**, [1 ch, miss next 3 sts, 3 tr into next 1ch-sp] twice, 1 ch; rep from * around ending last rep at **, 1 ch, miss next 3 sts, 3 tr into next 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss next 3 sts, 2 tr into last 1ch-sp covering joining sl st, join with sl st in 4th of beg 4 ch. 48 sts Fasten off.

Joining

Lay out Squares with RS facing as shown in Front Layout Diagram for your size. Join horizontal seams first, then join vertical seams.

With MC and starting with first 2 adjacent Squares, start in one corner (in ch after centre ch) and *insert hook from RS in BLO on first Square, then in BLO of adjacent Square, pick up MC and pull it through both loops on hook; rep from * along 1 side working in each st and ch to centre ch of 3ch-sp, miss centre ch, 2 ch, rep from * along next two Squares until all Squares on Front are joined, then rep for Back Squares. Do not join Front and Back at this time.

SIZES S & M ONLY:

Work treble-crochet groups back and forth along the neck on completed Back Panel only.

Row 1 (RS): With RS facing, join MC with sl st in corner 3ch-sp of first Square, [3 ch, 2 tr] into same 3ch-sp, [1 ch, 3 tr into next ch-sp] 9 times, changing to any CC in last st. Pm around post of first st of row. Turn. 30 sts

Row 2: With CC, 4 ch, [3 tr into next 1chsp, 1 ch] 9 times, 1 tr in top of beg 3 ch, changing to MC. Turn. 28 sts

Row 3: With MC, 3 ch, 2 tr into first 1chsp, [1 ch, 3 tr into next 1ch-sp] 9 times, changing to any CC in last st. Turn. 30 sts

Rows 4-5: rep rows 2 and 3 once more, do not turn or change to CC at end of Row 5.

Edging 1

Row 1: Cont with MC, rotate to work across row ends, 3 dc around post of st on Row 5, [3 dc around st on next row] 3 times, 1 dc around post of st on Row 1. Turn. 13 sts

Row 2: Working only in adjacent sts, join to side of adjacent Square in the same manner as Front and Back Panels were assembled. Fasten off. Leave rem sts on adjacent Square unworked. Fasten off.

Edging 2

Row 1: With RS facing and working across row ends, join MC with sl st around post of marked st, rm, 1 dc around same st, [3 dc around st on next row] 4 times. Turn. 13 sts

Row 2: As Row 2 of Edging 1.

SIZES M, L, XL, 2X & 3X ONLY: SIDE PANELS Right Side, Back Panel

Row 1 (RS): With RS facing, join MC with sl st in top corner of - (2nd, 2nd, 2nd, 3rd, 3rd) Square from bottom edge, [3 ch, 2 tr] into same 3ch-sp as join, *1 ch, 3 tr into next ch-sp; rep from * to end. Turn. - (30, 30, 30, 45, 45) sts

Row 2 (WS): With MC, 4 ch, change to any CC in last ch, 3 tr into next 1ch-sp, *1 ch, 3 tr into next 1ch-sp; rep from * to last 3 sts, miss last 3 sts. Turn. Fasten off MC and CC. - (28, 28, 28, 43, 43) sts

SIZES L, XL, 2X & 3X ONLY:

Row 3: Join MC with sl st in first st, 3 ch (does not count as a st), *3 tr into next chsp, 1 ch; rep from * to end omitting last 1 ch on last rep. Turn. - (-, 27, 27, 42, 42) sts Fasten off Size L only.

SIZES XL, 2X & 3X ONLY:

Rows 4-5: Rep rows 2–3. – (-, -, 24, 39, 39) sts

Fasten off Size XL only.

SIZES 2X & 3X ONLY:

Rows 6-7: Rep rows 2–3. – (-, -, -, 36, 36) sts Row 8: As Row 2. - (-, -, -, 34, 34) sts

SIZE 3X ONLY:

Row 9: As Row 3. – (-, -, -, -, 33) sts **Row 10:** As Row 2. – (-, -, -, -, 31) sts The side section measures approx. - (2, 4, 6, 9, 12) cm.

Left Side, Back Panel

Work in the same way as the RH side but start from the WS and join in ch-sp at bottom of panel so decreases match on both sides.

SIDES ON FRONT PANEL

Work in the same way as Back Panel.

SLEEVES

Lay out Squares with RS facing as shown in Sleeve Layout Diagram for your size. Join horizontal seams first, then join vertical seams. Fold Sleeve in half vertically (bring A to B as shown on Layout Diagram) and sew Sleeve seam leaving 0 (2, 3, 4, 9, 12) cm at the top. Work the other sleeve seam in the same way but in reverse (the squares at the top of first Sleeve will be at the bottom on 2nd Sleeve).

Making up

Work all seams in the same manner as joining Squares. Lay Back and Front Panels next to each other, with shoulders touching and RS out. Seam shoulders. Fold to have WS tog and bottom edges even, then seam Sleeves to Front and Back Panels, matching fold of Sleeve with fold at top of shoulder, beg with seaming the 0 (2, 3, 4, 9, 12) cm unjoined at top of Sleeve to top of Side Panels. Leaving a split of 8-10 cm at the bottom of each side, seam Sleeve and side.

Neck Edging

Rnd 1: Join MC with sl st in centre ch-sp of either shoulder, 1 dc into same ch-sp as join, *3 ch, 1 dc into next ch-sp; rep from * around neckline, 3 ch, join with sl st to beg. Fasten off.

Hem Edging

Work around bottom of jumper in the same manner as Neck Edging. Cut and fasten the strands.

Weave in ends.



Snoopy: 16cm tall Pumpkin: 16cm diameter x 9.5cm tall

This pattern is worked in the amigurumi style (unless otherwise specified), in a spiral without slip stitching or turning chains. Rnds 6-11: Dc around.

On the next rnd the increases mark the top of Head.

Rnd 12: 12 dc, [2 dc in next st] 6 times, 12 dc. 36 sts

Rnds 13-18: Dc around.

Rnd 19: [4 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 30 sts Beg to stuff Head, cont as you go. With black embroidery thread, using photograph as a guide, embroider eyes between rnds 12-13 approximately 7 sts apart.

Rnd 20: [3 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog]. 24 sts

Rnd 21: [2 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog]. 18 sts

Rnd 22: [1 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog]. 12 sts

Rnd 23: 6 inv-dc2tog. 6 sts

Fasten off, leaving a long tail. Use tail end to sew hole closed.

Legs (make 2)

Rnd 1: With CC1 and working into a magic ring, 6 dc. 6 sts

Rnd 2: {1 dc, [2 dc in next st] twice} twice.

Rnd 3: {2 dc, [2 dc in next st] 3 times} twice. 16 sts

Rnd 4: 5 dc, 2 dc in next st, 7 dc, 2 dc in next st, 2 dc. 18 sts

Rnd 5: Dc around.

Rnd 6: 10 dc, 4 inv-dc2tog. 14 sts

Rnd 7: 1 inv-dc2tog, 6 dc, 3 inv-dc2tog.

Rnd 8: Dc around

Fasten off first Leg, do not fasten off second Leg. Cont to Body.

Body

Rnd 9: 2 ch, sl st in any st on first Leg, 10 dc around first Leg, 2 dc across chain, 10 dc around second Leg, 2 dc across other side of chain. 24 sts

Beg to stuff, cont as you go.

Rnd 10: [3 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 30 sts Rnd 11: [4 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 36 sts

Rnds 12-14: Dc around.

Rnd 15: [4 dc. 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 30 sts

Rnd 16-20: Dc around.

Rnd 21: [3 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 24 sts

Rnds 22-23: Dc around.

Rnd 24: [2 dc. 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 18 sts Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing Head onto Body.

With black embroidery thread, using photograph as a guide, embroider three lines onto each Paw.

Nose

Rnd 1: With CC2 and working into a magic ring, 5 dc. 5 sts

Rnd 2: [2 dc in next st] 5 times. 10 sts

Rnd 3: [3 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] twice. 8 sts Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing Nose onto Head. Stuff Nose.

Ears (make 2)

Fars are unstuffed.

Rnds 1-3: With CC2, work as for Head. 18 sts

Rnds 4-5: Dc around.

Rnd 6: [4 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 3 times. 15 sts

Rnds 7-8: Dc around.

Rnd 9: [3 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 3 times. 12 sts

Rnd 10: Dc around.

Rnd 11: [2 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 3 times. 9 sts

Rnd 12: Dc around.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing Ears onto Head.

Back Patch

Rnds 1-2: With CC2, work as for Nose. Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing Patch onto Body.

Arms (make 2)

Rnd 1: With CC1 and working into a magic ring, 6 dc. 6 sts

Rnd 2: [2 dc in next st] 6 times. 12 sts

Rnds 3-6: Dc around.

Rnd 7: [4 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] twice. 10 sts

Rnds 8-11: Dc around.

Rnd 12: [3 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog]. 8 sts

Rnd 13-14: Dc around.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing Arms to Body.

Stuff to Rnd 9 only, leaving top of Arm unstuffed.

With black embroidery thread, using photograph as a guide, embroider 3 lines onto each Paw.

Rnd 1: With CC2 and working into a magic ring, 4 dc. 4 sts

Rnd 2: Dc around.

Using photograph as a guide, sew Nose onto Head between eyes, over rnds 3-4. Sew Ears either side of Head over rnds 15-18, approximately 8 sts apart. Sew Head to top of Body. Sew Back Patch to back of Body. Sew Tail to back of Body. Sew Arms either side of Body, angled so they point forwards.

Collar

With CC3, crochet a chain long enough to fit around Neck.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 1 dc in each st to end.

Fasten off.

Attach Collar at the bottom of the Head around Neck.

Rnd 60: 6 inv-dc2tog. 6 sts

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing. Use tail to sew hole closed.

Pumpkin topper (make 2)

Rnd 1: With MC and working into a magic ring, 6 dc. 6 sts

Rnd 2: [2 dc in next st] 6 times. 12 sts

Rnd 3: [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. *18 sts* Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing.

Making up

Cut a length of MC and wrap it around Pumpkin twice, taking it through the centre of Pumpkin and pulling it taut to shape into segments. Tie in a secure knot at the top. Rep twice more to create six equal segments.

Sew Pumpkin Topper onto top and bottom of Pumpkin to cover where the yarn for making the segments crosses.

Cut 2 triangles for eyes and one mouth shape out of felt. Glue or sew, with black sewing thread and sewing needle, triangles and mouth onto front of completed Pumpkin.



Colour sequence

Change colour at the end of every row throughout pattern. Repeat colour sequence as necessary. MC, CC1, CC2, MC, CC3, CC2, MC, CC3, MC, CC3, CC1, MC, CC2, CC1, MC, CC2, CC3, MC, CC1, CC3

Stitch pattern

Moss stitch: 2 ch, miss 1 dc, 1 dc into next 1ch-sp, *1 ch, miss 1 dc, 1 dc into next 1ch-sp; rep from * to end. Turn.

Start crocheting...

Carry yarn up the sides of your work rather than cutting every row to reduce the number of ends to weave in.

Change colour on the last yrh of the last st of the row.

Front and Back panels are worked sideways. Shoulder seams are joined, then sleeves are worked onto panels. Beg 2 ch counts as one st.

Each ch in moss st patt is counted as a st.

FRONT PANEL

With MC, chain 44 (46, 48, 50, 50) (54, 58, 66, 72, 76)

Row 1: Starting in 4th ch from hook (missed chs count as first 1ch-sp), 1 dc, *1 ch, miss 1 ch, 1 dc; rep from * to end, change to CC1. Turn. 42 (44, 46, 48, 48) (52, 56, 64, 70, 74) sts

Work another 7 (7, 7, 7, 9) (9, 11, 11, 13, 15) rows in moss st patt, cont to follow colour sequence throughout.

Neck Shaping

Next Row: Work in patt until 4 sts rem (working last dc into 3rd ch-sp from end of row), change to next colour, leave rem 4 sts unworked, Turn, 38 (40, 42, 44, 44) (48, 52, 60, 66, 70) sts **

Next Row: 3 ch (counts as first st), pm in 3ch-sp just made, miss [1 dc, 1 ch, 1 dc],

Work 21 (23, 25, 27, 27) (31, 31, 33, 33, 33) rows in moss st patt.

Neck Shaping

Next Row: Work in moss st patt to end, 2 fdc, changing colour on last fdc. Turn. 38 (40, 42, 44, 44) (48, 52, 60, 66, 70) sts

Next Row: 6 ch, starting in 4th ch from hook, 1 dc, 1 ch, miss 1 ch, 1 dc in last ch, cont in moss st patt to end. 42 (44, 46, 48, 48) (52, 56, 64, 70, 74) sts Work 7 (7, 7, 7, 9) (9, 11, 11, 13, 15) rows

Fasten off all colours, leaving a long tail on last row for seaming shoulders.

BACK PANEL

in moss st patt.

With MC, chain 44 (46, 48, 50, 50) (54, 58, 66, 72, 76)

Work as for Front Panel to **. 38 (40, 42, 44, 44) (48, 52, 60, 66, 70) sts

Centre Back

Work 24 (26, 28, 30, 30) (34, 34, 36, 36, 36) rows in moss st patt.

Neck Shaping

Next Row: 6 ch, starting in 4th ch from hook, 1 dc, 1 ch, miss 1 ch, 1 dc in last ch, cont in moss st to end. 42 (44, 46, 48, 48) (52, 56, 64, 70, 74) sts

Work 7 (7, 7, 7, 9) (9, 11, 11, 13, 15) rows in moss st patt.

Fasten off.

Joining

Place Front and Back panels WS together, aligning shoulders. With MC, starting from outside edge, join the first 8 (8, 8, 8, 10) (10, 12, 12, 14, 16) rows together using whip stitch. Rep for opposite shoulder. Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Neck Ribbing

Join MC with sl st at either shoulder seam on neck opening.

Chain 8.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook and working in the back bump of chs, 7 sl st, [1 sl st in next st on Body] twice. Turn. 9 sts

Row 2: Miss first 2 sl sts, 7 sl st in BLO. Turn. 7 sts



Row 3: 1 ch, 7 sl st in BLO, [1 sl st in next st : on Body] twice.

Rep rows 2-3 until you have worked around entire neck opening.

Fasten off.

Using mattress stitch, seam the two ends of ribbing tog.

SLEEVES

These will be worked directly onto the joined Front and Back Panels. Follow colour sequence throughout, starting with MC and changing colour at the end of every row.

With RS of Front Panel facing, count down from shoulder seam 17 (18, 19, 19, 19) (22, 23, 25, 27, 29) sts (remembering to include 1ch-sps), pm in next st. Rep for Back Panel. 36 (38, 40, 40, 40) (46, 48, 52, 56, 60) sts from marker to marker, inclusive.

With RS facing, join MC with sl st in first marked st, rm.

Row 1: 2 ch, miss st with join, 1 dc, *1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 dc; rep from * to next marked st (working last dc into marked st), rm. Turn. 36 (38, 40, 40, 40) (46, 48, 52, 56, 60) sts

Work 1 (1, 1, 1, 3) (3, 3, 3, 5, 5) rows in moss

(Work more or fewer rows here if you need to adjust sleeve length)

Dec Row: 2 ch, 1 moss-dec, cont in moss st patt across until 3 ch-sps rem, 1 mossdec, 1 ch, 1 dc into last ch-sp. Turn. 4 sts dec'd, 32 (34, 36, 36, 36) (42, 44, 48, 52, 56) sts

Work 2 (2, 4, 7, 7) (7, 9, 10, 11, 11) rows in moss st patt.

Rep last 3 (3, 5, 8, 8) (8, 10, 11, 12, 12) rows 3 (0, 3, 1, 1) (0, 3, 1, 3, 2) more time(s). 20 (34, 24, 32, 32) (42, 32, 44, 40, 48) sts

SIZES 6M, 18M, 6Y & 10Y ONLY:

Work 2 (-, 2, -, -) (-, 4, -, 6, -) more rows in moss st patt.

SIZES 12M, 24M, 2Y, 4Y, 8Y & 12Y ONLY:

*Work Dec Row. - (30, -, 28, 28) (38, -, 40, -, 44) sts

Work - (3, -, 8, 8) (8, -, 11, -, 12) rows in moss st patt.**

Rep between * and ** - (2, -, 1, 1) (2, -, 1, -, 0) more time(s). - (22, -, 24, 24) (30, -, 36, -, 44) sts

Work - (2, -, 2, 4) (4, -, 4, -, 6) more rows in moss st patt.

ALL SIZES:

(Work more or fewer rows in moss st patt here if you need to adjust sleeve length) Block to measurements given.

Cuff Ribbing

Cuff length can be adjusted by working more or fewer chains.

With RS facing, join MC with sl st in first st at bottom of Sleeve.

Chain 9.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook and working in the back bump of chs, 8 sl st, [1 sl st in next st on Sleeve] twice. Turn. 10 sts

Row 2: Miss first 2 sl sts, 8 sl st in BLO. Turn. 8 sts

Row 3: 1 ch, 8 sl st in BLO, [1 sl st in next st on Sleevel twice.

Rep rows 2-3 across last row of Sleeve.

Fasten off.

Using mattress stitch, seam the two ends of ribbing tog.

Finishing

Using mattress stitch, seam Front and Back Panels tog from bottom to underarm, then seam Sleeve.

Hem

With RS facing, join MC with sl st at either side seam.

Rnd 1: 1 ch, working in each row end, dc around, join with sl st to beg dc.

Fasten off. Weave in ends.

elcome to my crochet workshop, my aim for this book is to help you advance your crochet skills. I'm assuming you already know how to crochet and already have a couple of projects under your belt; there is no better way to learn than to 'Crochet It Yourself'. This book is split into three sections - Sweaters, Cardigans and Accessories with each pattern containing its own CIY technique for you to master. Each pattern comes with helpful hints and tips, and there are blank illustrations for you to draw out

Design process

your own design ideas.

Although I love crafting in any form, I like my designs to have a polished and modern finish. There is something so satisfying about creating those refined details by hand or hook. This is important to me when designing a new piece and often where my design process begins. I'm also an avid Pinterest scroller and create a new board

for every new project I begin. You could also create a photo album on your phone, full of images you've taken from shopping on the high street, from magazines, books or catalogues, of flowers, architecture or art that makes you feel inspired. This can help with decisions on finishing, colour choices and even what yarn you decide to use.

Using colour

When designing, I often start with colour. Working with colour can be approached in many different ways - if you love it, then why not wear it? You can find colour inspiration and colour trends anywhere; you can take inspiration from fashion, nature, art and photography. I enjoy going out for a walk and taking photos of surrounding landscapes and flowers for my colour inspiration. I often add these images to my project mood boards. Beginning with primary colours is a great place to start, then introduce secondary and tertiary colours to create your palette.

For me, working a sock heel is super satisfying. I love the way the increases and decreases sit each side of the foot and I find it fascinating how going from working in rounds to working straight then back to rounds again creates such a unique but elegant shape.

Pattern Tip: If you change the foot length, remember you may need less or more yarn.

Start crocheting...

SOCKS (make 2)

Toe & Foot

Worked in a continuous spiral. With A and larger hook, chain 3, join with a sl st in first ch to form a ring.

Rnd 1: 12 tr in ring, pm for beg of rnd. Rnd 2: 2 tr in each st around. 24 sts



Rnd 3: [1 tr, 2 tr in next st] to end. 36 sts Rnds 4-6: Tr around.

Change to B.

Rnd 7: Tr around.

Rnds 8-19: As Rnd 7.

Work less or more length here if desired, until piece measures approximately 2.5cm less than final desired foot length.

Heel

Worked back and forth in rows.

Row 1 (RS): 18 htr, leave rem sts unworked. Turn. 18 sts

Row 2 (WS): Htr across. Turn.

Row 3: 1 htr2tog, htr across to last 2 sts, 1 htr2tog. 2 sts dec'd, 16 sts

Row 4: Htr across. Turn.

Rows 5-10: Rep rows 3-4 three times. 10 sts

Rotate to evenly place 8 htr down side of heel, work 18 htr in unworked sts across top of foot, evenly place 8 htr up side of heel, then work 10 htr across back of heel. 44 sts

Gusset decreases

Return to working in the round.

Pm to indicate beg/end of each rnd.

Rnd 1: 1 htr2tog, 6 htr, 18 tr, 6 htr, 1 htr2tog, 10 htr. 42 sts

Rnd 2: 1 htr2tog, 5 htr, 18 tr, 5 htr,

1 htr2tog, 10 htr. 40 sts

Rnd 3: 1 htr2tog, 4 htr, 18 tr, 4 htr,

1 htr2tog, 10 htr. 38 sts

Rnd 4: 1 htr2tog, 3 htr, 18 tr, 3 htr, 1 htr2tog, 10 htr. 36 sts

Leg

Rnds 5-10: Tr around. 36 sts Work more rnds here if desired for sock length.

Last Rnd: Dc around, join with sl st to beg tr.

Cuff

Change to smaller hook.

Rnd 1: Tr in BLO around.

Rnd 2: [1 RtrF, 1 tr] around.

Rnd 3: As Rnd 2.

Rnd 4: Dc around, join with sl st to beg dc. Fasten off.

Finishing

Weave in ends. Press/block socks referring to ball band for instructions.

Square

(make 63 in an assortment of yarns)

Worked in turned rounds. Join each rnd with sl st to beg dc.

Chain 4. Join with a sl st in first ch to form

Rnd 1 (WS): 1 ch (does not count as a st here and throughout), [1 dc, 2 ch] 4 times, join. Turn. 4 sts

Rnd 2 (RS): 1 ch, *[1 dc, 2 ch, 1 dc] into 2ch-sp (corner made), 1 ch; rep from * 3 more times, join with a sl st in first dc. Turn. 8 sts

Rnd 3: 1 ch, *1 dc into next 1ch-sp, 1 ch, [1 dc, 2 ch, 1 dc] into corner 2ch-sp, 1 ch; rep from * 3 times more, join. Turn. 12 sts

Rnd 4: 1 ch, *[1 dc into next 1ch-sp, 1 ch] to next corner 2ch-sp, [1 dc, 2 ch, 1 dc] into corner 2ch-sp, 1 ch; rep from * 3 more times, [1 dc into next 1ch-sp, 1 ch] to end, join. Turn. 16 sts

Rnds 5-8: As Rnd 4. 32 sts Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Joining

Using the flat braid joining method, lay out your squares in the order they will be joined, 7 rows by 9 columns. Join yarn with a standing dc in RH corner 2ch-sp of square at top of blanket.

Working along top of Square 1: 5 ch, 1 dc into same 2ch-sp as join (corner loop made), [4 ch, 1 dc into next ch-sp] 7 times, 4 ch, [1 dc, 5 ch, 1 dc] into next 2ch-sp (corner loop made), rotate to work down left side, [4 ch, 1 dc into next ch-sp] 8 times**, 5 ch, working into Square 2, 1 dc in corner 2ch-sp of Square 2.

Beg join: 2 ch, remove hook from working loop, place hook through last ch loop made on Square 1 (from RS to WS), replace working loop on hook, 2 ch, 1 dc into next 1ch-sp of Square 2 (working on side adjacent to Square 1 which has the ch loops), [2 ch, remove hook, place hook through next ch loop of Square 1, replace working loop on hook, 2 ch, 1 dc into next 1ch-sp of Square 2] 6 times, 3 ch, remove hook from working loop, insert hook through corner loop of Square 1, replace working loop on hook, 3 ch, 1 dc into corner 2ch-sp of Square 2.

Work along top of Square 2: [4 ch, 1 dc into next ch-sp] 7 times, 4 ch, [1 dc, 5 ch, 1 dc] into corner 2ch-sp (corner loop made), rotate to work down the left side as for Square 1 then joining Square 3 in the same manner the first two squares were joined.

Continue joining each square of the top row, ending at ** (bottom corner of Square 7), 5 ch, 1 dc into same 2ch-sp (corner loop made), working along bottom of Square 7, *[4 ch, 1 dc into next ch-sp] 8 times***, 3 ch, remove hook from working loop, insert hook under 5ch-sp between squares, replace working loop on hook, 3 ch, 1 dc into first 2ch-sp of next Square; rep from * across the row ending at *** (you should

be at the final 2ch-sp of the row).

Join next row: 5 ch, 1 dc into corner 2chsp of first square of row 2 (Square 8), [2 ch, remove hook from working loop, insert hook through next chain loop of Square 1, replace working loop on hook, 2 ch, 1 dc into next ch-sp of Square 8] 8 times, 3 ch remove hook from working loop, insert hook through the diagonally opposite corner loop (of Square 2), 3 ch, 1 dc into corner 2ch-sp of Square 8, work down the left side of Square 8 as for Square 1, joining Square 9 as you joined Squares 1

Once you reach the corner 2ch-sp of Square 9, 3 ch remove hook from working loop, insert hook through the diagonally opposite corner loop (of Square 1), 3 ch, 1 dc into corner 2ch-sp of Square 9. Cont to join each square along the row in the same way, then cont adding each row until all squares have been joined.

Once you've worked along the bottom of the final row, [1 dc, 5 ch, 1 dc] into last corner 2ch-sp, *[4 ch, 1 dc into next ch-sp] 8 times, 3 ch, 1 dc into 5ch-loop, 3 ch, 1 dc into corner 2ch-sp of next square; rep from * to beg of rnd, omitting last dc on Square 1 corner. Do not fasten off.

Edging

Rnd 1: [1 sl st, 1 ch, 1 dc] into corner chsp, [3 ch, 1 dc into next ch-sp] around blanket, join with sl st to beg dc. Fasten off.

Join yarn with standing dc in 2nd ch-sp after any corner dc.

Rnd 2: 1 dc, picot, 1 dc into same ch-sp as join, 7 shells, *[1 dc, 1 htr, 1 tr, 1 tassel, 1 htr, 1 dc] into next ch-sp (middle loop between squares), 9 shells; rep from * to ch-sp before corner dc, [1 dc, 1 htr, 1 tr] into next ch-sp, 1 tr in corner dc, 1 tassel, [1 tr, 1 htr, 1 dc] into next ch-sp, 8 shells; rep from * around blanket, join with sl st to beg dc. Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Tassels (make 32)

Cut 30cm lengths of a variety of your yarns and lay in groups of 8-10 strands. Tie a piece of the joining colour yarn tightly around the middle, fold where yarn is tied. Leave one end of tie to join tassel to blanket and the other end to wrap around the folded bunch several times, creating a tassel shape. Tie tassels to the tassel loops created in the 🗜 Edging round. Trim tassel ends neatly. 🏶

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
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

Tension

10 rows \times 21 sts = 10cm measured over tr

Hook used

3.5mm

Sizing

Each square measures 18cm Finished blanket is: 112x130cm

Squares are made in the tapestry crochet technique. Carry the non-working yarn across the back of the square and work over it, encasing it inside the sts until it is needed again. Each colour change is made in the last yrh of the tr before the next colour, as follows: Work tr before change to last 2 loops on hook, drop the first colour, yrh and draw through both loops with new colour. When working the tapestry crochet sts, gently pull the strand of encased yarn taut before starting to use it again – this will

help to hide the strand in the stitches.

At the end of each rnd, carry the yarn that's not in use up to the new rnd by catching it under the joining sl st.

Worked in joined rnds, without turning. Beg 3 ch counts as first tr. Join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch.

Charts shows one side, repeat 3 times more for complete square. Each square represents one treble. 2 ch in each corner not shown.

Start crocheting...

Little Triangles (make 1)



Rnd 1: With A and working into a magic ring, 3 ch, 2 tr, 2 ch, [3 tr, 2 ch] 3 times, pull beg tail tightly to close magic ring, join. 3 tr each side

Rnd 2: 2 ch in A, pull CC through loop on hook, tighten A loop, 1 ch in CC (completes beg 3 ch), 1 tr in CC, 1 tr in A, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in A, {1 tr in A, 1 tr in CC, 1 tr in A, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in A} 3 times, change to CC in last st, join. 7 tr each side

Rnd 3: 3 ch, 2 tr in CC, 2 tr in A, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in A, {2 tr in A, 3 tr in CC, 2 tr in A, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in A} 3 times, 2 tr in A, change to CC in last st, join. 11 tr each side

Rnd 4: 3 ch, 3 tr in CC, 3 tr in A, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in A, [3 tr in A, 5 tr in CC, 3 tr in A, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in A} 3 times, 3 tr in A, 1 tr in CC, change to A in last st, join. 15 tr each side

Rnd 5: Do not work over CC strand for this rnd just carry it up to the next rnd in the joining sl st. With A, 3 ch, *tr across to next 2ch-sp, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2chsp; rep from * 3 times more, tr to end, join and work over CC. 19 tr each side

Rnd 6: 3 ch, 4 tr in A, 5 tr in CC, 1 tr in A, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in A, {1 tr in A, 5 tr in CC, 1 tr in A, 5 tr in CC, 1 tr in A, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in A} 3 times, 1 tr in A, 5 tr in CC, 2 tr in A, join. 23 tr each side

Rnd 7: 3 ch, 5 tr in A, 3 tr in CC, 4 tr in A, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in A, [4 tr in A, 3 tr in CC, 9 tr in A, 3 tr in CC, 4 tr in A, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in A] 3 times, 4 tr in A, 3 tr in CC, 3 tr in A, join. 27 tr each side



Rnd 3: 3 ch, 2 tr in CC, 2 tr in MC, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in MC, {2 tr in MC, 3 tr in CC, 2 tr in MC, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2chsp in MC} 3 times, 2 tr in MC, change to CC in last st, join. 11 tr each side



Rnd 7: 3 ch, 2 tr in CC, 10 tr in MC, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in MC, {10 tr in MC, 3 tr in CC, 10 tr in MC, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in MC} 3 times, 10 tr in MC, join. 27 tr each side

Rnd 8: 3 ch, 14 tr in MC, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in CC, {27 tr in MC, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in CC} 3 times, 12 tr in MC, join. 31 tr each side



Rnd 9: 3 ch, 13 tr in MC, 2 tr in CC, 1 tr in MC, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in MC, {1 tr in MC, 2 tr in CC, 25 tr in MC, 2 tr in CC, 1 tr in MC, [2 tr, 2 ch, 2 tr] into 2ch-sp in

Join CC in any 2ch-sp.

Rnd 3: 3 ch, 2 tr into same 2ch-sp as join, {3 tr in next sp between clusters, [3 tr, 2 ch, 3 tr] into next corner 2chsp} 3 times, 3 tr in next sp between clusters, 3 tr into next (beg) corner 2chsp, 2 ch, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. 3 3tr clusters per side

Fasten off.

Join MC in any 2ch-sp.

Rnd 4: 3 ch, 2 tr in same 2ch-sp as join, {3 tr in each sp between clusters to next corner, [3 tr, 2 ch, 3 tr] into corner 2ch-sp} 3 times, 3 tr in each sp between clusters to beg corner, 3 tr into beg corner 2ch-sp, 2 ch, join. 4 3tr clusters per side

Fasten off.

Rnds 5-9: As Rnd 4 using one colour per rnd in the sequence: CC, CC, MC, CC, MC.

Circle Squares (make 5)

With CC and smaller hook, chain 3.

Rnd 1: 12 tr in 3rd ch from hook, join with sl st in top of beg tr. 12 sts

Rnd 2: 2 ch (does not count as a st here and throughout), 2 tr in each st around, join with a sl st in top of beg 2 ch. 24 sts

Rnd 3: 2 ch, [1 tr, 2 tr in next st] around, join. 36 sts

Fasten off.

Join MC in BLO of any st.

Rnd 4: Working in BLO, 3 ch, 2 tr in same st as join, {[miss 2 sts, 3 tr in next st] twice**, miss 2 sts, [3 tr, 2 ch, 3 tr] in next st} 4 times, ending last rep at **, miss 2 sts, [3 tr, 2 ch] in same st as beg 3 ch, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. 43 tr clusters per edge

Fasten off.

Join CC in any corner 2ch-sp.

Rnd 5: 3 ch, 2 tr in same 2ch-sp as join, {3 tr in each sp between clusters to next corner, [3 tr, 2 ch, 3 tr] into next 2ch-sp} 3 times, 3 tr in each sp between clusters to next corner, [3 tr, 2 ch] in same sp as beg 3 ch, join. 5 3 tr clusters per side Fasten off.

Accessory

Rnds 6-9: As Rnd 5, using one colour per rnd in the sequence: CC, MC, CC, MC.

Sew squares tog in a long strip, starting and ending with a granny square and alternating between circle squares and granny squares in between.

Edging

With larger hook, join CC1 with sl st in 2chsp in scarf corner, ready to work down a long side.

Rnd 1: 3 ch, 2 tr in same 2ch-sp as join, *3 tr in each sp between clusters to next corner 2ch-sp (at seam), [2 tr into next corner 2ch-sp] twice; rep from * 9 times more, 3 tr in each sp between clusters to last corner 2ch-sp of side, [3 tr, 2 ch, 3 tr] into last corner 2ch-sp, rotate to work along short end, [3 tr in next sp between clusters] 8 times**, [3 tr, 2 ch, 3 tr] into corner 2ch-sp; rep from * once more, ending rep at **, 3 tr in same sp as beg 3 ch, 2 ch, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. Do not fasten off.

Rnd 2: 1 ch, [1 dc in each st to next corner 2ch-sp, 3 dc into corner 2ch-sp, pm in centre dc of 3 dc just made] 3 times, 1 dc in each st to last corner, 3 dc into 2ch-sp, pm in centre dc of 3 dc just made, join with sl st in beg 1 ch.

Fasten off.

Join CC5 in first st after any marker.

Rnd 3: Working in BLO, 1 ch, [1 dc in each st to next marked st, 3 dc in marked st] 4 times, join with sl st in beg 1 ch. Fasten off.

With larger hook, join CC2 in any st. Rnd 4: 1 ch, sl st in each st around, join with sl st in beg 1 ch.

Fasten off.

The perfect project to use up those special scraps you might have left over from a recent project

Yarn used

Paintbox Yarns Cotton DK 1 ball in Peach Orange

About the yarn

DK; 125m per 50g; 100% cotton

Tension

Tension isn't crucial for this project, however, reduce your hook size if needed to create a sturdy fabric

Hook used

3mm

Other supplies

tapestry needle keychain ring

Sizing

Finished size (excluding keychain attachment) when folded, 11.5cm X 3cm

Start crocheting...

Begin with a slip knot on your hook. Work 6 dc around key chain attachment. Turn. Row 1: 1 ch (does not count as a st here or throughout), dc in BLO across. Turn. Rows 2-45: 1 ch, *1 sl st, 1 htr; rep from * to end. Turn.

Fold short side in line with unworked loops from Row 1. Insert hook into first st of working row and in the first unworked loop from Row 1, sl st together. Continuing to work through both thicknesses, sl st across the rest of the row.

Fasten off, sew in ends.

Tension is not critical for this project, but sts should be tight enough to avoid stuffing showing through

Other supplies

toy stuffing tapestry needle 2 pairs of safety eyes, 4mm 3 circles of cardboard, 9cm in diameter a strand of black yarn stitch marker

Sizing

The complete burger is approximately 11.5cm in diameter and 7.5cm tall. The carton of fries is approximately 7.5cm wide and 10cm tall.

Special stitches

Puff stitch (PS): [Yrh, insert hook into st, yrh, pul, drawing loop up to the height of 2 ch sts] 3 times into the same st (7 loops on hook), yrh, draw through all loops on hook

PS2tog: *[Yrh, insert hook into st, yrh, pul, drawing loop up to the height of 2 ch sts] 3 times into the same st (7 loops on hook); rep from * once more in next st, yrh, draw through all 14 loops on hook

The Burger Bun, Lettuce and Burger are worked in the amigurumi style, in a spiral without slip stitching or turning chains. Use a stitch marker or waste yarn to keep track of the first stitch of each round. For the Burger, the puff stitches are placed in the spaces between the stitches of the previous round. The Cheese Slice and the Fries are worked in rows. The red Carton for the Fries is made using a rectangle of crochet worked in rows and then the sides are worked in the rnd. Place a marker at the beginning of each round so you know where you are in the pattern.

Start crocheting...

BURGER

Bun Top

Rnd 1: With A and working into a magic ring, 7 dc. 7 sts

Rnd 2: 2 dc in each st around. 14 sts

Rnd 3: [2 dc in next st, 1 dc] 7 times. 21 sts

Rnd 4: [2 dc, 2 dc in next st] 7 times. 28 sts

Rnd 5: 1 dc, 2 dc in next st, [3 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times, 2 dc. 35 sts

Rnd 6: [2 dc in next st, 4 dc] 7 times. 42 sts

Rnd 7: [5 dc, 2 dc in next st] 7 times. 49 sts

Rnd 8: 3 dc, 2 dc in next st, [6 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times, 3 dc. 56 sts

Rnd 9: [2 dc in next st, 7 dc] 7 times. *63 sts* **Rnd 10**: [8 dc, 2 dc in next st] 7 times. 70 sts

Rnd 11: [34 dc, 2 dc in next st] twice. 72 sts

Rnds 12-15: Dc around.

Pm in working loop and put Bun Top aside.

Bun Base

Rnd 1: With A and working into a magic ring, 8 dc. 8 sts

Rnd 2: 2 dc in each st around. 16 sts

Rnd 3: [2 dc in next st, 1 dc] 8 times. 24 sts





Rnd 5: 1 dc, 2 dc in next st, [3 dc, 2 dc in next st] 7 times, 2 dc. 40 sts

Rnd 6: [2 dc in next st, 4 dc] 8 times. 48 sts **Rnd 7:** [5 dc, 2 dc in next st] 8 times. 56 sts

Rnd 8: 3 dc, 2 dc in next st, [6 dc, 2 dc in next st] 7 times, 3 dc. 64 sts

Rnd 9: [2 dc in next st, 7 dc] 8 times. 72 sts Rnd 10: Dc around.

Rnds 11-12: Dc around in BLO.

Fasten off.

Weave in ends.

Bun Insides (make 2)

With B, work as for Bun Base. Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Making up

Using photograph as a guide, position and secure safety eyes on Bun Top. With black yarn, embroider the mouth below eyes. Taking a length of B, embroider some large chain stitches on top of Bun Top to represent seeds. Stuff Bun Top firmly. Cut a circle of cardboard, approximately 9cm in diameter. Place the cardboard on top of the stuffing, then place one Bun Inside on top. Putting the working loop of A (of Bun Top) back on your crochet hook, dc the last row of the Bun Top and the last row Bun Inside tog. Fasten off and weave in ends. For the base, place two pieces of cardboard inside the Bun Base. Place one Bun Inside on top and using B and with the inside facing, dc the last rnds of the Bun Inside and the Bun Base tog. Fasten off and weave in ends.

Lettuce

With C, work as for Bun Base through Rnd 8.64 sts

Rnd 9: 2 ch (counts as 1 tr), 2 tr in first st, 3 tr in each rem st around, join with sl st in top of beg 2 ch. 192 sts

Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Burger

Rnd 1: With F and working into a magic ring, 8 dc. 8 sts

Rnd 2: 1 PS in each st around. 8 sts

Rnd 3: Working into sps between puffs of Rnd 2, [2 PS in next sp] 8 times. 16 sts

Rnd 4: 1 PS in each sp around.

Rnd 5: [1 PS, 2 PS in next sp] 8 times. 24 sts

Rnd 6: 1 PS in each sp around.

Rnd 7: [2 PS, 2 PS in next sp] 8 times.

32 sts

Rnd 8: 1 PS in each sp around.

Rnd 9: [2 PS, 1 PS2tog] 8 times. 24 sts



Rnd 10: 1 PS in each sp around.

Rnd 11: [1 PS, 1 PS2tog] 8 times. 16 sts

Rnd 12: 1 PS in each sp around.

Rnd 13: 8 PS2tog. 8 sts

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing. Using tapestry needle, weave tail through rem 8 sts and gather hole tog. Weave in ends.

Cheese

With D, chain 21.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 2 dc in next ch, 1 dc to end. Turn. 21 sts

Rows 2-22: Dc across. Turn. Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Making up

You can leave your Burger so all the parts can be separated. Or secure tog by working a long stitch through the centre of the Burger Bun Top, Cheese, Burger, Lettuce and then





FRIES

Fries (make 8)

With D, chain 21.

Rnd 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, sl st to end. Turn. 20 sts

Rnds 2-4: 1 sl st to end. Turn. Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Carton

With E, chain 6.

Rnd 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, dc across. Turn. 5 sts

Rnds 2-14: Dc across.

Do not fasten off; you will now work around the edges of the rectangle in continuous rnds.

Rnd 1: 1 ch, 5 dc, *rotate to work across row ends, miss first row end [1 dc in next row end] 14 times**, 5 dc along the foundation ch, rep between * and ** once, miss last row end. 38 sts

Rnds 2-7: Dc around.

Rnd 8: [2 dc in next st, 12 dc, 2 dc in next st, 5 dc] twice. 42 sts

Rnds 9-14: Dc around. Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Carton Inside

With E, chain 8.

Rnd 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, dc across, Turn, 7 sts

Rnds 2-16: Dc across.

Fasten off, leaving 30cm tail for sewing.

Making up

Using photograph as a guide, position and secure safety eyes on front of Carton. Using black yarn, embroider the mouth. Stuff Carton firmly, then place Carton Inside on top of the stuffing. Sew this piece of crochet about two rnds below the edge of Carton, using small whip stitches. Fold each Fry in half and sew folded end to Carton Inside with some small stitches.

This design uses the overlay mosaic crochet technique worked in the rnd. The main fabric is made up of dc in BLO, and the pattern is created by working trebles into the unworked front loops 2 rows below. Join every round using the Invisible join, as specified in Special Stitches.

This is worked in standard dc (through both loops). Use the invisible join at the end of

each rnd, but do not change colours.

With MC, chain 49.

Rnd 1: Working in the back bumps of the chain and starting in 2nd ch from hook, 2 dc in next ch (pm in first dc made), dc across until 1 ch remains, 3 dc in last ch, rotating as you go, work in the other side of the chain, dc across, invisible join. 98 sts

Rnd 2: 1 ch (does not count as a st here and throughout Base), [2 dc in next st] twice, 46 dc, [2 dc in next st] 3 times, 46 dc, 2 dc in next st, join. 104 sts

Rnd 3: 1 ch, 1 dc, 2 dc in next st, 47 dc, 2 dc in next st, [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] twice, 47 dc, 2 dc in next st, 1 dc, 2 dc in next st, join. 110 sts

Rnd 4: 1 ch, 2 dc, 2 dc in next st, 48 dc, 2 dc in next st, [2 dc, 2 dc in next st] twice, 48 dc, 2 dc in next st, 2 dc, 2 dc in next st, join. 116 sts

Main Body of Bag

Rnds 5 to 65 are worked using the mosaic crochet technique.

All tr2d are worked in the FLO of the st 2 rnds below. All dc are worked in BLO, unless stated otherwise.

Rnd 5: With MC and working in both loops for this rnd only, 1 ch, 59 dc, pm in first and last st to mark the start of each chart rep, 57 dc, join. 116 sts

Rnd 6: With CC1, 1 ch, dc across, join. Rnd 7: With MC, 1 ch, tr2d in each st across, join.

Rnds 8-9: Rep rnds 6-7.

Rnd 10: Rep Rnd 6.

Rnd 11: With MC, 1 ch, [8 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 dc, 29 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 17 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 12: With CC1, 1 ch, [11 dc, 27 tr2d, 20 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 13: With MC, 1 ch, [10 tr2d, 2 tr2d in

next st, miss 1 dc, 25 dc, miss 1 dc, 2 tr2d in next st, 19 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 14: With CC1, 1 ch, [14 dc, 21 tr2d, 23 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 15: With MC, 1 ch, [13 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 dc, 19 dc, miss 1 dc, 2 tr2d in next st, 6 dc, 16 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 16: With CC1, 1 ch, [15 dc, miss 1 dc, 2 tr2d in next st, 15 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 dc, 1 dc, miss 1 dc, 2 tr2d in next st, 4 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 dc, 15 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 17: With MC, 1 ch, [14 tr2d, 30 dc, 14 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 18: With CC1, 1 ch, [13 dc, miss 1 dc, 2 tr2d in next st, 23 tr2d, 3 dc, 2 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 dc, 13 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 19: With MC, 1 ch, [12 tr2d, 25 dc, miss 1 dc, 2 tr2d in next st, 1 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 dc, 4 dc, 12 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 20: With CC1, 1 ch, [11 dc, miss 1 dc, 2 tr2d in next st, 23 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 dc, 5 dc, 2 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 dc, 11 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 21: With MC, 1 ch, [11 tr2d, 27 dc, 4 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 dc, 3 dc, 11 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 22: With CC1, 1 ch, [10 dc, miss 1 dc, 2 tr2d in next st, 25 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 dc, 5 dc, 2 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 dc, 10 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 23: With MC, 1 ch, [10 tr2d, 29 dc, 4 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 dc, 3 dc,

Special stitches

tr2d: Treble in FLO of st 2 rnds below Invisible join: At the end of each rnd, remove hook from loop, insert hook under both loops of beg dc from back to front, place loop back on hook and pull through st. Using new colour, yrh and cont with next rnd. Tighten all loops, drop previous colour to WS

Accessory

10 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 24: With CC1, 1 ch, [10 dc, 29 tr2d, 6 dc, 3 tr2d, 10 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 27: With MC, 1 ch, [10 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 dc, 25 dc, miss 1 dc, 2 tr2d in next st, 6 tr2d, 2 dc, miss 1 dc, 2 tr2d in next st, 9 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 28: With CC1, 1 ch, [12 dc, 4 tr2d, 1 dc, 15 tr2d, 1 dc, 4 tr2d, 7 dc, miss 1 dc, 2 tr2d in next st, 1 tr2d, 11 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 29: With MC, 1 ch, [11 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 dc, 2 dc, miss 1 dc, 2 tr2d in next st, 15 dc, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 dc, 2 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 6 tr2d, 2 dc, miss 1 dc, 2 tr2d in next st, 10 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 30: With CC1, 1 ch, [17 dc, 15 tr2d, 11 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 1 tr2d, 12 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 31: With MC, 1 ch, [16 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 13 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 10 tr2d, 2 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 11 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 32: With CC1, 1 ch, [18 dc, 13 tr2d, 11 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 1 tr2d, 13 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 33: With MC, 1 ch, [17 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 11 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 10 tr2d, 2 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 12 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 34: With CC1, 1 ch, [19 dc, 11 tr2d, 11 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 1 tr2d, 14 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 35: With MC, 1 ch, [18 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 9 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 10 tr2d, 2 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 13 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 36: With CC1, 1 ch, [22 dc, 5 tr2d, 14 dc, 2 tr2d, 15 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 37: With MC, 1 ch, [22 tr2d, 5 dc, 14 tr2d, 2 dc, 8 tr2d, 2 dc, 5 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 38: With CC1, 1 ch, [22 dc, 5 tr2d, 14 dc, 1 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 6 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 1 tr2d, 5 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 39: With MC, 1 ch, [16 tr2d, 16 dc, 8 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 2 dc, 6 tr2d, 2 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 4 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 40: With CC1, 1 ch, [15 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 14 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 9 dc, 1 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 4 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 1 tr2d, 6 dc] twice, join.



Rnd 41: With MC, 1 ch, [13 tr2d, 22 dc, 6 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 8 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 5 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 42: With CC1, 1 ch, [12 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 20 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 8 dc, 6 tr2d, 8 dc] twice, join.

For rnds 43 to 51 you will change from MC to CC2 for part of the MC rnds. Change colour as indicated in the instructions/chart.

When working the green section of the eyes, if you find the purple yarn is visible, try changing colours 1 st earlier/ later than stated.

Rnd 43: With MC, 1 ch, [12 tr2d, 3 dc, change to CC2, 19 dc, change to MC, 3 dc, 6 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 4 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 7 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 44: With CC1, 1 ch, [11 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 2 tr2d, 8 dc, 3 tr2d, 8 dc, 2 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 20 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 45: With MC, 1 ch, [11 tr2d, 3 dc, change to CC2, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 2 tr2d, 2 dc, 3 tr2d, 3 dc, 3 tr2d, 2 dc, 2 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, change to MC, 3 dc, 20 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 46: With CC1, 1 ch, [11 dc, 3 tr2d, 4 dc, 2 tr2d, 3 dc, 3 tr2d, 3 dc, 2 tr2d, 4 dc, 3 tr2d, 20 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 47: With MC, 1 ch, [11 tr2d, 3 dc, change to CC2, 4 tr2d, 2 dc, 3 tr2d, 3 dc, 3 tr2d, 2 dc, 4 tr2d, change to MC, 3 dc, 20 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 48: With CC1, 1 ch, [11 dc, 3 tr2d, 4 dc, 2 tr2d, 2 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 1 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 2 dc, 2 tr2d, 4 dc, 3 tr2d, 20 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 49: With MC, 1 ch, [10 tr2d, 2 tr2d in

next st, miss 1 st, 2 dc, change to CC2, 4 tr2d, 2 dc, 2 tr2d, 5 dc, 2 tr2d, 2 dc, 4 tr2d, change to MC, 2 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 19 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 50: With CC1, 1 ch, [12 dc, 2 tr2d, 7 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 3 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 7 dc, 2 tr2d, 21 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 51: With MC, 1 ch, [11 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 1 dc, change to CC2, 2 tr2d, 17 dc, 2 tr2d, change to MC, 1 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 20 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 52: With CC1, 1 ch, [13 dc, 1 tr2d, 1 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 15 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 1 dc, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 21 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 53: With MC, 1 ch, [13 tr2d, 24 dc, 21 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 54: With CC1, 1 ch, [12 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 23 tr2d, 21 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 55: With MC, 1 ch, [12 tr2d, 25 dc, 21 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 56: With CC1, 1 ch, [12 dc, 7 tr2d, 11 dc, 7 tr2d, 21 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 57: With MC, 1 ch, [12 tr2d, 6 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 9 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 6 dc, 21 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 58: With CC1, 1 ch, [12 dc, 5 tr2d, 14 dc, 6 tr2d, 21 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 59: With MC, 1 ch, [12 tr2d, 4 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 12 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 5 dc, 21 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 60: With CC1, 1 ch, [13 dc, 3 tr2d, 17 dc, 3 tr2d, 22 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 61: With MC, 1 ch, [13 tr2d, 2 dc, miss 1 st, 2 tr2d in next st, 15 tr2d, 2 tr2d in next st, miss 1 st, 2 dc, 22 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 62: With CC1, 1 ch, [14 dc, 1 tr2d, 19 dc, 1 tr2d, 23 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 63: With MC, 1 ch, [14 tr2d, 1 dc, 19 tr2d, 1 dc, 23 tr2d] twice, join.

Rnd 64: With CC1, 1 ch, [58 dc] twice, join.

Rnd 65: With MC, 1 ch, [58 tr2d] twice, join. Do not change colour.

For rem rnds you will be working with MC and through both loops, unless otherwise stated.

Rnd 66: With MC, 2 ch, [17 tr, 24 ch (for Handle), miss 24 sts, 17 tr] twice, join.


Rnd 67: 2 ch, [17 tr, working in back bump of each ch, 24 tr, 17 tr] twice, join.

Rnd 68: 2 ch, [58 tr] twice, join.

Rnd 69: 2 ch, [58 tr] twice, join and change to CC1.

Rnd 70: 1 ch, [58 dc] twice, join. Fasten off.

Cat chart



Finishing Handle

Join CC1 with sl st to first st inside the Handle gap at Row 66, 1 ch (does not count as a st), 24 dc, rotate to work around the tr2d, 2 dc around the tr2d, rotate to work on the other side of the handle gap, 24 dc, rotate to work around the tr2d, 2 dc around the tr2d, join with sl st to top of beg dc. Rep for other Handle. Weave in ends and block.

Reading the chart

Read the chart from bottom to top, right to left (left to right if you are left-handed).

The first st of each rnd indicates the colour you will be using for the entire rnd. Note that on the chart, CC1 is shown on alternate rnds as a reminder but you will work a tr2d over this st on

the MC rnds, covering up the CC1 st. With the exception of rnds 43-51, you do not change colours within each rnd (the colours on the chart are there only to give you an idea of how the piece will look when completed). Any square without a symbol on the chart represents a dc in BLO

Row 5: 1 ch, 2 dc in A, 70 dc in B. Turn. Cont adding 1 new st in A, and removing 1 st in B

Row 6: 1 ch, dc across to last B st, change to A, dc to end. Turn.

Row 7: 1 ch, with A, dc to last A st, change to B, dc to end. Turn.

Rows 8-29: Rep rows 6-7.

Row 30: 1 ch, 57 dc in B, 15 dc in A. Turn. Fasten off B.

Rows 31-47: With A, 1 ch, 72 dc. Turn. **Row 48:** 1 ch, 33 dc in A, 16 dc in C, 23 dc in A. Turn.

Row 49: 1 ch, 23 dc in A, 16 dc in C, 33 dc in A. Turn.

Rows 50-77: Rep rows 48-49.

Fasten off C.

Rows 78-85: With A, 1 ch, 72 dc. Turn. Fasten off.

BACK PANEL

With M. chain 73.

Row 1 (WS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 72 dc. Turn. 72 sts

Rows 2-9: 1 ch, 72 dc. Turn.

Rows 10-76: Following Chart on page 75 for colour changes, rep Row 2.

Rows 77-85: With M, rep Row 2. Fasten off.

With A, surface sl st a vertical row to define where the two walls meet from Row 30 to Row 85.

With A, surface sl st a frame around the window.

With L, 2 rows above the window, surface sl st a horizontal row the width of the window to create a curtain pole.

ARMCHAIR Base Front and Nearest Arm (part 1)

With G, chain 31.

Row 1 (RS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 30 dc. Turn. 30 sts

Row 2 (WS): 1 ch, 16 dc, 1 dc2tog, 12 dc. Turn. 29 sts

Row 3: 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, 10 dc, 1 dc2tog, 16 dc. Turn.

Row 4: 1 ch, 15 dc, 1 dc2tog, 11 dc, 2 dc in last st. Turn.

Row 5: 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, 11 dc, 1 dc2tog, 15 dc. Turn. Row 6: 1 ch, 15 dc, leave rem

14 sts unworked. Turn. 15 sts **Rows 7-17:** 1 ch, 15 dc. Turn.

Row 18: 1 ch, 15 dc in BLO. Turn.

Row 19: 1 ch, 15 dc in FLO. Turn

Row 20: 1 ch, 15 dc in BLO. Fasten off.

Chair Seat

Join G to first st of Row 5 in part 1.

Row 1 (RS): 1 ch, working in BLO, 1 dc2tog, 11 dc. miss last st. sl st to end of Row 6 to join. Turn. 12 sts

Row 2: 1 ch, sl st to end of Row 7, miss first st, working in FLO, 9 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 10 sts

Row 3: 1 ch, working in BLO, 1 dc2tog, 7 dc, miss last st, sl st to end of Row 8. Turn. 8 sts

Row 4: 1 ch. sl st to end of Row 9, miss first st, working in FLO, 5 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 6 sts

Row 5: 1 ch, working in BLO, 1 dc2tog, 3 dc, miss last st, sl st to end of Row 10. Turn.

Row 6: 1 ch, sl st to end of Row 11, miss first st, working in FLO, 1 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 2 sts

Row 7: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog in BLO, sl st to end of Row 12. 1 st Fasten off.

Furthest Arm

With G, chain 16.

Row 1 (WS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 15 dc. Turn. *15 sts*

Rows 2-11: 1 ch, 15 dc. Turn.

Row 12: 1 ch, 2 dc in BLO, leave rem 13 sts unworked. Turn. 2 sts

Row 13: 1 ch, 2 dc in FLO. Turn.

Row 14: 1 ch, 2 dc in BLO.

Fasten off.

Chair Back

With G, chain 11.

Row 1 (RS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 10 dc. Turn. 10 sts

Row 2: 1 ch, 7 dc, leave rem 3 sts unworked. Turn. 7 sts

Rows 3-4: 1 ch, 7 dc. Turn. Fasten off.



Cushion

Roll over, to the back, the top 3 two-stitch rows (along the BLO/FLO lines) of the Furthest Arm. Using G and backstitch, sew Furthest Arm and Chair Back to the rest of Armchair, ensuring there is a bit of the rolled over rows showing.

Add a line of surface sl st to the edge of Nearest Arm to give it more definition. Sew completed Armchair to Front Panel, lining it up with the wall (line of surface sl st) and window. Do not sew Nearest Arm down yet, so the cushion can be tucked underneath.

Cushion

With H, chain 9.

Row 1 (RS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 8 dc. Turn. 8 sts

Rows 2-8: 1 ch, 8 dc. Turn. **Row 9:** 1 ch, 8 dc in BLO. Turn.



Rows 10-16: 1 ch, 8 dc. Turn.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail. Fold over and crochet two sides tog. Add stuffing to the top half of Cushion and sew the third side tog. Tuck under Nearest Arm of Armchair and sew in place.

Sew Nearest Arm in place, rolling over the top edge (along the BLO/FLO rows); see photo as a guide.

CURTAINS (make 2)

With E, chain 14.

Row 1: Starting in 3rd ch from hook, 12 tr. Turn. 12 sts

Row 2: 2 ch, 12 tr. Turn. **Rows 3-15:** Rep Row 2.

Fasten off.

Fold Curtains over twice lengthwise to create the effect of them being pushed open. Stitch to hold in place. Line up with the window and curtain pole and sew in place along the top. Sew along the length of the folds and the outer edges of each Curtain to keep in place.

RUG

With D, chain 21.

Row 1 (WS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 20 dc. Turn. 20 sts

Row 2 (RS): 1 ch, 1 dc2tog, 17 dc, 2 dc in last st. Turn.

Drop D and change to E.

Row 3: With E, 1 ch, 20 dc. Turn.

Row 4: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog, 17 dc, 2 dc in last st. Turn.

Rows 5-36: Rep rows 3-4, dropping working colour and picking up next colour every 2 rows following the pattern D, E, F, G, H, I. Fasten off.

Sew in place along the edge using matching colours, including along a few rows through the middle to keep it flat.

TABLE Table Top

With I, chain 25.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 24 dc.

Row 2: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog, 20 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. *22 sts*

Row 3: 1 ch, 22 dc. Turn.

Row 4: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog, 18 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. *20 sts*

Row 5: 1 ch, 20 dc. Turn.

Row 6: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog, 16 dc, 1 dc2tog.

Turn. 18 sts

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing.

Table Legs Front (make 2)

With I, chain 16.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 15 dc. Turn. *15 sts*

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing.

Table Legs Back (make 2)

With I, chain 12.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 11 dc. Turn. *11 sts*

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing. Line up with the window and floor (see photo) and sew in place along the edge, matching up Legs.

SEWING MACHINE

With D, chain 11.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 10 dc. Turn. *10 sts*

Rows 2-3: 1 ch, 10 dc. Turn.

Row 4: 1 ch, 4 dc, leave rem 6 sts

unworked. Turn. 4 sts

Rows 5-7: 1 ch, 4 dc. Turn.

Row 8: 1 ch, 4 dc, 7 ch. Turn.

Row 9: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 10 dc.

Turn. 10 sts

Row 10: 1 ch, 10 dc. Turn. **Row 11:** 1 ch, 9 dc, 1 sl st.

Fasten off.

Row 1: Join D to final ch on bottom of Row 8, 1 ch, 3 dc. Turn. 3 sts

Row 2: 1 ch, 3 dc.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing. Place on top of Table and sew in place. With I, use backstitch to add a needle and a knob on the machine.

NOTICEBOARD

With M, chain 19.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 18 dc. Turn. *18 sts*

Rows 2-12: 1 ch, 18 dc. Turn.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing. Using backstitch in a contrasting colour 'draw' on the blackboard.

Sew around the outside edge to attach. With H, surface sl st around the outside to create a frame.

VASE

With D, chain 6.

Row 1 (WS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook,

5 dc. Turn. *5 st*s

Rows 2-7: 1 ch, 5 dc. Turn. **Row 8:** 1 ch, 5 sl st in BLO.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing. Position on windowsill with the sl st row at the top. Sew along the side and bottom edges to attach.

Flowers (make 3)

Rnd 1: With J, working into a magic ring, [1 sl st, 1 tr, 1 sl st] 4 times.
Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing.

Leaves (make 2)

With K, chain 3.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 2 dc. Turn. 2 sts

Row 2: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog. *1 st*Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing.
With K, embroider stalks from the top of
Vase. Attach Flowers at top of stalks and
Leaves between Flowers and top of Vase.




Rnd 1: With any colour and working into a magic ring, 6 dc, do not join, cont in a spiral. 6 sts

Rnd 2: 2 dc in each st around. 12 sts

Rnd 3: [2 dc in next st, 1 dc] 6 times. *18 sts* Change to L.

Rnd 4: [2 dc in next st, 2 dc] 6 times, join with [1 sl st, 1 ch, 1 sl st] to beg dc. Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing.





Decorate Embroidery Hoops with short sts, weaving, or change colour part way. Pull Embroidery Hoops to create a more oval shape and then sew to Front Panel with join on Rnd 4 at top.

Basket

Row 1 (WS): With L and working into a magic ring, 3 dc. Turn. 3 sts

Row 2: 1 ch, 2 dc in each st. Turn. 6 sts

Row 3: 1 ch, [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] 3 times. Turn. 9 sts

Row 4: 1 ch, 9 dc in BLO. Turn.

Row 5: 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, 7 dc, 2 dc in last st. Turn. 11 sts

Row 6: 1 ch, 11 dc. Turn.

Row 7: 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, 9 dc, 2 dc in last st. Turn. 13 sts

Row 8: 1 ch, 13 dc. Turn.

Row 9: 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, 11 dc, 2 dc in last st. Turn. 15 sts

Row 10: 1 ch, 15 dc. Turn.

Row 11: 1 ch, 5 sl st, 10 ch (for handle),

miss 10, 1 sl st.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing. Position by Armchair and sew to attach along the sides and bottom edge.

Use yarn ends as stuffing in the bottom of Basket to help it keep the shape and for the balls of yarn to sit on.

To create the balls of yarn, roll up a length of yarn to the size you want and sew a couple of stitches through the middle to secure. Leave a long tail for sewing.

Place the balls of yarn in the Basket and sew in place to both the Armchair and Basket.

Crochet hook

With I, chain 8.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing. Position against Armchair, with the end bent over to replicate a crochet hook, as though it is sticking out of the Basket and sew it in place.

Making up

Hold completed Front and Back Panels with WS tog.

With a contrasting colour, dc evenly around three sides, placing 3 dc in each of corner st. Insert the cushion pad and dc along the final side to close, join with sl st to beg dc. Approximately 318 sts Fasten off. Weave in ends.





Special stitches
Treble 3 together (tr3tog): [Yrh, insert hook in next st, yrh, pul, yrh, draw through 2 loops on hook]
3 times, yrh, draw through all 4 loops on hook



Fasten off. 24 sts

Square 2: Join MC with sl st into any 2ch-sp of next unjoined Granny Square Centre, 3 ch, 3 tr into same 2ch-sp as join, 1 ch, 3 tr into next 2ch-sp, 1 ch, sl st into marked 2ch-sp of Square 1, rm, 1 ch, [1 tr into same 2ch-sp on Square 2, 1 sl st in next tr on Square 1] 3 times to complete corner, 1 ch, sl st into 1ch-sp in Square 1, working into next 2ch-sp, [1 tr into 2ch-sp on Square 2, 1 sl st in next tr on Square 1] 3 times, 1 ch, sl st into 2ch-sp on Square 1, 1 ch, sl st into join in row below, working into same 2ch-sp, [1 tr into 2ch-sp, 1 sl st in next tr on Square in row below] 3 times, 1 ch, sl st into 1ch-sp of same Square in row below, working into next 2ch-sp, [1 tr into 2chsp, 1 sl st in next tr on Square in row



below] 3 times, 1 ch, sl st into join on row below (join complete), 1 ch, 3 tr into same 2ch-sp to complete corner, 1 ch, 3 tr into first 2ch-sp to complete first corner, 2 ch, join with sl st to beg tr, pm in 2ch-sp just made. Fasten off. 24 sts

Rep Square 2 to end of row, joining Square 3 to Square 2, etc. Do not pm in last Square.

Rep Following Row until a total of 6 (7, 7, 8, 8) rows have been completed.

Shoulder Rows

Rep Following Row, joining only 1 (2, 2, 3, 3) Squares on each edge and missing 4 (3, 4, 3, 4) Squares at centre for neck opening until a total of 3 Shoulder Rows on each edge have been completed.

Rep Following Row of Front, joining a row of 6 (7, 8, 9, 10) Squares over last Shoulder Row, omitting join to previous row in centre.

Rep Following Row of Front until a total of 8 (9, 9, 10, 10) rows of Back have been completed (Back is 3 rows longer).

Neckline

Rnd 1 (RS): Join MC with sl st to centre st on Back of neck opening, 1 ch, *dc in each st and ch-sp across** to 1 st before corner neckline, 1 tr3tog; rep from * around ending last rep at **, join with sl st to beg dc.

Rnd 2: 1 ch, *dc across** to 1 st before next tr3tog, 1 tr3tog; rep from * around ending last rep at **, join with sl st to beg dc. Fasten off.

Rnd 3: Join CC1 with sl st in first st, 3 ch, *tr across** to 1 st before next tr3tog, 1 tr3tog; rep from * around ending last rep at **, join with sl st to

Rnd 4: 3 ch, *1 RtrF, 1 RtrB; rep from * around, join with sl st to beg RtrF. Fasten off.

Rnd 5: Join CC2 in any st, rep Rnd 4.

Edging

Rnd 1 (RS): Working across hem, join MC with sl st in first st after corner 2ch-sp of Back, 1 ch, *1 dc in each st and ch-sp across to next corner 2ch-sp, 3 dc into corner 2ch-sp, pm in 2nd of 3 sts just made; rep from * around Slipover, join with sl st to beg dc.

Rnd 2: 1 ch, *dc across to next marked st, 3 dc in corner st, move marker up; rep from * around to last st, 1 dc, join with sl st to beg dc. Fasten off.

Hem

Row 1 (RS): Join CC1 with sl st to front marked st, rm, 3 ch, tr across to next marked st, rm, 1 tr in marked st, leave rem sts unworked. Turn.

Row 2 (WS): 3 ch, *1 RtrF, 1 RtrB; rep from * to end. Turn. Fasten off.

Rnd 3: Join CC2 with sl st in first st, 3 ch, *1 RtrF, 1 RtrB; rep from * to end. Fasten off. Rep for Back.

Ties

With RS facing, join CC1 with sl st to st on Edging between 3rd and 4th Squares (or as desired for comfort) from bottom hem on Front, 31 ch, pm in last ch.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 30 sl st, 1 dc in same st as joining sl st. Fasten off.

Row 2: Join CC2 with sl st in marked ch, rm, 11 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook, 10 sl st, 1 dc in same ch as joining sl st. Fasten off.

Rep for opposite side of Front. Rep for Back except join CC1 on Edging between 4th and 5th Squares (or as desired for comfort) from bottom hem. Weave in ends and block to shape.

My favourite types of projects to work on are definitely sweaters and blankets. I love making my own clothes, and as the weather is cold in Ireland, woolly handmade sweaters are the best! And for summer, I really enjoy making cotton tops that are easy and fresh to wear.

Where is your favourite place to crochet?

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Use your HAT TEMPLATES

Crochet the perfect size hat every time with your easy-to-use templates!



Your handy new hat templates are perfect guides to make simple hats with no need for a pattern. The way they work is simple, but very clever - the rounded top of the template shows the size of the crown for a top-down hat, and the height of the template is the suggested height for the hat. It's that easy! As long as you crochet the crown to match the rounded top, and the height the same length as the template, you will be crocheting hats in no time for everyone. You can keep it simple with double crochet in the round, or make it more complex with a pretty stitch pattern as long as you match the template, you can get as creative as you like.

Just follow our complete guide on everything you need to know to get the most out of your templates.

- 1 Start with a magic ring, and crochet do or tr into the ring to ensure the circle lies flat. Multiples of 6 or 12 sts work best for these hats. We have worked 12 tr into the ring in our example below. 12 sts
- 2 Increase on the next rnd evenly, ensuring that as you crochet, your work

lies completely flat. This is so the fit of the hat is as accurate as possible. We have worked [2 tr in next st] 12 times. 24 sts

- 3 Continue to increase evenly on every rnd until your work fits exactly into the rounded top of the template as shown. It is important that your work fits exactly into the rounded top. We have worked [2 tr in next st, 1 tr] 12 times. 36 sts
- 4 Once you have finished your beginning circle, work in straight rnds without increasing until you reach the same height as the template. To check this, slip the template inside the hat and pull your work down as shown to check your measurement.
- 5 Continue until you reach the height of the template. You can finish with ribbing or another stitch. We worked one rnd in dc on a smaller hook to complete the hat.
- 6 You have finished a hat easy! Now you can experiment with sizing, yarn, stitches and more. Flick through our collection to get some ideas for hats you can crochet.



Don't forget

- Your starting rnds should lie completely flat - multiples of 6 and 12 stitches work best.
- When you finish increasing, your work needs to touch the edge of the circle of your template to ensure the correct fit - go up or down a hook size to achieve better tension if needed.
- The names of the templates are guides only, check the finished measurements for the best fit; small adults might benefit from teen hats for example.













Before you start crocheting hats to your heart's content, check out our top tools and tips for perfect, stylish hats every time!

TOP YARN

You can use any yarn you want when crocheting hats with your templates, from 4-ply up to super chunky. The heavier the weight of your yarn, the faster you can crochet. We've picked a few of our favourites from this collection - many only need one ball of yarn to make a simple hat!

RIB IT YOUR WAY

One way to finish your hat like a pro is with a neat ribbed hem - plus you will get a better fit on your hat! Go down a hook size and work either of the two options below.



Work [1 RtrF, 1 RtrB] around the bottom of your hat for at least 2 or 3 rnds to give the effect of ribbing.



Chain to the height you would like the hem to be. *Turn, 1 ch, dc in BLO back to work, [miss 1, sl st] at base of hat, turn, dc in BLO to end of row; rep from * until you have worked around the edge of the hat, working last row in BLO of first and last rows to join.

PERFECT POMPOMS

The finishing touches on a hat can make all the difference! Consider adding a pompom to your hat - you could match the colour or do something completely different. These Clover pompom makers are perfect for adding the finishing touch to your accessories!



HOW TO INCREASE EVENLY

Here are some simple rules to guarantee even increases in the rnd every time.

- On your first increase rnd, work [2 st into next st] repeated by the number of sts you started with - your work will increase by the same number of sts that you started with; for example, if you start with 12 sts, after your first increase rnd you will have 24 sts.
- On your second increase rnd, work [2 st in next st, 1 st] repeated by the number of sts you started with - your work will evenly increase by the same number of sts you started with; for example, if you started with 12 sts, after 3 rnds you will have 36 sts.
- On your third increase rnd, work [2 st in next st, 2 st] repeated by the number of sts you started with.
- Continue to increase following this rule; increase the number of sts between [2 dc in next st] by 1 every rnd - so, [2 st in next st, 3 st], [2 dc in next st, 4 st], [2 dc in next st, 5 st] and so on.
- Stop increasing once your work matches the top of your template.

DESIGN YOUR OWN PATTERN!

Use the chart below to have a go at making your own colourwork design for your hat! Keep your pattern to multiples of 12 or 6 (depending on your starting rnd), meaning the repeat should fit evenly into your hat once you stop increasing. Remember, you are working top down, so you need to start at the top of your chart, or draw your design upside down.



The Alpine hat has a 4-st repeat that fits into multiples of 12 evenly

BUST YOUR STASH

One 100g ball of yarn will comfortably make a teen hat, and some with long meterage will finish an adult hat!

Terrific **TEXTURES**

Now you've mastered the basics, let's introduce a more complex stitch pattern!

HOW WE DID IT

- # Use your teen template and larger hook.
- Start with 12 tr into magic ring.
- # Increase evenly for 1 rnd using dc sts. 24 sts
- Increase in next rnd as follows: 3 ch, *1 RtrF in tr 2 rnds below, 1 tr in st behind RtrF, 1 tr; rep from * to end. 36 sts
- # Increase evenly for 1 rnd using dc sts. 48 sts
- Increase in next rnd as follows: 3 ch, *1 RtrF in tr 2 rnds below, 1 tr in st behind RtrF, 3 tr; rep from * to end. 60 sts
- # Increase evenly for 1 rnd using dc sts. 72 sts
- # Increase in next rnd as follows: 3 ch, *1 RtrF in tr 2 rnds below, 1 tr in st behind RtrF, 5 tr; rep from * to end. 84 sts
- # Increase evenly for 1 rnd using dc sts. 96 sts
- # Increase in next rnd as follows: 3 ch, *1 RtrF in tr 2 rnds below, 1 tr in st behind RtrF, 7 tr; rep from * to end. 108 sts
- With the teen template, your crown should now fit your template.
- Rep the next 4 rnds until your work measures 4cm shorter than your template;
 - a 1 ch (doesn't count as st throughout), dc around, join.
 - 3 ch (doesn't count as st throughout), *1 RtrF in tr 2 rnds below, 1 tr in next st; rep from * to end, join.
 - 1 ch, dc around, join.
 - 3 ch, *1 tr in next st, 1 RtrF in tr 2 rnds below; rep from * to end, join.
- Work a ribbed brim with smaller hook as follows: 7 ch, *turn, 6 dc in BLO, miss 1 st from last rnd worked, sl st, turn, 6 dc in BLO, 1 ch; rep from* around the edge of your hat. Fasten off and weave in ends. Finish with a pompom if desired.



Join each rnd with a sl st to first st.

CROWN

Rnd 1: With A and working into a magic ring, 2 ch (does not count as a st here and throughout), 12 tr, join. 12 sts

Rnd 2: 2 ch, 2 tr in each st around. 24 sts

Rnd 3: 2 ch. [1 tr. 2 tr in next st] 12 times, join. 36 sts

Rnd 4: 2 ch, [2 tr, 2 tr in next st] 12 times, join. 48 sts

Rnd 5: 2 ch, [3 tr, 2 tr in next st] 12 times, join. 60 sts

Rnd 6: 2 ch, [4 tr, 2 tr in next st] 12 times, join. 72 sts

Rnd 7: 2 ch, [5 tr, 2 tr in next st] 12 times, join. 84 sts

Rnd 8: 2 ch, [6 tr, 2 tr in next st] 12 times, join. 96 sts

SIZE S ONLY:

Rnds 9-10: 2 ch, tr around, join. Fasten off.

SIZES M & L ONLY:

Rnd 9: 2 ch. [7 tr. 2 tr in next st] 12 times, join. 108 sts

SIZE M ONLY:

Rnd 10: 2 ch, tr around, join. Fasten off.

SIZE L ONLY:

Rnd 10: 2 ch, [8 tr, 2 tr in next st] 12 times, join. Fasten off. 120 sts

ALL SIZES:

RANY

Join B with sl st to any st. Rnd 11: 2 ch, tr around, join.

Note: Rnds 12-23 can either be worked following the written instructions or the colour chart provided. Each square on chart is one tr.

Rnd 12: 2 ch, 2 tr with B, *1 tr with C, 3 tr with B; rep from * to last 2 sts, 1 tr with C, 1 tr with B, join.

Rnd 13: 2 ch, *1 tr with B, 3 tr with C; rep from * around, join.

Rnd 14: With C throughout, 2 ch, tr around, join.

Rnd 15: As Rnd 13.

Rnd 16: As Rnd 12.

Rnd 17: With B throughout,

2 ch, tr around, join. Rnds 18-23: Rep rnds

12-17. Fasten off C only.

BRIM

Row 1: Continuing with B. 9 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook, 8 dc, sl st in next 2 sts of Body. Turn.

Row 2: Miss 2 sl sts, dc in BLO across. Turn. 8 sts


Row 3: 1 ch, dc in BLO across, sl st in next 2 sts of Body. Turn.

Rep rows 2-3 around base of hat, ending with a Row 2.

Last Row: Do not make 1 ch, 8 sl sts in underside of beg ch to join to first row.

Fasten off. Weave in ends. Block if needed.

Although you don't need your template for this hat, you can amend the pattern using your template to your desired size! Simply work the **Crown instructions** until vour work fits vour template, then switch to the Body and work the colour chart for your desired length - easy!



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
