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

Tension

21 sts and 35 rows to 10 cm or 4 in over rib pattern using 3.75mm (UK 9, US 5) knitting needles, measured after light blocking 20 sts and 26 rows to 10 cm or 4 in over lace pattern using 3.75 mm (UK 9, US 5) knitting needles, measured after light blocking

PATTERN NOTES

The top is worked flat from the bottom up with some side and shoulder shaping. The neck and armhole edgings are worked in the round after the side and shoulder seams have been completed.

SHAPING IN LACE

When increasing and decreasing in the lace pattern it is important to keep an eye on your stitch counts to make sure that each decrease is paired up with an increase to balance those stitch counts. The lace pattern here is worked in multiples of four stitches, with an k2tog or an ssk worked either before or after a yo. The repeat reads k2tog, yo twice, ssk; it can be broken down into (k2tog, yo) and then (yo, ssk), for ease of seeing whether the decreases and increases in the repeat are paired up. If, when working an increase or a decrease section, you have an incomplete pair of decrease/increase, the stitches in that partial repeat should instead be worked in stocking stitch.

STITCH PATTERNS

Rib (multiple of 2 sts, worked flat)
Row 1 (RS): *K1, P1; rep from * to end.
Row 2 (WS): Knit.
Rep rows 1-2 for pattern.

Worked in the round:

Round 1: *K1, P1; rep from * to end. Round 2: Purl. Rep rounds 1-2 for pattern.

Lace pattern (multiple of 4 sts)

When purling across the WS row's double yarn over, purl into the first yarn over as usual, then purl into the back of the second yarn over.

Row 1 (RS): *K2tog, yo twice, ssk; rep from *to end

Row 2 (WS): Purl.

Row 3: *Yo, ssk, k2tog, yo; repeat from * to end of row.

Row 4: Purl

Rep rows 1-4 for pattern.

PATTERN

Front and Back are worked alike to start of sleeve/ neck shaping.

BODY RIBBED HEM

Cast on 98 (106:114:122:134:142) sts. **Set up rib:** Knit one edge st, work in rib pattern to last st, K1 edge st.

Next row: Purl one edge st, work in rib pattern to last st, Purl one edge st.

Work in pattern as set by the previous two

rows until rib measures 10 cm or 4 in from cast on edge ending with a right side row. Next row (WS): Knit and decrease 8 (8:8:8: 12:12) sts distributing them evenly. 90 (98:106:114:122:130) sts.

SET UP BODY PATTERN

Row 1 (RS): Knit one edge st, work in lace pattern to last st, knit one edge st. Row 2 (WS): Purl one edge st, work in lace pattern to last st, purl one edge st. Continue as set by the previous two rows until piece measures 25 cm or 10 in from cast on edge.

SHAPE BODY

Inc row (RS): Knit one edge st, M1, work in lace pattern to last st, M1, knit one edge st. 2 sts increased.

Work seven rows in pattern.

Rep last eight rows twice more. 96 (104:112: 120:128:136) sts.

Work Inc row every RS row three times. 102 (110:118:126:134:142) sts.

Work one WS row.

Next row (RS): K1 edge st, work in lace pattern to end, cast on two sts. 104 (112: 120:128:136:144) sts.

Next row (WS): P1 edge st, work in lace pattern to end, cast on two sts. 106 (114: 122:130:138:146) sts.

BACK SLEEVE AND NECK SHAPING

Work even until sleeve measures 18 (18.5: 19.5:**20.5**:21.5:**23**) cm or 7 (**71/**4:73/4:**8**:81/2:**9**) in or ending with a WS row.

SHAPE RIGHT BACK SHOULDER & NECK

Row 1 (RS): Cast off 11 (12:13:14:15:16) sts: work in patt across the following 28 (30:32: 34:36:38) sts.

Place rem sts on holder for centre neck and left back shoulder.

Row 2 (WS): Cast off 3 sts, work in pattern to end.

Row 3: Cast off 11 (12:13:14:15:16) sts: work in patt to end


Row 4: Cast off 3 sts, work in patt to end. **Row 5:** Cast off remaining 11 (12:13:14:15: 16) sts.

Cut yarn leaving a long tail.

SHAPE LEFT BACK SHOULDER & NECK

With RS facing: slip the following 28 (30:32: 34:36:38) centre sts onto holder for back neck and join yarn to the remaining sts. Row 1 (RS): Cast off 3 sts, work in pattern to end.

Row 2 (WS): Cast off 11 (12:13:14:15:16) sts; work in patt to the end.



Rep last two rows once more. Work one right side row.

Next row (WS): Cast off rem 11 (12:13:14: 15:16) sts. Cut yarn leaving a long tail.

FRONT SLEEVE AND NECK **SHAPING**

Work even until sleeve measures 8.5 (9:9.5:10:11: 11.5) cm or 31/4 (**31/2**:33/4: **4**: 41/4:41/2) in ending with a WS row.

LEFT FRONT NECK **SHAPING**

Row 1 (RS): Work in patt across the foll 43 (46:49:52: 55:58) sts, place rem sts on holder.

Row 2 (WS): Cast off 4 sts, work in patt to end. 39 (42:45:48:51:54) sts.

Row 3: Work in patt.

Row 4: Cast off 2 sts, work in patt. 37 (40: 43: 46:49:52) sts.

Rows 5-6: Repeat rows 3-4. 35 (38:41:44: 47:50) sts.

Row 7: Work in patt to last 3 sts, k2tog, K1. 34 (37:40:43:46:49) sts.

Row 8: Work in patt.

Rows 9-10: Rep rows 7-8. 33 (36:39: 42:45:46) sts.

> Work even across rem sts until left front sleeve meas same as back ending with a WS row.

LEFT FRONT

SHOULDER SHAPING Nex row (RS): Cast off 11 (12:13:14:15:16) sts: work

in patt to end.

Work one WS row in pattern. Rep last two rows twice more.

Cut yarn leaving long tail.

RIGHT FRONT NECK SHAPING

With RS facing, slip the following 20 (22: 24:26:28:30) centre sts onto a holder for





centre neck. Place rem sts onto a left hand needle and join yarn to the rem 43 (46:49:

52:55:58) sts.

Row 1 (RS): Cast off 4 sts. Work in patt to end. 39 (42:45:48:51:54) sts.

Row 2 (WS): Work in patt.

Row 3: Cast off 2 sts. Work in patt to end.

37 (40:43:46:49:52) sts. Row 4: Work in patt.

Rows 5-6: Rep rows 3-4. 35 (38:41:44:47:

50) sts.

Row 7: K1, ssk, work in patt to end. 34 (37:

40:43:46: 49) sts. Row 8: Work in patt.

Rows 9-10: Rep rows 7-8. 33 (**36**:39:**42**:45:

48) sts.

Work even until right front sleeve meas same as back ending with a right side row.

RIGHT FRONT SHOULDER SHAPING

Next row (WS): Cast off 11 (12:13:14:15:

16) sts, work in patt to end.

Work one RS row in patt.

Rep last two rows twice more.

Cut yarn leaving a long tail.

MAKING UP

Join side seams and shoulder seams.

ARMHOLE EDGING

With RS facing and using double-pointed needles or shorter circular needle, starting at the centre of underarm, pick up and knit 3 sts for every four rows around the armhole to the centre of underarm. Place marker to denote beg of round.

Work rib pattern in the round until armhole edging meas 2.5 cm or 1in.

Cast off in patt.

NECKLINE EDGING

With RS facing and using double-pointed needles or shorter circular needle, starting at the right shoulder, pick up and knit 1 st into each cast off st along back neck, knit across centre back sts on holder, then pick up and knit one stitch into each cast off st to left shoulder seam. Pick up and knit three stitches for every four rows and one stitch into every cast off st along front neck, knit across centre sts on holder, pick up and knit one st into every cast off st and three stitches for every four rows along front neck. Place marker to denote beginning of round.

Work rib pattern in the round until it measures 2.5 cm or 1 in. Cast off all sts in patt loosely. Weave in ends and block following the ball band instructions. 🧔

How did you get into knitwear design?

A few years ago a friend introduced me to Loraine McClean of Knit Design Online and after enrolling on her excellent course, I completed the City and in Hand Knitting and

Design. I enjoyed the course so much that I then went on to complete the C&G Diploma too. The courses helped me to develop my own design style and to gain the practical knowledge to be able to write my own knitting patterns.

What's the inspiration behind your designs?

My designs are inspired by diverse sources such as the natural world, architecture and, most recently, armour. I also find lots of my design inspiration in museums such as the Victoria and Albert Museum and the British Museum. A small item in a gallery can spark off ideas for a whole new line of design development.

What do you get up to when you're not knitting?

Last November I was part of an exhibition called Moths and More which included my work from the Knitted Textile Awards and my paper sculptures. I begin each sculpture by creating a photo montage of my subject, for example, views of London. The next step is to carefully cut away sections of the paper using a scalpel knife. When I have cut several layers, I put them together and light them from inside or above, to cast shadows that give a whole new dimension to the scene.

What is your advice for young knitwear designers?

My advice is to carry a notebook to record your thoughts and ideas wherever you go and to look all around you for design inspiration. Sometimes the best ideas for designs come from the most unlikely places, such as looking down to check out the floor tiles!



Stripes are everywhere

you look this summer, and no wonder – not only are narrow, horizontal bands flattering for all shapes, they also come back into fashion year after year. This colourful knit will never date – we'd be surprised if it spends much time in your wardrobe at all!

Materials

Yarn

7 (8:9:10:11) x 50g balls of Rowan Cotton Glacé in A Greengage (shade 864), 1 (2:2:2:2) x 50g balls of Rowan Cotton Glacé in B Ivy (shade 812),

1 (1:1:1:1) x 50g balls of Rowan Cotton Glacé in C Lavender (shade 860), 1 (1:1:1:2) x 50g of balls of Rowan Cotton Glacé in D Baked Red (shade 837), 1 (1:1:1:1) x 50g balls of E Rowan Cotton Glacé in Ecru (shade 725), F Blackcurrant (shade 862), G Rose (shade 861), and H Ochre (shade 833).

Rows 24 to 26: Using yarn G. Rows 27 and 28: Using yarn E.

Row 29: Using yarn A.

Rows 30 to 32: Using yarn D.

Row 33: Using yarn F.

Rows 34 and 35: Using yarn A.

Row 36: Using yarn H. Row 37: Using yarn D.

Rows 38 and 39: Using yarn C.

Row 40: Using yarn D. Row 41: Using yarn H.

Rows 42 and 43: Using yarn A.

Row 44: Using yarn F.

Rows 45 to 47: Using yarn D.

Row 48: Using yarn A.

Rows 49 and 50: Using yarn E.

Rows 51 to 53: Using yarn G.

Row 54: Using yarn H.

Rows 55 and 56: Using yarn G. Rows 57 and 58: Using yarn A.

Rows 59 and 60: Using yarn F. Row 61: Using yarn E.

Row 62: Using yarn E.

Rows 63 to 65: Using yarn D.

Rows 66 and 67: Using yarn C. Rows 68 and 69: Using yarn B.

These 69 rows are worked once only.

Rows 70 to 73: Using yarn A. Row 74: Using yarn B.

These five rows are then repeated throughout.

BACK

Using 2.75mm needles and yarn A, cast on 117 (**129**:145:**159**:177) sts.

Row 1 (RS): *K1, P1; rep from * to last st,

Row 2: *P1, K1; rep from * to last st, P1. These two rows form rib.

Work in rib for a further 18 rows, dec 1 st at end of last row and ending with RS facing for next row. 116 (128:144:158:176) sts.

Change to 3mm needles.

Beg with a K row, work in st st in stripe sequence working rows 1 to 69 once only then rep rows 70 to 74 throughout (see above) as follows:



Dec 1 st at each end of 5th (9th:11th:13th:17th) row, then on three (three: three: six: six) foll fourth rows, then on foll four (four: four: one: one) alt rows. 100 (112:128:142:160) sts. Work seven (seven:seven:five:five) rows more, ending with RS facing for next row. Inc 1 st at each end of next and four foll 10th rows. 110 (122:138:152:170) sts.

Cont straight until back meas 33 (34:35:36:37) cm or 13 (131/2:133/4:141/4:143/4) in, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE ARMHOLES

Keeping stripes correct, cast off 7 (8:9:10:11) sts at beg of next two rows. 96 (106:120:132:148) sts.

Dec 1 st at each end of next three

(five:seven:nine:eleven) rows, then on foll five (five:seven:seven:nine) alt rows.

80 (86:92:100:108) sts. Cont straight until armhole meas 19 (20:21:22:23) cm or 71/2 (8:81/4:83/4:9) in or ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE BACK NECK

Next row (RS): K21 (24:26:30:33) sts and turn, leaving rem sts on a holder. Work each side of neck separately.

Dec 1 st at neck edge of next three rows, ending with RS facing for next row. 18 (21:23:27:30) sts.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Cast off 8 (10:11:13:14) sts at beg and dec 1 st at end of next row. Work one row. Cast off rem 9 (10:11:13:15) sts. With RS facing, rejoin appropriate yarn to rem sts, cast off centre 38 (38:40:40:42) sts, and K to end. Complete to match first side, reversing shapings.

LEFT FRONT

Using 2.75mm needles and yarn A, cast on 63 (69:77:83:93) sts.

Work 20 rows in rib, dec 1 (1:1:0:1) st at end of last row and ending with RS facing for next row. 62 (68:76:83:92) sts.

Change to 3mm needles.

Beg with a Krow, work in st st in stripe sequence working rows 1 to 69 once only then rep rows 70 to 74 throughout as folls:

Next row (RS): K to last 8 sts and turn, leaving rem 8 sts on a holder. 54 (60:68:75:84) sts.

Decrease 1 st at beg of 4th

(8th:10th:12th:16th) row, then on three (three:three:six:six) foll fourth rows, then on following four (four:four:one:one) alt rows. 46 (52:60:67:76) stitches.

Work seven (seven:seven:five:five) rows more, ending with RS facing for next row. Inc 1 st at beg of next and four foll 10th rows. 51 (57:65:72:81) sts.

Cont straight until left front matches back to beg of armhole shaping, ending with same patt row and with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE ARMHOLE

Next row (RS): Keeping stripes correct, cast off 7 (8:9:10:11) sts, K to end. 44 (49:56:62:

Work one row, ending with RS facing for

Dec 1 st at armhole edge of next three (five: seven:nine:eleven) rows, then on foll five (five:seven:seven) alternate rows.

36 (39:42:46:52) sts.

Work six (eight:two:four:zero) rows, ending with WS facing for the next row.

SHAPE NECK

Next row (WS): Cast off 6 sts, P to end. 30 (33:36:40:46) sts. Dec 0 (0:0:0:1) st at beg

of - (-:-:next) row, then on foll zero

(**zero**:zero:zero:one) - (-:-:-:alt)

row, at the same time dec 1 st at neck edge of next three (three:five:five) rows, then on foll four (four:two:two:three) alt

rows, then on three (**three**:three:two) foll fourth rows, then on three (**three**:four:four:five) foll sixth rows.

17 (**20**:22:**26**:29) sts.

Cont straight until left front matches back to beg of shoulder shaping, ending with same patt row and with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Next row (RS): Cast off 8 (**10**:11:**13**:14) sts, K to end.

Work one row, ending with RS facing for next row. Cast off rem 9 (10:11:13:15) sts.

RIGHT FRONT

Using 2.75mm needles and yarn A, cast on 63 (**69**:77:**83**:93) sts.

Work eight rows in rib, ending with RS facing for next row.

Next row (RS): Rib 3, rib2tog, yfwd (to make a buttonhole), rib to end.

Work 11 rows more in rib, dec 1 (1:1:0:1) st at beg of last row and ending with RS facing for next row. 62 (68:76:83:92) sts.

Change to 3mm needles.

Beg with a K row, work in st st in stripe sequence working rows 1 to 69 once only then rep rows 70 to 74 throughout as folls:

Next row (RS): Rib 8 sts and leave these sts on a holder, K to end. 54 (60:68:75:84) sts.

Dec 1 st at end of 4th (8th:10th:12th:16th) row, then on three (three:three:six:six) foll fourth rows, then on foll four (four:four:one:one) alt rows. 46 (52:60:67:76) sts. Work seven (seven: seven: five: five) rows more, ending with RS facing for next row. Inc 1 st at end of next and four foll 10th rows. 51 (57:65:72:81) sts. Complete to match left front, reversing shapings.

SLEEVES


Using 2.75mm (needles and yarn A, cast on 59 (**61**:63:**63**:67) sts.

Work 10 rows in rib as given for back, dec 1 st at end of last row and ending with RS facing for next row. 58 (60:62:62:66) sts.

Change to 3mm needles.

Beg with a K row and working in stripe sequence working rows 1 to 69 once only then rep rows 70 to 74 throughout (see above), cont in st st shaping sides by inc 1 st at each end of fifth and every foll 12th (tenth:tenth:eighth:eighth) row to 74 (78:88: 82:96) sts, then on every foll 14th (12th:12th:10th:10th) row until there are 80 (86:90:94:100) sts.

Cont straight until sleeve meas approx 45 (46:47:47:47) cm or 17¾ (18:18½:18½:18½) in, ending with same stripe row of five row rep as back and fronts at armhole shaping,



and with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE TOP

Keeping stripes correct, cast off 7 (8:9:10:11) sts at beginning of next two rows. 66 (70:72:74:78) sts.

Dec 1 st at each end of next three rows, then on foll alt row, then on seven foll fourth rows, then foll four (four:five:six:six) alt rows, then on every row until 22 sts rem.

Cast off 5 sts at beg of next two rows. Cast off rem 12 sts.

MAKING UP

Block out each piece of knitting and press garment pieces, omitting ribs. Join shoulder seams using back stitch, or mattress stitch if preferred. Darn in ends along a colour join.

NECKBAND


Beg and ending at front opening edges, with RS facing and using 2.75mm needles and yarn A, pick up and knit 46 (46:49:49:52) sts up right side of front neck, 5 sts down right side of back neck, 37 (37:39:39:41) sts from back, 5 sts up left side of back neck, and 46 (46:49:49:52) sts down left side of front neck.139 (139:147:147:155) sts. Beg with row 2 of rib as given for back, work eight rows in rib. Cast off in rib on WS.

BUTTON BAND


Slip 8 sts from holder on left front onto 2.75mm needles and rejoin yarn A with RS facing. Cont in rib as set until button band, when slightly stretched, fits up left front opening edge to cast-off edge of neckband, ending with WS facing for next row. Cast off in rib on WS. Slip stitch button band in place. Mark positions for rem five buttons, the last to be 1 cm or ½ in below cast-off edge of neckband and the rem four spaced evenly between.

BUTTONHOLE BAND

Slip 8 sts from holder on right front onto 2.75mm needles and rejoin yarn A with WS facing. Work as given for button band until buttonhole band, when slightly stretched, fits up right front opening edge to cast-off edge of neckband, ending with WS facing for next row and with the addition of 5 rem buttonholes worked as before to correspond with positions marked. When band is complete, cast off in rib on WS. Slip stitch buttonhole band in place. Place centre of cast off edge of sleeve to shoulder seam. Set in sleeve. Join side and sleeve seams. Sew on buttons to correspond with buttonholes. 🧐

Pattern notes

Moss stitch: Over an even number of stitches;

Row 1: *K1, P1; rep from * to end.

Row 2: *P1, K1; rep from * to end.

Over an odd number of stitches;

Every row: *K1, P1; rep from * to last st, K1

Adding repeats: You can easily adapt the pattern to be as large as you like by adding extra repeats of the six-row stripe pattern but you will need more yarn. Buy all your yarn in one batch to keep the dye lots consistent.

BLANKET

Using A and 4.5mm needles, cast on 108 (**122**:136) sts.

Work 14 rows in moss st.

Next row (WS): Work moss st over 11 sts then slip these sts onto a stitch holder for right hand side border, then continue in moss stitch to last 11 sts and slip these sts onto a second stitch holder for left hand side of border.

Turn, rejoin yarn to beg of RS row and continue working on the central 86 (**100**:114) sts for main panel as follows:

MAIN PANEL

Row 1 (RS): Using A, K1, kfb, K4, *skpo, k2tog, K4, kfb in each of next 2 sts, K4; rep from * to last 10 sts, skpo, k2tog, K4, kfb, K1.

Row 2 (WS): Purl.

Rows 3-6: Rep rows 1 and 2 twice more. Break A leaving a tail for weaving in. Change to B and rep rows 1-6. Break B leaving a tail for weaving in. Change to C and rep rows 1-6. Break C leaving a tail for weaving in. Change to D and rep rows 1-6. Break D leaving a tail for weaving in. Continue in six-row stripe sequence as set, until the piece measures 51 (61:71) cm or 20 (24:28) in from the cast on edge, ending after completing a six-row stripe. Leave the main panel sts on a spare 4.5mm needle or scrap yarn and then cont as folls:

BORDER

Slip left-hand border sts back to your working needle, rejoin A and work in moss stitch until strip, when slightly stretched, reaches the top of the main panel. Slip these sts back onto the holder, break yarn leaving a tail for weaving in, and complete right-hand border in the same way, but do not break yarn and continue in moss stitch across main panel sts and left-hand border. Work 14 rows in moss stitch. Cast off loosely.

MAKING UP

Pin side borders in place and join seams. Weave in ends and block to measurements. See ball band for washing and further care instructions.

The back should measure approximately 41 (44:47:50:52:54)cm, or

16 (171/4:181/2:193/4:201/2:211/4)in, across at this

Work 38 (44:44:42:44:48) rows more without shaping.

SHAPE ARMHOLES

Cast off 3 (3:3:4:4:4) sts at beginning of next two rows

You will now have 85 (91:97:101:107:111) sts on the needle.

Work one (one:one:two:two:two) rows decreasing 1 st at each end of every row. You will now have 83 (89:95:97:103:107) sts on the needle.

Work three rows decreasing one stitch at each end of next and every following alternate row.

You will now have 79 (85:91:93:99:103) sts on the needle.

Work on these 79 (85:91:93:99:103) stitches until armholes measure 19 (19:20:21:22:23) cm or 7½ (7½:8:8¼:8¾:9)in, straight down from the top of the needle to the beginning of the armhole shaping (don't measure around the curve) finishing after a purl row.

SHAPE SHOULDERS

Cast off 12 (13:15:15:16:17) sts at beginning of next two rows.

You will now have 55 (59:61:63:67:69) sts on the needle.

Cast off 12 (14:15:15:17:18) sts at beginning of next two rows.

You will now have 31 (31:31:33:33:33) sts on the needle.

Cast off remaining 31 (31:31:33:33) sts.

LEFT FRONT

Using your smaller needles cast on 43 (46:49:52:55:57) sts.

Work two rows in garter stitch.

Change to your main needles and proceed as follows:

Row 1: K20 (23:26:29:32:34), M1, (sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P2) five times, k2tog, K1.

Row 2: P2, (K3, P1) five times, P21 (24:27:30:33:35).

Row 3: K21 (24:27:30:33:35), M1, (sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P2) four times, sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yon, P1, k2tog, K1.

Row 4: P2, K2, (P1, K3) four times, P23 (26:29:32:35:37).

Row 5: K22 (25:28:31:34:36), M1, (sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P2) 4 times, sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, k2tog, K1.

Row 6: P2, K1, (P1, K3) four times, P24 (27:30:33:36:38).

Row 7: K23 (26:29:32:35:37), M1, (sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P2) four times, sl1, knit one stitch, psso, K2.

Row 8: P3, (K3, P1) four times, P24 (27:30:33:36:38).

Row 9: K24 (27:30:33:36:38), M1, (sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P2)

four times, knit two stitches together, K1.

Row 10: P2, (K3, P1) four times, P25 (28:31:34:37:39).

Row 11: K25

(28:31:34:37:39), M1, (sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P2) three times, sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P1, k2tog, K1.

Row 12: P2, K2, (P1, K3) three times, P27 (30:33:36:39:41).

Row 13: K26 (29:32:35:38:40), M1, (sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P2) three times, sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, k2tog, K1.

Row 14: P2, K1, (P1, K3) three times, P28 (31:34:37:40:42)

Row 15: K27 (30:33:36:39:41), M1, (sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P2) three times, sl1, K1, psso, K2.

Row 16: P3, (K3, P1) three times, P28 (31:34:37:40:42).

Row 17: K28 (31:34:37:40:42), M1, (sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P2) three times, k2tog, K1. Row 18: P2, (K3, P1) three times, P29

(32:35:38:41:43).

Row 19: K29 (32:35:38:41:43), M1, (sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P2) twice, sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P1, k2tog, K1.

Row 20: P2, K2, (P1, K3) twice, P31 (34:37:40:43:45).

Row 21: K30 (33:36:39:42:44), M1, (sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P2) twice, sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, k2tog, K1.

Row 22: P2, K1, (P1, K3) twice, P32 (35:38:41:44:46).

Row 23: K31 (34:37:40:43:45), M1, (sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P2) twice, sl1, K1, psso, K2.

Row 24: P3, (K3, P1) twice, P32 (35:38:41:44:46).

Row 25: K32 (35:38:41:44:46), M1, (sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P2) twice, k2tog, K1.

Row 26: P2, (K3, P1) twice, P33 (36:39:42:45:47).

Row 27: K33 (36:39:42:45:47), M1, sl1, K1,

psso, yfwd, yrn, P2, sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P1, k2tog, K1.

Row 28: P2, K2, P1, K3,

P35 (38:41:44:47:49).

Row 29: K34 (37:40:43:46:48), M1, sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P2, sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, k2tog, K1.

Row 30: P2, K1, P1, K3, P36

(39:42:45:48:50)

Row 31: K35 (38:41:44:47:49), M1, sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P2, sl1, K1, psso, K2. Row 32: P3, K3, P37 (40:43:46:49:51).

Row 33: K36 (39:42:45:48:50), M1,

sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P2, k2tog, K1.

Row 34: P2, K3, P38

(41:44:47:50:52). Row 35: K37

(40:43:46:49:51), M1, sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, yrn, P1, k2tog, K1.

Row 36: P2, K2, P39 (**42**:45:**48**:51:**53**).

Row 37: K38

(41:44:47:50:52), M1, sl1,

K1, psso, yfwd, knit two stitches together, K1.

38th Row. P2, K1, P40 (43:46:49:52:54). 39th Row. K39 (42:45:48:51:53), M1, sl1, K1, psso, K2.

40th Row: Purl.

41st Row: Knit to last 3 sts, M1, k2tog, K1. 42nd Row. Purl.

Work two rows more in stocking stitch.

SHAPE NECK

Next row: Knit to last 5 sts, k2tog (neck edge), K3.

You will now have 42 (45:48:51:54:56) sts on the needle.

Work three rows more without shaping.

For first, second, third, fourth and fifth sizes only

Work four rows decreasing 1 st at neck edge as before in 1st row.

You will now have 41 (44:47:50:53) sts on the needle.

For all six sizes

Work 30 (18:6:30:18:12) rows decreasing one stitch at neck edge as before in first and every following sixth (sixth:zero:sixth:sixth:sixth) row. You will now have 36 (41:46:45:50:54) sts on

the needle. Work 0 (18:30:4:18:32) rows decreasing

1 st at neck edge as before in zero (first:first:first:first) and every following zero (eighth:eighth:zero:eighth:eighth) row.

You will now have 36 (38:42:44:47:50) sts on the needle.

SHAPE ARMHOLE

Next row: Cast off 3 (3:3:4:4:4) sts (armhole edge), knit to last 5 (0:0:0:0:5) sts (k2tog, K3) one (zero:zero:zero:one) times. You will now have 32 (35:39:40:43:45) sts on the needle.

Next row: Purl.

Work one (**one**:one:**two**:two:**two**) rows decreasing 1 st at armhole edge in every row, at same time decreasing 1 st at neck edge as before in zero (zero:first:zero:zero) row. You will now have 31 (34:37:38:41:43) sts on the needle. Work three rows decreasing 1 st at armhole edge in next and following alternate row at same time decreasing 1 st at neck edge as before in zero (zero:zero:first:third:zero) row. You will now have 29 (32:35:35:38:41) sts on the needle. Work 35 (33:37:38:40:42) rows decreasing 1 st at neck edge only as before in third (first:fifth:sixth:eighth:second) and every following eighth row. You will now have 24 (27:30:30:33:35) sts on the needle. Work straight until armhole measures 19 (19:20:21:22:23)cm or 7½ (7½:8:8¼:8¾:9) in, finishing after a purl row.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Next row: Cast off 12 (13:15:15:16:17) sts, knit to end. You will now have 12 (14:15:15:17:18) sts on the needle. Next row: Purl.

Cast off remaining 12 (14:15:15:17:18) sts.

RIGHT FRONT

Using your smaller needles cast on 43 (46:49:52:55:57) sts.

Work two rows in garter stitch.

Change to main needles, proceed as folls: Row 1: K1, sl1, K1, psso, (P2, yon, k2tog) five

times, M1, K20 (23:26:29:32:34).

Row 2: P21 (24:27:30:33:35), (P1, K3) five times, P2.

Row 3: K1, sl1, K1, psso, P1, yon, k2tog, (P2, yon, k2tog) four times, M1, K21 (24:27:30:33:35).

Row 4: P23 (26:29:32:35:37), (K3, P1) four times, K2, P2.

Row 5: K1, sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, k2tog, (P2, yon, k2tog) four times, M1, K22 (25:28:31:34:36).

Row 6: P24 (27:30:33:36:38), (K3, P1) four times, K1, P2.

Row 7: K2, k2tog, (P2, yon, k2tog) four times, M1, K23 (26:29:32:35:37).

Row 8: P24 (27:30:33:36:38), (P1, K3) four



times, P3.

Row 9: K1, sl1, K1, psso, (P2, yon, k2tog) four times, M1, K24 (27:30:33:36:38).

Row 10: P25 (28:31:34:37:39), (P1, K3) four times, P2.

Row 11: K1, sl1, K1, psso, P1, yon, k2tog, (P2, yon, k2tog) three times, M1, K25 (28:31:34:37:39)

Row 12: P27 (30:33:36:39:41), (K3, P1) three times, K2, P2.

Row 13: K1, sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, k2tog, (P2, yon, k2tog) three times, M1, K26 (29:32:35:38:40).

Row 14: P28 (31:34:37:40:42), (K3, P1) three times, K1, P2.

Row 15: K2, k2tog, (P2, yon, k2tog) three times, M1, K27 (30:33:36:39:41).

Row 16: P28 (31:34:37:40:42), (P1, K3) three times, P3.

Row 17: K1, sl1, k1, psso, (p2, yon, k2tog) three times, M1, K28 (31:34:37:40:42).

Row 18: P29 (32:35:38:41:43), (P1, K3) three times, P2.

Row 19: K1, sl1, K1, psso, P1, yon, k2tog, (P2, yon, k2tog) twice, M1, K29 (32:35:38:41:43).

Row 20: P31 (34:37:40:43:45), (K3, P1) twice, K2, P2.

Row 21: K1, sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, k2tog, (P2, yon, k2tog) twice, M1, K30 (33:36:39:42:44). Row 22: P32 (35:38:41:44:46), (K3, P1) twice, K1, P2.

Row 23: K2, k2tog, (p2, yon, k2tog) twice, M1, K31 (34:37:40:43:45).

Row 24: P32 (35:38:41:44:46), (P1, K3) twice, P3.

Row 25: K1, sl1, K1, psso, (P2, yon, k2tog) twice, M1, K32 (35:38:41:44:46).

Row 26: P33 (36:39:42:45:47), (P1, K3) twice, P2.

Row 26: K1, sl1, k1, psso, p1, yon, k2tog, P2, yon, k2tog, M1, K33 (36:39:42:45:47).

Row 26: P35 (38:41:44:47:49), K3, P1, K2, P2. Row 26: K1, sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, k2tog, P2,

yon, k2tog, M1, K34 (37:40:43:46:48).

Row 26: P36 (39:42:45:48:50), K3, P1, K1, P2.

Row 26: K2, k2tog, P2, yon, k2tog, M1, K35 (38:41:44:47:49).

Row 26: P37 (40:43:46:49:51), K3, P3.

Row 26: K1, sl1, k1, psso, p2, yon, k2tog, M1, K36 (39:42:45:48:50).

Row 34: P38 (41:44:47:50:52), K3, P2.

Row 26: K1, sl1, K1, psso, P1, yon, k2tog, M1, K37 (40:43:46:49:51).

Row 26: P39 (42:45:48:51:53), K2, P2.

Row 26: K1, sl1, K1, psso, yfwd, k2tog, M1, K38 (41:44:47:50:52).

Row 26: P40 (43:46:49:52:54), K1, P2.

Row 39: K2, k2tog, M1, K39

(42:45:48:51:53).

Row 26: Purl to the end of the row. Row 26: K1, k2tog, M1, knit to end.

Row 42: Purl.

Work two rows more in stocking stitch.

SHAPE NECK

Next row: K3, sl1, K1, psso, knit to end. You will now have 42 (**45**:48:**51**:54:**56**) sts on the people

Work three rows more without shaping.

For 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th sizes only

Work four rows decreasing 1 st at neck edge as before in first row. You will now have 41 (44:47:50:53) sts on the needle.

For all six sizes

Work 30 (18:6:30:18:12) rows decreasing one stitch at neck edge as before in 1st and every following sixth (sixth:zero:sixth:sixth:sixth) row.
You will now have 36 (41:46:45:50:54) sts on the needle.

Work 1 (19:31:5:19:33) rows decreasing 1 st at neck edge as before in 1st and every following eighth (eighth:

eighth:**zero**:eighth:**eighth**) row. You will now have 35 (**38**:42:**44**:47:**49**) sts on

SHAPE ARMHOLE

the needle.

Next row: Cast off 3 (**3**:3:**4**:4:**4**) sts, purl to end. You will now have 32 (**35**:39:**40**:43:**45**) sts on the needle.

Work one (one:one:two:two:two) rows decreasing 1 st at neck edge as before in 0 (0:1st:0:0:0) row at same time decreasing one stitch at the armhole edge in every row. You will now have 31 (34:37:38:41:43) sts on the needle.

Work three rows decreasing 1 st at neck edge as before in zero

(**zero**:zero:**first**:third:**zero**) row at same time decreasing 1 st at armhole edge in next and following alternate row.

You will now have 29 (**32**:35:**35**:38:**41**) sts on the needle.

Work 35 (**33**:37:**38**:40:**42**) rows decreasing 1 st at neck edge only as before in third (**first**: fifth:**sixth**:eighth:**second**) and every following eighth row.

You will now have 24 (27:30:30:33:35) sts on the needle.

Work straight until armhole measures 19 (19:20:21:22:23)cm or 7½ (7½:8:8½:8¾:9) in, finishing after a knit row.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Next row: Cast off 12 (**13**:15:**15**:16:**17**) sts, purl to the end of the row.



You will now have 12 (**14**:15:**15**:17:**18**) sts on the needle.

Next row: Knit.

Cast off rem 12 (14:15:15:17:18) sts.

SLEEVES (BOTH ALIKE)

Using your smaller needles cast on 70 (74:80:80:84:88) sts.

Work two rows in garter stitch.

Change to main needles and work in st st for the remainder of the sleeve as follows: Work until the sleeve measures 3cm or 11/4in, finishing after a P row.

SHAPE SLEEVE TOP

Cast off 3 (3:3:4:4:4) sts at beginning of next two rows.

You will now have 64 (**68**:74:**72**:76:**80**) sts on the needle.

Work four (**four**:two:**six**:six:**two**) rows decreasing 1 st at each end of next and every following alternate row.

You will now have 60 (**64**:72:**66**:70:**78**) sts on the needle.

Work 14 (14:20:16:18:22) rows decreasing 1 st at each end of every row. You will now have 32 (36:32:34:34:34) sts on the needle. Cast off 8 (8:8:9:9:9) sts at beginning of next two rows.

You will now have 16 (**20**:16:16:16) sts on the needle.

Cast off remaining 16 (20:16:16:16) sts.

RIGHT FRONT BORDER

Join shoulder seams. With right side facing you using your smaller needles, pick up and knit 40 (40:40:42:42:42) sts evenly along straight edge, 72 (76:80:80:84:88) sts evenly along neck edge and 15 (15:15:16:16:16) sts evenly to centre back of neck.

You will now have 127

(**131**:135:**138**:142:**146**) sts on the needle. Work one row in garter stitch.

Next row: K4 (**4**:**4**:**3**:3:**3**), cast off 2 sts, (K8 (**8**:**8**:**9**:**9**:**9**), cast off 2 sts) three times, knit to the end

Next row: Knit to last 32 (**32**:32:34:34:34) sts, cast on 2 sts, (K9 (**9**:9:10:10:10), cast on 2 sts) three times, K5 (**5**:5:4:4:4). Work two rows in garter stitch. Cast off knitways.

LEFT FRONT BORDER

With right side facing you using your smaller needles, pick up and knit 15 (15:15:16:16:16) sts evenly from centre back of neck, 72 (76:80:80:84:88) sts evenly along neck edge and 40 (40:40:42:42:42) sts evenly along straight edge.

You will now have 127

(**131**:135:**138**:142:**146**) sts on the needle. Work five rows in garter stitch. Cast off knitways.

MAKING UP

Join side and sleeve seams. Join neckband at centre back of neck. Sew sleeve tops into armholes. Sew on buttons.

Pin out garment to the measurement given and cover with damp cloths until dry.
See the ball band for washing and further care instructions.



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TRADITIONAL LACE MADE SIMUOUS SIMUOUS

Old Shale lace is a timeless stitch pattern which designers love. *Judy Furlong* explains how it works

n enduring favourite among generations of knitters, the Old Shale lace pattern has it all – it's very effective in most yarns from very fine to heavy, it's open to many variations, has a self-forming scalloped lower edge and, best of all, it's very simple to knit. Recently we showcased it in Pat Mechini's beautiful lace edged t-shirt (see issue 99) so we thought it was the perfect time to delve a little deeper.



CLASSIC OLD SHALE PATTERN

Often associated with traditional Shetland lace, Old Shale (shale being the way "shell" is pronounced in Shetland) looks like a clam shell – hence its name – is created by clusters of gentle decreases followed by "yarn over" increases to balance the stitch count and form lacy holes. As is often the case with traditional stitches, it is known by

different names and has several variations, Feather & Fan, another classic stitch pattern, being one of them. Comparing the two patterns gives us a clue as to how this stitch pattern works.

Old Shale lace has a gently curved scallop shape and gentle ridges of Old Shale. Feather & Fan, by contrast, has straight columns of stitches with a central spine – usually created with a purl stitch – with lines representing feathers (see images A and C on p42 for

garter and stocking stitch versions of Feather and Fan stitch).

Both stitch patterns are created by decreasing 6 sts and then increasing 6 sts, but the critical difference is that in Old Shale, the decreases are spread out – k2tog six times – whereas in Feather & Fan all 6 sts are lost in two steps – k4tog tbl followed after a purl st by k4tog. Also, because so many sts are lying on top of each other in Feather & Fan, the slope is much sharper.

INSTRUCTIONS

Classic Old Shale 18 st, four-row repeat pattern (see image B on p42)

The pattern repeat for classic Old Shale is very simple.

Rows 1&2: Knit – creating a ridge on the RS. Row 3: *K2tog three times, (yo, K1) six times, k2tog three times, repeat from *.

Row 4: Purl.

This version is for flat knitting and worked from the bottom up, but can easily be adjusted to work for flat knitting, top down.

Row 1: Knit

Row 2: Purl

Row 3: *K2tog three times, (yo, K1) six times, k2tog three times, repeat from *.

Row 4: Knit, creating a ridge on the RS. In both cases, the ridge comes right beside the decrease/increase row.

Modern Old Shale (see image D on p42)

These days, we seem to have become a bit more obsessed with symmetry, matching left sloping slants (either k2tog tbl or ssk) with right sloping (k2tog) and centralising the "yarn overs". The result is that you are more likely to see the "increase/decrease row of Old Shale as:

Row 3: *K2tog three times (three rightsloping decreases), (yo, K1) five times, yo, (there is now a central K st), k2togtbl, or ssk, (three left-sloping decreases) three times, rep from *.

This then reduces the pattern repeat to 17 sts.
Pat Menchini has created a simple design

to knit using her version of Old Shale to border her tee shirt. It has only two rows, rather than the four rows of classic Old Shale, so you know that on every RS row the clusters of decreases and increases are to be worked and every WS row is purl. Here we take you through her stitch pattern, step by step.


Stretchy cast on


As with all shaped edges, it is essential to allow enough















stretch in the cast on to let the curves form. This is achieved either by casting on fairly loosely-try using a larger needle size - or use one of the many stretchy cast on methods.

- Make a slipknot and place it on needle.
- Insert RH needle into loop as if to knit a st.
- Draw through loop just the same as for knitting the st.
- Place new loop on LH needle. Repeat steps 2-4 until you have the required number of sts.

Pat Menchini's Old Shale variation

The patt is repeated until the last few sts. Here 4 sts are lost as usual but only two new ones are made, the other two were made at the beg of the row. (see image H on p42).

Count up the sts and you will see that you have ended up with the same number of sts you started with - for every decrease, there is a corresponding increase.

- 5 Knit 2 (3:4:5:1:3) sts depending on which size you are knitting. Yfwd (bring yarn forward under the needle).
- Take yarn over to the back again and knit next st.
- Yfwd again.
- Take yarn over to the back again and

k2tog tbl. Repeat step 4.

- K2toq. Repeat step 6. Repeat step 3. (K1, yfwd) three times.
- The finished pattern repeat is shown between the two purple st markers.

Make sure you keep checking your stitch counts

One danger with a repetitive st is that you lose concentration. A sure pointer that an error has crept in is if the repeat stitch pattern doesn't work out. Check the stitch count - unlike some lace stitch patterns, it doesn't vary - you should have the same number of stitches at the end of each row.

Common mistakes

Having said how easy this stitch

is, it is frustrating to find you are making mistakes. Take heart, the most common place involves yarn overs - so check there first.

Too few stitches?

You have probably missed a yarn over. Hold your work up to the light and check the

> number of holes you have in a row. For this version, there should be four then a group of stitches close together where the decreases were made.

If you are missing one, either take the work back to that point or, if it is only one row, work up to the point where the yarn over should have been, and slip the yarn lying between the two sts over your left-hand needle. It will be a little tighter than the yarn over would have been, but usually it evens out.

Use sharp needles Decreases are much

harder work when using blunt needles.

Swatch first! Try out the stitch pattern before starting a garment.

Try lifelines

They'll save your sanity if you need to rip back your work!

Too many stitches?

You have probably put in a yarn over by mistake. You may wish to take your work back to that point but usually, if it was only a row or two back, you can get

away with simply dropping the extra stitch and then letting it run down to the yarn over, where it will simply disappear! You still have









the option of taking your work back if you are not happy with the result.

Variations

Old Shale is open to many variations. Each scallop of Old Shale can be made wider or narrower by altering the number of increases and decreases – just match the increases with the decreases (k2tog & k2tog tbl or ssk).

Vary the distance apart for the ridges

The distance the ridges are apart can be varied if some four-row repeats are worked in st st – working the WS knit row as purl (see image E overleaf for a 12 st version).

An extreme version of this is to work the whole pattern in st st with no ridges, which is particularly effective with space-dyed yarns. Here we rely on the changes in colour to give the subtle appearance of the ridges on a clam shell (see image F overleaf).

Use more than one shade or yarn

Some really pretty effects can be achieved simply by using more than one yarn, changing at each four-row repeat. In this example (see **image G overleaf**) both the shade and yarn quality were alternated - flecked cotton/

polyester blend and cream 100% wool. Just make some test swatches to be sure the tensions are compatible and that the yarns work well together when washed.

Convert to knitting in the round

This variation simply requires you to remember to purl the ridge rounds and knit the others.

Round 1: Knit.

Round 2: Purl - creating a ridge on the RS. Row 3: *K2tog three times, (yo, K1) six times,

k2tog three times, repeat from *.

Row 4: Knit.

All over pattern


Old Shale is used extensively as a border but it is also very effective as an all-over pattern. Be careful to discriminate between the increases and decreases, which are the basis for the pattern stitch and those for shaping. You will almost certainly have to make some adjustment to the last pattern repeat - but if you can do this without introducing too much st st it is often the most effective.


Old Shale is a wonderful stitch pattern to play with, and rightly deserves its exalted place in the long history of hand knitting.



Bright future t-shirt (issue 99) By Pat Menchini

This simple t shirt is perfect for trying out Old Shale lace. Pat Menchini's version of the stitch pattern is explained step-by-step here so, as long as you keep a close eye on your increases and decreases there's little that can go wrong. Old Shale is a very traditional pattern so you'll probably recognise the effect once you start knitting it up. If you're new to lace, we recommend using stitch markers to break up the pattern repeats. If you drop a stitch don't forget you can use a crochet hook to pick it back up again, without having to rip back your work. If you make a drastic error you may need to undo your knitting, so put in a lifeline every couple of row repeats to make life easier should the worst happen!

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





The pattern will work with any DK yarn, which is great news if you find yourself hooked - why not use up spare balls of yarn to make a garland of beautiful blooms?

Materials

Yarn

1 x 50g ball of Tangerine Dream DK yarn, free with issue 100 of Knit Today

+ Hooks

4mm (UK 8, US G/6) crochet hook

Pattern notes

You will have enough yarn to make at least three flowers. Flowers 1 and 2 can be stitched or pinned together to make a larger flower, as shown in the main image opposite - flower 2 sits on top of flower 1.

Tension

Exact tension is not crucial, but if you find your stitches are very tight go up a hook size. If they are very loose go down a hook size.

FLOWER 1

Round 1: Ch5, sl st to close ring.

Round 2: Ch1 (counts as dc), 6dc into ring, sl st to close.

Round 3: Ch1 (counts as dc), (2tr, 1dc) into next dc, (1dc, 2tr, 1dc) into next 6dc, sl st to close. You should have seven mini petals.

Round 4: SI st to top of first petal. (Ch4, sI st to top of next petal) seven times.

Round 5: (6dc into ch sp) seven times. SI st to beg of round.

Round 6: SI st into next dc (3ch, 6dtr into next 6dc, 3ch, sl st into next dc) seven times, sl st to beg of round.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

FLOWER 2

Round 1: Ch5, sl st to close ring.

Round 2: Ch1 (counts as dc) 8dc into ring, sl

Round 3: (Ch 10, sl st to next dc into front loop only) rep to end of round. SI st to close.

Round 4: SI st to back loop of ring formed in round 2 (ch 12, sl st to next dc into back loop only) rep to end of round. SI st to close.

Round 5: Work a dc into each sl st between the back chain loops.

Round 6: Working into the dcs made on round 5, (ch 14, sl st to next dc) rep to end of round.

SI st to close.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

FLOWER 3

Ch106

Turn, miss 2 ch, dc into next 2 ch, 1ch, sl st to chain, ch2, dc into next 2 ch, 1ch, sl st to ch. (Ch3, 2tr into next 2 ch, ch2, sl st to chain)

(Ch4, 2dtr into next 2 ch, ch3, sl st to chain) five times.

(Ch4, 4dtr into next 4 ch, ch3, sl st to chain)

(Ch4, 1dtr into next ch, 4trtr into next 4 ch, 1dtr, ch3, sl st to chain) seven times. Fasten off.

Starting from the other end of the chain (with the smallest petals) roll the finished piece into a rose shape, stitching into a spiral as you go. 💩

PURPLE CUSHION (ARAN YARN)

Cast on 76 sts in yarn A, using 4.5mm needles.

Work garter stitch edging as follows:

Row 1 (WS): Knit.

Row 2: (RS): K5 *k2tog, K2, K into front and back of next 2 sts, K3, sl1, K1, psso; rep from * to last 5 sts, K5.

Rep rows 1 and 2 two more times, then row 1 once more.

Change to 5mm needles and begin main pattern for lower back of cover as follows.

Row 1 (RS): Using yarn B, K5 *k2tog, K2, K into front and back of next 2 sts, K3, sl1, K1, psso; rep from * to last 5 sts, K5.

Row 2: Purl.

Rows 3 and 4: Rep rows 1 and 2.

Row 5: Using yarn C, as row 1.

Rows 6 to 8: Knit.

Continue as set by these eight rows, changing colour every four rows, ie rows 1-4 and rows 5 to 8, in the following order, ending with a row 8:

D, B, A, D, C, A, B, C, D, B, A, D, C, A. Work bottom of cushion colour change, beginning with rows 1-8, then rows 1-4, in the following colour order: B, C, B.

Work front of cushion beginning with a row 5 and using the following colour order: *A, C, D, A, B, D, C, B; rep from * three times, ending with a row 4.

Work top of cushion ridge using rows 5-8 and varn A.

Work upper back, beginning with a row 1 and the following colour order, ending with a row 4:

B, C, D, B, A, D, C, A, B.

Change to 4.5mm needles.

Work garter st edging in yarn C beginning with the garter st edging row 2 as above.

Next row: Knit.

Rep these two rows twice more then row 2 once more.

Cast off.

MAKING UP

Block work according to ball band instructions. Fold cushion at turnover ridges and match up colour bands. Sew sides together, overlapping upper border.

RAINBOW CUSHION (DK YARN)

Cast on 83 sts in yarn A, using 3.25mm needles. Work garter stitch edging as folls:

Row 1 (WS): Knit.

Row 2: (RS): K3 *k2tog, K2, K into front and back of next 2 sts, K3, sl1, K1, psso; rep from * to last 3 sts, K3.

Rep rows 1-2 two more times, then row 1

once more.

Change to 4mm needles

and begin main pattern, always working rows 1 to 4 in yarn F (White) and changing yarns as shown for rows 5-10:

Row 1 (RS): Using yarn F, K3 *k2tog, K2, K into front and back of next 2 sts, K3, sl1, K1, psso; rep from * to last 3sts, K3.

Row 2: Purl.

Rows 3-4: Rep rows 1-2.

Row 5: Using Yarn B, as row 1.

Rows 6-10: Knit.

Continue as set by these 10 rows, changing colours in rows 5-10 in the following order: C, D, E,

Change to 3.25mm needles.

Next row: Knit.

Rep these two rows six more times then row 2 once more.

Cast off.

MAKING UP

Block work. Fold cushion at turnover ridges and match up colour bands. Sew sides together, overlapping upper border.

STITCHES USED

Pattern st, using 4mm needles. Over a number of sts divisible by 3 (+1).

Row 1 (RS): *K2, P1*; rep from *to* ending with K1.

Row 2: P1, *K2, P1*; rep from *to*.

BACK

Cast on 88 (97:106:112) sts & work in patt st. **ARMHOLES**

When work measures 19 (22:25:28)cm or 7½ (8½:9¾:11)in (58 (66:76:84) rows in total) cast off 4 sts at beg of next two rows. Cont on the rem 80 (89:98:104) sts.

SHOULDERS

When work measures 33 (**37**:41:**45**) cm or 13 (**14**½:16:**17**¾) in (100 (**112**:124:**136**) rows) in total) cast off at the beg of every row as foll:

4 yrs: 5 sts twice, 6 sts six times.

6 yrs: 6 sts four times, 7 sts four times.

8 yrs: 7 sts six times, 8 sts twice.

10 yrs: 7 sts twice, 8 sts six times.

Cast off the rem 34 (37:40:42) sts for neck.

LEFT FRONT

Cast on 47 (**51**:56:**59**) sts & work in patt st. Note that you will need to work a partial pattern repeat at the edge of your work.

To obtain a neat edge:

4, 8 & 10 yrs: On the RS, slip the last stitch as if to P,on the next row (WS), P this stitch.

6 yrs: On the RS, slip the last stitch as if to knit it, on the next row (WS), purl this stitch.

ARMHOLES

When work measures 19 (22:25:28)cm or 7½ (8½:9¾:11)in (58 (66:76:84) rows total) cast off 4 sts at beg of next RS row.

SHOULDER

When work measures 33 (37:41:45) cm or 13 (14½:16:17¾) in (100 (112:124:136) rows total cast off at the beg of every RS row as follows:

4 yrs: 5 sts once, 6 sts three times.

6 yrs: 6 sts twice, 7 sts twice.

8 yrs: 7 sts 3 times, 8 sts once.

10 yrs: 7 sts once, 8 sts three times. Cast off the rem 20 **(21**:23:**24)** sts for neck.

RIGHT FRONT

Work as for left front rev all shaping and starting patt st as follows:

4, 8 & 10 yrs: K3 instead of K2.

4 yrs: On every foll eighth row four times, then on every foll sixth row three times.
6 yrs: On every foll eighth row five times, then on every foll sixth row three times.
8 yrs: On every foll eighth row five times, then on every foll sixth row five times.
10 yrs: On every foll eighth row eight times, then on every foll sixth row three times.
Cont on the 73 (78:83:88) sts obtained.
When work meas 29 (32:36:40)cm or 11½ (12½:14:15¾)in (88 (96:107:120) rows, cast off at the beg of every row as follows:
3 sts twice, 2 sts four times, 3 sts four times and rem 47 (52:57:62) sts.

FASTENER

Cast on 9 sts & work in pattern stitch for 6.5cm or 2½in (19 rows).
Cast off.

SLEEVE CUFFS (MAKE TWO)


Cast on 9 sts & work in patt st for 10cm or 4in (30 rows) starting with K3 instead of K2, then cast off all sts.




Join shoulder seams. Sew sleeves into position, sew side and sleeve seams. Make three buttonholes without cutting thread, one on each front 4 sts from the edge and 2cm or ¾in from neck, then one on the fastener at 1.5cm or ½in height. Sew the bottom of the fastener to the front right 13 (14.5:16:17.5)cm or 5 (51/2:61/4:7) in from the edge seam and 8.5 (10:11.5:13) cm or $3\frac{1}{4}$ (4:4½:5)in from the cast on edge (see diagram). Place one cuff onto each sleeve 3cm or 1in from the cast on edge and centered on the sleeve, then sew the bottom edge of cuff into place (see diagram). Fold the collar down on each front to the right side (see assembly diagram). Sew on buttons (see diagram for placing). For the sleeve cuffs sew on buttons through both the cuff & sleeve.

Sew on press studs (see diagram for placing), the first 5.5 (7:8.5:10)cm or 2 (23/4:31/4:4)in from the cast on edge, the second at 7cm or 23/4in spacing.


ASSEMBLY DIAGRAM








BLOCKING DIAGRAM (all measurements in cm)









Cast on 15 sts in A using long tail cast on. Work moss stitch for 41 rows. Cast off.

SHORT SIDES (MAKE TWO)

Cast on 15 sts in A using long tail cast on. Work moss stitch for 24 rows. Cast off.

MAKING UP

Sew in ends.

Sew sides together.

Note: For a squarer box leave box turned inside out with seams showing 💿

MINI BASKET

Finished sizes

18cm or 7in circumference

Note: The self-patterning yarn makes the sides a different colour.

Cast on 49 sts in B using long tail method

Row 1: knit across the row

Row 2: Purl across the row

Row 3: Change to A, K3, sl1, *K5, sl1, repeat

from * to last three stitches K3

Row 4: P3, sl1, *P5, sl1, repeat from * to last three stitches, K3

Repeat these 4 rows seven more times (32 rows)

Row 33: Changeto B and K across the row

Row 34: P across the row Thread yarn you are knitting with through

the stitches on the needle, starting at the opposite end. Slide stitches of the needle and gather tight using the yarn.

MAKING UP

Sew up the side, sew in ends and block.







MAKEUP BAG

Finished sizes

13 x 11.5 cm or 5 x 4 ½ in

Cast on 36 stitches using long tail method. *Knit 10 rows in st st in A. Change to B for 10 rows in st st* Repeat from * once ending on a purl row

Row 41: Purl.

Starting with a purl row work 10 rows st st Change to A and work 10 rows st st. Change to B and work 10 rows st st. Change to A and work 10 rows st st, ending in a K row Row 82: K across the row.

Row 83: *K2, k2tog, K to last four stitches, K2tog, K2.

Row 84: P across row.

Repeat from * for 18 rows. 16 sts. Cast off.

MAKING UP

Block knitted fabric, sew in ends and sew up two short sides. Cut a piece of your chosen fabric (Sarah has used the lilac from the Craft Department's pastel bundle) fabric measuring the same as your knitted piece with 1cm or ½in seam allowance.

Sew up the two short sides and place

inside your knitted rectangle (wrong sides together).

Pin to the flap and front and sew using the overcast method.

Attach fastening.



Change to 3.25mm needles.

Beg with a K row, work in st st until back measures 29 (30:31:32:33) cm or 111/2 (113/4: 121/4:123/4:13) in, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE ARMHOLES

Cast off 6 (7:8:9:11) sts at beg of next two rows. 113 (125:139:153:169) sts. Dec 1 st at each end of next 5 (7:9:11:13) rows, then on foll five (six:seven:eight:ten) alt rows. 93 (99:107:115:123) sts. Work five (five:five:three:one) rows, ending with RS facing for next row. Now work centre back panel as folls:

Row 1 (RS): K27 (30:34:38:42), (yfwd, sl1, k2tog, psso, yfwd, K3) six times, yfwd, sl1, k2tog, psso, yfwd, K27 (30:34:38:42).

Row 2: Purl.

These two rows set the sts for remainder of back - centre 39 sts in lace patt with all other sts still in st st.

Cont as set until armhole meas 20 (21:22:23:24) cm or 8 (81/4:83/4:9:91/2) in, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE SHOULDERS

Keeping patt correct, cast off 8 (9:10:11:12) sts at beg of next four rows, then 7 (8:9:11:11) sts at beg of foll two rows. 47 (47:49:49:53) sts.

WORK BACK NECK BORDER Change to 2.75mm needles.

Beg with row 1, work in rib as given for lower edge for four rows, ending with RS facing for next row. Cast off in rib.

LEFT FRONT (WORKED SIDEWAYS)

Using 2.75mm needles cast on 139 (145:151:157:163) sts.

Row 1 (RS): K2, *P1, K1; rep from * to last

Row 2: K1, *P1, K1; rep from * to end. Rep last two rows once more, ending with RS facing for next row.

Change to 3.25mm needles.

Now work border patt as folls:

Row 1 (RS): K1, (K1, P1) twice, K to last 5 sts winding yarn twice round needle for each st, (P1, K1) twice, K1.

dropping extra loops, slip these 3 sts back onto left needle, working these 3 sts tog work (K1, yfwd, K1) all into these 3 sts; rep from * to last 5 sts, (K1, P1) twice, K1.

Row 3: K1, (K1, P1) twice, *yfwd, sl1, k2tog, psso, yfwd, K3; rep from * to last 8 sts, yfwd, sl1, k2tog, psso, yfwd, (P1, K1) twice, K1.

Row 4: K1, (P1, K1) twice, P to last 5 sts, (K1, P1) twice, K1.

Rows 5-8: As rows 3-4, twice.

Rows 9-10: As rows 1-2.

Row 11: K1, (K1, P1) twice, K3, *yfwd, sl1, k2tog, psso, yfwd, K3; rep from * to last 5 sts, (P1, K1) twice, K1.

Row 12: As row 4.

Rows 13-14: As rows 1-2.

Rows 15-20: As rows 3-4, three times.

Rows 21-22: As rows 1-2.

These 22 rows complete front opening edge border.

Next row (RS): K1, (K1, P1) twice, K to last 5 sts, (P1, K1) twice, K1.

Next row: K1, (P1, K1) twice, P to last 5 sts,

(K1, P1) twice, K1.

Last two rows set the sts for rest of left front – centre sts now in st st with 5 sts still in rib as each end of row.

Cont as now set until left front meas

32 (**34**:38:**41**:45) cm or 12¾ (**13½**:15:**16**:17¾) in, ending with wrong sides facing for next row.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Cast off 5 sts at beg of next row.

134 (**140**:146:**152**:158) sts. These five cast-off sts will be sewn to row-end edge of back neck border.) Dec 1 st at end of seventh

(**ninth**:ninth:**eleventh**:eleventh) and two foll 8th (8th:10th:12th:12th) rows.

131 (137:143:149:155) sts.

Work six (eight:eight:eight:ten) rows, ending with WS facing for next row.

SHAPE ARMHOLE

Cast off 41 (41:41:40:38) sts at beg of next row. 90 (**96**:102:**109**:117) sts.

Dec 1 st at end of next row and at same edge on foll 10 (12:14:20:24) rows, then

on foll one (**two**:three:**two**:three)

alt rows. 78 (**81**:84:**86**:89) sts.

Work 7 (**9**:9:**11**:13) rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

Cast off.

This cast-off edge forms left side seam.

RIGHT FRONT

Now work as given for the left front, reversing shapings.

SLEEVES

Using 2.75mm needles cast on 79 (83:87:91:97) sts.

Work in rib as given for back for two rows, ending with RS facing for next row.



SHAPE TOP

Keeping rib correct, cast off 6 (7:8:9:11) sts at beginning of next two rows.

67 (69:71:73:75) sts.

Change to 3.25mm needles.

Beginning with a knit row, now work in stocking stitch and complete sleeve as follows:

Dec 1 st at each end of next three rows, then on foll two alt rows, then on four foll fourth rows. 49 (51:53:55:57) sts.

Work one row.

Dec 1 st at each end of next and every following alt row until 33 sts remain, then on foll nine rows, ending with right sides facing for next row.

Cast off rem 15 sts.

MAKING UP


Press according to ball band, omitting ribs. Join both shoulder seams using back stitch, or mattress stitch if preferred, joining front row end (shoulder) edges to back cast-off (shoulder) edges and cast-off edges of upper front rib sections to row-end edges of back neck border extension.

When stitching pieces together, match areas of texture carefully.

Place centre of sleeve to shoulder seam. Set in sleeve, easing sleeve head into armhole.

Join side and sleeve seams.

Work four (**four**:five:**five**) rows decreasing 1 st at each end of every row. You will now have 42 (**48**:50:**56**) sts on the needle. Work on these 42 (**48**:50:**56**) sts until armholes measure 10 (**11**:12:**13**)cm or 4 (**4½**:4¾:**5½**)in, straight down from the top of the needle to the beginning of the armhole shaping (don't measure around the curve), finishing after a WS row.

SHAPE SHOULDERS

Cast off 3 (4:4:5) sts at beginning of next two rows. You will now have 36 (40:42:46) sts on the needle.

Cast off 4 (**4**:4:**5**) sts at beginning of next two rows. You will now have 28 (**32**:34:**36**) sts on the needle.

Cast off 4 (**5**:5:**6**) sts at beginning of next two rows. You will now have 20 (**22**:24:**24**) sts on the needle.

Cast off remaining 20 (22:24:24) sts.

LEFT FRONT (WORKED SIDEWAYS)

Using your main needles cast on 44 (55:64:78) sts.

Row 1: P2, *K4, P4, C2B, P4, repeat from * to last 0 (**11**:6:**6**) sts, K0 (**4**:4:**4**), P0 (**4**:2:**2**), (C2B, P1) zero (**one**:zero:**zero**) times.

Row 2: (K1, P2) zero (**one**:zero:**zero**) times, K0 (**4**:2:**2**), P0 (**4**:4:**4**), *K4, P2, K4, P4; repeat from * to last 2 sts, K2.

Row 3: P2, * C4B, P4, C2F, P4; repeat from * to last 0 (**11**:6:**6**) sts, (C4B) zero (one:one:one) times, P0 (**4**:2:**2**), (C2F, P1) zero (**one**:zero:**zero**) times.

Row 4: (K1, P2) zero (**one**:zero:**zero**) times, K0 (**4**:2:**2**), P0 (**4**:4:**4**), *K4, P2, K4, P4; repeat from * to last 2 sts, K2.

These four rows form pattern. Continue in pattern as follows: Work two rows.

SHAPE NECK

Next row: Pattern to last 2 sts, increase in

SHAPE NECK

Next row: Increase in first st (neck edge), pattern to end. You will now have 45 (**56**:65:**79**) sts on the needle

Next row: Pattern to last 2 sts, increase in next st, pattern 1. You will now have

46 (57:66:80) sts on the needle.

For 2nd, 3rd and 4th sizes only

Work two (two:four) rows increasing 1 st at neck edge as before in every row. You will now have 59 (68:84) sts on the needle.

For all four sizes

Next row: Pattern to end.

Next row: Pattern to end, cast on 4 sts. You will now have 50 (63:72:88) sts on the needle.

Next row: Pattern to end.

Next row: Pattern to end, cast on 6 (5:4:6) sts. You will now have 56 (68:76:94) sts on

the needle.

Next row: Pattern to end.

Next row: Pattern to end, cast on 10 sts. You will now have 66 (78:86:104) sts on the

needle.

Work four (six:six:six) rows without shaping.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Next row: Cast off 2 sts in pattern, pattern to end. You will now have 64 (76:84:102) sts on the needle.

Work three (five:five:five) rows.

Next row: Cast off 2 sts in pattern, pattern to end. You will now have 62 (74:82:100) sts on the needle.

Work three (three:five:five) rows.

SHAPE ARMHOLE

Next row: Cast off 24 (28:30:32) sts in pattern, pattern to end. You will now have 38 (46:52:68) sts on the needle.

Next row: Pattern to last 2 sts, pattern2tog (armhole edge). You will now have 37 (45:51:67) sts on the needle.

Next row: Pattern2tog, pattern to end. You will now have 36 (44:50:66) sts on the

Work two rows decreasing 1 st at armhole edge in every row. You will now have 34 (42:48:64) sts on the needle. Cast off rem 34 (42:48:64) sts in pattern.

LONG SLEEVES (BOTH ALIKE)

Using your smaller needles cast on 32 (32:34:34) sts.

Row 1 (RS): Knit.

This row forms garter stitch.

Work three rows in garter stitch.

Change to your main needles and work in stocking stitch for the remainder of the sleeve as follows:

Work 21 (9:35:17) rows increasing 1 st at each end of fifth and every following eighth (fourth:sixth:fourth) row working extra sts in stocking stitch (there will be seven (three:five:three) rows straight between each increase row). You will now have 38 (36:46:42) sts on the needle. Work 10 (24:8:36) rows increasing 1 st at each end of every following tenth (sixth: eighth:sixth) row (there will be nine (five:seven:five) rows straight between each increase row). You will now have 40 (44:48:54) sts on the needle. Work without further shaping until the sleeve is 15 (17:20:24)cm or 6 (61/2:8: 91/2)in, finishing after a WS row.

SHAPE SLEEVE TOP

Work four (four:five:five) rows decreasing 1 st at each end of every row. You will now have 32 (36:38:44) sts on the needle. Work zero (zero:one:one) rows without

Cast off 3 (3:4:3) sts at beginning of next six (ten:eight:two) rows. You will now have

14 (6:6:38) sts on the needle.

For first and fourth sizes only

Cast off 4 sts at beginning of next two (eight) rows. You will now have 6 sts on the needle.

For all four sizes

Cast off remaining 6 sts.

SHORT SLEEVES (BOTH ALIKE)

Using your smaller needles cast on 40 (44:48:54) sts.

Row 1 (RS): Knit to the end of the row. This row forms garter stitch.



BABY CARDIGAN

Work three rows in garter stitch. Change to main needles and work in st st for the remainder of the sleeve as follows: Work two (**two**:four:**four**) rows.

SHAPE SLEEVE TOP

Work four (**four**:five) rows decreasing 1 st at each end of every row. You will now have 32 (**36**:38:**44**) sts on the needle. Work zero (**zero**:one:**one**) rows without shaping. Cast off 3 (**3**:4:**3**) sts at beginning of next six (**ten**:eight:**two**) rows. You will now have 14 (**6**:6:**38**) sts on the needle.

For first and fourth sizes only

Cast off 4 sts at beg of next two (**eight**) rows. You will now have 6 sts on the needle.

For all four sizes

Cast off remaining 6 sts.

NECKBAND

Join shoulder seams. With RS facing, using smaller needles, pick up and K 24 (24:24:26) sts evenly along right side of neck, 20 (22:24:24) sts from back of neck and 24 (24:24:26) sts evenly along left side of neck. You will now have 68 (70:72:76) sts on the needle. Work four rows in garter stitch. Cast off knitways.

LOWER BORDER

Join side seams.

With RS facing, using your smaller needles, pick up and knit 24 (26:29:32) sts evenly along lower edge of left front, 50 (56:60:66) sts evenly along lower edge of back and 24 (26:29:32) sts evenly along lower edge of right front. You will now have 98 (108:118:130) sts on the needle. Work four rows garter st. Cast off knitways.

LEFT FRONT BORDER

With RS facing, using your smaller needles, pick up and knit 3 sts evenly along neckband, 31 (40:47:58) sts evenly along left front edge and 3 sts evenly along lower border. You will now have 37 (46:53:64) sts on the needle. Work four rows in garter stitch.

Cast off knitways.

RIGHT FRONT BORDER

With RS facing, using smaller needles, PUK 3 sts evenly along lower border, 31 (40:47:58) sts evenly along right front edge and 3 sts evenly along neckband. You will now have 37 (46:53:64) sts on the needle. Work one row in garter stitch.

Next row: K to last 4 sts, k2tog, yfwd, K2.



Work three rows garter st. Cast off knitways.

MAKING UP

Fold sleeves in half lengthways, then placing folds to shoulder seams, sew sleeves in position. Join sleeve seams. Sew on button. Pin out garment to measurement given and cover with damp cloths until dry. See ball band for washing and care instructions.





The Big Knit Challenge

Gary Baker explains how simple knitted squares are helping women in Sierra Leone

harity doesn't always need to start at home. An estimated 2 million women living in Africa need your help, suffering silently from the impact of internal injuries sustained due to complications during childbirth. Their condition - obstetric fistula - is much more common in countries with poor emergency medical care, or where women give birth at a young age or have many pregnancies close together. Typically it happens when a baby gets stuck during labour and the mother has no access to a Caesarean or assisted delivery, leaving the women struggling in pain until their baby often tragically dies. During this agonising process, loss of circulation causes tissue to die, causing dramatic internal damage, often leading to incontinence. Many sufferers are then ostracised by their families and communities due to their intimate problems, leaving them as outcasts.

In Africa, particularly in Sierra Leone, Kenya and Malawi, this happens to thousands of women every day, and they often have no one to help them recover.

The Freedom From Fistula Foundation aims to help all women in Africa get access to healthcare during pregnancy and childbirth, in the process helping to eradicate obstetric fistulas. They want to help expand and develop services across Africa; helping to train surgeons and midwives to provide the highest standards of maternal healthcare.

The Women's Centre offers a wide range of services, including basic literacy, numeracy and handicraft skills

The Freedom From Fistula Foundation also manages The Aberdeen Women's Centre in Sierra Leone. It provides free surgeries to women injured in childbirth, running both a children's and a maternity clinic. Rehabilitation is an important part of the recovery process and the centre offers a wide range of services, including the teaching of basic literacy, numeracy and handicraft skills. As part of the handicrafts training, some patients stitch together knitted squares to make blankets to aid recovery, as well as allowing them to take a warm blanket home with them when they leave the hospital.

This is where you come in. The Big Knit Challenge is aimed at helping these women and their children. The idea is to knit 15cm (6in) blanket squares for newborns or 20cm (8in) squares for adult or children's blankets which the women will then stitch together. Alternatively, try your hand at knitting classic baby-sized hats or bootees. @

CECILIA, PRODUCTION EDITOR Knitting for children is so much fun, and these cute farmyard animals are great for giving as gifts or using during storytime – and for acting out *Old Macdonald*, Look out for a horse, sheep and chicken next month.

Tension

26 sts and 34 rows to 10 cm or 4 in over st st using 3mm (UK size 11/ US size 2/3) knitting needles

Finishing measurements

- Pig measures 5.5cm or 2¼ in tall
- Cow measures8cm or 3 in tall
- ◆ Turn to page 92 for full list of abbreviations

leaving a 2.5cm or 1in gap. Turn right side out and stuff with filling. Pull up sts tightly and sew remaining seam, adding a little filling if necessary. Make a nose as follows: using Graphite, cast on 10 sts.

Row 1: (K2tog) to end.

Cut yarn and thread through sts. Pull up sts tightly and curve edge round to create a circle. Sew ends tog. Place inside cast on edge and join seams tog. Use a length of graphite yarn to thread around sts of nose one row in from cast on edge. Pull up gently to form nose shaping. Using a single length of soft peach pulled out from a piece about 12cm or 4¾in long. Work two tiny daisy sts on nose for nostrils. Work two daisy sts in white either side of head with about 4 sts between them for eyes. Place a small black bead in centre of each daisy st and sew securely. Make ears as follows: using graphite, cast on 6 sts. Work four rows garter st, each beg with k2tog.

Next row: K2tog.

Cut yarn and thread through. Pin ears in position above eyes with back of ears sewn to last row of graphite on body. Sew securely, curving ears slightly and with point facing towards nose.

LEGS (MAKE TWO IN SOFT PEACH & TWO IN GRAPHITE)

Cast on 6 sts.

St st three rows.

Cast off purlways.

Fold a 3cm or 1¼in pipe cleaner in half to make a 1.5cm or ¾in length. Gather up sts at one end. Wrap leg around pipe cleaner with reverse st-st to front and sew seam firmly. Sew across foot edge and pin other end to belly of body. When all four legs are in position, sew securely in position.

TAIL

Cast on 21 sts.

Row 1: (K3tog) to end. 7 sts.

Cast off.

Sew seam together firmly, allowing the tail to curve naturally. Sew to back of body. Check all loose ends are tied in securely to finish.

cow

BODY

Begin at neck using white and cast on 20 sts. **Row 1:** (K1, inc in next st) x 3, K8, (inc in next st, K1) to end. 26 sts.

Row 2: Purl.

Row 3: (K2, inc in next st) x 3, K8, (inc in next st, K1) to end. 32 sts.

Starting with a purl row, work 25 rows st st.

PIG

HEAD AND BODY

Begin at the nose using Graphite and cast on 12 sts.

Garter st three rows.

Row 4: (K1, inc in next st) x 2, K4, (inc in next st, K1) to end. 16 sts.

Row 5: Knit.

Row 6: (K2, inc in next st) x 2, K4, (inc in next st, K2) to end. 20 sts.

Row 7: Knit.

Row 8: Knit.

Row 9: Knit.

Row 10: (K3, inc in next st) x 2, K4, (inc in next st, K3) to end. 24 sts.

Change to Soft Peach.

Garter st three rows.

Row 14: K4, inc in next st, knit to last 5 sts, inc in next st, K4. 26 sts.

Row 15: Knit.

Row 16: K5, inc in next st, knit to last 6 sts, inc in next st, K5. 28 sts.

Garter st four rows.

Change to Graphite.

Garter st 13 rows.

Row 34: (K2, k2tog) to end. 21 sts.

Garter st three rows. **Row 38:** (K1, k2tog) to end. 14 sts.

Row 39: Knit.


Row 40: (K2tog) to end.

Cut yarn and thread through sts.

With wrong side facing, sew along seam,









Next row: K13, inc in next st, K4, inc in next st, knit to end. 34 sts.

Starting with a purl row, work three rows st st. Cast off.

Work some random patches of Black swiss darning across body. Fold body in half and sew along back seam, underbelly seam and halfway up front body seam. Turn RS out and then stuff firmly.

NECK

Using White cast on 18 sts.

Row 1: K2tog, K5, (inc in next st) x 4,

K5, k2tog. 20 sts.

Row 2: P2tog, P to last 2 sts, p2tog. 18 sts.

Row 3: K2tog, knit to last 2sts, k2tog. 16 sts.

Cast off sts.

Sew seam across the k2tog shaping of the first three rows. Turn RS. Sew cast on edge to neck of body. Stuff firmly.

HEAD

Using Soft Peach cast on

Row 1: Inc in every st. 12 sts.

Row 2: Purl.

Change to White.

Row 3: K3, inc in next st, K4, inc in next st, K3. 14 sts.

Row 4: Purl.

Row 5: K4, inc in next st, K4, inc in next st, K4. 16 sts.

Row 6: Purl.

Row 7: K5, inc in next st, K4, inc in next st, K5. 18 sts.

Row 8: Purl to the end of the row.

Row 9: Cast off 2sts, K4 (including st left on needle), inc in next st, K4, inc in next st, K6.

Row 10: Cast off 2 sts, purl to end. 16 sts.

Row 11: Cast off 2 sts, K3, inc in next st, K4, inc in next st, K5. 16 sts.

Row 12: Cast off 2sts, purl to end. 14 sts.

Row 13: K2tog, K4, inc in next 2 sts, K4, k2tog. 14 sts.

Row 14: Purl.

Row 15: (K2, k2tog) to last two stitches, knit two stitches together.

Cast off.

Using Black, swiss darn a spot on top left of head and another one or two small spots over face. Gather round sts at nose tightly then sew seam from nose to base of neck. Fold top of head and sew across cast off edge. Turn right sides out and stuff firmly. Sew a black bead on last inc either side of



central 4 sts for eyes. Use a length of Brown to make a small straight stitch for each nostril either side of nose near the top of the soft peach. Pin to neck of body then sew in place securely.

LEGS (THREE IN WHITE, ONE BLACK)

Make as for pig legs, working seven rows st st instead of three rows, making the last row and cast off using silver. Cut pipe cleaners 6 cm or 2½in long, fold with st st to front and make up as for pig legs.

EARS (MAKE ONE BLACK, ONE WHITE)

Cast on 3 sts.

Row 1: Inc in every st. 6 sts.

Row 2: Purl.

Row 3: (K2tog) to end. 3 sts.

Row 4: Sl1, p2tog, psso.

Fasten off.

Fold ears in half lengthways with st st to

Sew seams together.

Sew to either side of head, three rows above eyes with 4 sts between them.

Cut a length of Black yarn 60cm or 23¾in long. Fold in half and tie a knot in the end. Place a cable needle in centre of loop and twist cable needle till the yarn starts to twist in centre.

Let go and allow to twist.

Tie a knot 5cm or 2in along length.

Cut the excess yarn, 1cm or ½in from knot. Twist each individual length to release the yarn strands.

Sew top of tail to rear of cow, to finish.

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THE EXPERTS

NEEDLE KEEPERS

I'm in the middle of knitting a pair of socks but unfortunately I've lost one of the dpns (and a few stitches). Is it alright if I carry on with a bigger or smaller needle or will the stitches look uneven?

Louise Dix, Harlow

Jo says: So long as the needle is not used in the same place on every row of the sock you will find the stitches will even out. I would go with the slightly smaller needle - on the next row the bigger needle will pull it out a bit. I usually buy sets of five dpns just in case I lose one (I usually find them down the side of sofa!) as it saves money in the long run. You may also like to buy some Clover Double Pointed Needle Protectors. There are two pairs in each pack and they come in sizes Small (£4.84) for needles 2mm to 3.75mm and Large (£4.99) for sizes 4mm to 6mm. To buy them go to www.brownberryyarns.co.uk or call 01603 788038 for mail order.

I knitted myself a cardigan a couple of years ago that I wear all the time but

recently it has become covered in bobbles which makes it look tatty. I've tried using sticky tape to remove them but it doesn't work - is there anything I can do?

Sarah says: Wear and tear can cause knitted fabrics to pill and bobble, which I agree, does make them look tatty. Sticky tape is a good way to remove small bobbles but it can also make a knitted fabric look a bit fuzzy. I would recommend the Lilly Brush (available from loopknittingshop.com £12.99) - its bristles are designed to remove pill and bobbles without damaging delicate fabrics so hopefully it will be able to return your cardigan to its former self!



BLOCK PARTY

I'm having trouble blocking a blanket made out of acrylic - it keeps springing back into the original shape. My friend says there is a technique called 'killing acrylic'. Do you know how I do it?

Jo says: Acrylic yarn can be difficult to block but, if you soak it (once knitted!) in fabric softener or hair conditioner for ten minutes and then rinse it, thoroughly you'll find it easier to do. Pin it to your blocking board and then start the scary bit! Set your

steam iron so it produces the maximum amount of steam and move it over your knitting about an inch above. You need to make sure every bit of the knitting is soaking wet but at the same time make sure the iron doesn't touch the knitting or it will melt. When you've finished let it dry – you can do this with a fan or, on a warm day, take the steamed project outside. The work must be dry before you take the pins out. Want to try knitting with acrylic yarn? Try Stylecraft Special DK. The colours are wonderful and at only £1.69 from www.woolwarehouse. co.uk you can let your imagination run riot!

When I was knitting for my children I used to buy Phildar books and yarn as the designs were very different. Is it possible to buy them in the UK now?

Jo says: For years I've had to beg the family to search out a Phildar shop when on holiday to France and then I had to do a lot of reading through to make sure I'd changed the instructions into English correctly. My other means of acquiring Phildar magazines and yarn was to scour Ebay. The very good news is that you can now go to www.deramores.com and take your pick from a huge range of yarn. There are five pattern magazines at the moment but I'm sure demand will mean that there are more to follow. The books are still in French but have a supplement in English. Bear in mind that some patterns use 3.5mm needles - not widely available in every wool shop in the UK – but Deramores sell 3.5mm

Millward needles for £1.65. Each magazine costs £7.99 – to find them look under books rather than patterns.

PERFECT POM-POMS

I've seen hats with huge contrast colour pom-poms on top and I'd like to knit one for my daughter, but I don't want to have to buy a separate ball of yarn just to make the pom-pom. How much yarn do you think I would need to make a pom-pom?

Jess Broom, London

Sarah says: The amount of yarn you'll need to make a pom-pom will depend on how big you want it, but you're right, you won't need a whole ball. You could try finding a matching yarn in your yarn stash -




it would be a great way to use up leftovers. Or, because of the pom-pom hat trend, Sirdar have started making yarn called Head Start (available from good knitting shops £7.99) specifically made for knitting hats with a pom-pom attached! This would solve your problem and the colour of the yarn also has flecks of the contrasting pom-pom colour in it so it will match perfectly.

I'm knitting a jumper with ribbed cuffs and I want to make sure that they will be nice and snug around my wrists - is there a way to stop the rib from stretching?

Jeanette Collins, Manchester

Sarah says: I understand you want to keep the ribs nice and tight - it's annoying when they loose their shape over time. You could try knitting on smaller needles but if you want to be sure that they

will not loosen then it would be a good idea to use some of Clover's elastic yarn thread (available from knitting shops for about £7.20). This is a super fine thread that you can knit with at the same time as your knitting yarn and it will help keep the garments shape. It comes in black or invisible so you can use it with any colour yarn.



KNITTING

Susanne gives us some top tips for taking your knitting on holiday



ON THE CONTINENT

Do you have any recommendations for a holiday knitting project? I'm going to the South of France in August.

Susanne says: When the weather is hot, you don't want a big woolly knitting project that's going to make your hands hot and sticky. Yarns with cotton, bamboo and linen are ideal for knitting in hotter climates. Why not choose a pattern for a summer jumper that you'll want to wear at the end of the summer or on cooler days? I love this jumper by Bergère de France, using three different types of yarn: Ecoton, a cotton blend, sparkling Estivale and Cabourg, which is made with hemp, the perfect material for summer.

DOWN UNDER

I'm travelling to Australia in a few weeks' time, and I'd like to knit on the flight. I wonder whether you're allowed to take your knitting needles onto a plane?

Susanne says: Knitting is such a good pastime while travelling! The good news is, you can take your knitting needles (and crochet hooks) on a plane. There are no restrictions against them. However, I would use a circular needle because it takes up a lot less room in your bag and when you're in your seat a circular needle is much more practical in a confined space, be it a bus, a train or a plane – you don't want to annoy your neighbour! Consider taking bamboo needles because they are less threatening than metal ones. Blunt-point scissors with blades less than 4" long are allowed, as are tapestry needles. I prefer to carry dental floss instead of scissors though as you can use the cutter to break your yarn. Make sure you've got enough yarn in your hand luggage to keep you going for the duration of the flight, and carry the rest of the yarn in your hold luggage.

CROSS COUNTRY

I've just started working on a long cardi. I'd like to knit on a forthcoming train journey from Edinburgh to London but I don't think the project is practical. Any ideas?

Lily Davies, Abergavenny

Susanne says: There are three things to consider when choosing a project for your travels: colours, yarn weight and

project size. If your pattern includes 15 different yarn colours with changes at every row, you would need to pack 15 skeins of yarn in your bag. Choose a pattern with one or two colours instead – it will be less hassle! Consider the yarn weight: 4ply takes up a lot less room than superchunky. Finally, think about the size of the project. As you say, your long cardigan wouldn't be very practical. Amigurumi and small blocks on the other hand could be lost under your seat. The best projects for on the go.



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

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

Rows 49 to 56: Using yarn D.
Rows 57 and 58: Using yarn E.
Rows 59 and 60: Using yarn D.
Rows 61 to 64: As rows 57 to 60.
Rows 65 to 72: Using yarn E.
Rows 73 and 74: Using yarn F.
Rows 75 and 76: Using yarn E.
Rows 77 to 80: As rows 73 to 76.
Rows 81 to 88: Using yarn F.
Rows 89 and 90: Using yarn A.
Rows 91 and 92: Using yarn F.
Rows 93 to 96: As rows 89 to 92.
These 96 rows form stripe sequence and are
repeated.

Rows 45 to 48: As rows 41 to 44.

BACK

Using 3.25mm needles and yarn A cast on 106 (114:122:126:134:138:146:154) sts. Row 1 (RS): K2, *P2, K2; rep from * to end. Row 2: P2, *K2, P2; rep from * to end. These two rows form rib.

Cont in rib until back meas 6 cm or 2 ½ in, inc 1 (1:0:1:1:1:1:0) st at each end of last row and ending with RS facing for next row. 108 (116:122:128:136:140:148:154) sts.

Change to 5mm needles. Now work in patt as folls:

Row 1 (RS): *K1, sl 1 (see pattern note), rep from * to end.

Row 2: *P1, sl1 (see patt note), rep from * to end.

These two rows form patt, and rows 1 and 2 of stripe sequence (see above). Beg with stripe sequence row 3 (see above), cont in patt in stripe sequence until back meas 38 (40:41:43:41:41:40:42) cm or 15 (153/4:16:17:16:153/4:161/2) in, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE ARMHOLES

Keeping patt and stripes correct, cast off 5 sts at beg of next two rows.

98 (**106**:112:**118**:126:**130**:138:**144**) sts. Dec 1 st at each end of next five rows, then on foll four alt rows.

80 (88:94:100:108:112:120:126) sts. Cont straight until armhole meas 19 (20:22:23:25:27:28:29)cm or 7½ (7¾:8¾:9:9¾:10¾:11:11½) in, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE SHOULDERS AND BACK NECK

Next row (RS): Cast off 5 (6:6:7:8:8:9:10) sts, patt until there are 19 (22:24:26:28:30:32:34) sts on right needle and turn, leaving rem sts on a holder.

Work each side of neck separately. Keeping patt correct, dec 1 st at neck edge of next four rows and at same time cast off

Rows 13 to 16: As rows 9 to 12.
Rows 17 to 24: Using yarn B.
Rows 25 and 26: Using yarn C.

Rows 27 and 28: Using yarn B.
Rows 29 to 32: As rows 25 to 28.
Rows 33 and 34: Using yarn C.
Rows 35 and 36: Using yarn A.
Rows 37 to 40: As rows 33 to 36.
Rows 41 and 42: Using yarn D.
Rows 43 and 44: Using yarn A.

5 (6:6:7:8:8:9:10) sts at beg of second row, then 5 (6:7:7:8:9:9:10) sts at beg of foll alt row. Work one row.

Cast off rem 5 (6:7:8:8:9:10:10) sts

Cast off rem 5 (6:7:8:8:9:10:10) sts. With RS facing, slip centre 32 (32:34:34:36:36:38:38) sts onto a holder, rejoin appropriate yarn and patt to end. Complete to match first side, reversing shapings.

FRONT

Work as given for back until 18 (18:18:18:22:22:24:24) rows less have been worked than on back to beg of shoulder shaping, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE FRONT NECK

Next row (RS): Patt 30

(**34**:36:**39**:43:**45**:49:**52**) sts and turn, leaving rem sts on a holder.

Work each side of neck separately. Keeping patt correct, dec 1 st at neck edge of next 6 rows, then on foll three (three: three:three:three:four:four) alt rows, then on one (one:one:one:two:two:two) foll fourth rows. 20 (24:26:29:32:34:37:40) sts. Work one row.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Cast off 5 (6:6:7:8:8:9:10) sts at beg of next and two (two:one:two:two:one:two:two) foll alt rows, then - (-:7:-:-9:--) sts at beg of foll - (-:1:--:1:--) alt row. Work one row. Cast off rem 5 (6:7:8:8:9:10:10) sts. With RS facing, slip centre 20 (20:22:22:22:22:22) sts onto a holder, rejoin appropriate yarn and patt to end.

Complete to match first side, reversing shapings.

SLEEVES

Using 3.25mm needles and yarn A cast on 50 (50:54:58:58:58:58:62) sts.

Work in rib as given for back for 8 cm or 3 in, inc 0 (1:1:0: 0:1:1:0) st at each end of last row and ending with RS facing for next row. 50 (52:56:58:58:60:60:62) sts.

Change to 5mm needles.

Beg with stripe sequence row 83 (81:75:73:61:57:53:55), now work in stripe sequence in patt as given for back, shaping sides by inc 1 st at each end of fifth and every foll sixth row to 80 (72:66:62:70:78:86:84) sts, then on every foll eighth row until there are 84 (86:90:92:96:100:102:104) sts, taking inc sts into patt. Cont straight until sleeve meas approx 44 (47:50:52:54:55:55:56)cm or 17¼ (18½:19¾:20½:21¼:21¾:21¾:21¾:22)in, ending after same stripe sequence row as



on back to beg of armhole shaping and with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE TOP

Keeping patt and stripes correct, cast off 5 sts at beg of next two rows.

74 (76:80:82:86:90:92:94) sts.

Dec 1 st at each end of next three rows, then on foll alt row, then on two foll fourth rows. 62 (64:68:70:74:78:80:82) sts. Work one row. Dec 1 st at each end of next and every foll alt row until 42 sts rem, then on foll nine rows, ending with RS facing for next row. 24 sts. Cast off 4 sts at beg of next two rows. Cast off rem 16 sts.

MAKING UP

Press pieces according to ball band instructions. Join right shoulder seam using back stitch, or mattress stitch if preferred.

NECKBAND

With RS facing, using 3.25mm needles and same colour yarn as sts left on front holder, pick up and knit 18


(18:18:18:21:21:24:24) sts down left side of

front neck, K across 20

(20:22:22:22:22:22) sts on front holder, pick up and knit 18 (18:18:18:21:21:24:24) sts up right side of front neck, and 5 sts down right side of back neck, K across 32 (32:34:34:36:36:38:38) sts on back holder, then pick up and knit 5 sts up left side of back neck. 98 (98:102:102:110:110:118:118) sts. Beg with row 2, work in rib as given for back for 2.5 cm or 1 in, ending with RS facing for next row. Cast off in rib. Place centre of cast-off edge of sleeve to shoulder seam. Set in sleeve, easing sleeve head into armhole. Join side and sleeve seams. Slip stitch pocket edging and linings into place.



Use our **step-by-step** guide to learn the basics of knitting

MAKE A SLIPKNOT ◆ YOUR FIRST CAST ON STITCH



Twist the yarn into a loop and form a second loop of yarn to pull through the first one.



Tighten the first loop into a knot around the second. This will be your first cast on stitch.

CAST ON - THUMB METHOD ◆ USE THIS FOR A STRETCHY EDGE



Twist the yarn into a loop and form a second loop of yarn to pull through the first one.



Tighten the first loop into a knot around the second. This will be your first cast on stitch.



Wrap the ball end of the yarn anticlockwise around the needle. Push the needle through the loop.



Slide the loop off your thumb and tighten both ends. Repeat steps 2-4 for each stitch.

CAST ON - KNITTED ON METHOD ◆ USE THIS FOR A STRONG, HARDWEARING EDGE



With the slipknot on your left needle, insert the right needle from front to back of the loop.



Wrap the ball end of the yarn anticlockwise around right needle and then pull this through the loop.



Now insert the left needle tip through the front of new loop, dropping it off the right needle.



Repeat steps 1-3 as needed, forming new stitches from the top stitch on the left needle.

CAST OFF → HOW TO FINISH YOUR WORK



To begin, knit only the first two stitches in the cast off row.



Push the left needle through the first stitch, then lift it over the second stitch and off right needle.



With one stitch now on the right needle, knit another stitch and then repeat step 2 until the row end.



Cut the yarn with a 15cm or 6in tail. Pull the tail through the final cast off stitch.

KNIT • WORKED ON THE RIGHT SIDE IN STOCKING STITCH



Insert the right needle into the left needle's top stitch, from front to back with the yarn at the back.



Hold the yarn around your right index finger and then wrap it clockwise around the right needle.



Using the right needle, pull this new loop of yarn through the stitch on the left needle.



Ease the stitch off the left needle keeping the new stitch on the right needle. Repeat steps 1-4.

PURL ♦ WORKED ON THE WRONG SIDE IN STOCKING STITCH



of the left needle's top stitch with the yarn in front.



Insert the right needle into the front With your right index finger, wrap the yarn anticlockwise around the top of the right needle.



Using the right needle, pull this new loop of yarn back through the front of the stitch.



Ease the stitch off the left needle, keeping the new stitch on the right. Repeat steps 1-4.





♦ MATERIALS

Tells you recommended needle size, how much yarn for each size and whether you need any extra items, such as buttons or zips or other tools

HOW TO READ KNITTING CHARTS

Knitting charts follow the same rules unless the pattern states otherwise. Right side rows are usually odd numbers and are worked right to left. Wrong side rows are normally even numbers and are worked left to right. Pattern repeats will be contained in an area outlined in red and some charts will have further coloured outlines for different sizes. The key will give you each symbol and tell you what stitch it is.


when the garments arrive-that's when our minds begin to wander and we start them on the shoots.

Row 2: P16 (**20**:24:**28**:32), (K6, P7) twice, K6, P16 (**20**:24:**28**:32).

Row 3: K3, (k2tog, yfwd, K2) one (two:three: four:five) times, k2tog, yfwd, K1, tw2, K2, (yfwd, K1, skpo, P4, k2tog, K1, yfwd, K3) twice, yfwd, K1, skpo, P4, k2tog, K1, yfwd, K2, tw2, K1, (yfwd, skpo, K2) two (three:four:five:six) times, K1.

Row 4: P17 (**21**:25:**29**:33), (K4, P9) twice, K4, P17 (**21**:25:**29**:33).

Row 5: K2, (k2tog, yfwd, K2) two (three:four: five:six) times, tw2, K3, (yfwd, K1, skpo, P2, k2tog, K1, yfwd, K5) twice, yfwd, K1, skpo, P2, k2tog, K1, yfwd, K3, tw2, (K2, yfwd, skpo) two (three:four:five:six) times, K2.

Row 6: P18 (**22**:26:**30**:34), (K2, P11) twice, K2, P18 (**22**:26:**30**:34).

Row 7: K1, (k2tog, yfwd, K2) two (three:four: five:six) times, K1, tw2, K4, (yfwd, K1, skpo, k2tog, K1, yfwd, K7) twice, yfwd, K1, skpo, k2tog, K1, yfwd, K4, tw2, K3, (yfwd, skpo, K2) one (two:three:four:five) times, yfwd, skpo, K1. Row 8: Purl.

These eight rows set the patt.

Cont in patt until work measures 51 (**52**:53:**54**: 56) cm or 20 (**201**/₂:21:**211**/₂:22) in from beg, ending after a WS row.

Note: For a longer, tunic length top, add another 13-14cm or 5-5½ in in patt here.

SHAPE SHOULDERS

Cast off loosely 3 (4:5:6:7) sts at beg of next six rows, then 3 (4:5:5:6) sts at beginning of next two rows. Slip rem 40 (40:40:42:42) sts

onto a length of yarn and leave.

FRONT

Work as Back until Front measures 10 (**10**:10: **12**:12) rows less than Back up to start of shoulder shaping, ending after a WS row.

SHAPE NECK

Next row: Work across 15 (**19**:23:**26**:30) sts, then turn.

Cont on this group of sts for left side of neck. Dec 1 st at neck edge on next three rows. 12 (16:20:23:27) sts.

Work six (**six**:six:**eight**:eight) rows straight, thus ending at side edge.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Cast off loosely 3 (4:5:6:7) sts at beg of next row and the two foll alt rows. Work one row. Cast off rem sts.

With RS facing, slip next 34 (**34**:34:36:36) sts onto a length of yarn and leave. Neatly rejoin yarn to rem sts and work to end of row. Complete as left half of neck but working one row more before shaping shoulder.

SLEEVES

Using 6.5mm needles, cast on 31 (**39**:39: **47**:47) sts. Knit one row. Work in patt:


Row 1 (RS): (K2, yfwd, skpo) three (**four**:four: **five**:five) times, K2, yfwd, sl1, k2tog, psso, yfwd, K2, (k2tog, yfwd, K2) three (**four**:four: **five**:five) times.

Row 2 and every alt row: Purl.

Row 3: K3, (yfwd, skpo, K2) three (**four**:four: **five**:five) times, yfwd, skpo, K1, (k2tog, yfwd, K2) three (**four**:four:**five**:five) times, K1.

Row 5: K4, (yfwd, skpo, K2) three (four:four:five:five) times, K1, (k2tog, yfwd, K2) three (four:four:five:five) times, K2.

Row 7: K1, (yfwd, skpo, K2) three (**four**:four:**five**:five) times, yfwd, skpo, K1, (k2tog, yfwd, K2) three (**four**:four:**five**:five)





times, k2tog, yfwd, K1.

Row 8: Purl.

These eight rows set the patt.

Cont in patt shaping sleeve by inc 1 st at each end of next row, then on every foll sixth (eighth:fourth:sixth:fourth) row until there are 37 (45:45:59:63) sts, then on every foll eighth (tenth:sixth:eighth:sixth) row until there are 45 (51:57:63:69) sts, taking extra sts into patt. Cont straight for a few rows until sleeve meas 30 cm or 12in, ending after a RS row. Cast off very loosely.

NECKBAND

Join left shoulder. With WS facing, slip each group of sts left on length of yarn onto two 6.5mm needles. With RS facing and 5.5mm

needles, rejoin yarn neatly to top of right shoulder, K across back neck sts, K up 13 (13: 13:14:14) sts evenly down left front neck, K across front neck sts, finally K up 14 (14:14: 15:15) sts evenly up right front neck. 101 (101:101:107:107) sts.


Row 1: K1, (P1, K1) to end.


Row 2: K2, (P1, K1) to last st, K1.

Rep last two rows once. Cast off firmly in rib.

MAKING UP

Press work lightly on WS. Join right shoulder and neckband. Place a marker on side edges 28 (32:35:39:42) rows down from each shoulder seam. Stitch cast-off edge of sleeves between one set of markers. Join side and sleeve seams. Press seams.

BLANKET

With yarn A make 4ch, join with a sl st to form a ring.

Round 1: 5ch (counts as first tr, 2ch), [3tr into ring, 2ch] three times, 2tr into ring, sl st into third of 5ch at beg of round.

Change to yarn B.

Round 2: SI st into next ch-sp, 5ch (counts as 1tr and 2ch), 3tr into same ch-sp, *1ch, miss 3tr, [3tr, 2ch, 3tr] into next ch-sp; rep from * twice, 1ch, miss 3 sts, 2tr into same sp as 5ch at beg of round, sI st into third of 5ch at beg of round.

Round 3: SI st into next ch-sp, 5ch (counts as 1tr and 2ch), 3tr into same sp, *1ch, miss 3tr, 3tr into next ch-sp, 1ch, miss 3tr **, [3tr, 2ch, 3tr] into next ch-sp; rep from * twice and from * to ** again, 2tr into same ch-sp as 5ch, sI st into third of 5ch at beg of round.

Round 4: SI st into next ch-sp, 5ch (counts as 1tr and 2ch), 3tr into same sp, *[1ch, miss 3tr, 3tr into next sp] twice, 1ch, miss 3tr ** [3tr, 2ch, 3tr] into next sp; rep from * twice and from * to ** again, 2tr into same sp as 5ch, sI st into third of 5ch at beg of round.

The pattern is now set.

Change to yarn C.

Cont in pattern and work a further two rounds in yarn C.

Change to yarn D and work three rounds.
Change to yarn E and work three rounds.
Change to yarn F and work three rounds.
Change to yarn G and work three rounds.
Change to yarn H and work three rounds.
Change to yarn I and work three rounds.
Now reverse the colours and work three rounds in each starting with yarn H, G, F etc.

MAKING UP

Sew in all loose ends. 📀

Repeat last three rows three times more. ****
Drop yarn B and pick up yarn A.

Using yarn C work four rows garter stitch. **
Repeat from ** to ** three times more, then
from ** to **** once, decrease 1 st in centre of
last row. 48 sts.

Work ribbed top:

Next row: *K2tbl, P2 *; rep from * to * to end. **Next row:** *K2, P2 *; rep from * to * to end. Repeat last two rows four times more.

Make holes for tie cord: *K2tbl, yrn, p2tog *; rep from * to * to last 2 sts, P2.

Next row: *K2, P2 *; rep from * to * to end. Next row: *K2tbl, P2 *; rep from * to * to end. Next row: *K2, P2 *; rep from * to * to end. Repeat last two rows four times more. Break yarn B and join yarn A.

Work two rows in rib as before. Cast off in rib. Make a twisted cord using yarn A. Using a pom-pom maker or making the pom-poms in the traditional way using two circles of card, make two pom-poms using yarn A.

MAKING UP

Sew side seam of bottle cover.

Thread twisted cord through holes at neck of cover, attach a pom-pom to each end of the cord. Tie in a bow.

Row 6: Knit.

Change to yarn B.

Row 1: K15, sl1, k2tog, psso, K15.

Row 2 and every following alt row: Knit.

Row 3: K14, sl1, k2tog, psso, K14.

Row 5: K13, sl1, k2tog, psso, K13.

Row 6: Knit.

Change to yarn C.

Row 1: K12, sl1, k2tog, psso, K12.

Row 2 and every following alt row: Knit.



Row 3: K11, sl1, k2tog, psso, K11.

Row 5: K10, sl1, k2tog, psso, K10.

Row 6: Knit.

Change to yarn A.

Row 1: K9, sl1, k2tog, psso, K9.

Row 2 and every following alt row: Knit.

Row 3: K8, sl1, k2tog, psso, K8. **Row 5:** K7, sl1, k2tog, psso, K7.

Row 6: Knit.

Change to yarn B.

Row 1: K6, sl1, k2tog, psso, K6.

Row 2 and every following alt row: Knit.

Row 3: K5, sl1, k2tog, psso, K5. **Row 5:** K4, sl1, k2tog, psso, K4.

Row 6: Knit.

Change to yarn C.

Row 1: K3, sl1, k2tog, psso, K3.

Row 2 and every following alt row: Knit.

Row 3: K2, sl1, k2tog, psso, K2.

Row 5: K1, sl1, k2tog, psso, K1.

Row 6: K3tog. Fasten off.

Make three more squares in the same way.

MAKE TOP

Using 4mm needles and A cast on 40 sts.

Knit 16 rows in garter stitch.

Cast off.

BUTTON LOOP

Using 4mm needles and yarn A cast on 14 sts, cast off.


MAKING UP

Work in ends.

Sew the four squares together, cast off points will all meet in the centre.

Now fold the piece in half and join the seam, matching stripes as you do. The seam will run down the back of the case. Join the base neatly. Join the short ends of the top, place over the open end of the case. Secure with a few stitches to one side edge.

Attach button loop to other side edge, sew on button to match up.

Next row: K26, sl1, k2tog, psso, K26.

Next row: Knit.

Next row: K25, sl1, k2tog, psso, K25.

Next row: Knit.

Next row: K24, sl1, k2tog, psso, K24.

Next row: Knit. Change colour.

Next row: K23, sl1, k2tog, psso, K23.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: K22, sl1, k2tog, psso, K22.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: K21, sl1, k2tog, psso, K21.

Next row: Purl. Change colour.

Next row: K20, sl1, k2tog, psso, K20.

Next row: Knit.

Next row: K19, sl1, k2tog, psso, K19.

Next row: Knit.

Next row: K18, sl1, k2tog, psso. K18.

Next row: Knit. Change colour.

Next row: K17, sl1 k2tog, psso, K17.

Next row: Purl.

Knit 14 rows in garter stitch and cast off.

BACK

Using 4mm needles and yarn A cast on $67 \mathrm{\ sts}$

Knit four rows in garter stitch.

Change to st st with garter stitch borders.

**Row 1: Knit.

Row 2: K5, P to last 5 sts, K5.

Repeat last two rows three times more ***.

Knit six rows in garter stitch **



Then ** to *** once.

Work 14 rows in garter stitch and cast off.

HANDLES

Make one in yarn A and one in yarn G.



Using appropriate shade cast on 110 sts. Knit 14 rows in garter stitch. Cast off.

MAKING UP

Weave in ends. If you wish to line your bag

with fabric, do so before stitching knitted pieces together. Place back and front tog with RS facing. Pin in place all around three edges, leave top edge open. Sew neatly in place. Turn right sides out. Sew a handle to each side of the bag at the top edge.
