### Walking in a woolly wonderland

Hollywood has come to Yorkshire with the unveiling of a 'Knit Wool' sign, in the style of the US icon



Yorkshire knitters are ramping up their efforts to welcome the Tour de France this summer, which has already seen them knitting up bunting in the style of the famous cycle race's iconic jerseys, (as reported in Knit Today 94). The Knit Wool sign near Oxenhope is a nod to Yorkshire's wool industry heritage - although much of the yarn bought in the UK is now spun abroad, most of the UK's big yarn companies are based in the north. And with a recent growth in demand for British wool, local firm Laxtons are spinning more and more UK wool.

Keighley-based Designer Yarns turned out for the unveiling of the Knit Wool sign, along with Rita Verity of Sonia's Smile in Haworth and Chris Upton, Minister of West Lane Baptist Church, Haworth. Children from Haworth, Oldfield, Stanbury and Oxenhope primary schools also braved the unseasonably cold weather in winter woollies. The sign is just the latest in a series being unveiled across Yorkshire as part of the Worth the Tour campaign, which was set up to showcase the region in advance of the Tour de France's arrival this summer. Submissions for the Tour de Bunting were closing on March 10, but organisers have received more than 4,500 mini jerseys, which will be quite a sight come summer! 

# Let's givelit some well with the sound of th

How can a pair of knitted socks, a year of arty events and a 100-mile-long long row help raise money for a good cause? Gary Baker investigates...

hen it comes to helping out for charity, a dramatic physical challenge always raises adrenaline levels and plenty of money. Later this year a group of men from Skye will be attempting to row the 100 miles from St Kilda to Portree – something that, on the face of it, has little to do with knitting. But that's where you'd be mistaken...

#### All hands on deck

ATLAS is an organisation based in Skye and Lochalsh that aims to showcase innovative and ambitious contemporary arts projects. To help raise money to support the trip and the charities involved, ATLAS launched the Spincycle-Skye project – a year-long multidisciplinary project looking at culture, performance, music, visual arts and crafts. Forming an integral part of this project is the 100-mile row, as well as The Great Welly Sock Challenge, which is where your knitting needles come in.

#### How you can help

ATLAS Arts are encouraging everyone to have a go at knitting some welly socks, then sending them north to be sold in Portree. The proceeds will help raise money for the RNLI and Skye & Lochalsh Young Carers – the two charities the big row are supporting. Emma Nicolson, ATLAS Director, says: "We hope knitters will rise to the challenge and get those needles clicking so that shoppers will have a chance to purchase some exciting welly socks."

#### Row, row, row your boat

Once the weather improves the men taking the challenge will be rowing a boat that was built around 1880, a vessel that was last used in 1913! They have been working for many months to restore the boat to its former glory, as well as training intensively to prepare for the challenges that lie ahead. Of course, the team behind the row will be raising money themselves, but the Welly Sock Challenge will only help to fill the coffers. In order to participate, simply download the specially designed pattern from the ATLAS website (atlasarts.org.uk) and send your completed welly socks to ATLAS Arts, PO Box 6318, Portree, Isle of Skye, Scotland, IV51 0AF.


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



# Knitthelook

This spring, embrace the current trend for all things floral – it's time to bloom!

et's face it, flowers never really go out of fashion. But once in a while we remember how much we really do love them – maybe that's why the high streets are currently blooming with pretty floral prints and patterns. Thanks to designers like Dolce & Gabbana, Mulberry and Temperley, we've seen early signs of spring in the form of delicate buds, branches and blossom everywhere – in fashion, beauty and even homeware.

For knitters, this trend is a real treat as you can incorporate the simplest floral motifs in blush pinks and off-whites into sweaters and cardigans for just a hint of the trend, as demonstrated by Bergère de France – their gorgeous intarsia rollneck is the perfect spring knit. More experienced knitters will fall head over heels for Martin Storey's lime green wrap from *Knitting Pretty*, bedecked with a scattering of three-dimensional flowers.

As this is a spring/summer fashion statement, try 4ply cotton yarns that are lightweight yet durable – garments made from lighter yarns will be easier to layer on chillier days, and are perfect for throwing in the washing machine – especially important if you have small children! If staying pristine isn't a daily battle, why not add a dash of luxury in the form of a silk yarn? However you decide to wear this trend, we're sure you'll look blooming lovely.

#### 3 ways to wear

A little of this trend can go a long way, so why not knit a floral corsage to attach to your jacket or cardigan lapel for a bright pop of colour?

Breathe new life into a knitted sweater – add crocheted flowers or tiny knitted roses. For inspiration, see *100 Flowers to Knit & Crochet* by Lesley Stanfield.

Channel '50s style with a floral prom dress teamed with a lace knit wrap.







#### Scarf

**Note:** Work edge stitches (the lace edge) loosely. Using 5mm needles:

Cast on 1st.

Row 1: Knit twice in the first stitch. 2sts.

Row 2: Knit.

Row 3: Knit twice in first st, K1. 3sts.

Row 4: Knit.

Row 5: K2, yo, K1. 4sts.

Row 6: Knit.

Row 7: K2, yo, K2. 5sts.

Row 8: Knit.

Row 9: K2, vo. K3. 6sts.

Row 10: Knit.

Row 11: K2, yo, K4. 7sts.

Row 12: Knit.

Row 13: K2, yo, K5. 8sts.

Row 14: Knit.

**Row 15:** K2, yo, K6. 9sts.

Row 16: K6, P1, K2.

Row 17: K2, yo, K7. 10sts.

Row 18: K6, P2, K2.

Row 19: K2, yo knit to the

end of the row.

Row 20: K6, purl to last

2sts, K2.

Rep the last two rows six more times. 17sts.

**Row 33**: K2, yo, K1, yo, skpo, yo, knit two stitches together, knit to the end of the row.

Row 34: K6, purl to last 2sts, K2.

**Row 35**: K2, yo, K3, yo, skpo, yo, k2tog, knit to the end of the row.

**Row 36**: K6, purl to last 2sts, K2. 19sts.

#### **Start pattern repeat:**

**Row 37:** K2, yo, K5, yo, skpo, yo, k2tog, knit to last 7sts, M1, K7.

Row 38: K6, purl to last 2sts, K2.

**Row 39:** K2, yo, K7, yo, skpo, yo, k2tog, knit to last 6sts, W&T.

Row 40: Purl to last 2sts, K2.

**Row 41:** K1, skpo, yo, knit two stitches together, K3, skpo, yo, knit two stitches together, yo, knit to last 7sts, M1, K7.

Row 42: K6, purl to last 2sts, K2.

**Row 43:** K1, skpo, yo, knit two stitches together, K1, skpo, yo, knit two stitches together, yo, knit to the last seven stitches, M1, K7.

Row 44: Knit to last 10sts, P8, K2.

**Row 45:** K1, skpo, yo, sk2po, yo, k2tog, yo, knit to the end.

Row 46: Knit to last 8sts, P6, K2.

**Row 47:** K2, yo, K1, yo, skpo, yo, k2tog, K to the end of the row.

Row 48: Knit to last 10sts, P8, K2.

**Row 49:** K2, yo, K3, yo, skpo, yo, knit two stitches together, knit to the last 7sts, M1, K7.

**Row 50:** K6, purl to last 2sts, K2. 24sts.

Rows 37-50 form the pattern.

Rep these 14 rows 17 more times, then rep once more, ending at 46th row. 111sts.

**Row 299:** K2, yo, K1, yo, skpo, yo, k3tog, knit the to end.

Row 300: Knit to last 10sts, P8, K2.

**Row 301:** K2, yo, K3, yo, skpo, yo, knit two stitches together, knit to last 8sts, knit two stitches together, K6.

Row 302: K6, purl to last 2sts, K2.

**Row 303:** K2, yo, K5, yo, skpo, yo, knit two stitches together, knit to last 8sts, knit two stitches together, K6.

Row 304: K6, purl to last 2sts, K2.

**Row 305:** K2, yo, K7, yo, skpo, yo, k3tog, knit to last 6sts, W&T.

Row 306: Purl to last 2sts, K2.

**Row 312:** Knit to last 8sts, P6, K2 (106sts on this first rep).

Rows 299-312 form the pattern.

Repeat these 14 rows 17 more times then repeat once more, ending at 308th row. 19sts.

**Row 561:** K1, skpo, yo, k2tog, knit to the end of the row. 18sts.

**Row 562:** K6, purl to last 2sts, K2.

Repeat the last two rows nine more times. 9sts.

**Row 581:** K1, skpo, yo, k2tog, knit to the end of the row. 8sts.

Row 582: Knit to end.

Rep the last two rows three times. 5sts.

Row 589: K1, skpo, yo, k2tog. 4sts.

Row 590: K1 k2tog K1. 3sts.

Row 591: K1, skpo. 2sts.

Row 592: K2tog.

Cast off.

#### **Making up**

Sew in all the yarn ends. Place a large clean sheet or two bath towels on the floor and then pin the shawl to this, so that the garter stitch edge is placed along a straight edge. Pull the shawl into shape. Pin all the lace pattern points, lightly steam and leave to dry.

Row 4: K3, (P3, K4) to last 6sts, P3, K3.

These four rows form the pattern and are repeated throughout.

Work straight until the back measures 11cm or 4½ in from cast on edge, ending with a RS row.

Work straight until back measures 38 (39: 40: 41: 42)cm or 15 ( $15^{1/2}$ :  $15^{3/4}$ : 16:  $16^{1/2}$ )in from cast on edge, ending with a wrong side row.

#### **Shape armholes**

Cast off 8sts at beg of next two rows. 98 (112: 126: 140: 154)sts.

Cont in patt until back measures 54 (56: 58: 60: 62)cm or  $21^{1/4}$  (22:  $22^{3/4}$ :  $23^{1/2}$ :  $24^{1/2}$ )in from cast on edge, ending with a wrong side row.

#### Shape upper arms

Cast off 5 (6: 7: 8: 9)sts at beg of next six rows. 68 (76: 84: 92: 100)sts.

#### **Shape shoulders**

Cast off 6 (7: 8: 9: 10)sts at beg of next two rows and 7 (8: 9: 10: 11)sts at beg of foll two rows. Leave rem 42 (46: 50: 54: 58)sts on a spare needle.

#### Left front

With 3.75mm needles, cast on 60 (67: 74: 81: 88)sts.

Row 1: P3, (K3, P4) to last 8sts, K8.

Row 2: K5, (P3, K4) to last 6sts, P3, K3.

Rep the last two rows eight times more.

Change to 4mm needles and pattern as follows:

Row 1 (RS): P3, (RT, K1, P4) to last 8sts, RT, K5.

Row 2: K5, (P3, K4) to last 6sts, P3, K3.

**Row 4:** K5, (P3, K4) to last 6sts, P3, K3.

These four rows form the patt with garter st border and are repeated throughout.

Cont in patt as now set for a further 8cm or 3in ending with a right side row.

Work straight until front measures 38 (39: 40: 41: 42)cm or 15 ( $15^{1}/_{2}$ :  $15^{3}/_{4}$ : 16:  $16^{1}/_{2}$ )in from cast on edge, ending with a wrong side row.

#### Shape armhole

Cast off 8sts at beg of next row. 52 (59: 66: 73: 80)sts. Cont in patt until front measures 44 (46: 48: 49: 50)cm or 17½ (18: 18¾: 19½: 19½)in from cast on edge, ending with a RS row.

#### Shape front neck

**Next row:** Cast off 5sts, patt next 10 (11: 12: 13: 14)sts, leave these 11 (12: 13: 14: 15) sts on a holder, patt to end. 36 (42: 48: 54: 60)sts.

Dec 1st at neck edge on every row until 28 (33: 38: 43: 48)sts rem.

Work straight until the front measures the same as the back to upper arm shaping, ending at the armhole edge.





Knit to M1. New start of round is immediately after M1.

Dec round: K1, ssk, K to 3sts before M2, k2tog, K2 (1st either side of M2), ssk, K to 3sts before M1, k2tog, K1.

Plain round: Knit.

Repeat these rounds until 16 (20: 24) stitches remain. Distribute these so there are 8 (10: 12) on each of two of your double-pointed

> needles. Now, cast off 1st at the end of each needle, lifting the very end stitch over the one next to it, then off the needles.

This helps to avoid the ends of the toe sticking out in little points once the sock is finished. Graft the remaining 12 (16: 20) stitches using Kitchener stitch, then weave in all the ends, to finish. You may like to work the last two stitches

together, as this also helps to avoid making a baggy last stitch.

#### Pattern details

#### Gusset

Resume working in rounds as follows:

**Next row:** Pick up and knit approximately 18 (19: 20) stitches down the left side of the flap, place marker (M1), knit across top of foot, place marker (M2), pick up and knit approx 18 (19: 20) stitches up the right side of the flap.

You should pick up one stitch in every slipped stitch down the sides of the heel flap, then one extra stitch at the join between the heel and the instep stitches. This reduces the likelihood of a hole appearing at this join. It doesn't matter if the exact number you pick up is different to the numbers given above, as long as you pick up the same number on each side.

When knitting the next round, for this round only, knit the sts that you picked up at each side of the heel flap through the back of the loop. This tightens them up and avoids holes in the fabric. For all further rounds, knit these stitches normally. Dec round: K to 3sts before M1, k2tog, K1, knit across top of foot to M2, K1, ssk, K to end. Plain round: Knit to the end of the row. Rep these two rounds until 60 (64: 68)sts remain. Continue to knit plain stocking stitch until foot



# Socks made simple

If you're a sock newbie then don't worry – it's easier than it looks! **Rosee Woodland** explains how



### Getting started

#### YARN

Sock yarn is usually a little thinner than classic 4ply weight. Often a mix of superwash (machine washable) wool and about 25% nylon, to make it hard-wearing. It can also come in surprisingly luxurious fibres like silk and alpaca. To start with, we'd recommend a basic mix, which will wear, and wash well. Who wants to handwash their socks?!

#### **NEEDLES**

It's usual to knit socks on smaller needles than classic 4ply, to achieve a very tight tension of somewhere between 28 to 36sts and 36 to 44 rows to 10cm or 4in. This is because socks need to withstand a lot of wear and also fit snugly. It may seem strange at first to knit something so 'dense', but when you've got them on your feet you'll be thankful for it. Socks knitted on a looser tension can feel 'sloppy' and uncomfortable to wear. To get this tight tension you'll need to use needles between 2mm and 2.75mm - experiment to find what suits you.

There's a variety of needle types you can knit socks with. Traditionally double pointed needles (DPNs) are used. If you're new to sock-making, we'd recommend bamboo needles, as these are 'grippy' and will make it harder for your stitches to fall off. When working with DPNs, divide your stitches over three or four needles and knit with a fourth or fifth. The triangle shape created by three DPNs is more stable, and generally easier to work with, but some stitch patterns are more easily counted over four needles.

You can also knit socks using the Magic Loop method, using a single long circular needle, or two short circulars, but we'll concentrate on DPNs for this feature.

#### **CASTING ON**

Most people learn to knit socks 'top down' (starting with the cuff) rather than 'toe up' (starting with the toe). You'll need a stretchy cast on to start with, as the cuff has to stretch over your instep and heel, which is bigger than your ankle.

Try the cable, long tail, or thumb method, and if you find it hard to cast on loosely, go up a couple of needle sizes. Once you've cast on, join your stitches to work in the round, being careful not to twist them, and place a marker for the start of the round. You can join your stitches by casting on an extra stitch and then knitting the first and last stitches

of your cast on together, or by using a small crochet hook to swap over the first and last stitches. Don't tie the stitches together as the knot will become a point of weakness in your fabric.

Once you've joined your stitches into the round, you'll work in rounds for almost the entire sock - the only exception being the heel flap (see below).



#### Instructions



#### CUFF

Your pattern will tell you how many stitches to cast on, but it will usually be between 56 and 78 stitches, with 64 stitches a very common figure. The number of stitches you would cast on for a pair of socks is usually a multiple of four – this is because there are sections of your sock where you will need to repeat decreases four times across a round. Most socks cuffs are worked in stretchy rib, either K1, P1 (1x1 rib) or K2, P2 (2x2 rib). If you find you suffer from 'baggy' rib stitches, try working into the back of the loops on the knit stitches. This will twist these stitches to make them tighter, giving a much neater look. The cuff is usually 2.5cm or 1in long, but it's entirely up to you - make it as long as you fancy!



#### **LEG**



Once the ribbed cuff has been finished, continue to work in knit stitches only for a plain stocking stitch leg. If you prefer a really snug fit, you could continue in rib stitch instead.

The leg length can be anything from around 10cm to 20cm or 4in to 8in, but it's really down to personal preference. Choose a length you're happy with.





The heel flap is the only part of the sock you'll work flat (back and forth) rather than in the round. When you come to the point where you want to start the heel flap, knit past your beginning of round marker and then half the stitches in the round again. Now turn your work and purl all the way back to the marker.

You can work the heel flap in stocking stitch, or in a slipped stitch pattern (see above). If you want to work in slip stitch, which will help to reinforce the heel - a common point of wear on a sock, then on the RS rows work K1, sl1 across the row, and purl as normal on the WS rows. Whichever method you choose, slip the first stitch of each row as this will help you to pick up stitches around the heel flap later when turning the heel (see below). Your pattern should give you a number of rows for your heel flap, but if in doubt, aim to make a square flap of fabric as tall as it is wide. Finish your heel flap on a WS row.



#### SHAPE HEEL FLAP



SI1, K to 2sts past the centre of the heel flap, ssk, K1, turn, sl1 and purl 5sts, p2tog, P1, turn and \*\*knit to 1st before the 'gap' created by the turn on the previous knit row, ssk, K1, turn, purl to 1st before the gap created by the turn on the previous purl row, p2tog, turn, and repeat from \*\* until you've used up all the stitches across the top of the heel flap row, ending with a right side row.

#### **Techniques** feature

#### **PICKING UP AROUND HEEL FLAP**



Now pick up and knit one stitch for every slipped stitch down the first side of the heel flap, pick up approximately 3sts in the 'corner'. This will prevent holes at this point. Place a marker. Knit across the stitches which have been 'idle' while you've been working the heel flap, place a marker, pick up approximately 3sts in the 'corner' again, and then pick up and knit one stitch for every slipped stitch up the second side of the heel flap.

You will now have quite a large number of stitches on your needles, possibly 20 more than your original cast on, but this is right, so don't worry about it. You're going to get rid of them now!



#### **DECREASING GUSSET**

The aim of this next step is to shape the heel by decreasing stitches in the 'gusset' made where the heel flap rejoins the foot of the sock. Work across the heel flap stitches until 3sts before the first 'corner' marker you place, then ssk, K1, sl M, work across the instep stitches, sl M, K1, k2tog, work to the end of the round.

Then work the next round without any decreases. Repeat the last two rounds until you are back to your original number of stitches (or fewer if you have a particularly narrow foot!).



This bit is very straightforward – you just work straight until about 5cm or 2in from the final desired length of the sock. If you've been working in a stitch pattern rather than plain, then it's usual to work

the foot with a pattern on the top (instep) only, and to work the sole in plain stocking stitch to make it more comfortable.





The toe is worked in a similar way to the heel flap, except you will be decreasing either side of your 'corner' markers, to make a rather pointy decrease. Work the decrease row as K to 3sts before marker, \*\*ssk, K1, sl M, K1, k2tog, K to 3sts before second marker, ssk, K1, sl M, K1, k2tog, K to end. Work alternate decreasing and plain rows. Stop decreasing when you have something like 16 to 28 stitches remaining. This is down to personal preference and how wide your feet are!

The finished sock should never be longer than your actual foot, as this will make it too loose. If in doubt, make it a few rounds short and allow it to stretch a little.



#### **KITCHENER** STITCH/ **GRAFTING**

Kitchener stitch, also known as grafting, is a way of sewing your sock toe together with no seam. Instead you will use a darning needle to create a row of stitches joining the top and bottom of the foot together. Some sock knitters like to 'cast off' the end stitches of the toe (see our sock pattern on page 32 for how to do this) but for now we'll stick to the basics. Using your 'corner markers' as a guide, divide your remaining stitches over two DPNs - these will become the top and bottom of your foot.

Now snip your yarn with about a 30cm or 12in tail, and thread this onto a darning needle. Holding your two sets of stitches parallel in front of you, take your darning needle through the first stitch on your front DPN purlwise, and then take it through the first stitch on your back DPN - as it is facing you - knitwise.









\*\*\*Now, take your needle through the first stitch on your front DPN knitwise and slip it off the DPN. Take your needle through the next stitch on your front DPN purlwise. Take your needle through the first stitch on your back DPN purlwise and slip it off the DPN. Take your needle through the next stitch on your back DPN knitwise. Repeat from \*\*\* until you've used up all your stitches.

Fasten off the last stitch and weave in your yarn on the inside of your sock.

That's it! Now just repeat every step and you'll have a pair!









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Using two strands of Medium Pink together, cast on 14 stitches.

Row 1: Purl.

Next row: (Inc in every st) to end. 28sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (Inc, K1) to end. 42sts.

Starting with a purl row, st st three rows.

Next row: (Inc, K2) to end. 56sts.

Starting with a purl row, st st three rows.

Next row: (Inc, K3) to end. 70sts.

Next row: Knit.

Starting with a knit row st st seven rows.

Next row: P10 using Medium Pink, P50 using two strands of Off White, P10 using Medium Pink.

Next row: K10 using Medium Pink, P50 using Off White, K10 using Medium Pink. Keeping 10sts either side of Off White apron Medium Pink, work nine rows st st.

Next row: K8, k2tog, using Medium Pink, (K8, k2tog) x 5 using Off White, K8, k2tog using Medium Pink. 63sts.

Next row: P9 using Medium Pink, P45 using Off White, P9 using Medium Pink. Work six rows st st keeping colourwork correct.

Next row: K7, knit two stitches together, using Medium Pink, (K7, k2tog) x 5 using Off White, K7, knit two stitches together using Medium Pink. 56sts.

Next row: P8 using Medium Pink, P40 using Off White, P8 using Medium Pink. Work four rows st st keeping colourwork

Next row: K6, k2tog, using Medium Pink, (K6, k2tog) x 5 using Off White, K6, k2tog using Medium Pink. 49sts.

Next row: P7 using Medium Pink, P35 using off Off White, P7 using Medium Pink. Work two rows st st keeping colourwork correct.

Next row: K5, k2tog, using Medium Pink, (K5, k2tog) x 5 using Off White K5, k2tog using Medium Pink. 42sts.

Next row: Cont in Medium Pink only, purl to the end.

Work 10 rows st st.

### Shaping for arms

Next row: K8, k2togtbl, K1, k2tog, K16, k2togtbl, K1, k2tog, K8. 38sts.

Next row: Purl. Next row: Knit. Next row: (P2tog) to the end. 19sts. Cast off.

Turn outside in and run a length of yarn around the cast on edge and pull up tightly. Sew a seam along the base and up the back to waist. Turn right side out. Cut an 8cm or 3in diameter circle from cardboard and insert into the body, pushing down to the base. Add the filling, a little at a time, until the body is filled to the waist. Sew the back to the neck and cut the yarn. Add more filling to the top of the neck. Use a single length of Dark Olive Mix to work some daisy stitches randomly around the pink dress, in a variety of groups of one, two, three or four petals. Ensure all ends are tied in securely.

### Apron trimming

Using one strand of Off White, cast on 85sts. Work two rows garter st.

**Next row:** K1, (P1, p3tog, P1, K1) to end.

Pin the trimming along the hem of the apron and sew in place securely.

### Apron ribbon

Cast on 46sts using two strands of Off White.

Work three rows st st.

Cast off knitways.

Make another ribbon in the same way for the tiers at the back.

Fold the tiers and sew to the back where the apron ribbon joins. Sew in securely.

### Head

Using two strands of Off White, cast on six stitches.

Row 1: Inc in every st. 12sts. Next (and every alt) row: Purl.

**Next row:** (K1, inc in next st) to end. 18sts. NNext row: (K2, inc in next st) to end. 24sts. Next row: (K3, inc in next st) to end. 30sts.

**Next row:** (K4, inc in next st) to end. 36sts. Next row: (K5, inc in next st) to end. 42sts. Next row: K12, K6 (using two strands

throughout) Dark Grey, K6, Off White K6, Dark

Grey K6, Off White K12.

Next row: P12 Off White, P6 Dark Grey, P6 Off White, P6 Dark Grey, P12 Off White.

Rep last two rows again.

Next row: K4, k2tog, K4, k2tog, K1 using Off White, K5 using Dark Grey, K6 using Off White, K5 using Dark Grey, K1, k2tog, K4, k2tog, K4 using Off White. 38sts.

Next row: P11 Off White, P5 Dark Grey, P6 Off White, P5 Dark Grey, P13 white.

Next row: K11 Off White, K5 Dark Grey, k6 Off White, K5 Dark Grey, K13 Off White. Next row: P11 Off White, P5 Dark Grey, P6

Next row: P5 Off White, p3 Dark Grey, p3 Off White, p3 Dark Grey, P5 Off White.

Next row: K2, k2tog, K1, using Off White, K3 using Dark Grey, k3 using Off White, K3 using

Dark Grey, K1, k2tog, K2. 17sts

Next row: P4 Off White, P3 Dark Grey, p3 Off

White, P3 Dark Grey, P4 Off White.

Next row: K1, k2tog, K1, using Off White, k2tog, K1 using Dark Grey, K3 using Off White, K1, k2tog using Dark Grey, K1, k2tog, K1. 13sts

Next row: Purl. Next row: Knit.

Next row: (P2tog) to last st, P1. 7sts.

Cast off purlwise.

Gather round cast on sts and pull up tightly. Sew the seam for about 2cm or 3/4in. Gather round the cast off sts and sew the seam, leaving a 3cm or 11/4in gap. Turn right side out and stuff firmly. Place the eyes about halfway up the face and sew in place in the middle of each black stripe, ensuring they are level. Use a length of double Dark Grey to sew small vertical stitches for the nose and finish with one longer st across the top of them. Tie all the threads in knots in the gap then add a little more filling. Sew up the gap. Place the head on the body and sew firmly around the neck.

### Arms (make two)

Using two strands of Dark Grey, **cast on** 5sts.

Purl one row.

Next row: Inc in every st. 10sts. Starting with a purl row, st st five rows.

Change to Medium Pink. Use two strands together. Next row: (K1, inc) to end. 15sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K2, inc) to end. 20sts. Starting with a purl row, st st 19 rows.

Cast off 3sts at beg of next two rows. 13sts. Next row: K2tog, knit to last 2sts, k2tog.

11sts.

**Next row:** Purl.

Rep last two rows till 8sts. Next row: P2tog to end. 4sts.

Using a length of yarn, gather up sts round cast on edge and pull up tightly. Sew the seam to arm shaping. Turn right side round and stuff lightly. Pin the arms to the body angled in at the front. Attach securely to the side of the body, adding a little filling at the top.

### Shawl

Using one strand of Light Blue, cast on 2sts.

Row 1: Inc in each st. 4sts.

**Next row:** Inc in first st, K to last st, inc. 6sts

Rep last row until 56sts.

Cast off

Place the shawl over the shoulders and cross over at the front of the body. Attach to the apron band.

### Feet (make two)

Using two strands of Dark Grey, cast on 6sts.

Purl one row.

**Next row:** Inc in every st. 12sts. Starting with a purl row, st st 13 rows. Cast off.

Gather round the cast on sts and pull up tightly. Sew along the seam to the cast off edge. Turn RS out and oversew the cast off edge. Place the feet, angled, about 2cm or <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>in apart on the base with about half of the feet showing at the front.

Sew in place.

### Mob cap

Using two strands of Light Blue, cast on 35sts.

Knit two rows.

**Next row:** Inc in every st. 70sts. Starting with a purl row, st st five rows. Next row: (K2tog, K5) to end. 60sts. Starting with a purl row, st st three rows.

Next (and every alt) row: Purl. **Next row:** (K2tog, K4) to end. 50sts. **Next row:** (K2tog, K3) to end. 40sts. Next row: (K2tog, K2) to end. 30sts. Next row: (K2tog, K1) to end. 20sts. Next row: (K2tog) to end. 10sts. Next row: (P2tog) to end. 5sts.

Cut the yarn and thread through. Pull up the yarn tightly and sew the seam. Turn right

side out.

### F'rill

Using two strands of Light Blue yarn, cast on

35sts

Knit one row.

**Next row:** Inc in every st to end. 70sts.

Knit one row.

**Next row:** Inc in every st to end. 140sts.

Cast off.

Sew frill to cast on edge of cap. Place on the head and sew securely.

### Lace collar

Using one strand of Off White, cast on 30sts

and purl the first row.

Next row: (Inc, K1) to end. 45sts.

Next row: Purl.

**Next row:** (K1, yfwd, sl, K1, psso) to end.

Cast off purlways.

Place around the neck with the collar edges

to the front. Sew on securely.

### Purse

Using two strands of Goldenrod, cast on 8sts.

Row 1: Purl.

Next row: Inc in every st. 16sts.

**Next row:** Purl.

Next row: (K1, inc in next st) to end. 24sts. Starting with a purl row, st st five rows. Next row: K1, (yf, k2tog) to last st, K1.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: Inc in every st.

Cast off.

Sew the side seam and turn right way out. Stuff lightly. Gather the stitches up on the row with holes and pull up tightly. Make a chain using one strand of Goldenrod about 6cm or 21/2in long. Attach to either side of the purse to make a handle. Place over the hand and sew in position.



### Pattern notes

The ladder stitch patt is formed by winding yarn twice round needle for each st, creating a much looser fabric. As the row tension of this is different to the st st tension, the combined patt (of ladder st and st st) is created by knitting four rows in the st st sections but only two rows in the ladder st sections. On the back and front, when a number of rows is stated, this relates to the number of rows of st st worked either side of the central ladder st section. But on the sleeves, when a number of rows is stated. this relates to the number of rows of ladder st worked either side of the central stocking stitch section.

onto right needle, P to blue marker dropping extra loops, slip blue marker onto right

red marker, turn, K to end.

needle, P to end.

**Rows 5 to 7:** As rows 1-3.

Row 24: P2tog (for side seam dec), P to within 3sts of red marker, p3togtbl, slip red marker onto right needle, M1P, purl to blue marker dropping extra loops, M1P, slip blue marker onto right needle, p3tog,

P to last 2sts, p2tog (for side seam dec). 79 (91: 103: 115:

129)sts.

These 24 rows form chart rows 1-24 and set the sts – centre section in ladder st with side sts in st st. Four rows of st st are worked in the side sections for every two rows of ladder st worked in the centre section. On every eighth (WS) row, the

centre panel increases in width by one st at each side. St st side sections decrease one st to match this increase except on every third shaping row (every 24th row) an extra st is decreased to compensate for the st tension difference. Although there are fewer sts on the needle at the top of the side seams than at the cast-on edge, the two points should be the same width. Similarly, once the armhole shaping is completed, although the number of sts decreases the work should remain the same width. Cont foll chart until chart row 88 (96: 96: 100: 104) has been worked, ending with RS facing for next row. 81

Place markers either side of centre 19sts in the ladder st patt as folls: counting in from beg of last row, place red marker after first 34 (40: 46: 52: 59)sts, and counting in from the end of the last row, place blue marker after last 34 (40: 46: 52: 59)sts. Beg and ending rows as indicated, now work in patt from chart as folls:

Rows 1 to 3: K to blue marker, turn, P to end, turn, K to blue marker, slip blue marker

### Shape armholes

(91: 103: 115: 129) sts.

Keeping shaping over join between ladder st and st st sections correct as set by chart (and noting that no reference will be made to this shaping), cont as folls:

**Next three rows:** K to blue marker, turn, P to end, turn, cast off 3 (-: 5: 6: -)sts, patt to end. **Next row:** Cast off 3 (-: 5: 6: -)sts, patt to end. 75 (-: 93: 103: -)sts.

### Sizes M and XXL only

**Next three rows:** Cast off – (4: -: -: 7) sts, K to blue marker, turn, P to end, turn, k2tog, patt to end, turn, cast off – (4: -: -: 7) sts, P to red marker, turn, K to last 2sts, k2tog. – (81: -: -: 113)sts.

**Next row:** P2tog, patt to last 2sts, p2tog. – (79: -: -: 111)sts.

### **All sizes**

Working armhole shaping within st st side sections as shown on chart, dec 1 st at each end of next three (one: five: five: five) rows, then on foll two (four: four: six: six) alt rows. 63 (69: 75: 79: 87)sts in total – 43 (45: 47: 49: 49)sts in centre panel and 10 (12: 14: 15: 19) sts in each side panel.

Cont straight until chart row 144 (152: 156: 164: 168) has been completed, ending with RS facing for next row. 59 (65: 71: 77: 83)sts in total – 55 (57: 57: 59: 61)sts in centre panel and 2 (4: 7: 9: 11)sts in each side panel.

### **Shape shoulders**

Next row (RS): Cast off first 15 (18: 20: 23: 25)sts, K until there are 29 (29: 31: 31: 33)sts on right needle, cast off remaining 15 (18: 20: 23: 25)sts.

Break yarn and leave centre 29 (29: 31: 31: 33) sts on a holder (for the neckband).

### Front

Work as given for back until chart row 115 (123: 127: 135: 139) has been completed, ending with WS facing for next row. 63 (67:

73: 79: 87)sts in total. 47 (49: 49: 51: 53)sts in centre panel and 8 (9: 12: 14: 17)sts in each side panel.

### Shape front neck

**Note:** Front neck shaping is not shown on the chart.

Next row (WS): Patt first 26 (28: 30: 33: 36) sts and slip these sts onto a holder (for second side of neck), patt 11 (11: 13: 13: 15) sts and slip these sts onto another holder (for neckband), patt to the end. 26 (28: 30: 33: 36)sts.

Work each side of the neck separately. Keeping shaping over join between ladder st and st st sections correct as set by chart (and noting that no reference will be made to this shaping), cont as folls:

Dec 1 st at neck edge of next six ladder st rows, then on foll three alt ladder st rows. 16 (18: 20: 23: 26)sts.

Cont straight until chart row 144 (152: 156: 164: 168) has been completed, ending with RS facing for next row. 15 (18: 20: 23: 25) sts in total – 13 (14: 13: 14: 14) sts in centre panel and 2 (4: 7: 9: 11)sts in side panel.

### Shape shoulder

Cast off.

With RS facing, rejoin yarn and patt to sts on holder for second side of neck. Complete to match first side, reversing shapings.

### Sleeves

Using 3.25mm needles cast on 41 (43: 45: 45: 47)sts.

Row 1 (RS): K1, \*P1, K1, rep from \* to end. Row 2: P1, \*K1, P1, rep from \* to end. These two rows form rib.

Work in rib for a further nine rows, ending with WS facing for next row.

**Row 12 (WS):** Rib 2 (2: 1: 1: 1), work 2tog, (rib

2, work 2tog) zero (zero: one: one: one) times, rib 2 (3: 1: 1: 2), place red marker on needle, rib 29, place blue marker on needle, rib 2 (3: 1: 1: 2), work 2tog, (rib 2, work 2tog) zero (zero: one: one: one), rib 2 (2: 1: 1: 1). 39 (41: 41: 41: 43)sts. 29sts between markers and 5 (6: 6: 6: 7)sts at each side.

Change to 4mm needles.

Now work in patt as folls:

Row 1 (RS): K to blue marker wrapping yarn twice round needle for each st, slip blue marker onto right needle, K to red marker, turn, P to blue marker, turn, K to red marker, slip red marker onto right needle, K to end wrapping yarn twice round needle for each st. Row 2: P to red marker dropping extra

loops, slip red marker dropping extra loops, slip red marker onto right needle, P to blue marker, slip blue marker onto right needle, P to end dropping extra loops. These two rows form patt.

**Note:** As centre section of sleeves is in st st, twice as many rows are worked in this section. Also note that, for sleeve, all rows relate to the number of rows worked in the side ladder st patt sections, NOT the central st st section – see pattern note.

Cont in patt, shaping sides by inc 1st at each end of third (third: third: next: next) and every foll fourth (fourth: fourth: alt: alt) row to 43 (51: 61: 45: 51)sts, then on every foll sixth (sixth: sixth: fourth: fourth) row until there are 57 (61: 65: 69: 73)sts, taking inc sts into ladder st patt.

**Note:** Central st st section of sleeve remains 29sts wide throughout.

Cont straight until sleeve meas 44 (45: 46: 46: 46)cm or  $17^{1/4}$  ( $17^{3/4}$ : 18: 18: 18)in, ending with RS facing for next row.

### **Shape top**

Keeping patt correct, cast off 2 (3: 4: 5: 6)sts at the beg of the next two rows. 53 (55: 57: 59: 61) sts.





With RS facing and using 4mm needles, pick up and knit 21 (23: 23: 25)sts evenly from back side of end of right sleeve, and 21 (23: 23: 25)sts evenly from front end of right sleeve. 42 (46: 46: 50)sts. Work 16cm or 61/4 in in K2, P2 rib as given for back. Cast off loosely. Rep for other sleeve.

### **Making up**

Sew up the rem seams using mattress stitch with the right sides facing you as you work. Remember to match the stitch markers you placed while working front and back. ■





Press the pieces as described on the ball band, avoiding the ribs. Join all raglan seams using back stitch, or mattress stitch if preferred. Sew the pocket lining in place on the inside. Fold the first nine rows of the hood to the inside along the fold line row and neatly sew in place. Matching the centre back seam of the hood to the centre back neck, sew the row-end edges of hood to the neck edge, easing in the fullness and positioning the fold line rows so they meet at the centre front neck.

### **Hood drawstring**

Using double-pointed 4mm needles, cast on 3sts. Row 1 (RS): K3, \*without turning slip these 3sts to opposite end of needle and bring yarn to opposite end of work pulling it quite tightly across WS of work, knit these 3sts again, rep from \* until strip is 120cm or 471/4in long.





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# Diary of a knitting group

# Find out what Aneeta and her gang of knitters have been getting up to this month

I'm a firm believer in the joy of crafting with others and the monthly, free, drop-in Knitting SOS group is one of my favourite activities of every month!

### February 2014

Today's SOS session was a great mixture of cosy, as we hid out of the chilly wind, and lively, with lots of different projects whirling around the heads of my knitters. Inspiration comes not only from our own knitting, but from the 'oooh's and 'ahh's that come with finding out about everyone else's crafting stories.

Carrie's our resident expert knitter. She's always experimenting with patterns and knits her projects up faster than any other knitter I know. It's also great having such an experienced knitter in the group for when I need a second opinion on a tricky knitting SOS. She's knitting up a very unusual pair of sleeves at the moment that create an interesting layered look. It's a great idea for using up spare yarn and knitting a garment at the same time.

Chloe's new to knitting and new to Knitting SOS. She's a textiles student and an expert seamstress who needed a bit of help deciphering a vintage underwear pattern. With a four-week deadline to knit this for her course we sped through several new techniques and at the same time I got a bit of advice for my amateur (fabric) sewing skills. I do love a good skill-swap and today I got the opportunity to learn as much as I can teach!

Hayley's knitting a 4ply lace cardigan using a pair of Addi lace circular needles. These come in an interchangeable set that have long been on my wishlist of things to buy. Not only are they extra sharp, which is great for knitting lace or fine yarn, but they come in GOLD! I do love adding an extra bit of bling to my knitting.

Sam put her current WIP on the side today to get some extra inspiration from a stack of *Knit Todays*. I think she's leaning towards knitting a sweet little dog coat that she can knit up and donate to Battersea Dog's Home.

Doreen came to her first Knitting SOS last month and is back for more! Today we had a little one-to-one session in perfecting a thumb cast on. This is my favourite way to cast on and gives a really neat finish, especially if your pattern starts with a rib. I also find it extra stretchy so always use it when I knit socks. Doreen isn't quite ready to knit socks, but she definitely mastered a tidy thumb cast on.

Last month I was inspired by the dress on the cover of the February issue of *Knit Today*. As always I mixed and matched my patterns and this dress is a partadaptation of the Caviar Dress by Yoko Johnston (you'll find the pattern on www.ravelry.com) mixed with my current favourite knitting stitch, cable twist. This is a cable that knits up without using a cable needle, creating a very pretty, rib-gauged stitch that added a fitted shape to the bodice of this dress.





### It's not just about the knitting!

Today's biggest laugh (and moan) came from the antics of errant partners! The other half of a dedicated crafter has to be a pretty patient person as they have to cope with our obsession taking up lots of space and time. But of course, they can benefit from having gorgeous things handmade for them. Swings and roundabouts... but what makes an amateur crafter-partner stand out (for all the wrong reasons)? One of my Knitting SOS-er's turned up with a tangle of dropped stitches because her husband 'teased her until she lost concentration'! The group was amusedly outraged and this led to a giggle over the blog Handmade Ryan Gosling. Look it up – he's a crafter's best friend!

Using long tail cast on and 3.5mm DPNs, cast on 100sts, and join to work in the round, being careful not to twist stitches.

Easy

Work 1x1 rib for 9cm or 3½in.

Change to 4mm needles and knit one round.

**Next row:** \*Kfb, K9\* all stitches. 110sts. Next row: \*Kfb, K10\* all stitches. 120sts.

**Next row:** Knit 36 rounds and then beg decrease.

Next round: \*K2tog, K10\* all stitches. **Next round:** Knit to the end of the row.

Next round: \*K2tog, K9\* all stitches.

**Next round:** Knit to the end of the row.

Next round: \*K2tog, K8\* all stitches. **Next round:** Knit to the end of the row.

Next round: \*K2tog, K7\* all stitches.

**Next round:** Knit to the end of the row. Next round: \*K2tog, K6\* all stitches. **Next round:** Knit to the end of the row.

Next round: \*K2tog, K5\* all stitches. **Next round:** Knit to the end of the row.

**Next round:** \*K2tog, K4\* all stitches. **Next round:** Knit to the end of the row. Next round: \*K2tog, K3\* all stitches.

**Next round:** Knit to the end of the row. Next round: \*K2tog, K2\* all stitches.

**Next round:** Knit to the end of the row. Next round: \*K2tog, K1\* all stitches. **Next round:** Knit to the end of the row.

Next round: \*K2tog\* all stitches.

Thread the yarn through the remaining stitches

Using the long tail cast on method and 4mm DPNs, **cast on** 96sts in A and join to work in the round, being careful not to twist stitches.

Round 2: Change to B and knit.

Round 3: Knit to the end of the round.

Round 4: Change to A and knit.

**Round 5:** Knit to the end of the round.

Round 6: Change to B and knit.

Round 7: Knit to the end of the round.

Round 8: Change to A and knit.

Round 9: Knit to the end of the round.

Round 10: Change to B and knit.

Round 11: B.

Rounds 12-38: Work in A.

Round 39: \*K2tog, K6\* all stitches.

Round 40: Knit to the end of the round.

Round 41: \*K2tog, K5\* all stitches.

Round 42: Knit to the end of the round.

Round 43:\*K2tog, K4\* all stitches.

Round 44: Knit to the end of the round.

Round 45: \*K2tog, K3\* all stitches.

Round 46: Knit to the end of round.

Round 47: \*K2tog, K2\* all stitches

**Round 48:** Knit to the end of the round.

Round 49: \*K2tog, K1\* all stitches

Round 50: Knit to the end of the round.

Round 51: \*K2tog\* all stitches

Thread through the remaining sts and pull, sew the thread neatly into the hat. Then, using B, pick up the 96 stitches at the base of the hat, splitting them evenly and join to work in the round.

Round 1: Knit to the end of round.

Round 2: \*K2, P2\* all stitches.

Round 3: \*K2, P2\* all stitches.

Round 4: \*Kfb, K7\* all stitches. 108sts.

Round 5: \*Kfb, K8\* all stitches. 120sts.

Round 6: Knit to the end of round.

Row 7: Turn the piece and P back.

Row 8: K1, k2tog, knit until the last three stitches,

k2tog, K1

Row 9: Turn and P.

Rows 10-29: Work rows 8 and 9 until 98 stitches

remain (round 28).

Cast off.

### **Making up**

Using the natural curl of the brim, pin it to the top stripe on the hat. Sew through the curl

so the brim stands out more.

## **Sock situation**

I've knitted my first pair of socks but the cast on is quite tight around my leg. I used a knit cast on but I know from looking on Youtube that there are lots of different ways to cast on. Can you please give me some advice before I start knitting my next pair of socks?

Cora Twain, Herne Bay

Aneeta says: Some cast on techniques are stretchier than others. My personal choice of cast on for socks is the thumb method. You'll be able to find online video tutorials for this. Not only does this method give a tidier edge when you are starting your knitting with a ribbed border (as you are likely to with socks), it also stretches with the rib so works better with the tension. If you still have trouble, my advice is that you cast on using a knitting needle that's 1mm bigger than you are using for the rest of your sock.





## Stripy scarf

I have lots of single balls of yarn left from various knitting projects, and some of the colours go together well. I'd like to make a stripy scarf but was wondering how I can make sure the yarns match in thickness.

Rachel Best, Bath

Sarah says: For a stripy scarf, you need to make sure your yarns are of an equal weight. Names on labels are no

guarantee for a perfect match in terms of thickness. Some aran yarn will match a chunky yarn in another brand, and DK yarn can vary between brands. Knit a small test square with four rows each of the different yarns, and you'll see and feel which yarns go together well and produce an even effect. Hold the test square up against the light and judge the density of the stitches. Test needle sizes on your test square too: to ensure the scarf is soft and drapes nicely, use slightly bigger needles.

## Silver lining

I've knitted a small bag with a shoulder strap, but when I use it the contents stretch the bag and items sometimes get caught in the stitches. Should I add a lining?

Louise Brampton, Cromer

Sarah says: Absolutely! Unless the stitches are quite dense, I'd add a lining in a matching or contrasting material. This will prevent the contents from stretching the bag out of shape and nothing will slip through or snag the stitches. I also like to add an additional pocket for a mobile phone or mp3 player. To make the lining, lay your bag on a piece of material folded in half, with the fold matching the bottom of the bag. Cut around it. Close the side seams. Fold the top edges over and iron them. For the small pocket, cut out a rectangle measuring roughly 18x13cm or 7x5in. Fold the edges over and iron them. Stitch across one of the edges (this will be the top of the pocket), then sew the pocket into place. Now handstitch the lining into place.

## .....

I've just finished knitting my first scarf! I've got lots of loose ends of yarn where I added a new ball. I'm not sure if I can just cut these off?


Sarah Wilde, Manchester

Aneeta says: Don't cut them! Always weave loose ends of yarn into your knitting. If you cut them they'll unravel and that will be hard to recover from. You can weave short ends into the back of your knitting using a crochet hook. In a scarf you might not have a right and wrong side; if this is the case, then pick a side to weave into and stick to it. You need to weave in the ends of yarn at the cast on and cast off. If the loose ends are a bit longer, you can thread them onto a darning needle to weave them in.



My knitting pattern is telling me to use double knit yarn and 5mm needles, but the yarn label says to use 4mm needles. I don't know who to trust! Why is the information different on the pattern and the label? I know these things are important, but I'm not sure why! Fran Smith, via email

Aneeta says: The rule is to listen to the pattern initially. The designer will want the garment knitted to a specific tension, so it's best to trust the tension information and start by using the knitting needles recommended in the pattern. The label is correct. in that double knit yarn is traditionally knitted on 4mm (UK size 8) knitting needles. However, I often recommend that beginners use 5mm (UK size 6) needles in order to combat a beginner's tight tension, or to make the garment a little bit looser and stretchier (especially for baby and toddler garments) so it's perfectly alright for a designer to write a pattern using a different size knitting needle than that on the yarn label. You may notice that the stitches in the fabric are a little bit looser, but you shouldn't see any actual holes in the knitting. Tension can be slightly confusing for a new knitter, but trust the pattern and if you aren't sure, then take time to knit tension squares to make sure that you are knitting to the same tension as the pattern designer.



## Needles

## **Curly circulars**

I love knitting in the round but hate it when the cord on my circulars twists while I'm knitting. How do I stop this? **Ruth Crossman, Wilts** 

Jo says: It's the norm for most knitters! I usually stop every couple of rows and pull the cord straight. The trouble is a lot of cheaper circulars 'remember' the twist and it's hard to get it out if the cord has been left twisted for any time. When you've finished your project, dip the cord briefly in hot water and then straighten it out quickly. For topquality circulars you could invest in a set of HiyaHiya's bamboo and stainless steel circulars. The beauty of them is the cords are attached to the needles with a little swivel connector, which means no more twists! The small set contains seven needles ranging from 2.75mm to 5mm,

plus four cables and connectors. The large set contains six needles ranging from 5.5mm to 10mm, and four cables and connectors. All the needles are interchangeable with the cables so they should meet your every need. Each set costs £47.69 from www.woolstack.co.uk



Click clacking!

I usually knit when I'm watching television in the evening but now my husband has new hearing aids he's moaning about the click-clacking noise I make! Are there any needles that are quiet to use? Sue Bodden, Plymouth

Jo says: A good compromise would be to ditch the aluminium and buy some bamboo needles. They are much quieter to use but can slow down your knitting – get rid of any rough patches with an emery board and put a little oil on them to make the yarn slide more easily. A proper cleaning once a year is a good idea; when they are clean and dry, moisturise them with a little beeswax. You can buy a set of 18 pairs of bamboo knitting needles for £10.07 from Goodefiner at amazon.co.uk (delivered). Each pair (35cm long) is made of carbonized bamboo and sizes go from 2mm up to 10mm. There is a 3.5mm size in there too, which is not usually included in UK needle sets.

> Bamboo needles are reasonably priced and easy on the hands

## Cable knitting

My cable needle keeps sliding out of my stitches. I've messed up constantly because of this and by the time I've rescued the stitches they've dropped and my cables are now quite holey. Is there a foolproof cable needle? Jenny Gray, Kent.

Jo says: Personally, I never use cable needles – I always use a spare needle the same size as I'm knitting with. I just slide the stitches on and leave it to hang at either the back or the front. The stitches usually work their way up to the hilt and then I just slide them back onto the left hand needle and knit. If it's only a three-stitch cable I often knit the third stitch and then the first two and slide them all off together - very lazy! If you're happier with a cable needle, though, I would recommend the KnitPro set of two coloured aluminium cable needles: 2.5mm and 4mm. You can buy them for £1.89 from www.minervacrafts.com

## 3 top tips for needle know-how

## Tip 1

Keep duplicate sets of knitting needles – for holding stitches when not in use or just to have handy when you lose one!


## Tip 2


Buy a set of needles stoppers - they're usually used for double-pointed needles but can be used on ordinary needles to stop work falling off.

## Tip 3

Never leave bamboo knitting needles pushed into a ball of yarn in between knitting sessions, as they can break really easily.





Wash: Hand wash Nettles – they're not exactly the first thing you'd choose to have right next to your skin, but this beautiful aran weight yarn from Bessie May's Lishie-lou range might just change your mind about this oft maligned plant. ## Makeaslipknot Start all knitting projects with this easy knot




Twist the yarn into a loop and form a second loop of yarn to pull through the first one.



Tighten the first loop into a knot around the second. This will be your first cast on stitch.

## Caston-thumbmethod Use this for an extra-stretchy edge



Make a slipknot with a long tail of 2.5cm or 1in per stitch that the pattern has asked you to cast on.



Loop the tail end of the yarn around your left thumb and then slide the needle tip into this loop.



Wrap the ball end of the yarn anticlockwise around the needle. Push the needle through the loop.



Slide the loop off your thumb and tighten both ends. Repeat steps 2-4 for each stitch.

## Caston-twoneedlemethod Use this for a strong, hardwearing edge



With the slipknot on your left needle, insert the right needle from front to back of the loop.



Wrap the ball end of the yarn anticlockwise around the right needle and then pull this through the loop.



Now insert the left needle tip through the front of this new loop, dropping it off the right needle.



Repeat steps 1-3 as needed, forming new stitches from the top stitch on the left needle.

## Castoff

What to do when you've reached the end



To begin, knit only the first two stitches in the cast off row.



Push the left needle through the first stitch, then lift it over the second stitch and off the right needle.



With one stitch now on the right needle, knit another stitch and then repeat step 2 until the row end.



Cut the yarn with a 15cm or 6in tail. Pull the tail through the final cast off stitch.

## Knit

Learn the most essential stitch



Insert the right needle into the left needle's top stitch, from front to back with the yarn at the back.



Hold the yarn around your right index finger and then wrap it clockwise around the right needle.



Using the right needle, pull this new loop of yarn through the stitch on the left needle.



Ease the stitch off the left needle keeping the new stitch on the right needle. Repeat steps 1-4.

## Purl

Usually worked on the wrong side of the piece



Insert the right needle into the front of the left needle's top stitch with the yarn in front.



With your right index finger, wrap the yarn anticlockwise around the top of the right needle.



Using the right needle, pull this new loop of yarn back through the front of the stitch.



Ease the stitch off the left needle, keeping the new stitch on the right. Repeat steps 1-4.

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
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
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# Katie Jones



We catch up with the designer whose vibrant designs are inspired by native and tribal textiles

## Tell us about the ideas behind your designs.

Different cultures, traditional dress, art and crafts... these are my main go-tos for inspiration. I love some regions' boldness of colour and pattern. This is what I'm mainly drawn to; the technical ability that is shown in traditional costume really amazes me! I think sometimes people think fashion is so vacuous, but I love that by looking at different cultures and their tribal dress we can see that being able to create characters and express oneself through clothing has always been a fundamental human instinct.

## What is your favourite design?

The pieces I'm working on at the moment, but you'll have to wait to see those! I have to say that I still love my BA collection as much now as I did when I made it two years ago!

## What has been the highlight of your career so far?

Creating my new label K2TOG – it was a project I had wanted to start for a while and it's a new venture that I'm really excited about! But previous to that it was working on a GrapeDress showpiece for Romance was Born,

in Sydney – they are one of my favorite design houses, so to work with them was really an amazing experience!

## Which designers inspire you?

Romance was Born, Meadham Kirchhoff, Louise Gray, Dolce and Gabbana, Prada – I love quirky design, I think fashion should be lots of fun and full of colour!

### Who taught you to knit, and what was your first project?


I like to think I inherited my crafty side. I was taught as a kid by my Gran to knit, my Nana taught me to crochet and my great auntie taught me to sew. I carried on sewing but I put my needles down for a few years – then my Mum reawakened my love for it when I was 16, and I knitted a cropped cardi which had an Elvis head intarsia on the back. It's now mounted, a bit like a trophy, on my wall!

## What is your advice for young knitwear designers?

Value your skill, go with your gut and always make sure you double your time estimates!

## What are your favourite materials to work with, and why?

## **YOU WILL NEED**

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To fit an average teapot

## YARN DETAIL

Patons Diploma Gold DK www.makeitcoats.com

Content 55% wool, 25% acrylic, 20% nylon Weight/length 50g/120m

Wash Machine wash 40°C RRP £3.19



## **BACK AND FRONT (both alike)**

Using Aqua and 3.75mm needles, **cast on** 48sts, and work three rows in garter stitch.

Row 1 (RS): Knit.

Row 2: Purl.

**Row 3:** (P2tog) twice, \*(yon, K1) four times, p2tog four times\*; rep from \* to \*, ending last repeat p2tog twice.

Row 4: Purl.

These four rows form the pattern, and are repeated throughout.

Continue in pattern until work measures 15cm or 6in, or required length to the top of the teapot, ending on a P row.

At the same time, decrease 6sts evenly across the last row. 42sts.

## **SHAPE TOP**

Next row: (K2, k2tog) to last 2sts, K2. 32sts.

Rows 2-4: Work in st st.

Row 5: (K1, k2tog) to last 2sts, K2. You will now

have 22sts.

Rows 6-8: Work in st st.

Row 9: K2tog all across row. 11sts.

Row 10: Purl.

Row 11: (K2tog) five times, K1.

You will now have 6sts.

Break the yarn, thread through sts and pull up

tight, fasten off.

Work another piece to match.

## **ROSES**

Using the colour of your choice and 3.75mm

needles, cast on 12sts, P one row.

**Next row:** Inc in every stitch to end of row.

**Next row:** Knit.

**Next row:** Cast off as follows: cast off first 2sts in the normal way, \*yrn and slip stitch on needle over the yrn, K1, cast off 1st; rep from \* to continue casting off in this way until all sts are worked. Fasten off. The piece will curl as you cast off. Form the curl into a rose shape, and secure with a few stitches.



## **LEAVES**

Using Apple Green and 3.75mm needles,

cast on 5sts.

Knit four rows in garter stitch. **Next row:** K2, M1, K1, M1, K2.

**Next row:** K3, P1, K3.

**Next row:** K3, M1, K1, M1, K3.

**Next row:** K4, P1, K4.

Next row: K4, M1, K1, M1, K4. You will now have 11sts.
Next row: K5, P1, K5.

Next row: K5, P1, K5 Next row: Knit. Rep the last two rows twice more.

Next row: Dec 1st at each end of the row.

Next and alt rows: Knit, but keep the continuity

of the centre purl stitch, as before.

Repeat the last two rows until 3sts remain,

k3tog. Fasten off.

## **MAKING UP**

Sew the back and front sides together, leaving openings for the handle and spout. Position the roses and leaves on top, and stitch into place. Sew little bees onto the flowers to finish.

## TOP TIP!

Knit the flowers by doubling the number of stitches in the second row, then casting off on the fourth row. The knitting will naturally curl as you cast off, so use this to form a round rose. Sew a few in a cluster at the top of the cosy, surrounded by leaves.

4.5mm (UK size 7) knitting needles

## **OTHER**

50cm or 20in fuchsia ribbon 15mm wide

## **TENSION**

**Yarn used knits as aran when held double –** 17 stitches and 25 rows to 10cm or 4in using 4.5 mm (UK size 7) knitting needles

## **BACK**

**Cast on** 71 (77: 83: 91: 99)sts using two strands of yarn held together.

Work in moss stitch for 6cm or 2½ in (16 rows). Cont in reverse stocking stitch.

## **SHAPE TOP**

When work measures 38 (39: 40: 40: 41)cm or 15 ( $15^{1/4}$ :  $15^{3/4}$ :  $15^{3/4}$ : 16)in for 96 (98: 100: 100: 104) rows total cast off 2 (2: 3: 3: 3)sts at beg of next two rows.

Then dec 2sts in from edge as follows: To decrease 1st, 2sts in from edge: P2, p2tog, work to last 4sts, p2tog, P2.

**XS:** \*1st at each edge of every RS row three times, then 1st at each edge of foll fourth row\* rep from \*to\* twice, then 1st at each edge of every RS row three times.

**S:** \*1st at each edge of every RS row 4 times, then 1st at each edge of foll fourth row\* rep from \*to\* once, then 1st at each edge of every RS row seven times.

M: \*1st at each edge of every RS row three times, then 1st at each edge of foll fourth row\* rep from \*to\* twice, then 1st at each edge of every RS row six times.

L: \*1st at each edge of every RS row four times, then 1st at each edge of foll fourth row\* rep from \*to\* once, then 1st at each edge of every RS row 11 times.

**XL:** 1st at each edge of every RS row 24 times.

## **NECK**

When work measures 40 (41: 42: 42: 43)cm or 15<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> (16: 16<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>: 16<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>: 17)in for 102 (104: 106: 106: 110 rows, total cast off the central stitch and cont on each side separately casting off at the neck edge on every alt row as follows:

XS: 14sts once.

S: 15sts once.

M: 17sts once.

L: 18sts once.

XL: 19sts once.

After the final raglan dec work one row on the rem 4 (4: 3: 3: 3)sts then fasten off.

## **FRONT**

Start as for the back and work raglan at same height as for the back.

## **NECK**

When work measures 48 (50: 52: 54: 56)cm or 19 (19½: 20½: 21½: 22)in for 122 (126: 132: 136: 142) rows, total cast off the central 15 (17: 19: 21: 23)sts then cont each side separately. Cast off at the neck edge on every alt row as follows: 3sts once, 2sts twice, 1st once. After the final raglan dec work one row on the rem 3sts then cast off.

## **SLEEVES**

Using a double strand of yarn **cast on** 39 (41: 43: 45: 47)sts. Work in moss stitch for 6cm or  $2^{1}/4$ in) (16 rows).

Cont in reverse stocking stitch for 16 (14: 12: 10: 8) rows, then inc 1st at each edge of next RS row 2sts in from edge then as follows:

**XS:** On every foll sixteenth row four times.

**S:** On every foll fourteenth row five times.

**M:** On every foll twelfth row twice, then on every foll tenth row five times.

**L:** On every foll tenth row six times, then on every foll eighth row twice.

**XL:** On every foll eighth row eight times, then on every foll sixth row three times.

Then cont on the 49 (53: 59: 63: 71)sts obtained.

## **RAGLAN**

When work measures 45cm or 17<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>in (114 rows) total cast off 2sts at beg of next two rows, work 2 (2: 0: 0: 0) rows straight then dec 1st at each edge of next RS row (2sts in from edge), then as follows:

**XS:** \*1st at each edge of next RS row, 1st at each edge of foll fourth row\* rep from \*to\* twice, then 1st at each edge of next RS row, then 1st at each edge of every foll fourth row three times, then work three rows on rem 23sts. Cast off all sts. **S:** \*1st at each edge of next RS row, 1st at each edge of foll fourth row\* rep from \*to\* three times, then 1st at each edge of next RS row, then 1st at each edge of every foll fourth row three times, then work three rows on the remaining 23 stitches then cast off all stitches.



M: \*1st at each edge of next two RS rows, 1st at each edge of foll fourth row\* rep from \*to\* four times, then 1st at each edge of next RS row, then work three rows on the remaining 23 stitches then cast off all stitches.

L: \*1st at each edge of next two RS rows, 1st at each edge of foll fourth row\* rep from \*to\* five times, then work three rows on the remaining 23 stitches then cast off all stitches.

**XL:** \*1st at each edge of next two RS rows, 1st at each edge of foll fourth row\* rep from \*to\* twice, then 1st at each edge of every RS row 13 times, then work one row on the rem 23sts then cast off all stitches.

# **NECK BORDER**

Using a double strand of yarn **cast on** 147 (153: 159: 171: 177)sts. Work in moss st for 2cm or <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>in [five rows] then leave on a spare needle.

# **MAKING UP**

Join raglan seams.

Graft the neck border around neck edge starting and ending at the centre of the back then sew the edge seams of the border to form a point. Sew side and sleeve seams.

Cut two ribbons to the width required on the back (see diagram) and sew into position. \*

#### **YARN**

1 x 50g ball of Debbie Bliss Cotton DK in Apple (shade 69)

#### **NEEDLES**

4mm (UK size 8) knitting needles Cable needle

#### **OTHER**

Darning needle Plant pot, 30cm or 12in wide at the bottom and 12cm or 4in high

#### **TENSION**

**Yarn used knits as DK –** 20sts and 28 rows to 10cm or 4in over stocking stitch on 4mm (UK size 8) needles

#### **FINISHED SIZES**

To fit plant pot 30cm or 12in wide around base and 12cm or 43/4in high

# **POT COSY**

Using 4mm needles, cast on 60sts.

Row 1 (RS): (K4, P2) to the end.

Row 2 (WS): (K2, P4) to the end.

**Row 3:** (K4, P2, C4F, P2) to the end.

Row 4: Repeat row 2.

**Row 5:** Repeat row 1.

Row 6: Repeat row 2.

Rows 7-10: Repeat rows 3-6. Rows 11-12: Repeat rows 3-4.

Row 13: (K4, M1P, P2, K4, P2) to end. 65sts.

**Row 14:** (K2, P4, K3, P4) to the end.

**Row 15:** (K4, P3, C4F, P2) to the end.

Row 16: Repeat row 14.

**Row 17:** (K4, P3, K4, P2) to the end.

Row 18: Repeat row 14.

Rows 19-20: Repeat rows 15-16.

**Row 21:** (K4, P3, K4, M1P, P2) to end. 70sts.

**Row 22:** (K3, P4) to the end.

Row 23: (K4, P3, C4F, P3) to the end.

Row 24: Repeat row 22.

**Row 25:** (K4, P3) to the end.

Row 26: Repeat row 22.

Row 27: Repeat row 23.

Row 28: Repeat row 22.

Row 29: Repeat row 25.

Rows 30-39: Knit. Cast off knitwise.

# **MAKING UP**

Using mattress stitch, sew up the back seam. Tie off your thread and trim all loose yarn ends. Slide the cosy up your plant pot making sure that the garter stitch border folds over the top lip of the pot, to help keep it in place. \*

Freshen up your child's bedroom with Libby Summers' bunting, knitted in pretty candy shades



#### **YARN**

2 x 50g balls of Debbie Bliss Cotton DK in Peach (shade 65), A

\$\left(\) 1 x 50g ball of Rowan Handknit Cotton in Bleached (shade 263), B and Celery (shade 309), C

#### **NEEDLES**

4mm (UK size 8) knitting needles

#### **TENSION**

**Yarn used knits as DK –** 19sts and 28 rows to 10cm or 4in over the pattern using 4mm (UK size 8) knitting needles

#### **FINISHED SIZES**

Height of triangles: 10cm or 4in

# YARN DETAIL

Rowan Handknit Cotton www.knitrowan.com

Content 100% cotton
Weight/length 50g/85m
Wash Machine wash 40°C
RRP £4.50



**Note:** The triangles are knitted upside down. When sewing up, make sure you turn them the other way up, so the cast-on edge is at the top.

### **PLAIN TRIANGLES**

Make two in Bleached, four in Peach and four in Celery.

**Cast on** 28sts using 4mm needles and your chosen colour.

Row 1 (WS): Purl.

**Row 2:** P1, skpo, knit to the last 3sts, K1, (move the stitch onto the left needle, and pass the penultimate stitch over this knitted stitch, move the stitch back onto the right needle), P1. 26sts. Repeat the last two rows until 4sts remain, finishing with a right side row.

**Next row:** Purl.

Next row: P1, skpo, P1.

Next row: P3tog.

Fasten off.

# STRIPED TRIANGLES

Make four triangles in your choice of colour combinations. Following exactly the same shaping as for the plain triangles, create the striped triangles by working three rows in a main colour, followed by two in the second colour, or one in a secondary colour and one in the third colour. Repeat the pattern until your triangle is complete. You could also create a polka dot effect by stitch on dots using a darning needle and duplicate stitch.





#### **YARN**

1 x 100g ball of Patons Cotton DK in Denim (shade 2697)

#### **NEEDLES**

3.25mm (UK size 10) knitting needles

#### **OTHER**

1m of 7mm ribbon Sewing thread and needle Darning needle

#### **TENSION**

Yarn used knits as DK – 22sts and 30 rows to 10cm or 4in on 4mm (UK size 8) knitting needles

#### **FINISHED SIZES**

Adjustable

#### YARN DETAIL

Patons Cotton DK www.makeitcoats.com

Content 100% cotton
Weight/length 100g/210m
Wash Machine wash 40°C
RRP £4.89



## **COLLAR**

Using 3.25mm needles, cast on 15sts.

Moss stitch border

**Set up row:** (K1, P1) to the last stitch, K1.

Repeat the last row 3 more times.

Now work in pattern as follows:

**Row 1:** K5, (yrn, p2tog) twice, K1tbl, K1, K1tbl, yrn, K3. 16sts.

**Row 2:** K3, P1, P1tbl, P1, P1tbl, P2, (yrn, p2tog) twice, K3.

**Row 3:** K5, (yrn, p2tog) twice, K1tbl, K1, K1tbl, yrn, K4. 17sts.

**Row 4:** K4, P1, P1tbl, P1, P1tbl, P2, (yrn, p2tog) twice, K3.

**Row 5:** K5, (yrn, p2tog) twice, K1tbl, K1, K1tbl, yrn, K5. 18sts.

**Row 6:** K5, P1, P1tbl, P1, P1tbl, P2, (yrn, p2tog) twice, K3.

**Row 7:** K5, (yrn, p2tog) twice, K1tbl, K1, K1tbl, yrn, K6. 19sts.

**Row 8:** Cast off 4sts, K1, P1, P1tbl, P1, P1tbl, P2, (yrn, p2tog) twice, K3. 15sts.

Repeat rows 1-8 until your collar is the length you require (finishing on a row 8).

#### Moss stitch border

**Rows 1-3:** (K1, P1) to the last stitch, K1. Cast off in moss stitch pattern. Weave yarn ends into work and trim.

# **MAKING UP**

Cut the length of ribbon in half. Fold under 1cm on each piece and stitch to the inside of the top border edge. Tie the collar and trim excess ribbon to the length required. \*\*

# Felted Stripes

Give felting a go with this sweet little pom-pom bag – a perfect choice for girly girls



#### **YARN**

1 x 50g ball of Rowan Felted Tweed DK in the following shades:

- Bilberry (shade 151), A
- Gilt (shade 160), B
- Clay (shade 177), C
- Rage (shade 150), D
- Avocado (shade 161), E
- Watery (shade 152), F

#### **NEEDLES**

4mm (UK size 8) knitting needles

#### **OTHER**

Lining fabric to fit the finished size of your bag when washed

#### **TENSION**

Before washing: Yarn used knits as DK – 24sts and 32 rows to 10cm or 4in over st st using 4mm (UK size 8) knitting needles

#### **FINISHED SIZES**

**After washing:** 35x28cm or 13<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>x11in – but please note that this can change depending on your washing machine and the temperature at which you wash the bag

Content 50% merino, 25% alpaca,

#### **FRONT**

Using 4mm (UK size 8) knitting needles and colour A, **cast on** 100sts.

Beg with a knit row, work two rows in st st. Change to B and work two rows in st st. Change to C and work two rows in st st. Change to D and work two rows in st st. Change to E and work two rows in st st. Change to F and work two rows in st st. Now work from chart, rows 1-30.

Change to F and work two rows in st st.

Now work from chart, rows 1-30.

Change to B and work two rows in st st.

Change to F and work two rows in st st.

Change to C and work two rows in st st.

Change to A and work two rows in st st.

Change to E and work two rows in st st.

Change to colour D and work two rows in st st.

These 12 rows form the repeat stripe pattern.

Cont in stripe and at the same time, work every RS row as follows:

**Next row (RS):** K3, sl1, K1, psso, K to last 5sts, k2tog, K3.

Next row (WS): Purl.

Cont dec 2sts every RS row until you have 60sts on the needle, ending with a WS row.

**Next row:** \*K2, P2; rep from \* to end. **Next row:** \*K2, P2; rep from \* to end.

These rows form the rib.

Cont in rib until work measures 7cm or 23/4in.

Cast off.


# **BACK**

Work as for front.

# **MAKING UP**

Sew in all loose ends. Placing WS together, sew across the bottom and up both side seams to the start of the shaping. Put the bag into the washing machine on a hot wash. When washed, pull the bag into shape with your hands and dry flat. Once the bag is completely dry, cut the lining fabric to the shape of the bag and line the bag. To attach the handles, fold the rib fabric at the top over each handle, from back to front, and sew down. Make three small pompoms by winding yarn around two cardboard rings sandwiched together. When the rings are full, cut the yarn all the way around the edges and thread a length of yarn through the cardboard. Tie tightly around all the strands of yarn. Remove cardboard to create the pompom. Tie to the front of the bag to finish. \*

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
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
