Needles 3.25mm (UK 10, US 3), 3.75mm (UK 9, US 5), 4mm (UK 8, US 6), 4.5mm (UK7, US 7), 5mm (UK 6, US 8)

22 sts and 30 rows to 10cm or 4in over st st on 4mm (UK 8, US 6) needles; 23 sts and 32 rows to 10cm/4in over double moss st on 4.5mm (UK7, US 7) needles; 18 sts and 24 rows to 10cm or 4in over st st on 5mm (UK 6, US 8) needles with Angel yarn held double.

slip the next st Skpp knitwise, the foll 2 sts purlwise then knit these 3 sts together. 2 sts dec. M1 pick up loop between last and next st, purl into back of this loop

These 2 rows set rib.

Work in rib until work meas 8 (8:8:9:9) cm, ending with WS facing for next row.

Next row: \* P2, k2tog, rep from \* to last 2 sts, p2. 134 (146:158:170:188) sts.

#### Change to 4mm needles.

Beg with a K row and working in st st cont until work meas 35 (36:37:38:39) cm, ending with RS facing for next row.

#### **SHAPE ARMHOLES**

Cast off 5 (6:7:8:9) sts at beg of next 2 rows. 124 (134:144:154:170) sts.

Next row (RS): K2, skpp, knit to last 5 sts, k3tog, k2

Next row: Purl.

Rep these 2 rows 2 (3:3:4:4) times. 112 (118:128:134:150) sts. \*\*

Next row: K2, skp, knit to last 4 sts, k2tog,

This row sets single decrease shaping. Dec 1 st as set at each end of 2nd and 4 (3:4:3:4) foll alt rows.

100 (108:116:124:138) sts.

#### FOR 4th SIZE ONLY

Work 2 rows, ending with WS facing for next

#### **FOR ALL SIZES**

Next row (WS): P9 (9:9:9:12), (m1, p20 (21:23:25:27)) four times, m1, purl to end. 105 (113:121:129:143) sts.

Change to 4.5mm needles and B.

**Row 1 (RS):** K1, \* p1, k1, rep from \* to end. **Row 2:** \* P1, k1, rep from \* to last st, p1.

**Row 3:** As row 2.

**Row 4:** As row 1.

These 4 rows set double moss stitch. Working in double moss stitch as set, cont without shaping until armhole meas 20.5 (21.5:22.5:23.5:26.5) cm, ending with RS facing for next row.

#### **SHAPE BACK NECK**

Next row (RS): Patt 34 (38:41:45:51), turn and leave rem sts on a holder.

Next row (WS): Cast off 2 sts, patt to end.

Next row: Patt to end.

Rep these 2 rows twice more.

Next row: Cast off 1 st, patt to end. 27

(31:34:38:44) sts.

Work 1 row, ending with RS facing for next row.





#### **SHAPE SHOULDER**

Cast off 9 (10:11:13:15) sts at beg of next and foll alt row.

Work 1 row.

Cast off rem 9 (11:12:12:14) sts.

With RS facing, working on rem sts, place 37 (37:39:39:41) sts on holder for back neck, rejoin yarn to rem sts and patt to end.

Next row (RS): Cast off 2 sts, patt to end.

Next row: Patt to end.

Rep these 2 rows twice more.

**Next row:** Cast off 1 st, patt to end. 27

(31:34:38:44) sts.

Work 1 row, ending with WS facing for next

row.

Shape shoulder.

Cast off 9 (10:11:13:15) sts at beg of next

and foll alt row.

Work 1 row. Cast off rem 9 (11:12:12:14) sts.

#### **FRONT**

Work as given for back to \*\*.

For 1st and 2nd size only

Next row: K2, skp, knit to last 4 sts, k2tog, k2. 110 (116) sts.

For 1st size only

Work 1 row.

Next row: K2, skp, knit to last 4 sts, k2tog, k2. 108 sts.

#### For all sizes

Next row (WS): P5 (10:5:8:11), (p2tog, p3) 20 (20:24:24:26) times, purl to end. 88 (96:104:110:124) sts.

Change to 5mm needles and C held double throughout. Cont as folls:

Next row: K2, skp, knit to last 4 sts, k2tog,

This row sets single decrease shaping. Dec 1 st as set at each end of 2nd and 2 (2:4:3:4) foll alt rows. 80 (88:92:100:112) sts.

#### For 4th size only

Work 2 rows, ending with WS facing for next row.

#### For all sizes

**Next row:** P5 (**5**:3:**4**:6), (m1, p3, m1, p4) 10 (11:12:13:14) times, m1, purl to end. 101 (**111**:117:**127**:141) sts.

#### Change to 4.5mm needles and B.

Working in double moss stitch as set on back, cont without shaping until armhole meas 15 (16:16:17:17)cm, ending with RS facing for next row.

#### **SHAPE FRONT NECK**

Next row: Patt 39 (44:47:52:59), turn and leave rem sts on a holder.

**Next row (WS):** Cast off 2 sts, patt to end.

Next row: Patt to end. Rep these 2 rows twice more.

**Next row:** Cast off 1 st, patt to end.

Next row: Patt.

Rep these 2 rows 5 (6:6:7:8) times more. 27

(31:34:38:44) sts.

Work 5 (3:7:5:7) rows, ending with RS facing for next row. (Work should now match back to start of shoulder)

#### **SHAPE SHOULDER**

Cast off 9 (10:11:13:15) sts at beg of next and foll alt row.

Work 1 row.

Cast off rem 9 (11:12:12:14) sts.

With RS facing, leave 23 sts on a holder for front neck, patt to end.

Patt 1 row.

Next row (RS): Cast off 2 sts, patt to end.

Next row: Patt to end. Rep these 2 rows twice more.

**Next row:** Cast off 1 st, patt to end.

Next row: Patt.

Rep these 2 rows 5 (6:6:7:8) times more. 27

(31:34:38:44) sts.

Work 5 (3:7:5:7) rows, ending with WS facing ◆



for next row. (Work should now match back to start of shoulder).

Cast off 9 (10:11:13:15) sts at beg of next and foll alt row.

Work 1 row.

Cast off rem 9 (11:12:12:14) sts.

#### **SLEEVES**

Using 3.25mm needles and A cast on 70 (70:74:74:78) sts.

Work 8cm in rib as set on back, ending with WS facing for next row.

Next row: \* P2, k2tog, rep from \* to last 2 sts, p2. 53 (53:56:56:59) sts.

Change to 4mm needles. Beg with a K row, working in st st throughout, inc 1 st at each end of 3rd and 16 (20:19:-:-) foll 4th (4th:4th:-:-) rows, then on every foll 6th (6th:6th:4th:4th) row to 97 (101:104:108:111) sts.

Cont without shaping until sleeve meas 43 (44:45:45:45)cm, ending with RS facing for next row.

#### SHAPE SLEEVE TOP

Cast off 5 (6:7:8:9) sts at beg of next 2 rows. 87 (89:90:92:93) sts.

Dec 1 st at each end of next 7 rows. 73 (75:76:78:79) sts.

Next row: Dec 1 st at each end of row and at same time, using m1 increase 4 (4:3:3:2) sts across row. 75 (77:77:79:79) sts.

Change to 4.5mm needles and B. Work double moss stitch as set on back, as folls:

Dec 1 st at each end of next 3 (3:1:3:1)

rows, then on every foll alt row to 33 sts.

> Dec 1 st at each end of next 5 rows. 23 sts.

Cast off 4 sts at beg of next 2 rows. 15 sts.

Cast off rem 15 sts.

#### **MAKING UP**


Using mattress stitch, join right shoulder seam.

#### **NECKBAND**

With RS facing, using 3.75mm needles and B, pick up and knit 21 (21:24:24) sts down left side of neck, 23 sts from holder at front neck, 21 (21:24:25) sts up right side of neck, 8 sts down side of back neck, 37 (37:39:39:41) sts and 8 sts up side of back neck. 118 (118:126:126:130) sts.

Beg with 2nd row, work 4cm in rib as set on back, ending with RS facing for next row. Cast off loosely in rib.

Join side and sleeve seams, sew in sleeves using the set-in method. @

SHETLAND HAP SHAWL Shetland Hap shawls are the simplest of the Shetland shawl designs. Taken from the Medieval word for cover up, Hap shawls are used for everyday wear.

FAIR ISLE SLIPOVER Knitted in the Shetland Isles, using locally sourced wool, the Fair Isle slipover was made popular in the 1920/30s by the then Prince of Wales. A truly stylish piece, it's as popular now as it was in the 20s.

**POMPOM SLIPPERS** Pom poms are great for adorning anything from garlands to beanie hats, and shawls to slippers. Traditional Italian wedding shoes have small pompoms, as do some Turkish dancing shoes.

**ARAN JUMPER** The Aran jumper takes its name from the Aran Islands off the west coast of Ireland. Traditional Aran sweaters are usually off-white and made from 100% wool. One of the most recognisable features is the cable patterning on the chest.

FISHERMAN'S SWEATER Also known as ganseys, fisherman's sweaters can absorb 30% of their weight in water before feeling wet. They keep the wearer warm on the cold days and nights at sea, and were traditionally knitted by fisherman's wives.

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

# designer chat



We talk to Rita about her love of vintage knitwear patterns and natural yarns and what she'd take to a desert island...

How did you become a knitwear designer? I had always made up patterns to knit for myself and family, and then I met someone who was looking for individual knits for her shop. I showed her some of my own designs and she liked them. It all progressed from then on really.

#### Describe your design process for us.

I usually start with the yarns I'm planning to use, then look at picture files and Pinterest pages for more inspiration.

#### What kind of patterns do you like designing most and why?

I love anything with a hint of the traditional about it. Or patterns based on vintage designs. They have a unique design quality that I find very attractive.

Do you have any favourite yarns at the moment? I like Blacker Swan and have just bought some to knit a cardigan for myself – a rare event!

Can you share your greatest knitting disaster? My worst moment was having a piece stolen. It was a kimono jacket with a multi-coloured dragon that went right around the body. I loved it but I could never knit it again.

#### Which of your many designs are you most proud of and why?

I like all of the designs that I created for my book, Knit Vintage, but I am most proud of the Aran cardigan that I designed for Blacker. It has my love of the traditional but with a modern look.

If you were stranded on a desert island, which pattern and yarn would you like to take with you? It would be nice to have some quiet time to knit one of Anniken Allis's lovely shawls in yarn I bought from The Old Piggery.

#### What do you have planned for 2015?

I have plans for another book but it is still in the very early stages at the moment.

#### Our dainty dancer

pattern is a great way to use up all those oddments of DK yarn in your stash: although if you buy 100g balls in each colour, you will have enough yarn to knit a pair of ballerinas!

#### Materials

Yarn

1 x 100g ball of Hayfield Bonus DK in the following colours:

A White (shade 0961) B Cupid (shade 0944) C Flesh Tone, (shade 0963) D Bright Lemon, (shade 0819)

E Sunflower, (shade 0978) F Royal Blue, (shade 0979)

 ◆ Needles
 A pair of 3.25mm (UK 10, US 3) knitting needles

Accessories70g of toy stuffing

#### Yarn detail

- Sirdar Hayfield Bonus DK www.sirdar.co.uk 01924 371501
- 100% acrylic
- + 100g/280m
- ♦ Machine wash 40°C
- + £1.99

#### Tension

24 sts and 32 rows to 10cm/4in over st st using 3.25mm (UK 10, US 3) knitting needles. Exact tension is not vital for this project, but ensure your fabric is dense enough to prevent toy stuffing escaping.

#### Special abbreviations

Pfkb

Increase by knitting into both the front and back of the next stitch (k row) Increase by purling into the front of the next stitch and purling into the back of the same stitch (p row) Break the yarn

В&Т

stitch (p row)
Break the yarn
and thread the tail
onto a tapestry
needle. Thread the
yarn end through
the sts on the
knitting needle,
then take the sts
off the needle and

#### Pattern notes

**Row 3:** Kfb, knit to last st, kfb. 8 sts. Rep last 2 rows until 16 sts are on the

needle, ending on a knit row. **Row 8:** Purl.

Knit 2 rows (second knit row marks fold).

**Row 11:** Cast on 8 sts, knit across row. 24 sts

**Row 12:** Cast on 8 sts, purl across row. 32 sts.

Beg knit, st st 10 rows.

Break off A and join in B.

Beg knit, st st 14 rows.

Decrease for shoulders as follows.

**Row 37:** (K2, k2tog) to end. 24 sts.

Purl 1 row.

Break off B and join in C.

Beg knit, st st 2 rows.

Row 41: (K2, k2tog) to end. 18 sts.

Beg purl, st st 3 rows.

Increase for head as follows.

**Row 45:** Kfb in every st. 36 sts.

Beg purl, st st 19 rows.

Decrease for top of head as follows.

**Row 65:** (K4, k2tog) to end. 30 sts.

Row 66 and every alt row: Purl.

**Row 67:** (K3, k2tog) to end. 24 sts.

**Row 69:** (K2, k2tog) to end. 18 sts.

**Row 71:** (K1, k2tog) to end. 12 sts. **Row 73:** (K2tog) to end. 6 sts.

R&T

#### **LEGS (MAKE 2 THE SAME)**

Beginning with sole of foot, using 3.25mm needles and B, cast on 4 sts.

Row 1: Kfb, k1, kfb, k1. 6 sts.

Knit 7 rows.

**Row 9:** Kfb, k3, kfb, k1. 8 sts.

Knit 3 rows

**Row 13:** K2tog tbl, knit to last 2 sts, k2tog. 6 sts.

Row 14: Knit.

**Row 15:** K2tog tbl, knit to last 2 sts, k2tog. 4 sts.

Row 16: Knit.

**Row 17:** Cast on 10 sts at beg of row, knit across row. 14 sts.

**Row 18:** Cast on 10 sts at beg of row, knit across row. 24 sts.

Beg knit, st st 6 rows.

Break off B and join in C.

**Row 25:** K8, (k2tog) x 4, k8. 20 sts.

Beg purl, st st 3 rows.

Row 29: K6, (k2tog) x 4, k6. 16 sts.

Beg purl, st st 34 rows. Break off C and join in A. Purl 1 row. Cast off.

#### **ANKLE STRAPS (MAKE 2)**

Using 3.25mm needles and B, cast on and then cast off 28 sts.

#### **SHOE STRAPS: (MAKE 4)**

Using 3.25mm needles and B, cast on and then cast off 8 sts.

#### **RIGHT ARM (NOTE VARIATION FOR LEFT ARM IN SQUARE BRACKETS)**

Using 3.25mm needles and B, cast on 4 st.

Row 1: Kfb, K1, kfb, K1. 6 sts.

Row 2: Purl.

Row 3: Kfb, knit to last 2 sts, kfb, K1. 8 sts.

Row 4: Purl.

Rep 3rd and 4th rows until 14 sts are on the needle, ending on a purl row. Mark this row.

Beg knit, st st 4 rows. Break off B, join in C.

St st a further 14 rows.

Shape wrist as follows.

**Row 29:** (K1, k2tog) x 2; K1; (K1, k2tog) x 2; K1. 10sts.

Row 30: Purl.

**Row 31:** (K1, kfb) x 2; K1; (K1, kfb) x 2; K1.

14sts.

Row 32: Purl.

Make thumb as follows.

Row 33: K11 [for left arm K5 here], turn.

Row 34: P2, turn.

Working on these 2sts only, and leaving the other sts on the needles, beg knit, st st 6 rows

Row 41: With right sides facing, knit the 2 thumb sts, then knit the remaining sts on the left hand needle.

Row 42: Purl across all sts. 14sts. Beginning knit, st st 6 rows. B&T.

#### **LEFT ARM**

Work as for right arm, noting variation in square brackets on Row 33.

#### HAIR (MAKE TWO THE SAME)

Using 3.25mm needles and D, cast on 46 sts. Row 1: K2tog, (k2tog and then pass 1st st on right hand needle over 2nd stitch to cast off) x 15, knit to end of row. 15 sts. Knit 3 rows.

\*\*Row 5: Cast on 31 sts at beg of row. K2tog, (k2tog and then pass 1st st on right hand needle over 2nd stitch to cast off) x 15, knit to end of row. 15 sts.

Knit 3 rows.

Rep from \*\* 7 times more (9 curls have been made).



Row 37: Cast on 31 sts at beg of row. K2tog, (k2tog and then pass 1st st on right hand needle over 2nd stitch to cast off) x 15, cast off remaining sts.

(10 curls made altogether).

Using 3.25mm needles and B, cast on 96 sts. Knit 6 rows.

Beg knit, st st 8 rows.

Row 15: (K1, k2tog) to the end of the row. 64 sts.

Beg purl, st st 3 rows.

Row 19: K2; (k2tog) to the last 2 sts; k2. 34 sts. Beg purl, st st 3 rows

Cast off.

#### **UNDER SKIRTS (MAKE** TWO THE SAME)

Using 3.25mm needles and A, cast on 204 sts.

Knit 4 rows.

Rows 5-8: (K6, p6) to the end of the row. **Row 9:** (K2tog, k2, k2tog, p2tog, p2, p2tog) to the end of the row. 136 sts.

Rows 10-13: (K4, p4) across row.

**Row 14:** (K2 tog x 2, p2 tog x 2) across

Row 15-18: (K2, p2) across row.

Row 19: (k2tog, p2tog) across row.

34 sts.

Cast off.

Using 3.25mm needles and A, cast on and cast off 12 sts.

#### **TIARA**

The tiara uses a picot cast on, as detailed. Using 3.25mm needles and E:

Cast on row: Cast on 5sts, (k2tog, return st just made by k2tog from right hand needle back onto left hand needle, cast on

Row 1: Knit.

2 sts) x 11, cast on 1st 17 sts.

**Row 2:** K12, turn.

**Row 3:** Sl1, k6, turn. Row 4: SI1, knit to the end of the row.

> Row 5: Knit across all sts. Cast off.

**JEWEL** 

Using 3.25mm needles and B, cast on 3sts. B&T.


#### **MAKING UP MAIN DOLL**

Sew the main seam together, above the fold line to the top of the head.

Stuff, then sew the remaining triangular flap at the base of the doll to the cast on edges, closing all gaps.

Take a length of C and tie this tightly around the row below the head increase row to form a neck. Sew in the ends.





#### **FACE**

Using B, embroider a small 'U' shaped smile on the face, with the centre bottom point being about 5 rows up from the head increase row.

Using C, work 2 horizontal back stitches about 3 rows above the centre of the mouth to form a nose.

Using F, work a few vertical back stitches 2 rows above the nose and 3 stitches apart for the eyes.

#### **HAIR**

Sew a running stitch along the width of each hair piece, just above where the curls start. Pull up the running stitch to form the curls into a bunch.

Place the hair on the head, having the curl bunches on either side of the head, and with the two straight side edges meeting along the centre of the head, the front join being about seven rows above the eyes, and the back being about 12 rows from the head increase line.

Sew the side edges and centre join firmly to the head of the doll.

#### **LEGS**

Sew the side seams of the legs, and then fold up the garter stitch sole portions to meet the cast on stitches at the base of the legs and sew together.

Turn the legs right side out and stuff firmly. Fold the top cast off edge so that the leg seam is placed at the centre back of the leg and the 'foot' is at centre front.

Over sew the cast off sts, then sew the legs to the fold line at the base of the body.

#### **SHOES**

Pin and then sew the two shoe straps to the front of the foot, placing the ends of the two straps together about four rows up from the centre of the light B shoe, and sloping down to join to the shoe sides at either side of the centre, creating an inverted 'v' shape. Sew the long ankle strap around the ankle of the doll, crossing over the two smaller straps at the centre front, and being joined at the back seam of the leg.

#### **ARMS**

Turn the arm right side out and ladder stitch the side seams of the thumb. Turn the arm back to the wrong side and join the side seams of the arm(s) from the B&T sts to the markers, leaving the top of the arms above the markers open. Turn the arm(s) back to the right side and stuff.

Sew the shaped top part of the arms (above the marked row) to the sides of the doll,

placing the top of the arms level with the last row of B.

#### **SKIRTS**

Join the side edges. Sew the skirt to the doll along the first B row, with the seam at the back.

Sew the two underskirts to the doll just below the skirt, along the top A row.

#### **ROSE**

Roll up the strip lengthwise to form a rose shape and sew along the bottom edge to hold the shape.

Sew the rose onto the front of the doll, just below the first C row.

Sew a running st through the cast on sts of the jewel and pull up tight to form a dome shape.

Sew the jewel onto the centre front of the tiara, taking care that the sewing stitching does not show on the back of the tiara. Sew the tiara in a crescent shape on the top of the head, with the centre front of the tiara placed on the centre seam of the hair, about 1.5cm from the edge of the hair, and the two ends about the same distance from the centre of the tiara, and about 6cm apart. 🕼

It looks great with a plain or patterned shirt, or under a jacket, and there are several colours in the Libby Summers Fine Aran range which would work well for this garment, which is an essential for any stylish man's wardrobe.

**Row 1 (RS):** (K1, p1) rep to last st, k1. **Row 2 (WS):** (P1, k1) rep to last st, p1.

Change to 5mm needles. Beg with a k row, work in st st, inc 1 st at both ends of 3rd, and next foll 8 (8:10: 10) row to 89 (93:97:101) sts and then on every foll 12th row to 93 (97:101:105) sts.

Cont straight until work meas 42 (**43**:44:**45**) cm or 16 (**17**:17:**17**) in.

#### **SHAPE ARMHOLES**

Cast off 7 sts at beg of next 2 rows. 79 **(83**:87:**91)** sts.

Dec 1 st at both ends of next 2 rows and next alt row. 73 (77:81:85) sts\*.

Cont straight until armhole meas 25 (26:27:28) cm or 10 (10:10:11) in from Shape Armholes, ending with a WS row.

#### **SHAPE SHOULDER**

Cast off 8 (8: 8: 9) sts at beg of next 4 rows. 41 (45: 49: 49) sts.

Cast off 6 (6: 7: **7**) sts at beg of next 2 rows. 29 (**33**: **35**: **35**) sts.

Leave rem sts on a holder.

#### **FRONT**

Work as for Back to \*.

Cont straight until work meas 49 (**52**:53:**54**) cm or 19 (**20**:21:**21**) in from cast on edge ending on a WS row.

#### DIVIDE FOR NECK

**Next row (RS):** K35 (**37**:39:**41**), skpo. Turn and work on these 36 (**38**:40:**42**) sts only as folls:

Next row (WS): Purl.

**Next row:** K to last 2 sts, skpo.

35 (**37**:39:**41**) sts.

Rep last 2 rows until you have 22 (**22**:23:**25**)

Cont straight until work meas same as Back to shoulder shaping, ending with WS row. Cont in st st, cast off 8 (8: 8: 9) sts at beg of next and foll alt row. 6 (6:7:7) sts.

Cast off 6 (6:7:7) sts at beg of next row. With RS facing, rejoin yarn to rem 36 (38:40:42) sts.

**Next row (RS):** K2tog, k to end. 35

Next row (WS): Purl.

(37:39:41) sts.

Rep last 2 rows until you have 22 (22:23:25) sts, ending with WS facing for next row.







Cont in st st, cast off 8 (8:8:9) sts at beg of next and foll alt row. 6 (6:7:7) sts.
Cast off 6 (6:7:7) sts at beg of next row.

#### MAKING UP NECKBAND

With RS tog join left shoulder seam using back stitch.

With RS facing and using 4mm circular needle, knit across 29 (33:35:35) sts left on a holder from back neck, pick up and knit 44 (46:46:48) sts down left side neck, place SM on needle, pick up and knit 44 (46:46:48) sts up right side of neck.

117 (125:127:131) sts.

Row 1 (WS): Beg with p1, work in k1, p1 rib over first 44 (46:46:48) sts (ending with k1), slip marker to RH needle, beg with k1, work in k1, p1 rib to end of row.

Row 2: Rib as set to 2 sts before marker, skpo, sl marker to RH needle,

k2tog, rib to end.

Row 3: Rib as set to

2 sts before marker, p2tog, sl marker to RH needle, p2togtbl, rib to end.

Rep rows 2 and 3 once (**once**: twice:**twice**) more.

Cast off on RS using rib method. With RS tog join right shoulder seam using back stitch.

#### **ARMHOLE EDGES**

With RS facing and using 4mm circular needle, pick up and knit 43 (44:46:48) sts from right back armhole, and 44 (45:47:49) sts from right front armhole, making sure you start and finish right at the edge of work (this means picking up from the few sts cast off for armholes, as well as up the side of work). 87 (89:93:97) sts.

Work 4 rows in rib patt as given for Back. Cast off.

Repeat Armhole Edge instructions, picking up sts first from left front armhole and then left back armhole for the other side.

Sew up side seams with RS facing, using mattress stitch.



Introducing Libby Summers

With a book out, and a growing yarn range, Libby is one to watch, says Cecilia Forfitt

How old were you when you first started knitting? What project did you make?

I was about seven years old. The first thing I knitted was probably a scarf for a teddy. I moved on quickly to more interesting things, including knitting entire wardrobes for my Barbie dolls!

#### Did you train formally, or did you find your way into knitting via a different route?

The school I went to was lovely but it was very focused on academia, and (because I was bright), I was steered away from art and design - my main passion in life - and towards an academic degree. But while at uni I also did

life drawing classes, painted landscapes, and sketched people in coffee shops! Afterwards I became a violin teacher, which I did for 15 years. In the last five of these, I started my knitwear business part time, only going full time in July 2013, when I launched my varn collection. This time my career was a conscious decision, and I am very happy with my mid-life career change!

#### Tell us a little bit about how you design...

I have always believed strongly in the power of simplicity, particularly in design. I approach designing a garment a bit like putting together a really good landscape painting

or life drawing. I also have the knitter in mind at all times. The process of creating a garment or accessory is as important to me as the outcome, and must flow together; the pattern needs to be easy to follow, and the construction understandable.

#### What defines your knitting style?

Eclectic, yet personal and simple - and striking. I believe that good design is timeless, and I aim to create classic pieces that will be long-lasting in their appeal. William Morris said: "Have nothing in your house that you do not know to be useful, or believe to be beautiful." I have taken this one step further - everything has to be beautiful AND useful, not just one or the other!

#### What inspires and influences your designs?

My most creative periods usually happen while on holiday or just after a holiday. New places, new people, new ideas are the things that really excite and stimulate me. I love traveling and learning about different cultures. However, having a family of three girls (all at a crucial point in their education), and needing to earn a living keeps me at home most of the time. The internet has

become an important source of inspiration to me. I like going to galleries when I can, and visiting shops and new towns - something I have an excuse to do now that I sell wholesale to knitting shops. Some of my designs are influenced by conversations with retailers about what people want to knit.

#### Do you have a favourite knitting spot?

Not really; I knit anywhere and everywhere! If I am visiting my sister in London, I will knit on the bus or the train. If I am waiting at the dentist, I will knit. I do have a favourite chair at home that is ideal for knitting in, though, as the arms are low, so my elbows can jiggle away without being inhibited by the furniture!

#### What sort of thing do you like to listen to while you're knitting?

Radio 4 in general, and Women's Hour in particular - or, if it's a Saturday afternoon the jazz programme on Radio 3. Sometimes I listen to classical music, such as Mozart or Bach, but I have to be in the mood for it, and it needs to be gentle to be knitted to.

I believe good design is timeless. I try to make my designs beautiful and useful, not just one or the other!


#### Which designers and artists inspire you?

Years ago, when I was just starting to design and wanting to become a 'proper' designer, I went to a Debbie Bliss trunk show in a town near to my home. She gave a talk about how she had got into designing, and she also came through a back-door route with a bit of luck and lots of hard work. That stopped me thinking, "I can't do this - I don't have a textiles degree". In more recent times I have been inspired by Erika Knight, who taught me to crochet with her book Simple Crochet, and Louisa Harding. In a more general sense, I am inspired by all sorts of artists, from Christiane Kubrick to Renoir, Lowry and Vermeer. My tastes are about as eclectic as you can get!

#### Congratulations on your new book! Which of the patterns are you most proud of?


My sister in law had been pestering me to design a tank top so she could knit one for my brother, so I included this in the book. I also love the Fair Isle bag, Sweet Pea, and the Charlotte Cowl.












Apart from my own yarn, I love Manos Silk. I discovered (by accidentally washing a jumper in the machine) that this yarn comes out like new... on a handwash cold setting! It is beautifully soft and so warm. I also love Rowan Felted Tweed for the texture and the drape. I recently discovered Blacker Yarns Swan Falkland Islands DK when I was trying out yarns for my book – it is so soft, and

gives brilliant stitch definition!



I was impressed by Emma Wright's graduate show (Emma Knitted), and I think she will go far. I also love Louisa Crompton's work, for her use of colour and surface pattern. I think she is definitely one to keep an eye on.

## Tell us something we might not know about you.

My summer job while I was a student was helping to grade sheep fleeces at Central Wool Growers in Stamford. I had no idea back then that I would be selling sheep's wool for a living one day!

...playing my violin, making a cake or going out for coffee with my lovely hubbie or my daughters.

#### What's next on your knit list?

Like most knitters, I always have at least one

WIP, although since I started designing, I keep this to a maximum of three, otherwise I am liable to get confused or make mistakes with the pattern writing. Right now I have just come back from holiday, where I allowed myself to knit something in someone else's yarn (shock horror!) for the first time since writing my book. It's a hat in Holst Garn Supersoft 4ply which I bought from Tangled Yarn. I was hoping to have it finished by the end of the week, but had forgotten what a slog 4ply is! Next on my list is an adult version of

I had a summer job **grading fleeces,** but I had no idea I'd be **selling sheep's wool** for a living one day!

the cardigan I have just designed in my Fine Aran. It's an unusually complex pattern for me, with all over cables, but it's a stunner!

# What's next? Do you have any secret plans in the pipeline?

I had an exciting idea in the summer, inspired by a city break, but I don't know when I am going to get around to it!

I am also hoping to write another book, and to launch a new yarn for AWI5, but one thing I have learnt in life is not to plan too far ahead or too definitively, as you never know what's waiting for you around the corner. Often the things I haven't yet thought of are far better than the ones I have!

1 str Tornade/1 str Phil Light: 15 sts and 20 rows to 10cm/4in over st st using 5mm (UK 6, US 8) needles 1 str Phil Light/1 str Strasslight: 14 sts and 38 rows to 10cm/4in over Fisherman Rib using 4mm (UK 8, US 6) needles Phil Harmony: 14 sts and 20 rows to 10cm/4in over dble moss st using 5mm (UK 6, US 8) needles

#### Finished size

40cm x 175cm (15¾ x 69in). Made from 14 rectangles each measuring 20 x 25cm.

#### Special abbreviations

K1b k1, but insert right needle in st directly below st on left needle, work this st and pull both sts

#### **RECTANGLE 5**

Using 5mm needles and 1 str Gazelle, cast on 29 sts and work in dble moss st for 25cm. Cast off.

Work 3 more rectangles in same way.

#### TO MAKE UP

Piece together the various sections (see below) using overedge or concealed stitching; use Gazelle worked double or Miel or Caramel, matching colours to the section being sewn (or use strong thread).

#### **RECTANGLE 3**

Using 5mm needles and 1 str Braise/1 str Caramel, cast on 30 sts and work in st st for 25 cm (on each edge, work 1 selv st in garter st). Cast off.

Work 2 more rectangles in same way.

#### MAGIC CARPET

Rib row 4: \*P2, k2; rep from \* to mrk, sl mrk, p2, k2, p2, (p1, k1) twice, p2, k2, p2, sl mrk, (k1, p1) 5 times, k1, sl mrk, p2, k2, p2, (p1, k1) twice, p2, k2, p2, sl mrk, \*k2, p2; rep from \*

Rib row 5: \*K2, p2; rep from \* to mrk, sl mrk, k2, p2, k2, (k1, p1) twice, k2, p2, k2, sl mrk, (k1, p1) 5 times, k1, sl mrk, k2, p2, k2, (k1, p1) twice, k2, p2, k2, sl mrk, \*p2, k2; rep from \* to end.

Rep rows two to five 2 (2:2:3:3) more times, then Row 2 once more.

Change to 8mm needles.

**Row 1:** (P2, p2tog) 3 (**4**:4:**5**:6) times, p2tog 0 (0:0:2:2) times, p 0 (0:4:0:0), sl mrk, work row 1 of chart A over next 16 sts, sl mrk, (p1, k1) 5 times, p1, sl mrk, work Row 1 of chart B over next 16 sts, sl mrk, p 0 (0:4:0:0), p2tog 0 (0:0:2:2) times, (p2tog, p2) 3 (4:4:5:6) times. 61 (67:75:77:83) sts

Row 2: K to mrk, sl mrk, work row 2 of chart B over nxt 16 sts, sl mrk, (k1, p1) 5 times, k1, sl mrk, work row 2 of chart A over next 16 sts, sl mrk, k to end.

Row 3: P to mrk, sl mrk, work row 3 of chart A over nxt 16sts, sl mrk, (k1, p1) 5 times, k1, sl mrk, work row 3 of chart B over nxt 16 sts, sl mrk, p to end.

Row 4: K to mrk, sl mrk, work row 4 of chart B over nxt 16st, sl mrk, (p1, k1) 5 times, p1, sl mrk, work row 2 of chart A over nxt 16sts, sl mrk, K to end.

Continue as set by these rows, working in rev st st at sides, repeating chart rows on cable panels and working double moss st in centre panel.

Continue until 40 (42:44:46) rows have been worked from the cast on edge, ending with a chart row 6 (8:10:6:8).

With R side facing, pick up 16 (16:20:20:20) sts from L front neck, pm, work the centre panel 11sts from st holder in continuing dbl moss st pattern, pm, 14 (14:18:18:18) sts from R front of neck, 8 (8:8:12:12) sts from R back of neck, pm, pick up centre panel 11sts and work in continuing dbl moss st pattern, pm, 8 (8:8:12:12) sts from L back of neck. 68 (68:76:84:84) sts.

Row 1 (WS): \*K2, p2; rep from \* to mrk, sl mrk, patt in dbl moss st to nxt mrk, sl mrk, \*p2, k2; rep from \* to mrk, sl mrk, patt in dbl moss st to mrk, sl mrk, \*p2, k2; rep from \* to

Row 2 (RS): \*P2, k2; rep from \* to mrk, sl mrk, dbl moss st to mrk, sl mrk, \*k2, p2; rep from \* to 2 sts before mrk, k2, sl mrk, dbl moss st to mrk, sl mrk, \*k2, p2; rep from \* to

Rep these two rows 11 more times for fold over neck band.







# Wrapped up for winter

Needles at the ready! Gary Baker finds out about Age UK's campaign to warm up Britain

rom leaves on the line to snow on the roads, winter brings us many challenges - but for the elderly, it can be a whole lot more serious, with potentially grave consequences. Age UK has decided to step in and help, calling on the nation's knitters to support this year's campaign for warm homes to ensure older people stay warm and well in the winter.

Each winter, one elderly person dies every seven minutes from the cold, with many others developing serious illness due to living in a constantly cold home. Obviously these deaths and health problems can be prevented, with warmer homes and cheaper energy bills. There's no doubt many houses in the UK could be made much warmer with proper insulation and other energy-efficient measures.

'Cold Homes Week' (2nd-6th February, 2015) brings together an alliance of many concerned organisations, including Age

UK, who are calling on MPs to make fuel poverty a thing of the past.

And this is where you all come in... As part of their 'Spread The Warmth' campaign this year, Age UK are asking keen knitters and crocheters to create woolly homes


that will be exhibited by Age UK groups up and down the country to highlight this serious national issue. The aim is to raise awareness in a creative way, inviting policy makers and MPs from local communities to discuss the urgent need for warm homes. older people to keep warm, both inside and outside their homes in the winter months. No one should be cold in their own home and we are urging MPs to make all homes more energy efficient through our campaign."

Make 1 Left: lift strand between stitches fromfront to back and knit into back loop

M1R Make 1 Right: lift strand between stitches from back to front and knit into loop

#### **MITTENS**

With smaller needles and A, cast on 42 (**52**) sts. Divide sts as evenly as possible over 4 dpn. Join to work in the round, being careful not to twist stitches. Work around in k1, p1 rib for 6 cm.

Change to larger dpn and work in pattern, following the chart. Increase for the thumb gusset as indicated on the chart. Increase with M1R before and M1L after the centre set of sts of thumb gusset. When you reach the row marked with X at the left side of the chart, place the 11 (13) thumb sts on a holder. cast on 11 (13) sts over the gap. 50 (62) sts.

Now divide the sts with 12 (16) sts each on dpn 1 and 3 and 13 (15) sts each on dpn 2 and 4. Continue, following the chart. Shape the top with decreases on each side of the 2-st bands at sides of hand.

#### **TOP SHAPING**

At the beginning of dpn 1 and 3: Ssk (or sl 1, k1, psso); knit to end of needle.
At the end of dpn 2 and 4: K2tog.
End by cutting yarn and drawing through remaining 10 sts; tighten.
Weave in all ends neatly on WS.

#### **THUMB**


Slip sts on holder to larger size dpn, knit across in pattern and then pick up and knit 11 (13) sts above thumbhole and 1 st at each side. 24 (28) sts.

Work in pattern, following the thumb chart. Shape top of thumb as shown on chart. End by cutting yarn and drawing through remaining 8 sts and tighten. Weave in all ends neatly on WS.


#### **MAKING UP**

Make the other mitten the same way, placing thumb on opposite side of palm.

Who needs one pompom when you can have two? This cute winter hat is super-striking with a cable pattern topped with cute pompom 'ears'. So what are you waiting for? Get those big needles ready!

#### Materials

- Yarn
- 2 x 100g ball of Erika Knight for John Lewis Super Chunky Yarn in Coral (shade 10)
- Needles 1 pair 10mm (UK 000/ US 15) knitting needles
- Accessories Cable needle Pompom maker (optional)

#### Yarn detail

- Erika Knight for John Lewis
- www.johnlewis.com
- ◆ 100% wool

#### + 100g/75m (82 yds)

- Hand wash
- + £7.95 per ball

#### Tension

10 sts and 11 rows over stocking stitch using 10mm (UK 000/ US 15) knitting needles

#### Finished measurement

To fit an average adult head. This fabric is very stretchy.

#### Pattern notes

If you prefer, you can work this pattern solely from the chart after the ribbed edging. Make sure that you work a decrease as directed in Row 1 of the written cable pattern (the first row of the chart) for the first repeat only. This decrease is not shown on the charted pattern.

#### Special abbreviations

C4F Place next two stitches on cable needle and hold at front of work. Knit next two stitches, knit two stitches from cable needle.

#### **HAT**

Cast on 29 sts using the thumb or longtail method.

**Set-up row (WS):** K2 (p1, k1) to last 3 sts, p1, k2.

Row 1 (RS): P2 (k1, p1) to last 3 sts, k1, p2. Row 2 (WS): K2 (p1, k1) to last 3 sts, p1, k2. Repeat the last two rows 7 times. (16 rows).

#### **CABLE PATTERN**

Row 1 (RS): P2, k4, p1, k4, p2tog, k4, p1, k4, p1, k4, p2. 28 sts

Row 2 (WS): K2 (p4, k1, p4, k1) twice, p4, k2.

Row 3: P2 (c4F, p1, k4, p1) twice, c4F, p2.

Row 4: As Row 2.

Row 5: P2 (k4, p1) four times, k4, p2.

Row 6: As Row 2.

Repeat the cable pattern 16 times in total, working the P2tog decrease given in bold in Row 1 as P1 after the first repeat.

Next row (RS): P2, (k1, p1) 6 times, kfb, (k1, p1) 5 times, k1, p2. 29 sts.

Next row (WS): K2 (p1, k1) to last 3 sts, p1,

Next row (RS): P2 (k1, p1) to last 3 sts, k1,

Repeat the last two rows 7 times. (16 rows). Cast off in rib.

#### **POMPOMS**

Make two large pompoms of equal size using your remaining yarn.

The easiest way to do this is to unwind the remaining yarn and hold both ends together, and then find the middle point to cut.

You should now have two equal amounts of your yarn.

Save a 20cm length from each length to tie around the middle of your pompom.

Either use a pompom maker, or wind the yarn loosely around three fingers until it's used up, then tie it around the middle and cut the two resulting loops.

If you're using this method, you'll need to trim your pompom to make it even all the way around.


Finish by rolling the pompom between your palms to lightly felt it.

#### **MAKING UP**

Fold your beanie hat in half with RS together, and join up the side seams using mattress stitch, remembering that the RS of the work will be the WS of the ribbed edging once it's folded up.

Stitch a pompom to each of the top corners, making sure they are well secured. 🧔

#### Crocheting in the round

is speedy, simple and beautifully effective for making impact accessories. This gorgeous cushion cover, with its charming leaf and flower embellishments, is perfect for practising trebles. The yarn used in this project is a super chunky and super soft yarn making your cushion extra touchy-feely!

#### Materials

Yarn

MC: 4 x 50g balls of Debbie Bliss Paloma in Jade (shade 28) Flowers:

Scraps of DK-weight yarn in six contrasting colours:

A off-white B pale orange

C orange

D pink

E light pink F red

Leaves:

Scraps of DK yarn in one colour:

G pale green

Hooks

7mm (UK 2, US K-10½) crochet hook 4mm (UK 8, US G-6) crochet hook

Accessories
 40cm (16in) round cushion pad

#### Yarn detail

- Super chunky weight
- ♦ 60% alpaca, 40% wool
- + 50g/65m
- Hand wash
- + £6.95

#### Tension

10 sts x 4½ rows over a 10cm /4in square worked in treble crochet using a 7mm (US K-10½) hook and MC.

#### Finished measurements

Finished cushion cover fits a cushion pad 40cm (16in) in diameter.

#### Pattern notes

The French knots are worked using a darning needle. Bring yarn out to RS. Wrap yarn around needle 2 or 3 times, pushing wraps close to crocheted cushion surface. Pull needle slowly through wraps to form a small decorative knot. This will secure the flowers and leaves to the cushion.

#### Abbreviations

ss slip stitch

#### TO MAKE THE CUSHION COVER FRONT

**Foundation ring:** Using a 7mm hook and MC, make 6ch and join with ss in first ch to form a ring.

**Round 1 (RS):** 3ch (counts as first tr), 11tr in ring, join with a ss in top of first 3-ch. 12 sts. Cont in rounds with RS always facing you.

**Round 2:** 3ch, 1tr in same place as last ss, 2tr in next st and every st to end of round, join with a ss in top of first 3-ch. 24 sts.

**Round 3:** 3ch, 1tr in same place as last ss, \*1tr in next st, 2tr in each of next 2 sts; rep from \* to last 2 sts, 1tr in next st, 2tr in last st, join with a ss in top of first 3-ch. 40 sts.

**Round 4:** 3ch, 1tr in same place as last ss, \*1tr in each of next 3 sts, 2tr in next st; rep from \* to last 3 sts, 1tr in each of last 3 sts, join with a ss in top of first 3-ch. 50 sts.

**Round 5:** 3ch, 1tr in same place as last ss, \*1tr in each of next 4 sts, 2tr in next st; rep from \* to last 4 sts, 1tr in each of last 4 sts, join with a ss in top of first 3-ch. 60 sts.

**Round 6:** 3ch, 1tr in same place as last ss, \*1tr in each of next 5 sts, 2tr in next st; rep from \*to last 5 sts, 1tr in each of last 5 sts, join with a ss in top of first 3-ch. 70 sts.

**Round 7:** 3ch, 1tr in same place as last ss, \*1tr in each of next 6 sts, 2tr in next st; rep from \* to last 6 sts, 1tr in each of last 6 sts, join with a ss in top of first 3-ch. 80 sts.

**Round 8:** 3ch, 1tr in same place as last ss, \*1tr in each of next 7 sts, 2tr in next st; rep from \*to last 7 sts, 1tr in each of last 7 sts, join with a ss in top of first 3-ch. 90 sts.

**Round 9:** 3ch, 1tr in same place as last ss, \*1tr in each of next 8 sts, 2tr in next st; rep from \* to last 8 sts, 1tr in each of last 8 sts, join with a ss in top of first 3-ch. 100 sts. Fasten off.

#### TO MAKE THE CUSHION COVER BACK

Make exactly as for the front.

#### TO MAKE THE FIVE-PETAL FLOWERS

(Make two in A, and one each in B, C, D, E and F)  $\,$ 

**Foundation ring:** Using a 4mm (US size G-6) hook, make 6ch and join with a ss in first ch to form a ring.

**Round 1 (RS):** 1ch, 15dc in ring, join with a ss in first dc.


Cont in rounds with RS facing.

**Round 2:** \*3ch, 1tr in each of next 2 dc, 3ch, 1ss in next dc; rep from \* 4 times more. 5 petals.


Fasten off.

Using a yarn sewing needle, sew in the beginning yarn tail around centre to close hole. Sew in the other yarn end on the wrong side of the flower.

#### **CHART 2: LEAF**




Using a yarn sewing needle and a contrasting colour (A, B, C, D, E, F or G), embroider three French knots in the centre of each flower.

#### TO MAKE THE LEAVES (MAKE SIX)

Foundation chain: Using a 4mm hook and G, make 8ch.

Round 1 (RS): 1dc in 2nd ch from hook, 1htr in next ch, 1tr in each of next 2 ch, 2tr in next ch, 1htr in next ch, 1dc in next ch (this is the last ch), 2ch, with RS of work still facing, turn work so that underside of foundation chain is uppermost and continue working around other side of this chain, 1dc in first ch, 1htr in next ch, 2tr in next ch, 1tr in each of next 2 ch, 1htr in next ch, 1dc in last ch, join with a ss in first dc of round (in tip of leaf). Fasten off.

#### **CHART 3: 5-PETAL FLOWER**



#### TO FINISH THE COVER

Using a yarn sewing needle, sew in any yarn ends on the crochet pieces.

Place the cushion cover front on the cushion cover back, with wrong sides together, then join the layers with a double crochet seam

Using a 7mm hook and MC, insert hook through a tr on both layers, yrh and draw a loop through, 1ch, then working through both layers with each st, work 1dc in same



st as ss was worked, 1dc in each st until the opening is just big enough to push through the cushion pad.

Insert the cushion pad.

Cont in dc until the seam is complete (total of 100 dc around edge), then join with a ss in first dc. Do not cut off yarn.

To complete the cushion, work a shell edging all around the seam.

#### TO WORK THE SHELL EDGING

Round 1 (RS): Miss first dc, 5tr in next dc, miss next dc, 1ss in next dc, \*miss next dc, 5tr in next dc, miss next dc, 1ss in next st; rep from \* to end, working last ss in same place as ss at beginning of round. 25 shells made.

Fasten off.

#### **TO SEW ON THE FLOWERS & LEAVES**

Arrange the flowers and leaves at the centre of the cushion cover front, so they are sitting within the first 3 or 4 rounds. Position one flower at the very centre and the six remaining flowers around it. Position the ends of the leaves between the flowers so they point outward. Sew the arrangement in place with French knots using a yarn sewing needle and matching thread.





#### Tension

28 sts and 30 rows to 10cm over cable pattern using 4mm (UK 8, US 6) needles.

Pattern is worked in the lovely soft Blacker Swan yarn with a number of cables across the front but only one on the back. The rest of the back is worked in 2x2 rib to give a slightly fitted shape.

Row 1: K3 (2:2:2:2:2:2:1:1:3), (p2, k2) 2 (3:4:0:1:2:3:4:0:1) times, (p2, k16) 5 (5:7:7:7:7:7:7:9:9) times, p2 (k2, p2) 2 (3:4:0:1:2:3:4:0:1) times, k2 (2:2:2:2:2:2:1:1:3). Row 2: P2 (2:2:2:2:2:2:1:1:3), (k2, p2) 2 (3:4:0:1:2:3:4:0:1) times, (k2,

**Row 2:** P2 (2:2:2:2:2:1:1:3), (k2, p2) 2 (3:4:0:1:2:3:4:0:1) times, (k2, p16) 5 (5:7:7:7:7:7:7:9:9) times, k2, (p2, k2) 2 (3:4:0:1:2:3:4:0:1) times, p2 (2:2:2:2:2:2:1:1:3).

Rep these 2 rows 3 times more.

#### Change to 4mm needles.

Work staghorn cables over each group of 18 sts.

Row 1 (RS): P2, k16.

Row 2 and all WS rows: p16, k2.

Row 3: P2, k4, 2/2 RC, 2/2 LC, k4.

**Row 5:** P2, k2, 2/2 RC, k4, 2/2 LC, k2.

Row 7: P2, 2/2 RC, k8, 2/2 LC.

**Row 9:** as row 1.

**Row 10:** as row 2.

Continue in pattern as set to 49 (49:50:50:51:51:52:52:53:53) cm.

#### SHAPE ARMHOLE AND NECK

Cast off 3 (3:3:3:3:4:4:4:4) sts, patt 43 (49:50:52:55:58:56:59:61:67).

K 14 (**16**:16:**16**:18:**18**:20:**20**:20:**20**) and leave on holder, patt to end.

Cont on last set of sts for right neck.

**Row 1:** Cast off 3 (**3**:3:**3**:3:4:**4**:4:4) at beg, patt to end.

Row 2: K1, k3togtbl, patt to last 3, k2tog, k1.

Row 3: K1, k2tog, patt to end.

Rep rows 2 and 3 once more then dec as on row 2, 3 (3:3:3:3:4:4:4:5) times more.

Next row: K1, k2tog, patt to end.

**Next row:** Patt to end.

Rep last 2 rows to 22 (**26**:26:**28**:28:**28**:

30:30:32:32) sts.

Cont until armhole measures 18 (19:20:21:22:23:24:25:27:29) cm.

#### **SHAPE SHOULDER**

Cast off 5 (**6**:6:**7**:7:**7**:7:**8:8**) at beg next and foll 2 alt rows.

Cast off rem 7 (7:7:7:7:9:9:8:8) sts.

Return to first set of sts and work to match, reversing shapings.


#### **BACK**

Work rib as for front on 112 (**120**:128:**132**: 140:**148**:156:**162**:166:**178**) sts. **Change to 4mm needles.**

Cont in patt until work measures same as front to shoulders.

#### **SHAPE SHOULDERS**

Cast off 5 (**6**:6:**7**:7:**7**:7:**7**:8:**8**) at beg next 6 rows.

Cast off 7 (**7**:7:**7**:7:**9**:**9**:8:**8**) sts at beg next 2 rows.

Join shoulders.

#### **NECKBAND (WORKED IN THE ROUND)**

With 3.75mm circular needle and with RS facing, knit 42 (42:48:48:50:52:54:60:66:74) from back neck, pick up and knit 45 (45:45:47:47:47:49:49:53:53) down left side of neck, 14 (16:16:16:18:18:20:20:20:20) from holder and 45 (45:45:47:47:47:49:49:53:53) up right side of neck.
Knit 9 rows, cast off loosely.

#### **SLEEVES**

Using 3.75mm straight needles, cast on 56 (**56**:56:**56**:5**6**:74:**74**:7**4**) sts. **Row 1:** (p2, k16) 3 (**3**:3:**3**:3:**4**:**4**:**4**:**4**) times, p2.

This sets position of cables.

Work in staghorn cable for 29 more rows **Change to 4mm needles**. Cont in st st inc 1 st each end of every 6th row to 72 (**76**:84:**9** 0:94:**98**:102:**104**:106:**110**) sts. When sleeve measures 46cm.

#### **SHAPE TOP**

Cast off 3 (**3**:3:**3**:3:4:**4**:4:**4**) sts, at beg next 4 rows.

60 (64:72:78:82:86:86:88:90:94) sts.
Cast off 2 (2:2:2:2:2:3:3:3:3) sts at beg next 4 rows. 52 (56:64:70:76:78:74:76:78:82) sts.
Dec 1 at each end of every row 0 (0:0:3:3:4:4:4:5:5) times.
Cast off rem 52 (56:64:64:70:70:66:68:68:72) sts, loosely.

#### MAKING UP

Set in sleeves.

Join side and sleeve seams leaving bottom edge of sides open for approx 15cm.



Next row (WS): K3, (p2, k2) 4 times, p2, k3. Now work 10 rows in rib setting sts as folls: Rib row 1 (picot): Cast on 2 sts, cast off 2 sts, 1 st on RH needle, k4, (p2, k2) 4 times, k3.

**Rib row 2 (picot):** Cast on 2 sts, cast off 2 sts, 1 st on RH needle, k2, (p2, k2) 4 times, p2, k3.

**Rib row 3:** K5, (p2, k2) 4 times, k3. **Rib row 4:** K3, (p2, k2) 4 times, p2, k3. Work rib rows 1-4 once more.

Work rib rows 1-2 once more.

Next row (RS)(inc): K3, (k1, m1) 8 times, k2,

(m1, k1) 8 times, k3. 40 sts. **Next row (WS):** K3, p to last 3 sts, k3.

**Next row (WS):** K3, p to last 3 sts, k3. Now work 4 rows in st st with garter st edging patt as folls:

**Patt row 1 (picot):** Cast on 2 sts, cast off 2 sts, 1 st on RH needle, k to end.

Patt row 2 (picot): Cast on 2 sts, cast off 2 sts, 1 st on RH needle, k2, p to last 3 sts, k3.

Patt row 3: Knit.

**Patt row 4:** K3, p2 to last 3 sts, k3. These 4 rows form the st st with garter st edging patt.

Cont to work these 4 rows until work measures 35.5cm (14 in), ending with RS facing for next row.

Leave sts on a holder.

#### **CRAVAT (SECOND HALF)**

Work as for first half to \*\*.

#### **CRAVAT SPLIT SHAPING**

**Next row (RS) (dec):** K3, (k2tog) 8 times, k2, (ssk) 8 times, k3. 24 sts.

Next row (WS): K3, (p2, k2) 4 times, p2, k3. Now work 10 rows for cravat split as folls: Split row 1 (RS) (picot): Cast on 2 sts, cast

off 2 sts, 1 st on RH needle, k4, p2, k2, cast

#### **CRAVAT (FIRST HALF)**

Using 5mm needles work picot cast on as folls:

\*Cast on 5 sts using the cable cast on method, cast off 2 sts, slip st on RH needle back onto LH needle\* (3 sts now on LH needle) rep from \* to \* until there are 39 sts on RH needle, cast on 1 sts. 40 sts.

Work 4 rows in garter st ending with RS facing for next row.

Work 24 rows in lace patt as folls:

**Lace patt row 1 (RS):** K3, yo, ssk, k2, yo, ssk, p2, yo, k4, ssk, k6, k2tog, k4, yo, p2, k2, yo,

ssk, k5.

Lace patt row 2 (WS): K3, yo, p2tog, p2, yo, p2tog, k2, p1, yo, p4, p2tog, p4, p2tog tbl, p4, yo, p1, k2, p2, yo, p2tog, p2, k3.

Lace patt row 3 (picot): Cast on 2 sts, cast off 2 sts, 1 st on RH needle, k2, yo, ssk, k2,

off 2 sts, 1 st on RH needle, k2, yo, ssk, k2, yo, ssk, p2, k2, yo, k4, ssk, k2, k2tog, k4, yo, k2, p2, k2, yo, ssk, k5.

Lace patt row 4 (picot): Cast on 2 sts, cast

Split row 6 (rib row 4) (picot): Cast on 2 sts, cast off 2 sts, 1 st on RH needle, k2, (p2, k2) 4 times, p2, k3.

Now work 2nd split as folls:

**Split row 7 (RS):** K5, p2, k2, cast off 6 sts (10 sts on RH needle), k1, p2, k5. 18 sts.

Split row 8 (WS): K3, p2, k2, p2, turn work to RS and using first st on LH needle cast on 6 sts, turn work to WS so 15 sts on RH needle) p2, k2, p2, k3. 24 sts.

Split row 9 (rib row 3) (picot): Cast on 2 sts, cast off 2 sts, 1 st on RH needle, k4, (p2, k2) 4 times, k3.

Split row 10 (rib row 4) (picot): Cast on 2 sts, cast off 2 sts, 1 st on RH needle, k2, (p2, k2) 4 times, p2, k3.

Next row (RS) (inc): K3, (k1, m1) 8 times, k2, (m1, k1) 8 times, k3. 40 sts.

Next row (WS): K3, p to last 3 sts, k3. Now work 4 rows in st st with garter st edging patt as folls:

Patt row 1 (picot): Cast on 2 sts, cast off 2 sts, 1 st on RH needle, k to end.

Patt row 2 (picot): Cast on 2 sts, cast off 2 sts, 1 st on RH needle, k2, p to last 3 sts, k3. Patt row 3: Knit.

Patt row 4: K3, p2 to last 3 sts, kK3. These 4 rows form the st st with garter st edging patt.

Cont to work these 4 rows until work measures 35.5cm (14in), ending with RS facing for next row.

Leave sts on a holder.

#### **MAKING UP**

Grafting the two halves together: Before grafting make sure you have your yarn in the correct place to begin. Place knitting on two needles with the points of the needles on right, and the wrong sides of the knitting facing each other. Your yarn should also be on right. Cut yarn, leaving a long piece to graft sts together with approx 3 times the width of the knitting. Thread yarn onto a blunt sewing needle. You are now ready to begin grafting.

Joining stocking stitch:

First, set up the first two sts.

Put the sewing needle in the first st of the front knitting needle purlways and pull the yarn all the way through. Do not drop the st off the knitting needle.

Next put the sewing needle into the first st of the back knitting needle knitways and pull all the way through. Again, do not drop the st off the knitting needle.

You have now set up the first two stitches.

\*\* Now put the sewing needle into the first st of the front knitting needle knitways and pull the yarn all the way through. Drop st off the knitting needle.

Put the sewing needle purlways into the next st on the front knitting needle and pull through. Do not drop the st off the knitting needle.

Put the sewing needle purlways into the first st on the back knitting needle and pull through. Drop the st off the knitting needle. Put the sewing needle into the next st on the back knitting needle knitways and pull through. Do not drop the st off the knitting needle.

Rep from \*\* to the end of your row.

Sew in all ends and press/block.



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#### **Needle Sizer**

Identify needle sizes and use to measure gauge of stitches or rows. Magnifying strip. 2 – 12mm 0 – 17 U.S.

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## DIARY OF A knitting group

We catch up with Aneeta and find out how the members of Knitting SOS have been getting on...



I'm Aneeta. I am a knitting teacher and author based in East London. I also run a monthly knitting group called Knitting SOS. Knitting SOS is an

online service knitters can use for their knitting questions, but I wanted to have a real live group too so that people could come together with their crafting and queries. I'm a firm believer in the joy of crafting with others and the monthly, free, drop-in Knitting SOS group is one of my favourite activities of every month!

After the completion of her fabulous coat a few months ago, you might be forgiven for thinking that Francine would want to take things easy for a bit... but you'd be dead wrong! She's dived straight into Fair Isle with this gorgeous Kate Davies beret. It's such an impressive skill for any knitter's repertoire and was a definite hit with all at Knitting SOS.

My favourite project from this month's SOS is Juliette's knitted bath mat. I've always had a hankering to knit a bath mat, so I get nearly as much pleasure from teaching one as I would from knitting it myself. This pattern is knitted using Sirdar Denim Ultra which is a perfect mixture of cotton, wool and acrylic so will be hard wearing and soft on bare feet.

Alice is new to Knitting SOS and I'm afraid she bore the brunt of one of my biggest knitting pet peeves. As a teacher, I'm a big believer in approaching things at the correct time with the best amount of experience under your belt. What I'm trying to say is that if you are a confident 'basic' knitter, then that's the time to move onto more challenging patterns, using the

skills you have acquired along the way. On the other hand, if you are completely new to knitting, then your first project probably shouldn't be a mohair shawl knitted in a lace stitch! Poor Alice was bravely struggling along with this ambitious project, with only a few basic skills under her belt. As a knitting teacher, I think this lack of knowledge can often make the creative process less enjoyable, and even put beginners off knitting all together - which is not what we want at all! Alice was so determined to keep going with her project that we did all

we could to get her back on track with this shawl. She's also looking forward to joining a few beginners' classes to build her confidence and basic knitting skills.

#### It's never too late...

Scotia was taking advantage of the turn in the weather to get on with her Christmas knitting. She knits for gifts and local craft fairs so I always look forward to seeing what she comes up with over the months before the big day. Remember it's never too late to knit a few things for Christmas knitting if you have time to spare. And if you've done all yours, you could make a start on projects for Christmas 2015!

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

#### 77 (85:95:105:115) sts.

Cont until work meas 36 (**37**:38:**39**:40) cm, ending with RS facing for next row.

#### **SHAPE SLEEVES**

Inc 1 st at each end of next 10 (10:10:7:5) rows, then on – (–:-:3:5) foll alt rows, taking inc sts into patt. 97 (105:115:125:135) sts. Work 0 (0:0:1:1) row, ending with RS facing for next row. Cast on 2 (3:4:4:4) sts at beg of next 4 rows. 105 (117:131:141:151) sts. Cont until sleeve meas 17 (17.5:18:18:18:18.5) cm from last cast-on sts, ending with RS facing for next row.

#### **SHAPE SHOULDERS**

Keeping patt correct, cast off 14 (16:18:18:18) sts at beg of next 2 rows, then 7 (8:9:11:12) sts at beg of foll 2 rows, then 7 [8:10:11:13) sts at beg of foll 2 rows, then 7 (9:10:12:13) at beg of foll 2 rows. 35 (35:37:37:39) sts.

Dec 1 st at each end of 3rd and foll 2 alt rows. 29 (**29**:31:**31**:33) sts.

Work 1 row.

With 7mm needle, cast off in rib.

#### **MAKING UP**

Join both shoulder seams using back stitch, or mattress stitch if preferred.


#### **SLEEVE BORDERS (BOTH ALIKE)**

Using 5mm needles pick up and knit 57 (**59**:61:**61**:63) sts evenly across sleeve edge. Beg with row 2, work in rib as given for back and front for 6 rows, ending with WS facing for next row.

Cast off in rib on WS.

Sew up side seams using back stitch, or mattress stitch if preferred.

#### **SCARF**

With 4.5mm needles, cast on 60 sts. **Row 1:** \*K1, p1, rep from \* to end. **Row 2:** \*P1, k1 rep from \* to end. These 2 rows form the moss stitch. **Next row:** P2,\* k1,m1, k2, p2, k4, m1, k3, p2 rep from \* to last 16sts, k1, m1, k2, p2, k4, m1, k3, (k1, p1)

#### Change to 5mm needles.

**Row 1:** (P1, k1) twice, \*p8, k2, p4, k2 rep from \* to end.

Now work in pattern as follows: **Row 2 (RS):** \*P2, k4, p2, k8 rep

from \*to last 4 sts,(k1, p1) twice.

**Row 3:** As row 1.

twice. 68 sts.

**Row 4:**\* P2, C4B, p2, c4b, c4f, rep from \* to last 4 sts, (k1, p1) twice.

**Row 5:** As row 1.

**Row 6:** As row 2.

Rep last 2 rows once more and row 1 again.

**Row 10:** \*P2, c4b, p2, c4f, c4b, rep from \* to last 4 sts (k1, p1) twice.

**Row 11:** As row 1.

**Row 12:** As row 2.

Rep last 2 rows once more then row 1 again.

**Row 16:** As row 4.

Cont in pattern as set until work measures 168 cm.

**Next row:** Pattern across row but decreasing 8 sts evenly over row. 60 sts.

Change to 4.5 mm needles. Work in moss st for 2 rows. Cast off.

#### **MAKING UP**

Sew in loose ends.

Fold scarf in half and starting at the back middle point and using mattress stitch sew down the back seam for 27cm.

Make a tassel and attach to the point at back of head.

Make tassels and attach to each end of scarf.

#### KNITTED FLOWERS

I have lots of bits of yarn left over from my knitting and thought it would be a great idea to crochet up some flowers to sew onto a bedspread - but I've struggled to get to grips with crochet. Is there another way of making up flowers with the scraps?

Jo says: You could buy a Prym flower loom (£7.99); it has patterns to make different shapes and sizes easily made by

just adjusting the pegs. They are very quick and great fun to make, but the loops of yarns might get tangled when you wash the bedspread. For longer lasting flowers, buy 'Knitted Flowers (Twenty to Make)' by Susie Johns (www.searchpress. co.uk). Whether you want to knit a rose, poppy, daisy, or even some cherry blossom

I am struggling to decide what to knit with it as I have never knitted with a fur yarn before. Do you have any design suggestions?

Susan Cliff, Swindon

Sarah says: As you can see from the picture Ophelia is a fur yarn with a metallic thread in it. The yarn has a lovely texture and knits on 6mm needles so it should knit up quickly. I would suggest that you make accessories from it such as a scarf or this short cropped cardigan which would be

a fab top for parties or evenings out. The pattern is available from www.wool4less. co.uk. or call 0845 003 0775.

#### GOOD WOOD

I'm making myself a knitted cardigan in natural cream coloured wool and wanted to buy some simple wooden buttons to match the style. I can only find plastic ones in my local craft shop. Do you know where I can get some? Susan Cliff, Swindon

Sarah says: I think these buttons made by Coats Crafts will be perfect to go with a natural coloured wool. They are made from wood and have a burnt effect which gives them a lovely golden colour to complement your wool. They are available online at www.deramores.com or at Hobbycraft stores for £2.09 per pack of 3.



#### **KOOL-AID**

I have seen reference on the internet to dyeing yarn with Kool-Aid which is a colourful flavoured drink. As I can't find it for sale in any supermarkets, I thought you may be able to tell me if I can buy it in the UK, or is there an alternative? Also, as washing powders can remove most food and drink nowadays, will it wash out?

Mary Simpson, Beverley

Jo says: It's the amount of citric acid in Kool-Aid that makes it good for dyeing wool, hair and popcorn, not to mention cleaning the dishwasher, making lip gloss, play dough, drinks and adding to food! It's available in the UK from www. dtcrafts.co.uk. You will


need one pack (50p) per 25g of yarn which must be non-synthetic. Saturate the yarn with water and place in a saucepan, mix the Kool-Aid with water and pour over the saturated wool. Slowly bring to the boil, take it off the heat and let it cool. You will find that the yarn will soak up every bit of colour and any resulting water will be clear. Let the yarn dry and you will have one colourfast hand dyed ball of yarn.

#### SIZE MATTERS

I have substituted the yarn used in a pattern to one I already had at home so I am going to knit a gauge swatch. What size should it be?

Carol Price, Falmouth

Sarah says: A gauge swatch needs to be big enough for you to measure it easily. Normally you measure the gauge over 10cm so I would recommend that you knit a swatch about 15cm square. Although if your pattern includes a cable or textured pattern, your gauge swatch should include one repeat so may need to be a bit bigger.



#### SHETLAND FOR STEEKING

I want to make a steeked tea cosy and the pattern says to use pure wool. I have some acrylic DK, will I be able to use it? Susan Dawson, London

Jo says: As it's a small item I would suggest making a tension square and trying it out. You would need to machine stitch around the section you want to cut. Adding a bit of cotton fabric to the back and sewing a few times will help to keep the knitting stable. If this doesn't work, try any DK wool that doesn't say 'superwash' on it. Superwash yarn has been treated so it won't felt and you do need the yarn to become sticky when wet so that the stitches won't unravel. Jamieson and Smith's Shetland DK (www.jamiesonsofshetland.co. uk) is perfect for steeking or felting project.

With 225 colours to choose from. it costs £2.90 for a 25g ball.

## KNITTING FOR BABIES

Aneeta gives advice on quick knits and choosing the best yarns for newborns

#### **BABY STEPS**

I'm quite a new knitter but my friend is about to have a baby and I'd love to knit something. Can you suggest something quite simple that won't take me months. I'm still quite slow! Nicola Carstairs, Belfast,

Aneeta says: There are definitely simple patterns available for baby gifts. I would avoid toys as, while they can be relatively straightforward to knit, but fiddly to sew up. I have a free pattern available that I like to teach as a beginner's second project (after a scarf of course) for baby bootees. They are quick to knit and a great way to learn about reading knitting patterns. You'll find it on www. knittingsos.co.uk/freeknitting-patterns



I would like to knit a baby blanket as a present for my sister but I have no idea where to start. Any ideas please? Jane Percival, Nuneaton

Aneeta says: The best place to start is to speak to your sister! A baby blanket for a new mum is a very personal thing and while I'm sure she'll love it that you want to knit it for her, she'll enjoy it even more





if she can have some input on the pattern. Consider your skill level when choosing a pattern as you need to enjoy the process of knitting too, of course! So ask your sister if she has a colour preference or an affinity to any particular fibre. She may want cotton for a summer baby or wool for a winter baby. And when it comes to colours, would she prefer brights or neutrals? Let this be a collaborative

Aneeta says: In my opinion, the first thing to look at when knitting for babies is the washing instruction on the yarn label! Be sure to use a fibre that is machine-washable. No matter how luxurious a yarn might feel, no new parent is going to want to handwash delicate items. Also, take care to not choose anything too fluffy or textured as a baby's soft skin will prefer a smooth knitted

fabric. Beyond these practical considerations, you can see you don't have to be limited to just baby yarns. Use your imagination in terms of colours and patterns to create a unique wardrobe for your baby!



tips for knitting for babies

Machine-washable baby knits are a must. They'll end up at the bottom of the laundry basket if not!

Include the yarn label with knitted gifts for baby, to show the fibre and washing instructions

When knitting for a baby consider the month they are born. It'll help you choose what to knit - lightweight yarns in summer, cosier for winter

C4F slip the next 2 sts onto the cable needle and leave at the front of the work, k2, then k2 from the cable needle

**C6B** slip the next 3 sts onto the cable needle and leave at the back of the work, k3, then k3 from the cable needle

C6F slip the next 3 sts onto the cable needle and leave at the front of the work, k3, then k3 from the cable needle

#### TO MAKE THE HAT

With 9mm needles, cast on 62 sts.

**Row 1(RS):** P2, (k2, p2) to end. **Row 2 (WS):** K2, (p2, k2) to end.

Rep the last 2 rows twice more and the first row again.

Inc row K2, (p2, k1, m1, k1, p2, k1, m1, k1, p2, k2) to end. 72 sts.

Change to 10mm needles.

**Row 1 (RS):** P2, (k12, p2) to end. **Row 2 (WS):** K2, (p12, k2) to end.

Row 3 and 4: As 1st and 2nd rows.

**Row 5:** P2, (C6B, C6F, p2) to end.

Row 6: As 2nd row.

Row 7 and 8: As 1st and 2nd rows.

These 8 rows form the patt.

Work a further 18 rows.

**Dec row:** P2, \* slip next 3 sts onto cable needle and hold at back of work, k1, then (k next st tog with next st on cable needle) twice, k1 from cable needle, slip next 3 sts onto cable needle and hold at front of work, k1, then (sl1 from cable needle, k1 from left hand needle, skpo) twice, k1 from cable needle, p2; rep from \* to end. 52 sts.

Next row: K2, (p8, k2) to end.

Work 4 more rows as set.

**Next row:** P2, (C4B, C4F, p2) to end.

Work 3 more rows as set.

**Dec row:** P2, \* slip next 2 sts onto cable needle and hold at back of work, then (k next st tog with next st on cable needle) twice, slip next 2 sts onto cable needle and hold at front of work, then (sl1 from cable needle, k1 from left front needle, skpo) twice, p2; rep from \* to end. 32 sts.

Next row: K2tog, (p4, k2tog) to end. 26 sts. Next row: P1, (k2tog, skpo, p1) to end. 16 sts

Next row: K1, (p2tog, k1) to end. 11 sts. Next row: P1, (p2tog) to end. 6 sts. Break off yarn, thread through rem sts and fasten off. Join seam.

Attach the pompom to top of hat.

This round sets rib.

Cont in rib until work meas 3 (3:4:4)cm, inc 2 (0:2:0) sts across last round.

142 (156:170:184) sts.

Change to 4mm needles.

Rounds 1 and 2: Using A, knit.

Rounds 3 and 4: \* K2A, k5B, rep from \* to last 2 sts, k2A.

Round 5 and 6: Using A, knit.

Rounds 7 to 12: As rounds 3 and 4.

These 12 rounds set pattern.

Cont in patt as set until work meas 22 (25:30:33)cm, ending 7 (8:9:9) sts before beg of round marker.

Shape armholes

Next round: Cast off 13 (15:17:18) sts, patt until there are 57 (63:67:74) sts on RH needle, turn and working in rows not rounds, cont on these sts only for front.

Next row (WS): Patt.

#### SHAPE FRONT NECK

Next row: SI1, k1, psso, patt until there are 25 (30:30:34) sts, k2tog, turn and leave rem sts on a holder.

Next row: Patt to last 2 sts, p2togtbl. These 2 rows set armhole and neck shaping. Dec 1 st at armhole edge of next 5 rows then on 1 (1:2:2) foll alt rows and at same time dec 1 st at neck edge of next and every foll alt row.

Dec 1 st at neck edge only of 2nd and 2 (8:6:7) foll alt rows then on every foll 4th row until 8 (8:10:11) sts remain.

Cont without shaping until armhole meas 14 (15:16:17)cm, ending with RS facing for next row.

#### **SHAPE SHOULDERS**

Next row: Cast off 4 (4:5:5) sts, patt to end. Work 1 row.

Cast off rem 4 (4:5:6) sts.

With RS facing working on rem sts of front, (sl1, k1, psso) 1 (1:1:0) times, patt to end. Work 1 row.

Complete to match first side of neck, reversing all shapings.

#### **BACK**

Rejoin yarn to rem sts, cast off 13 (15:17:18) sts for armhole, patt to end. 57 (63:67:74)

With RS facing, using 3.25mm needle pick up and knit 34 (37:41:45) sts evenly down left side of neck, place a marker before last st, 32 (37:40:45) sts evenly up right side of neck and knit across 25 (30:31:34) sts on holder at back neck. 92 (104:112:124) sts. Working in rounds not rows, cont as folls: Round 1: \* K2, p2, rep from \* to end.

This round sets rib.

**Round 2:** Rib to 1 st before marker, k2tog, ssk, patt to end.

Rep these 2 rounds twice more. Cast off in patt.

#### **ARMHOLES**

With RS facing, using 3.25mm needles pick up and knit 88 (**96**:104:**112**) sts evenly all round armhole edge.

Working in rounds not rows, work 6 rounds in rib as set on body. Cast off in patt.



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

Twist the yarn into a loop and form a second loop of yarn to pull through the first one.



Tighten the first loop into a knot around the second. This will be your first cast on stitch.

#### CAST ON - THUMB METHOD ◆ USE THIS FOR A STRETCHY EDGE



Twist the yarn into a loop and form a second loop of yarn to pull through the first one.



Tighten the first loop into a knot around the second. This will be your first cast on stitch.



Wrap the ball end of the yarn anticlockwise around the needle. Push the needle through the loop.



Slide the loop off your thumb and tighten both ends. Repeat steps 2-4 for each stitch.

#### CAST ON - KNITTED ON METHOD ◆ USE THIS FOR A STRONG, HARDWEARING EDGE



With the slipknot on your left needle, insert the right needle from front to back of the loop.



Wrap the ball end of the yarn anticlockwise around right needle and then pull this through the loop.



Now insert the left needle tip through the front of new loop, dropping it off the right needle.



Repeat steps 1-3 as needed, forming new stitches from the top stitch on the left needle.

#### CAST OFF → HOW TO FINISH YOUR WORK



To begin, knit only the first two stitches in the cast off row.



Push the left needle through the first stitch, then lift it over the second stitch and off right needle.



With one stitch now on the right needle, knit another stitch and then Pull the tail through the final cast repeat step 2 until the row end.



Cut the yarn with a 15cm or 6in tail. off stitch.

#### KNIT • WORKED ON THE RIGHT SIDE IN STOCKING STITCH



Insert the right needle into the left needle's top stitch, from front to back with the yarn at the back.



Hold the yarn around your right index finger and then wrap it clockwise around the right needle.



Using the right needle, pull this new loop of yarn through the stitch on the left needle.



Ease the stitch off the left needle keeping the new stitch on the right needle. Repeat steps 1-4.

#### PURL WORKED ON THE WRONG SIDE IN STOCKING STITCH



Insert the right needle into the front With your right index finger, wrap of the left needle's top stitch with the yarn in front.



the yarn anticlockwise around the top of the right needle.



Using the right needle, pull this new loop of yarn back through the front of the stitch.



Ease the stitch off the left needle, keeping the new stitch on the right. Repeat steps 1-4.



#### **♦ MATERIALS**

Tells you recommended needle size, how much yarn for each size and whether you need any extra items, such as buttons or zips or other tools

#### **+** TENSION

How many rows and stitches per 10cm you need to knit your garment to the correct size. If you've got too many try a larger needle, if you've got too few, try a smaller needle.

#### HOW TO READ KNITTING CHARTS

Knitting charts follow the same rules unless the pattern states otherwise. Right side rows are usually odd numbers and are worked right to left. Wrong side rows are normally even numbers and are worked left to right. Pattern repeats will be contained in an area outlined in red and some charts will have further coloured outlines for different sizes. The key will give you each symbol and tell you what stitch it is.



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
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
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## l've started so l'Il finish!

anuary is a great time for knitters to take stock. How many projects do you have tucked away half-finished? What yarn did you buy last year and not get around to using? Were there techniques you wanted to try that you shied away from? I hold up my hand as a terrible project procrastinator. 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
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

#### Yarn detail

- Super chunky weight
   70% wool, 30% alpaca
- + 100g/80m
- Hand wash
- + £8.95 per ball

#### Tension

10 sts and 11 rows over stocking stitch using 10mm (UK 000/US 15) knitting needles.

This is a smaller needle size and tighter tension than is given on the ballband.

#### **Finished measurements**

To fit an average adult head. This fabric is very stretchy.

#### Pattern notes

The chart for this hat shows the whole pattern for the beginning and end sections, with the repeated main section outlined in red.

#### **Special abbreviations**

K3tog Insert needle into front of three stitches from left to right and knit them together

#### **HAT**

Cast on 45 sts using the thumb or long tail method.

**Set up row (WS):** P1 (k1, p1) to end. **Row 1 (RS):** K1b (p1, k1b) to end. **Row 2 (WS):** P1 (k1, p1) to end.

Repeat the last 2 rows two times in total, and row 2 once more

#### **LACE PATTERN**

**Row 1 (RS):** K2tog, k to end. 44 sts.

Row 2 (and all WS rows): Purl.

**Row 3:** K1 (ssk, k5, yo) to last st, k1.

**Row 5:** K1 (ssk, k4, yo, k1) 6 times, k1.

**Row 7:** K1 (ssk, k2, yo, k3) 6 times, k1.

**Row 9:** K1 (ssk, k2, yo, k3) 6 times, k1.

**Row 11:** K1 (ssk, k1, yo, k4) 6 times, k1.

Row 13: K1 (ssk, yo, k5) 6 times, k1.

Row 15: K1 (k2tog, yo, k5) 6 times, k1.

**Row 17:** K1 (k2tog, k1, yo, k4) 6 times, k1.

**Row 19:** K1 (k2tog, k2, yo, k3) 6 times, k1.

Row 21: K1 (k2tog, k3, yo, k2) 6 times, k1.

Row 23: K1 (k2tog, k4, yo, k1) 6 times, k1.

**Row 25:** K1 (k2tog, K5, yo) 6 times, k1.

Row 26 (WS): Purl.

#### **CROWN SHAPING**

Row 27 (RS): K1 (k5, yo, ssk) 6 times, K1.

Row 28 (and all WS rows): Purl.

Row 29: K4, k2tog, yo, k1 (ssk, k2, k2tog, yo,

k1) 5 times, k2toq. 38 sts.

Row 31: K3 (k2tog, yo, k2, ssk) 5 times,

k2tog, yo, k3. 33 sts.

**Row 33:** K2, k2tog (yo, k2, k3tog) 5 times, yo,

k2, ssk. 27 sts.

Row 34 (WS): Purl.

Break yarn, thread through remaining sts, pull tight and fasten off.


#### **MAKING UP**

Join back seam using mattress stitch and weave in ends.

Soak hat in lukewarm water (adding wool soak if preferred). Remove from water, supported flat (to avoid stretching) and lay flat on a clean dry towel. Roll up the towel tightly to squeeze out the water from the hat

Place a small plate inside the hat, gently shaping the top of the beret over the domed bottom of the plate. This will enhance the beret shaping. Leave to dry in a warm place.



10mm (UK 000, US15) knitting needles

# Yarn detail

- + 100% wool
- + 50g/50m
- + Hand wash
- + £1.95 per ball

# **Tension**

10 sts and 14 rows to 10cm or 4in square using 10mm (UK 000, US 15) knitting needles.

# **Finished measurements**

60cm/24in circ x 40cm/16in deep

# Purl

This cowl would also look great in an ombre colourway Just choose four shades of the same colour, working from light to dark.

## **INSTRUCTIONS**

Using A and 10mm needles cast on 66 sts.

\*\*\* Knit 4 rows in garter stitch.

Begin pattern.

**Row 1 (RS):** \* P3, k3, rep from \* to end.

Row 2 (WS): Knit

Repeat these 2 rows 5 times more. \*\*\*

Break A and change to B

Work from \*\*\* to \*\*\*

Break B and change to C

Work from \*\*\* to \*\*\*

Break C and change to D

Work from \*\*\* to \*\*\* and cast off.

# **MAKING UP**

Work in ends neatly.

With wrong sides facing join piece together into a tube, match each stripe as you sew.

Turn right sides out. 💿







# COWL Materials

♦ Yarn

2 x 100g balls of Rowan Big Wool in Pine Needle (shade 077)

◆ Needles

1 pair 10mm (UK 000/ US 15) knitting needles

# Yarn detail

- ♦ 100% wool
- + 100g/80m
- Hand wash
- + £9.25 per ball

# **Tension**

9 sts and 10 to 12 rows over stocking stitch using 10mm (UK 000/ US 15) knitting needles

Exact tension is not vital for this pattern but avoid loose tension if you can, as this will make the cowl rather floppy.

# **Finished measurements**

58cm/23in circ x 40cm/16in depth

#### COWL

Using 10mm needles and the thumb or long tail method, cast on 64 stitches.

Row 1 (RS): Knit. Row 2 (WS): Knit.

These two rows form garter stitch. Repeat these last two rows a total of 27 times.

Row 55 (RS): Knit

Row 56 (WS): Cast off knitwise.

Weave in ends. Sew short edges together using mattress or back stitch.





1 x 100g ball of Rico Designs Creative Glow Worm in Fuschia (shade 005)

1 pair 10mm (UK 000/US 15) knitting

- Rico Designs Creative Glow Worm www.rico-design.de/en/home
- ◆ 54% acrylic, 30% wool, 16% glass

10 sts and 12 rows over stocking stitch using 10mm (UK 000/US 15) knitting

This is a looser tension and larger needle size than is given on the ball

# Finished measurements

To fit 15 to 18cm (6 to 7in) palm circumference at widest point. This fabric is very stretchy.

This eyelet stitch pattern changes the stitch count across rows



# **WRISTWARMERS (MAKE 2)**

Cast on 22 sts using the thumb or long tail method.

**Row 1 (RS):** P2 (k3, p2) to end.

Row 2 (WS): K2 (p3, k2) to end.

These two rows form 3 x 2 rib.

Repeat these last two rows twice. (6 rows).

**Row 7 (RS):** P2 (k1, sl2, psso, p2) to end.

**Row 8 (WS):** K2, (p1, yrn, p1, k2) to end. 22 sts.

**Row 9:** P2 (k3, p2) to end.

**Row 10:** K2 (p3, k2) to end.

These four rows set pattern.

Repeat the last four rows a total of four times

Repeat row 7 once more. 18 sts.

**Next row (WS):** K2 (p2, k2) to end. **Next row (RS):** P2 (k2, p2) to end. Repeat the last two rows once more.

**Next row (WS):** K2 (p2, k2) to end. **Next row (RS):** Cast off in rib.

# INTERIM MAKING UP

Sew long edges together using mattress or back stitch, starting from the bottom edge and stopping in line with the end of the fourth repeat.

#### **THUMBS**

Working from the top of the final repeat, and with RS facing, pick up and knit 5 sts down to where the joined edges meet, 1 st in join and 5 sts up to where the last repeat ends.

Work back and forth in st st for 6 rows, starting with a purl row.

Cast off knitwise on WS.

## **MAKING UP**

Join thumb seam and rest of long edge using mattress or back stitch.

Weave in ends.









# **Materials**

♦ Yarn

1 x 100g skein of Erika Knight Fur Wool in Pretty (shade 42)

◆ Needles

1 pair 10mm (UK 000/ US 15) knitting needles

# Yarn detail

- Erika Knight fur wool www.erikaknight.co.uk 0333 6665333
- ♦ 97% wool, 3% nylon
- + 100g/40m (44 yds)
- + Hand wash
- + £11.65 per skein

# Tension

5 sts and 10 rows to 10cm or 4in over stocking stitch using 10mm (UK 000/US 15) knitting needles Exact tension is not vital for this pattern but avoid loose tension as this could cause you to run out of yarn before the end!

# **Finished measurements**

90cm/35in long x 20cm/8in wide



# **SCARF**

Using 10mm needles cast on 1 stitch.

Row 1 (RS): Kfb. 2 sts.

Row 2 (and all WS rows): Purl.

**Row 3:** Kfb, k1. 3 sts.

**Row 5:** Kfb, k2. 4 sts.

**Row 7:** Kfb, k3. 5 sts.

Row 9: Kfb, k4. 6 sts.

**Row 11:** Kfb, k5. 7 sts.

Row 13: Kfb, k6. 8 sts.

**Row 15:** Kfb, k7. 9 sts.

Row 17: Kfb, k8. 10 sts.

Row 19: Knit.

Row 20: Purl.

Now work straight in st st for 50cm (20in) ending with a purl row.

Make scarf slot as follows:

**Next row (RS):** K5, cast off 4 sts (including 2 of the original 5 sts you just knitted at the start of this row), k3 (to end of row).

You should now have 4 central stitches cast off over the last row.

Next row (WS): P3, turn work, cable cast on

4 sts, turn work, p to end. **Next row (RS):** Knit.

Next row (and all WS rows): Purl.

Next RS row: K1, ssk, k to end. 9 sts.

Next RS row: K1, ssk, k to end. 8 sts.

Continue decreasing 1 st on each RS row as set until you have 2 sts, ending with a RS row.

Next row (WS): P2tog.

# **MAKING UP**

Fasten off remaining st and weave in ends. Scarf is worn by threading one end through the slot at the other end.





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
