

Our cover star knit is the perfect treat for spring. The lacy patterning and the saddle shoulder finishing create a stylish look to mix and match with everything in your wardrobe! It's worked in the round on circular needles.

Materials

- ◆ Yarn 5 (**6**:6:**7**:8) x 100gm balls Rowan Pure Wool Worsted in Rosy (shade 115)
- ◆ Needles 1 x 4mm (no 8, US 6) circular

needle

1 x 4.5mm (no 7, US 7) circular needle 1 set of DPNs in each size unless using the Magic Loop technique

Yarn detail

- Rowan Pure Wool Worsted www.knitrowan.com 01484 681881
- ◆ 100% wool
- 100g/200m
- ◆ Machine wash 40°
- + f8.25

Tension

20 sts and 25 rows to 10cm or 4in over st st on 4.5mm needles.

Special abbreviations

CCD

(centre double decrease) Slip 2 together , knit one and pass the slipped stitches over

Using 4mm needle cast on 182 (**202**:226:**250**:278) sts.

Ensuring sts are not twisted, join to work in the round.

Place markers at beg of round for first side seam and second side seam marker after st 91 (**101**:113:**125**:139).

Round 1: * K1, k1, rep from * to end. Cont in rib until work meas 7 (**7**:7:**8**:8) cm or 2¾ (**2³**4:2¾:**3**¼:3¼) in

Change to 4.5mm needles. Cont as folls: Next round: * K2 (7:11:15:22), (work next 15 sts at set on round 1 of chart A, k3 (3:4:5:5), work next 15 sts as set on round 1 of chart B, k3 (3:4:5:5)) twice, work next 15 sts at set on round 1 of chart A, k2 (7:11:15:22), (you should now have reached side seam marker), rep from * to end.

This round sets st st and chart placement.
Working in 8 row rep as set on chart
throughout cont as folls:Cont as set until work most 11.5

Cont as set until work meas 11.5 (12.5:13.5:15.5:17.5) cm or 4½ (5:5½:6:7) in.

SHAPE WAIST

Change to 4mm needles. Cont until work meas 16.5 (**17.5**:18.5:**20.5**:22.5)cm or 6½ (**7**:7½:**8**:9) in.

Change back to 4.5mm needles. Cont without shaping until work meas 33 (34:35:36:37) cm or 13 (13½:13¾:14¼:14¾) in

DO NOT BREAK off yarn and leave work on a st holder.

SLEEVES (MAKE 2 ALIKE)

Using 4mm needles cast on 36 (**40**:44:**44**:48) sts.

Join to work in the round, ensuring sts are not twisted.

Place marker at beg of round. Work 4 (**4**:4:**5**:5)cm or 1½ (**1½**:1½:**2**:2) in in rib as set on body, dec 0 (**0**:1:**0**:1) and inc 1 (**1**:0:**1**:0) st on last round. 37 (**41**:43:**45**:47)

Change to 4.5mm needles.

Round 1: K11 (**13**:14:**15**:16) work next 15 sts as set on round 1 of chart B, k11 (**13**:14:**15**:16).

This round sets st st and chart placement, working 8 round rep as set on chart throughout cont as folls:-

Work 1 round.

Next round: K1, m1l (by picking up loop between last and next st from the front and working into the back of this loop) patt to last st, m1r (by picking up loop between last

and next st from behind and working into the front of this loop), k1.

This round sets sleeve seam increases. Inc as set on 11 (9:14:8:16) foll 5th (5th:5th:4th:4th) round, then on every foll 6th (6th:6th:5th:5th) round to 73 (77:81:89:93) sts.

Cont without shaping until sleeve meas 45 (46:46:47:47) cm or 173/4 (18:18:181/2:181/2) in. Leave 1st and last 5 (6:7:8:9) sts on one

holder and rem 63 (65:67:73:75) sts on a second holder.

JOIN BODY AND SLEEVES

With RS facing, leave first 5 (6:7:8:9) sts of front on a holder, pm, patt across front sts to 5 (6:7:8:9) sts before side seam marker, leave next 10 (12:14:16:18) sts on a holder, place marker, knit across 63 (65:67:73:75) sts on first sleeve, patt across back sts to last 5

(6:7:8:9) sts, leave these sts on a holder with 5 (6:7:8:9) sts left on a holder for front, place marker, knit across 63 (65:67:73:75) sts of second sleeve, 288 (308:332:364:392) sts. Working all sleeve sts in st st and all body sts in pattern where possible work as folls:-Work 1 round.

1st dec round: (Patt to 2 sts before marker, CDD) 4 times, patt to end. 8 sts dec. 2nd dec round: (Patt to 1 st before marker



at beg of sleeve, sl1, k1, psso, patt to 1 st before marker at end of sleeve, k2tog) twice. 4 sleeve sts dec.

Rep these 2 rounds 4 (5:6:7:8) times. 228 (236:248:268:284) sts.

Working dec as set on 2nd dec round, work 1 (4:2:6:6) rounds. 220 (220:244:244:260) sts. Working dec as set on 2nd dec round, dec 4 sts across next and every foll alt round until there are 19 sts for each sleeve.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Next round: * Patt to 1 st before marker for sleeve k2tog (1 st body decreased), patt to last st of sleeve, sl1, k1, psso, (1 body st decreased), rep from * once more. This round sets body decreases. Cont to decrease in this way until there are 43 (**43**:45:**45**:47) sts in body sections.

SHAPE NECK

Next 2 rounds: Patt 14, w&t, patt 13, p2togtbl, patt to last st of sleeve, p2tog, patt to 1 st before sleeve marker, p2togtbl, patt to last st of sleeve, p2tog, patt 13, w&t, work back to 1st marker of round.

Next 2 rounds: Patt 9, w&t, patt 8, p2togtbl, patt to last st of sleeve, p2tog, patt to 1 st before sleeve marker, p2togtbl, patt to last st of sleeve, p2tog, patt 9, w&t, work back to 1st marker of round.

Next 2 rounds: Patt 4, w&t, patt 3, p2togtbl, patt to last st of sleeve, p2tog, patt to 1 st before sleeve marker, p2togtbl, patt to last st of sleeve, p2tog, patt 4, w&t, work back to 1st marker of round.


Change to 4mm needles.

Work 3cm in rib as set.

Cast off.

Sew in ends and join sts underarm using Kitchener stitch.

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

(shade 1064)

 3mm (UK 11, US 3) knitting
 needles

Accessories
Polyester filling
8cm (3in) square piece of white felt
2 pairs of 8mm blue plastic safety toy eyes
2 x small black beads for nose
White thread
Black thread

Tension

26 sts and 34 rows to 10cm or 4in square over stocking stitch on 3mm (UK 11, US 3) needles.

Starting with a purl row, work 11 rows st st. **Next row:** K3, (k2tog) six times, k4, (k2tog) six times, k3. 22 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K2tog, k2) to last 2sts, k2tog. 16 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K2tog, k1) to last st, k1. 11 sts.

Cast off purlways.

Fold in half, and sew along rear end seam to underbelly. Gather round cast off sts and pull up tightly. Sew seam to underbelly, leaving a 3cm gap. Turn RS out, and stuff with filling. Sew rem seam.

FRONT LEGS (MAKE 2)

Using A, cast on 3 sts.

First row: Inc in every st. 6 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K1, inc in next st) to end. 9 sts.

Next row: Knit.

Starting with a knit row, work 2 rows st st. Change to B, and work 8 more rows st st.

Next row: K3, inc in next 3sts, k3. 12 sts. Starting with a purl row, work 3 rows st st. **Next row:** K4, using C, k2, using B, knit to

end.

Next row: Using B, p5, using C, p3, using B, purl to end.

Next row: Using B, k5, using C, k3, using B, knit to end.

Next row: Using B, p3, using C, p5, using B, purl to end.

Next row: Using B, k3, using C, k4, turn. Work on this side first.

Next row: Using C, cast off 2sts, p1, using B, p3. 5 sts.

Next row: Using B, k3, using C, k2tog, turn. 4 sts

Cont using B only.

Next row: P2tog, purl to end. 3 sts.

St st 4 rows.

Cast off.

Rejoin yarn to rem sts.

Next row: Using C, k2, using B, k3, turn.

Next row: Using B, p3, using C, p2tog. 4 sts. Cont in B only.

Next row: K2tog, knit to end. 3 sts. St st 5 rows.

Cast off.

Gather up sts from cast on edge and pull up tightly (but do not cut). Sew seam.

Turn right side out and stuff with filling.

Thread leftover yarn from cast on edge, and push needle through centre of hoof, and pull slightly to help make hoof flat at bottom. Secure the end and cut.

Pin legs in place on front of body and then

FAWN (BODY)

Begin at rear using C and cast on 12 sts.

Row 1: Inc in every st. 24 sts.

Row 2: Purl. Row 3: Knit.

Row 4: Purl.

Row 5: K2, (inc in next st, k1) four times, k4, (inc in next st, k1) four times, k2. 32 sts.

Row 6: Purl

Row 7: Inc in first st, k14, inc in next st, inc in next st, k14, inc in last st. 36 sts.

Row 8: Purl.

Row 9: K17, inc in next st, inc in next st, k17.

38 sts.

Starting with a purl row, work 5 rows in st st. **Next row:** K2, (k2tog) five times, k14, (k2tog) x 5, k2. 28 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K5, k2tog) to end. 24 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K4, k2tog) to end. 20 sts. Starting with a purl row, work 3 rows st st. **Next row:** (K4, inc in next st) to end. 24 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: K3, (inc in next st) five times, k8, (inc in next st) five times, k3. 34 sts.







sew when in correct position, adding a little filling as you go.

Run a length of C yarn around the shaping at the sides of the body from one side, along about 12 rows then back around the other side.

Pull up gently to help shape the upper legs. Rep with other leg.

BACK LEGS (MAKE 2)

Using A, cast on 3 sts.

First row: Inc in every st. 6 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K1, inc in next st) to end. 9 sts.

Next row: Knit.

Starting with a knit row, work 2 rows st st. Change to B and work 6 more rows st st.

Next row: K2tog, knit to last 2sts, k2tog.

7 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Rep these last 2 rows till 3 sts.

Next row: Inc in first st, knit to last st, inc.

5 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: Inc in first st, using C, k3, using B,

inc in last st. 7 sts.

Next row: Using B, p1, using C, p4, using

B, p2.

Cont in C only.

Next row: Inc in first st, knit to last st, inc.

9 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: K3, inc in next 3sts, k3. 12 sts. Starting with a purl row, work 7 rows st st.

Next row: (K2, k2tog) to end. 9 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K1, k2tog) to end. 6 sts. **Next row:** (P2tog) to end. 3 sts. Cast off. Gather up sts from cast on edge and pull up

tightly (but do not cut).

Sew seam to shaping. Join shaped edges together to form a dart at each side.

Turn RS out and stuff with filling.

Thread the leftover yarn from the cast on edge and push the needle through the centre of the hoof and pull slightly to help make the hoof flat at the bottom.

Sew rem seam lightly. Pin legs in place on rear of body and then sew when in correct position. Run a length of C yarn around the shaping at the sides of the body from one side, along about 12 rows then back around the other side. Pull up gently to help shape the upper legs. Rep with other leg.

HEAD

Using C, begin at back of head and cast on

6 sts.

First row: Inc in every st. 12 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K1, inc in next st) to end. 18 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K2, inc in next st) to end. 24 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K3, inc in next st) to end. 30 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K4, inc in next st) to end. 36 sts.

Starting with a purl row, st st 9 rows. Next row: (K4, k2tog) to end. 30 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K3, k2tog) to end. 24 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K2, k2tog) to end. 18 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K1, k2tog) to end. 12 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K2tog) to end. 6 sts. Cut yarn and thread through sts.

MUZZLE

Using C, cast on 6 sts.

First row: Inc in every st. 12 sts.

Next row: Purl. Cast off.

NECK

Using C, cast on 16 sts. Work 3 rows st st. Cast off knitways.

EARS (MAKE 2)

Start at base of ear using C, and cast on

Row 1: Inc in every st. 8 sts.

Row 2: Purl.

Row 3: Inc in first st, knit to last st, inc. 10 sts.

Row 4: Purl.

Row 5: K2tog, knit to last

2sts, k2tog. 8 sts. Row 6: Purl.

Change to A.

Rep last 2 rows till 2 sts.

Cast off.

Gather round cast on sts of head and pull up tightly. Join seam for 3cm. Pull up sts tightly at front of head and sew seam, leaving a 3cm gap. Turn RS out.

Pin muzzle on front of head, the top of muzzle in line with last row of head. Cut 2 oval eye shapes in white felt about 12mm long. Cut small cross near edge of one eye corner and push shaft of plastic safety eye through, then through knitting about 6 rows up from muzzle.

Rep with second safety eye and push in place about 10 sts away from first eye. Ensure both eyes are secured at back. Sew a small black bead at uppermost part of muzzle.

Then sew upside down 'Y' shape in small



straight sts using double length of black thread.

Add filling to head then sew rem seam. Gather cast on sts of ears and pull up tightly. Place ears about 3 rows behind eyes and one st below them.

Use double length of black sewing

thread to work 3 straight sts at top outside edge of eyes for

eyelashes.

Sew neck seam together. Place on top of body at front about 5 rows from start and sew in place. Add filling.

Pin head on neck then sew in position, adding some filling if necessary.

Tie in all loose ends securely.

TAIL

Start at base of tail using C, and cast on

Row 1: Inc in every st. 8 sts.

Row 2: Purl.

Change to A.

Row 3: Inc in first st, knit to last st, inc. 10 sts.

Row 4: Purl.

Row 5: K2tog, knit to last 2sts, k2tog. 8 sts.

Row 6: Purl.

Rep last 2 rows till 2 sts.

Cast off.

Fold tail in half lengthways, and sew seam

together. Turn RS out, pin in place on rear end then sew securely.

Cut 6x6mm circles of white felt and arrange in a triangle shape on either side of deer at rear end as in photo. Sew securely to finish.

Knit and make up head and body as for fawn. Add tail in the same way but omit white felt circles.

LEGS (MAKE 4)

Using A, cast on 3 sts.

First row: Inc in every st. 6 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K1, inc in next st) to end. 9 sts.

Next row: Knit.

Starting with a knit row, work 2 rows st st. Change to C and work 10 more rows st st. Next row: K3, inc in next 3 sts, k3. 12 sts. Starting with a purl row, work 11 rows st st. Next row: K4, inc in next 4 sts, k4. 16 sts.

Starting with a purl row, work 3 rows st st. Cast off.

Gather up sts from cast on edge and pull up tightly (but do not cut). Sew seam. Turn RS out and stuff with filling. Thread leftover yarn from cast on edge and push the needle through centre of hoof and pull slightly to help make hoof flat at bottom.

Pin legs in place on front and rear of body, and sew securely when in correct position. Ensure all loose ends are tied in to finish.

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
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

DEBBIE BLISS

Tape yarns are making a comeback and Debbie Bliss Delphi is one of several new for 2015. Many tape yarns are high in nylon, but this is a 100% pure cotton. It knits up on 8mm needles, making an open fabric which shows off its unusual structure beautifully. Delphi comes in 12 tonal shades and runs to 50m per 50g ball. Building on the success of Debbie Bliss Eco Baby, is Eco Baby Prints. This organic cotton has five tonal shades and five multi colours, and the light, fresh palette is perfect for spring, which also sees the relaunch of Rialto DK Print with a new booklet of designs for six to ten year olds.

LOUISA HARDING

This season Louisa Harding launches a classic DK weight yarn which is sure to be popular. Cassia

is 75% wool, 25% nylon for extra strength. Azalea is a splash-dyed pure cotton DK with 12 shades, which comes in 100g balls. Louisa has designed a range of pretty, feminine patterns to let it shine. Anise is our favourite though. It's a cotton tape with a difference, made up of the kind of edging produced by an overlocker. Each colourway changes shade from section to section, with two contrasting tones in each. Hard to explain, but exciting to knit with!

ARAUCANIA
Araucania are known for their beautiful, variegated colourways, and luxurious fibres. Their new yarns
Nuble and Curaco are no exception, both hand-painted to striking effect. Curaco is coloured with a spray of shades, giving a look that's straight off the high street. It's a chunky superwash pure wool and you get 75m in a 100g skein. Nuble is a merino/silk single ply yarn with a high yardage of 250m per 50g, making it great for light accessories.

JUNIPER MOON With a big following in the US for their ethicallysourced yarns, Juniper Moon have now come across the pond, bringing lots of treats for UK knitters! If you love knitting shawls, try Findley, a 50/50 mix of silk and merino wool that runs to a whopping 730m per 100g ball - just the thing to wrap yourself in. Also available in the UK are Herriot Heathers, a pure alpaca DK in subtly marled shades, and Moonshine, an alpaca/wool/silk blend with fibre sourced from Peru. All three yarns have at least 20 shades to choose from, ranging from muted to jewel bright.

Also imported from the
US, Ella Rae yarns will be
available in four lines and
offers great value. Cozy Soft
and Cozy Soft Prints are heavy DK yarns
which knit up into a smooth, sheeny fabric.
Phoenix DK is a pure cotton, which comes
in 24 colours. We think it would be fabulous
for crochet, as would Cozy Bamboo, which
has a lovely rangle of soft colours perfect
for super-cute baby knits.

STYLECRAFT
Stylecraft are turning on the luxury for spring with Malabar, a cotton yarn with a generous touch of silk.
We've shown it here in our early look first sample, a 50g ball, but it will normally be a 100g ball, with 165m at an aran weight. We love that it's machine washable. It comes in 12 fresh colours, including Jade (shown here) and a bold orange called Mandarin that would be great for kids. Stylecraft have also released new shades in their ever popular Classique Cotton.

YARN STORIES
The new kid on the block,
Yarn Stories launched last
autumn with a single pure
merino yarn (in DK and 4ply)
with an impressive 20 shades. The new
year saw a new merino/alpaca yarn in DK
and aran weights and they are now on their
third major release, adding a silk/merino
yarn to their stable. We've seen an early
sample and it's lovely stuff. Shown here are
balls of their merino and alpaca yarns in
available weights.

SIRDAR There's a trio of new yarns from Sirdar this season. Recently released was Cotton 4ply, which arrived complete with a booklet of vintage inspired designs. This is a super-sheeny mercerised cotton, which comes in ten spring-friendly shades. A little goes a long way, at 335m per 100g ball. Beachcomber is a fun new pure cotton yarn with a soft thick 'n' thin wave. It's available in six solids, a cream and a white, and some four fab mixes, each with grey, white and a bright tonal. Most striking is Catch the Sun, which is shot through with fluoro limey-yellow. Cotton Rich Aran, a cotton/acrylic mix, rounds out the group. With eight, mostly nautical colours and a seaside inspired pattern collection to complement it, this is an instant classic for spring and runs to 200m per 100g ball.

It runs to 125m per 50 ball and is 75% cotton, 25% silk.

HAYFIELD Traditionally a budget range, Hayfield attracts a loyal following thanks to its consistency and wide colour ranges. This spring sees the launch of Hayfield Baby Sparkle DK. At 97% acrylic with a touch of sparkly poly fibre you can machine wash it without fear. One of our favourite things are the names of the eight shades, which include Fancy Pansy, a rich dark purple, and I Lilac Your Style, which speaks for itself! Hayfield Fiesta DK is a new bamboo/acrylic blend, available in a range of neutrals and brights. There are some fab pattern leaflets to go with it, which really go to town on showcasing its bolder colours.





Round 1: (K2, p1) four times, k2. Rounds 2 and 3: As Round 1. Round 4: K2, p1, C5L, p1, C5L. Rounds 5 to 7: As Round 1. Round 8: C5R, p1, C5R, p1, k2.

CUFF

Using 2.5mm needles, cast on 66 (**70**:74) sts. Join to work in the round, being careful not to twist.

Rounds 1 to 10: P1, k2, p1 (1:2), k2, p1 (2:2), k2, p2, (k2, p1) four times, k2, p2, k2, p1 (2:2), k2, p1 (1:2), k2, p2, k2, p1 (1:2), k2, p1 (2:2), k2, p2, (k2, p1) twice, k2, p2, k2, p1 (2:2), k2, p1 (1:2), k2, p1.

LEG

Round 11: P1, k2, p1 (1:2), k2, p1 (2:2), k2, p2, work cable pattern, p2, k2, p1 (2:2), k2, p1 (1:2), k2, p2, k2, p1 (1:2), k2, p1 (2:2), k2, p2, (k2, p1) twice, k2, p2, k2, p1 (2:2), k2, p1 (1:2), k2, p1.

Repeat Round 11 for pattern. Continue to work in pattern until sock measures 16cm from cast-on edge. Sample shown has eight full repeats of cable pattern.

HEEL

P1, k1, turn.

Row 1: Sl1 pwise, work in pattern across 33 (**35**:37) sts, turn. 34 (**36**:38) sts.

Row 2: Sl1 pwise, work in pattern across 33 (35:37) sts, turn.

Repeat these two rows 12 (13:14) more times. 26 (28:30) rows in total.

Next row: Sl1 pwise, P18 (**20**:20), p2tog, p1, turn

Next row: SI1, k5 (7:5), ssk, k1, turn. Next row: SI1, p6 (8:6), p2tog, p1, turn. Next row: SI1, k7 (9:7), ssk, k1, turn. Continue in this way until all the sts have been used up.

GUSSET

Resume working in rounds as follows: **Next round:** Pick up and knit approx 15 (**16**:17) stitches down left side of flap, place marker (M1), work across top of foot in pattern, place marker (M2), pick up and knit approx 15 (**16**:17) stitches up right side of flap.

You should pick up one stitch in every slipped stitch down the sides of the heel flap, then one extra stitch at the join between the heel and the instep stitches. This reduces the likelihood of a hole appearing at this join. It doesn't matter if the exact number you pick up is different to the

numbers given above, as long as you pick up the same number on each side.

When knitting the next round, (FOR THIS ROUND ONLY), knit the stitches that you picked up at each side of the heel flap through the back loop. This tightens them up and avoids holes in the fabric. For all further rounds, knit these stitches normally.

Dec round: K to 3 sts before M1, k2tog, k1, work across top of foot in pattern to M2, k1, ssk, k to end.

Plain round: Work in pattern.

Repeat these two rounds until 34 (**36**:38) sts remain on sole of foot.

Remove markers (you may wish to keep a marker for the start of round).

Continue to work in pattern

until foot measures approximately 4cm or 1¾in less than the desired length.
Finish with Round 3 or 7 of cable pattern.

Next round:

Work in pattern as normal, but when you come to the cable stitches, work CLdec or CRdec in place of the normal cables (this reduces the stitch count on the top of the foot). Finish 2 sts before end of round. This marks new start of round.

TOE

Next round: K1, ssk, k24 (**26**:28), k2tog, k1, pm, k1, ssk, k to 3 sts before end of round, k2tog, k1.

Plain round: Knit.

Dec round: K1, ssk, k to 3 sts before marker, k2tog, k1, pm, k1, ssk, k to 3 sts before end of round, k2tog, k1.

Repeat these rounds until 20 (24:24) stitches remain. If you are working with DPNs, distribute the remaining sts over two DPNs and work with a third. There should now be 10 (12:12) sts on each needle tip. Now, 'cast off' 1 stitch at the end of each needle, lifting the very end stitch over the one next to it, then off the needles. This helps to avoid the ends of the toe sticking out in little points once the sock is finished. Graft the remaining 16 (20:20) sts using Kitchener stitch, then weave in all ends.





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

BODY (KNITTED IN ONE PIECE TO ARMHOLES)

Using 2.25mm circular needle and A, cast on 288 (**324**:360:**396**:432) sts. Taking care not to twist cast-on edge, now work in rounds as folls:

Round 1 (RS): *K1, p1, rep from * to end. This round forms rib.

Place marker between first and last st of last round. This is centre back point.
Cont in rib for a further 20 rounds.

Change to 2.75mm circular needle. Round 22: Knit.

This round forms st st.

Work in st st for 1 (3:5:7:9) more rounds.

Change to 3.25mm circular needle. Join in B.

Using the Fair Isle technique and repeating the 12 st patt repeat 24 (27:30:33:36) times around each round, work in patt from chart A, which is worked entirely in st st, until all 28 rounds of chart A have been completed. Break off B.

Change to 2.75mm circular needle. Work in st st for 20 (22:24:26:28) rounds. Change to 3.25mm circular needle. Join in B.

Using the Fair Isle technique and repeating the 12 st patt repeat 24 (27:30:33:36) times around each round, work in patt from chart B, which is worked entirely in st st, until all 42 rounds of chart B have been completed. Break off B.

Change to 2.75mm circular needle. Work in st st for 3 rounds. Work should meas approx 34 (35:36:37:38) cm.) 13¼ (13¾:14½:14½:15) in.

Next round: K66 (75:84:93:102) and slip these sts onto a holder (for left back), cast off next 12 sts (for left underarm), knit until there are 132 (150:168:186:204) sts on right needle after cast-off and slip these sts onto another holder (for front), cast off next 12 sts (for right underarm), knit to end and leave these 66 (75:84:93:102) sts on another holder (for right back). Break yarn.

SLEEVES


Using set of 4 double-pointed 2.25mm needles and A, cast on 60 (**62**:64:**64**:66) sts. Distribute sts evenly over 3 of the 4 needles. Using 4th needle and taking care not to twist cast-on edge, now work in rounds as folls:

Placing marker between first and last st of first round (to denote sleeve 'seam' point), work in rib as given for body for 21 rounds.

Change to set of 4 double-pointed 2.75mm needles.









Work in st st, inc 1 st at each end of 3rd and 1 (1:2:1:-) foll 7th (7th:6th:6th:-) rounds. 64 (66:70:68:68) sts.

Work 5 (5:0:2:4) rounds.

Change to set of 4 double-pointed 3.25mm needles.

Join in B.

Using the Fair Isle technique and repeating the 2 st patt repeat 32 (33:35:34:34) times around each round, work in patt from chart C, which is worked entirely in st st, as folls: Inc 1 st at each end of 2nd (2nd:6th:

4th:next) and foll 7th (**7th**:-:**-:**5th) round. 68 (**70**:72:**70**:72) sts.

Work 0 (**0**:3:**5**:3) rounds, ending after chart row 9.

Break off B.

Change to set of 4 double-pointed 2.75mm needles.

Work in st st, inc 1 st at each end of 7th (**7th**:4th:**next**:3rd) and 1 (**2**:2:**4**:4) foll 7th (**7th**:7th:**6th**:6th) rounds. 72 (**76**:78: **80**:82) sts.

Work 6 (1:6:1:1) rounds.

Change to set of 4 double-pointed

3.25mm needles.

Join in B.

Using the Fair Isle technique and repeating the 12 st patt repeat 6 times around each round, work in patt from chart D, which is worked entirely in st st, as folls:

Inc 1 st at each end of next (6th:next:

5th:5th) and 3 foll 7th (**7th**:7th:6**th**:6th) rounds. 80 (**84**:86:**88**:90) sts.

Work 6 (1:6:5:5) rounds, ending after chart row 28.

Break off B.

Change to set of 4 double-pointed 2.75mm needles.

Work in st st, inc 1 st at each end of next (6th:next:next:next) and 2 (2:3:4:4) foll 7th (7th:7th:6th:6th) rounds. 86 (90:94: 98:100) sts.

Work 5 (2:2:1:3) rounds.

Change to set of 4 double-pointed 3.25mm needles.

Join in B.

Using the Fair Isle technique and repeating the 12 st patt, repeat 7 times around each round, work in patt from chart E, which is worked entirely in st st, as folls:

Inc 1 st at each end of 2nd (**5th**: 5th: **5th**: 3rd) and 1 (**4**:4:**4**:5) foll 7th (**7th**:7th:7th:6th) rounds, then on 3 (**0**:0:**0**:0) foll 8th rounds. 96 (**100**:104:**108**:112) sts.

Work 9 rounds, ending after chart row 42. Break off B.

Change to set of 4 double-pointed 2.75mm needles.

Work in st st for 3 rounds. (Sleeve should meas approx 44 (**45**:46:**46**:46) cm.)

Next round (RS): Cast off first 6 sts, knit to last 6 sts, cast off rem 6 sts. Break yarn and leave rem 84 (**88**:92:**96**:100)

sts on another holder.

YOKE

(Please note – the yoke of the garment starts on circular needles. When number of sts has decreased to a point where sts no longer fit comfortably on circular needle, change to set of 4 double-pointed needles.)
With RS facing, using 2.75mm circular needle and A, knit across sts on holders as folls:





Knit across 66 (75:84:93:102) sts on left back holder dec 0 (1:1:1:1) st at centre, then 84 (88:92:96100) sts on left sleeve holder dec 0 (2:2:1:1) sts evenly across, 132 (150:168:186:204) sts on front holder dec 0 (2:1:2:1) sts evenly across, 84 (88:92:96:100) sts on right sleeve holder dec 0 (2:2:1:1) sts evenly across, and 66 (75:84:93:102) sts on right back holder dec 0 (1:1:1:1) st at centre.

432 (468:513:558:603) sts.

Work in st st for 14 (16:18:20:22) rounds.

Next round: (K4, k2tog, k3), 48 (**52**:57:**62**:67) times. 384 (416:456:496:536) sts.

Change to 3.25mm circular needle. Join in B.

Using the Fair Isle technique and repeating the 8 st patt repeat 48 (52:57:62:67) times around each round, work in patt from chart F, which is worked entirely in st st, until all 14 rounds have been completed. Break off yarn B.

Change to 2.75mm circular needle.

Next round: (K3, k2tog, k3), 48 (52:57:62:67) times. 336 (364:399:434:469) sts.

Work a further 14 (16:18:20:22) rounds.

Next round: (K3, k2tog, k2), 48 (52:57:62:67) times. 288 (312:342:372:402) sts.

Work a further 4 rounds.

Change to 3.25mm needles.

Join in B.

Using the Fair Isle technique and repeating the 2 st patt repeat 144 (156:171:186:201) times around each round, work in patt from chart G, worked entirely in st st, as folls: Work all 9 rounds of chart G.

Break off B.

Change to 2.75mm needles.

Work in st st for 1 round.

Next round: (K2, k2tog, k2) 48 (52:57:62:67)

times. 240 (260:285:310:335) sts. Work in st st for 14 rounds.

Next round: (K2, k2tog, k1) 48 (**52**:57:**62**:67) times. 192 (208:228:248: 68) sts.

Work in st st for 14 rounds.

Next round: (K1, k2tog, k1) 48 (**52**:57:**62**:67)

times. 144 (156:171:186:201) sts.

Next round: K8 (3:0:7:7), k2tog, (K3 (2:2:1:1), k2tog) 25 (37:42:57:62) times, k9 (3:1:6:6).

118 (118:128:128:138) sts.





Cast off all the sts and cut the yarn 80cm or 31½in from the work. This will be used to sew the seam.

Fold the cowl in half and using the tapestry needle, stitch the side seam.

Slip the remaining yarn through a few stitches and cut off.

Secure and weave in all ends in the same way, to finish.





LEGWARMERS (KNIT TWO)

Using 5.5mm needles and A, cast on 34 sts. **Row 1 (RS):** K2, * p2, k2, rep from * to end. Row 2 (WS): P2, *k2, p2, rep from * to end. These 2 rows form 2x2 rib.

Cont until work measures 5cm or 2in. (10 rows).

Change to 6.5mm needles.

Cont in pattern st, following the chart. After row 36 of the chart has been worked, change to 5.5mm needles and cont in 2x2 rib for 10cm or 4in (20 rows). Cast off.

MAKING UP

Sew seam, stitching last 5cm or 2in on RS to allow for cuff at top of legwarmer to be turned back.

With 4 strands of B, make a cord 70cm or 27½ in long. On WS of work, 2.5cm down from the top, slip cord under 2 k sts, over 2 p sts, under 2 k sts, over 2 p sts, all way round.

With B, make two 6cm (2½in) tassels as follows: Wind yarn around cardboard to desired thickness. Tie strands along one side of cardboard and tie a knot securely.

Remove cardboard. Using yarn double, wrap tightly below top knot

to secure strands. Hold firmly and thread ends

onto wool needle.





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SIMPLE STEPS TO GETTING GREAT CAST ONS



Using a cast on suited to your project is one of the easiest ways to create a better finish for your knitting. Here are a few of the most useful. By *Rosee Woodland*

hen you learnt to knit, the chances are you were shown the knitted on, backwards loop or thumb cast ons, and then stuck with them for years! There's nothing wrong with using a simple cast on but sometimes a simple tweak can make all the difference. If you find you cast on too tightly, try going up a needle size. For cast ons that use a single needle, bamboo needles can be handy as the yarn sticks to them more easily. If you find your cast ons are too 'baggy' knit into the back of the loops on your first row only – twisting the stitches will make them tighter and neater.



Pull out a length of yarn at least three times the length of your finished cast on. Loop it over your thumb and forefinger with the cut end of the yarn hanging from your thumb and grab both ends with your left hand, as shown.



Take a knitting needle in your right hand and press the tip down so that the top loop moves below the yarn ends you're holding in your left hand. Don't hold the yarn too tightly as you want it to flow through your fingers.



Having picked up your first loop, bring your needle up through the loop made by the crossed yarns on your left thumb.



Move the needle towards the loop on your left index finger. While doing this, hold the first loop you made on the needle steady with your right index finger, as shown.



Use the needle tip to grab the loop on your index finger and pull it through the loop on your thumb. Make sure you're still holding both ends of the yarn in your left hand.



Pull both strands held in your left hand gently with your thumb and forefinger. This will create your first loop. Now repeat from step 2 for each subsequent stitch.

TECH FEATURE



The finished long tail cast on creates a lovely neat edge that has a decent amount of stretch to it, making it a good choice for hats and socks. You can treat the first cast on row as your first RS row as it is a full stitch deep.



Cast on two stitches as normal, then place the tip of your right needle between the two stitches on your left-hand needle. Make sure your needle tip hasn't gone through either of the stitches on your left hand needle.



Wind the yarn around your right-hand needle as if you were knitting a stitch as normal.



Pull the stitch you've created through the hole between the two stitches. It can help to hold the yarn tail in your left hand to keep everything nice and stable.



Pull the loop you've made up and onto the left needle. As it is coming 'out' of a gap between the first two stitches it will be at a slightly different angle from the stitches before it. Repeat from step 2 for each new stitch.



The finished cast on is stretchy, neat and ends so that the right side of the work is facing you for the next row. If joining to work in rib in the round it's easier to purl, rather than knit the first and last stitch of the cast on together.



This is a neater variation of the backwards loop cast on and is great for adding stitches in the middle of a row. Start with a slip knot on your right needle and place the working end of the yarn over your left hand, as shown.



Take your needle tip and bring it under the yarn secured by the second and third fingers on your left hand. Then push your needle tip downwards over the yarn loop secured by your thumb and forefinger and pull it towards you.



Twist your right-hand needle to the left and then up again and to the right, and you'll end up with three loops of yarn – two on your fingers, as shown, and one on your needle.



Drop the loop on your left index finger first and With this cast on it feels like the stitch almost then pull the loop on your thumb towards you. This will feel very loose and a bit unfamiliar, but go with it!



comes out of nowhere! Repeat the process from step 1 for each new stitch. It takes a bit of practice but this is a really fast cast on once you've got the hang of it.



This cast on has a neat firm edge. Like the backwards loop cast on it has a lot of stretch, but it feels more under control. It's great for buttonholes, too!



Start with a single slip knot on your left-hand needle. Holding the slip knot stable with your left hand, take your working yarn from back to front over the needle, creating a yarn over.



Hold the working yarn stable with your right hand. If the stitch twists around the needle just the two loops created, similar to the technique move the slip knot back to the underside of the used for your cable cast on. left needle and hold in place again.



Take your right-hand needle and knit between



Pull the loop you've just made through the two stitches, remembering to hold the working yarn stable in your right hand.



Place this new stitch onto your left-hand needle. You should now have three stitches. Repeat from step one, working a new yarn over before knitting in between it and the last stitch. You will make two stitches each time.



This cast on has an attractive looped edge that adds a special touch to lace projects. It can only be used for an odd number of stitches, so if you need an even number then drop your first slip knot off on the first row.



Using 5.5mm needles and MC, cast on 51 (**54**:57:**60**:63) sts and work 7cm or 2¾in in garter-st ending with a RS row.

Change to 6mm needles. Knit 1 row. Work in slip st patt as given for back until sleeve measures 16 (16:18:20:20) cm or 6½ (6½:7:7:8) in, ending with a WS row.

SHAPE RAGLAN

Keeping patt correct, cast off 2 sts at beg of next 2 rows. 47 (50:53:56:59) sts.

Dec 1 st at each end of next and every foll alt row to 19 (22:19:20:19) sts, then on every foll 4th row to 9 (10:9:10:9) sts.

Leave rem sts on st holder.

TO MAKE UP

Join front and right back raglan seams.

NECK TRIM

With RS facing, using 5.5mm needles and MC, k across 9 (10:9:10:9) sts from left sleeve, 29 (32:32:37:37) sts from front neck, 9 (10:9:10:9) sts from right sleeve and 29 (32:32:37:37) sts from back neck. 76 (84:82:94:92) sts.

Next row: P6 **(4**:2:**4**:2), * p2tog, p3: rep from * to end. 62 **(68**:66:**76**:74) sts.

Work in garter st until neck trim measures 16cm or 61/4in.

Cast off loosely.

Join right back raglan seam and neck trim seam. Fold neck trim in half to inside of sweater and slip stitch around neck seam.



Cont in rib for a further 4 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

Next row (RS): K11 (13:15:18:21), sl 1, k1, psso, yfwd, k1, yfwd, k2tog, k12 (12:13:13:13).

Row 1 (WS): Purl.

Row 2: Knit.

Rows 3 and 4: As rows 1 and 2.

Row 5: Purl.

Row 6: K7 (9:11:14:17), sl 1, k1, psso, yfwd, k2, sl 1, k1, psso, yfwd, k1, yfwd, k2tog, k2, yfwd, k2tog, k8 (8:9:9:9).

These 6 rows form patt: st st with 4 eyelet holes worked on every 6th row. Cont in patt until 12 rows less have been worked than on back to beg of armhole shaping, ending with RS facing for next row.

Keeping patt correct, dec 1 st at end of next and 1 (0:2:2:1) foll 4th rows, then on 1 (1:0:0:1) foll 6th row. 25 (28:30:33:36) sts. Work 1 (5:3:3:1) rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE ARMHOLE

Keeping patt correct, cast off 2 sts at beg and dec 0 (1:0:0:0) st at end of next row. 23 (25:28:31:34) sts.

Work 1 row.

Dec 1 st at front slope edge of 3rd (5th:next:next:3rd) and 3 (3:4:4:4) foll 6th rows and at same time dec 1 st at armhole edge of next and foll alt row.

17 (19:21:24:27) sts.

Cont straight until left front matches back to beg of shoulder shaping, ending with RS facing for next row. (Note: On last rep of patt row 6, omit the 2nd and 3rd eyelet holes, working just the 1st and 4th (outer) eyelet holes and st st between them.)

SHAPE SHOULDER

Working all sts in st st (thereby omitting eyelet holes), cont as folls:

Cast off 6 (6:7:8:9) sts at beg of next and foll

Work 1 row.

Cast off rem 5 (7:7:8:9) sts.

RIGHT FRONT

Using 9mm needles and A, cast on 28 (30:33:36:39) sts.

Row 1 (RS): K2, *p2, k1, rep from * to last 2 (1:1:1:1) sts, p2 (1:1:1:1).

Row 2: K2 (1:1:1:1), p1, *k2, p1, rep from * to last st, k1.

These 2 rows form rib.



Row 2: P0 (0:1:1:1), *k2, p1, rep from * to last 2 (2:0:0:0) sts, k2 (2:0:0:0).

These 2 rows form rib.

Cont in rib for a further 4 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

Change to 10mm needles.

Beg with a K row, now work in st st, shaping sides by inc 1 st at each end of 3rd (3rd:3rd:next) and every foll 4th (4th:4th:4th:alt) row to 34 (38:40:46:26) sts, then on every foll 6th (6th:6th:-:4th) row until there are 40 (42:44:-:48) sts. Cont straight until sleeve meas 46 (47:48:48:48) cm, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE TOP

Cast off 2 sts at beg of next 2 rows.

36 (38:40:42:44) sts. Dec 1 st at each end of next 2 rows. Cast off rem 32 (34:36:38:40) sts.

MAKING UP

Block pieces according to measurements. Join both shoulder seams using back stitch, or mattress stitch if preferred.

FRONT BAND

With RS facing, using 9mm circular needle and A, beg and ending at front cast-on edges, pick up and knit 35 (35:36:37:39) sts evenly up right front opening edge to beg of front slope shaping, 36 (37:38:39:40) sts up right front slope, and 3 sts down right side of back neck, knit across 8 (8:10:10:10) sts on back holder inc 0 (1:1:0:0) st at centre, pick up and knit 3 sts up left side of back neck, 36 (37:38:39:40) sts down left front slope to beg of front slope shaping, then 35 (35:36:37:39) sts down left front opening edge. 156 (159:165:168:174) sts.

Row 1 (WS): K1, *p1, k2, rep from * to last 2 sts, p1, k1.

This row sets position of rib as given for



back with first and last st of every row worked as a K st.

Keeping sts and rib correct as now set, cont

Row 2: Rib 1 (1:1:2:1), *work 2 tog, yrn (to make a buttonhole), rib 6 (6:6:6:7), rep from * 3 times more, work 2 tog, yrn (to make 5th buttonhole), rib to end.

Work one more row, ending with RS facing for next row.

Cast off in rib.

FRONT DECORATION CORDS (MAKE 2)

Using double-pointed 10mm needles and B, cast on 3 sts.

Row 1 (RS): K3, *without turning slip these 3 sts to opposite end of needle and bring yarn to opposite end of work pulling it quite tightly across WS of work, knit these 3 sts again, rep from * until cord is approx 350 (360:370:380:390) cm long.

Do NOT break yarn but slip these sts onto a holder.

Thread cord in and out of eyelet holes of patt on one front as folls:

Each complete rep of patt has 4 eyelet holes – eyelet nearest armhole/side seam edge is eyelet A, next eyelet towards centre is eyelet B, next eyelet is eyelet C, and eyelet nearest front opening edge is eyelet D. The first band of eyelet holes (at top of rib) has eyelets B and C only, and last rep of patt row 6 (near shoulder) has eyelets A and

Bring cord through to RS of work through eyelet D nearest to shoulder seam. Now take cord back through to WS through eyelet C of rep directly below,

> bringing it back through eyelet D of this rep. Cont in this


way to top of rib – this rep does NOT have eyelets A or D. On this rep, bring cord back through to RS through eyelet B. Now work up other side of patt, taking cord through to WS through eyelet A, bringing it back up through eyelet B, and ending by

taking cord through to WS through evelet A nearest shoulder.

Adjust length of cord as required (by either knitting a little more or unpicking a few rows), ensuring cord is not pulled too tight, and cast off the 3 cord sts. Secure ends of cord on inside.

In same way, make and thread cord through eyelet holes of other front. @

CHARLENE,

This cosy knit, with its heavyweight yarn and front zip, is guaranteed to become an essential in his winter wardrobe. The colourwork is done flat, rather than in the round, but with just 10 wrong side colourwork rows, you'll enjoy every stitch. This pattern uses a provisional cast on. The easiest option for this is to crochet a chain and then knit into it. It's easy to undo later and then pick up the stitches. Alternative, knit a few rows in waste yarn first, which you can cut away when you need to pick up stitches.

Materials

Yarn New Lanark Chunky 13 (16:18:20:22) balls in Limestone (MC), plus 1 ball each of Denim (CC1) and Ecru (CC2)

Needles 6mm (UK 4, US 10) and 5.5mm (UK 5, US 10) knitting needle for ribbing. Due to large number of body stitches we recommend using 80cm circular needles

Accessories Zip

With 5mm needles, cast on 32 (36:36:40:40) sts in MC, join in round, taking care not to twist the stitches.

K 1 round, increasing 4 sts evenly for all sizes. 36 (40:40:44:44) sts.

Change to 6mm needles.

Work in st st. Increase 1 st at the beg and end of the 4th and every subsequent 9th (9th:7th:7th:6th) rounds, 7 (8:12:13:15) times. 52 (58:64:70:74) sts.

At the same time, starting on the 6th round, work chart 1, repeating as necessary around

Continue without increases until work reaches 43 (45:46:48.5:49.5) cm. Work the first 8 rows of chart 2, beginning with the 15th (12th:8th:4th) st of the pattern and repeating as necessary around the sleeve.

On last round place the last 4 (4:5:5:6) sts and the first 4 (4:5:5:6) sts of the next round onto stitch holder or waste yarn. 44 (50:54:60:62) sts.

BODY

With larger needles cast on 141 (157:173:189:205) in MC using a provisional cast on.

Working in st st, cast on 5 sts at the beg of the next 2 rows. 151 (167:183:199:215) sts. Work in st st with an i-cord treatment as follows:

RS: K all sts.

WS: Slip 3 sts, p to last 3 sts, slip 3 sts. Continue to work these two rows until the work reaches 10cm or 4in, ending on a WS


Next row (RS): K5 sts, place cast on sts onto a spare needle, hold in rear of the working needle. Knit 1 st from the front needle together with 1 st from the rear needle until all cast on sts are used up, k to end of row. Continue working in st st with an i-cord treatment as before for 5 more rows. Work chart 1 as follows:

RS: K3 sts in MC, work chart 1 to last 3 sts, k3sts in MC.

WS: SI 3 sts, work in chart 1 to last 3 sts, sI

Continue to work in st st, slipping the first and last 3 sts of every WS row until the work reaches 38 (42:42:44) cm, ending on a WS row.

Work the first 8 rows of chart 2 as follows: RS: K3 sts in MC, work chart 2 to last 3 sts, k3 sts in MC.





Ribbed cuffs give this heavyweight knit extra strength and shape, and they look good too!

WS: SI 3 sts, work in chart 2 to last 3 sts, sI 3 sts.

JOIN BODY AND SLEEVES

K3 sts in MC, work row 9 of chart 2 for 31 (**35**:38:**42**:45) sts, pm, place next 8 (**8**:10:**10**:12) sts on waste yarn. Work row 9 of chart 2 for 44 (**50**:54:**60**:62) sts across RT sleeve, aligning the chart with established pattern, pm.

Work row 9 of chart 2 for 67 (**75**:81:**89**:95) st across back, aligning the chart with established pattern, pm, place next 8

(8:10:10:12) sts on waste yarn. Work row 9 of chart 2 for 44 (50:54:60:62) sts across left sleeve, aligning the chart with established pattern, pm.

Work row 9 of chart 2 for 31 (35:38:42:45) sts aligning the chart with established pattern to last 3 sts, k3 sts in MC. 223 (251:271:299:315) sts.

Decrease sequence 2

Row 1 and all WS rows: Work without decreases.

Row 2 (RS): Decrease on both sides of each marker as follows:

*Work as established to 2 sts before marker, k2tog, slm, ssk, work as established to two sts before next marker k2tog, slm, ssk.

Repeat from * to end of row.

Repeat these two rows a total of 2 (5:7:13:14) times. 135 (139:143:135:143) sts.

Decrease sequence 3

Row 1 and all WS rows: Work without decreases.

Row 2 (RS): Decrease on the body side of each marker as follows:



Work rows 10 to 17 of chart 2, aligning



99 (**115**:119:**123**:131) sts.

NECK SHAPING

On next row (WS), place 7 (7:7:9:10) sts on holder at beg and end of row. Continue to work decrease sequence 3 as established above 3 (4:4:4:4) more times while also decreasing 1 st at beg and end of every RS row. 37 (37:41:41:47) sts. Work 1 WS row without decreases. Cast off all remaining sts.

COLLAR

Place right front sts on needle, with smaller needle, knit across 7 (7:7:9:10) sts, pick up and knit 50 (**54**:58:**58**:64) sts from neckline. Place left front sts on needle, knit across 7 (7:7:9:10) sts. 64 (68:72:76:84) sts. Establish 2x2 ribbing as follows: WS: Sl3, (k2, p2) to last 5 sts, k2, sl3. RS: K3, (p2, k2) to last 5 sts, p2, k3. Work in 2x2 ribbing until work reaches 13cm or 5in, cast on and sew to inside of collar, leaving the first and last 5 sts unattached to accommodate zipper.

TO MAKE UP

Graft underarms using Kitchener st or 3-needle cast off. Sew in zipper. Block to measurements.

CHART 1 16 sts x 5 rows




TOP DOWN DEVOTEE

I've recently made a top down baby cardigan and I loved every stitch. I'd like to knit lots more - do you know where can I buy specific 'top down' patterns?

Chris Lander, Weston-super-Mare

Jo says: Many knitters like knitting top down as it eliminates a lot of the seaming and is also very comfortable around the neck. My two favourite baby cardigan patterns use the top down technique - one has a round yoke and the other has raglan sleeves. If you buy The

Top-Down Sweaters A brilliant buy for 'top down' fans

Knitters' Handy Book of Top Down Sweaters by Ann Budd (£16.58, www.amazon.co.uk) you will find all the information you need to make garments for all the family. The book advises you to knit a swatch in the yarn of your choice to

work out the gauge, which is most important, and then you look at the charts and choose the style and the project. There are five basic styles to choose from: round yoke, raglan, drop sleeves, set-in sleeves and saddle sleeves. The book also offers variations on the basic styles, with different types of yarn and pattern for you to make something really special. The hints and tips in the book are invaluable for any knitter, and the brilliant patterns ensure that you get a perfect fit every time.



IN A SPIN ABOUT STRIPES

I'm a beginner and I've learnt how to change colours to be able to stripe my knitting, but I'm getting a bit confused as to when I have to do this, and the right side and wrong side of my knitting keep getting reversed. Is there a way to tell when I should be changing colours?

Polly Johnson, Shropshire

Aneeta says: Yes, this is a simple thing to do when you know how! When you are adding new yarn of the same colour you can add it to either side of your knitting; but when adding a new yarn of a different colour, it is better add it to the same side each time so that all your loose ends are on one side. If you always add it at the beginning of a right side (RS) row it should now be easy to tell which is the right side and which is the wrong side!

ODDS AND ENDS

I hate throwing away leftover bits of yarn but I never use them for anything so

they are just taking up space in my yarn stash. Have you got any suggestions using them up? Steph Jenkins, Exeter

Sarah says: If you have loads of bits that are different weights, a good way to use them up is to make pom-poms. I like the colourful result using mismatched yarn gives you, too. Or, if you like knitting toys, you can use leftovers as stuffing. If you have a good amount of wool that's

a similar weight and colours that match then make a stripy scarf just sort the wool into colour groups first.



PATTERN PROBLEMS

I am knitting a hooded jacket for my baby granddaughter who's due soon. Everything was going great until my pattern said to pick up more stitches than cast off, to knit the hood. It said to pick up and knit 25 sts from the cast off 15 sts. How do I pick up more than one stitch from each cast off stitch? Annie Samuels, Falmouth



Aneeta says:

This problem requires a bit of creative thinking! What I would do in this situation is pick up one stitch for every cast off stitch, then in the row you knit after the pick-up row, increase evenly across that cast off section so that you have the number of stitches you need to continue. Then, follow the pattern for the rest of the hood.



GIFT FOR THE BIRTHDAY BOY

Hi, it's my boyfriend's birthday and I'd love to knit him an iPad cover - can you recommend a pattern?

Charlie Watkins, Nottingham

Sarah says: If you haven't signed up to Ravelry.com yet then there are lots of iPad cover patterns on there that I think you'll like. Or alternatively, the book Knit Nordic has a lovely design in it. Buy it for £13.59 from www.amazon.co.uk.

FOXED BY INTARSIA

I'm knitting a fox hat for the Innocent Big Knit and there's a small section in the pattern that needs to be intarsia or Fair Isle. I'm unsure which is which. Can you help? Ruth Whitehall, Wiltshire

Aneeta says: Intarsia is colour changes in large blocks of colour. You cut the yarn into bobbins, as it won't carry across the back of the knitting. Fair Isle is small patterns of colour, no more than 6 sts. You work the colours across the row so there's no need to cut the

Try Swiss darning for small areas of colour



yarn. You could knit the fox tummy intarsia style, as there's only one section of contrasting colour per row or round. However, an even easier technique would be to Swiss darn (embroider) the white stitches on after knitting the hat.

KNITTING FOR talk

The team shares tips on fabulous knits and tricks for children and babies

FINISHING TOUCH

I make all my granddaughter's knitted clothes and love knitting with self-patterning yarn, but I find it annoying when the fronts of cardigans don't match - how can I make clothes look better? Mandy Baker, Hampshire

Jo says: There are a few things you can do when making a cardigan, such as always making sure you start each side of the front in the same section of the self-patterning yarn. I always buy an extra ball when I'm knitting with this type of yarn, and I use the remainder to make a matching hat on circular needles. Working the whole body of the garment on circular needles ensures a better look, but you do have to remember to start in the same section of yarn for the sleeves. Working the pattern in stripes of self-patterning yarn and a plain yarn looks great and is also good for using up leftover yarn. Although

a lot of knitters like to keep the pattern regular, it is fun to have the pattern in different places, and this Kina Cole

4010 design shows how an offset pattern can look good. The pattern containing instructions for a tunic, cardigan, crossover cardigan and hat costs £2.99 from www.deramores.com. The clothes are knitted in King Cole's new DK yarn, Cherish.



KNIT A NAME

My sister has recently had a little boy called Sam and I want to knit him a hat with his name on in Fair Isle. Would you be able to chart me the name?

Karen Jones, Cardiff



Sarah says: Of course! It's lovely to give personalised gifts to a newborn, although it can mean you have to wait until they have been born before you start knitting! If you don't know the child's name then you can always use duplicate stitch and add the name to a pre-knitted garment. The chart is above for you to use.

BOOTIE SOLES

I would really like to make my one-year-old niece some booties with

soles. I think they would be a bit warmer and sturdier than booties on their own. How do I make them?

Jo says: There are quite a few different ways to add soles to booties. You can buy suede elbow patches (used for patching jumpers and

jackets) and sew them to the soles. Add them either over the whole sole, or just small sections at the back and front. This is very inexpensive and patches are widely available in most wool or cobbler shops. If you have any old felted jumpers you

could cut a couple of layers for each sole and use a Sharpie crochet hook to make holes through the felt and crochet the bootie onto it. Finally, you could go to www.joestoes.co.uk and buy ready-made soles; there are lots to chose from and for a baby I would pick the felt soles because she will be walking mostly indoors. They cost £2.95 a pair (for baby sizes) and there are eight colours to chose from, so you can have fun matching the tops to the soles. If you want outdoor soles, try the Vibram soles, which are very durable and cost £5.95 a pair.



tips for getting good tension


Knit a tension swatch while sitting as comfortably and relaxed as possible, and in your usual knitting position.

Be consistent with how you hold your needles. Use the same method for all parts of a garment.

If you can't seem to get the tension right, try a different pair of needles. The yarn will slide more on metal ones.

crochet clusters in granny stripes is not only a simple technique to master, it can be used to stunning effect, like this too-cute pixie hat. It's bound to cause admiring coos from friends and family.

starter pack. Alternatively, why not dive into your stash? Any machine washable aran yarn would work brilliantly, and this pattern is perfect for using up your scraps.

Materials

- Machine wash on cold

Tension

Work 5 clusters and 9 rows in pattern to measure 10cm or 4in square using 4mm hook.

Special stitch

Granny stripe

For swatching, chain 21 and follow instructions for rows 1–3. Then work rows 2 and 3 a total of four times.

Pattern notes

Count turning chain as a stitch. Change colours at the start of each row, alternating colours A–F as you work each row.

Safety note

Pompoms can come undone and the loose strands of yarn can present a choking hazard to babies and toddlers. Do not leave under-threes unattended with pompoms. If in doubt, leave them off.

PIXIE HAT

With Colour A, ch 45 (54:60:63).

Row 1: Starting in 6th ch from hook (counts as 1tr and 1ch), [3tr in ch, 1ch, miss 2ch] 13 (**16**:18:**19**) times, 1tr. Turn. Break yarn. 13 (**16**:18:**19**) 3tr clusters.

Row 2: Attach new colour, 3ch, 2tr in chsp, (1ch, miss 3tr, 3tr in chsp) 12 (15:17:18) times, 2tr in chsp, 1tr in top of tch. Turn. Break yarn. 14 (17:19:20) 3tr clusters.

Row 3: Attach new colour, 5ch, miss 3tr, (3tr in chsp, 1ch, miss 3tr) 13 (16:18:19) times, 1tr. Turn. Break yarn. 13 (16:18:19) 3tr clusters.

Work rows 2-3 a total of 7 (9:9:10) times.

Toddler and child size only

Work Row 2 once more.

Fold the beginning chain in half widthwise and sew or slip stitch the seam closed.

BOTTOM EDGING

Row 1: With Colour A, ch 10 (11:12:13), attach to front bottom edge of hat. Dc around bottom of hat 1dc into each tch and/or tr around, 11 (12:13:14) ch. Turn. 28 (36:38:42) sts.

Row 2: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 48 (**58**:62:**68**) dc across ch and dc. Break yarn.

POMPOMS (MAKE 2)

Cut a 30cm or 11¾in piece of contrast yarn and set it aside.

Using the yarn still attached to the ball, secure the cut end of yarn between two of your fingers, take your contrast yarn and wrap it approximately 60 times around your non-dominant hand.

Carefully remove the yarn from your fingers.

Pick up the set-aside yarn and wrap it widthwise around the loops of yarn. Then tie it off tightly.

Cut the loops, being careful not to cut the securing tie. Fluff up the yarn and trim into a pom-pom shape.

MAKING UP

Sew the pompoms securely to each end of the ties on the hat, to finish. Please see the note about safety for under-threes in the information panel.





Next row: Cast off 4 (5:5:6) sts and work to end. 20 (22:23:24) sts.

Next row: Cast off 1 st and work to end. 19 (21:22:23) sts.

Next row: Cast off 1 st and work to end. Cast off rem 18 (20:21:22) sts.

NECKBAND

Using 5.5mm needles and MC, cast on 57 (61:65:69) sts.

Work in 1x1 rib starting and ending with k2 until work measures 5cm or 2in (10 rows). Leave on a spare needle.

TO MAKE UP

Graft the neckband around neck edge. To add the embroidered detail on each front and sleeves, use a strand of CC and backstitch, winding the yarn twice around 9 rows of horizontal rib (3 rows rev st st, 3 rows st st, 3 rows rev st st), spacing as shown in the inset image top left. The total length of the garment will decrease by 5cm or 2in. Sew side and sleeve seams. Sew in zip.

Secure and weave in all ends. 🐽





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

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


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GUIDE TO knitting Use our **step-by-step** guide to learn the basics of knitting



MAKE A SLIPKNOT → YOUR FIRST CAST ON STITCH



Twist the yarn into a loop and form a second loop of yarn to pull through the first one.



Tighten the first loop into a knot around the second. This will be your first cast on stitch.

CAST ON - THUMB METHOD ◆ USE THIS FOR A STRETCHY EDGE



Twist the yarn into a loop and form a second loop of yarn to pull through the first one.



Tighten the first loop into a knot around the second. This will be your first cast on stitch.



Wrap the ball end of the yarn anticlockwise around the needle. Push the needle through the loop.



Slide the loop off your thumb and tighten both ends. Repeat steps 2-4 for each stitch.

CAST ON - KNITTED ON METHOD ◆ USE THIS FOR A STRONG, HARDWEARING EDGE



With the slipknot on your left needle, insert the right needle from front to back of the loop.



Wrap the ball end of the yarn anticlockwise around right needle and then pull this through the loop.



Now insert the left needle tip through the front of new loop, dropping it off the right needle.



Repeat steps 1-3 as needed, forming new stitches from the top stitch on the left needle.

CAST OFF → HOW TO FINISH YOUR WORK



To begin, knit only the first two stitches in the cast off row.



Push the left needle through the first stitch, then lift it over the second stitch and off right needle.



With one stitch now on the right needle, knit another stitch and then repeat step 2 until the row end.



Cut the yarn with a 15cm or 6in tail. Pull the tail through the final cast off stitch.

KNIT • WORKED ON THE RIGHT SIDE IN STOCKING STITCH



Insert the right needle into the left needle's top stitch, from front to back with the yarn at the back.



Hold the yarn around your right index finger and then wrap it clockwise around the right needle.



Using the right needle, pull this new loop of yarn through the stitch on the left needle.



Ease the stitch off the left needle keeping the new stitch on the right needle. Repeat steps 1-4.

PURL WORKED ON THE WRONG SIDE IN STOCKING STITCH



Insert the right needle into the front With your right index finger, wrap of the left needle's top stitch with the yarn in front.

Using the right needle, pull this new loop of yarn back through the front of the stitch.

HOW TO READ KNITTING CHARTS

Knitting charts follow the same rules unless the pattern states otherwise. Right side rows are usually odd numbers and are worked right to left. Wrong side rows are normally even numbers and are worked left to right. Pattern repeats will be contained in an area outlined in red and some charts will have further coloured outlines for different sizes. The key will give you each symbol and tell you what stitch it is.



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



These two rows form 2x2 rib.

Repeat these last two rows 10 times (22 rows).

Row 23 (RS): K2 (p2, k2) to end.

Row 24 (WS): Cast off in rib.

Weave in ends. Sew short edges together using mattress or back stitch.

HAT

Using 10mm needles and the thumb or long tail method, cast on 38 sts.

Row 1 (RS): K2 (p2, k2) to end. **Row 2 (WS):** P2 (k2, p2) to end. These two rows form 2 x 2 rib.

Repeat these last two rows once more.

Row 5 (RS): Knit. Row 6 (WS): Purl.

Repeat these last two rows six times more.

Row 19 (RS): K5, k2tog (k4, k2tog) five times, k1. 32 sts.


Row 20 (and all WS rows): Purl.


Row 21: K4, k2tog (k3, k2tog) five times, k1. 26 sts.

Row 23: K3, k2tog (k2, k2tog) five times, k1. 20 sts.

Break off yarn. Thread through remaining sts and fasten off. Join back seam using mattress stitch. Weave in ends.

Row 1 (RS): Knit.

Row 2: K6, * p4, k1, rep from * to last 4 sts, p4.

Row 3: * K3, p2, rep from * to last 5 sts, k5.

Row 4: K8, * p2, k3, rep from * to last 2 sts, p2.

Row 5: * K1, P4, rep from * to last 5 sts, K5.

Row 6: Knit.

Rows 1 to 6 incl form patt.

Cont in patt until work measures same as Back to beg of raglan armhole shaping, ending with a 6th patt row.

SHAPE RAGLAN ARMHOLE

Keeping patt and garter st border correct, cast off 1 (1:2) st/s at beg of next row. 34 (39:43) sts.

Row 2: K5, patt to last 2 sts, k1, p1.

Row 3: K1, p1, patt to last 5 sts, k5.

Row 4: As 2nd row.

Row 5: K1, p2tog, patt to last 5 sts, k5.

Row 6: As row 2.

Rep last 4 rows 2 (1:0) time/s, then rep last 2 rows only until 29 (33:36) sts rem.

Work 1 row, thus ending with a 6th patt row. Leave rem sts on a stitch holder for Yoke.

RIGHT FRONT

Using 3.75mm needles, cast on 35 (40:45) sts. Knit 7 rows garter st. (1st row is WS).

Change to 4.5mm needles.

Beg patt.

SHAPE RAGLAN ARMHOLE

Keeping patt and garter st border correct, cast off 1 (1:2) st/s at beg of next row. 34 (39:43) sts.

Row 2: K5, patt to last 2 sts, p1, k1.

Row 3: P1, k1, patt to last 5 sts, k5.

Row 4: K5, patt to last 3 sts, p2tog tbl, k1.

Row 5: As 3rd row.

Rep last 4 rows 2 (1:0) time/s, then rep last 2

rows only until 29 (33:36) sts rem.

Work 1 row, thus ending with a 6th patt row. Leave rem sts on a stitch holder for Yoke.

SLEEVES

Using 3.75mm needles, cast on 33 (**35**:39) sts. Knit 6 rows garter st. (1st row is WS).

Row 7 (WS): K4, * inc in next st, k3 (**2**:2), rep from * to last 5 (**4**:5) sts, inc in next st, k4 (**3**:4). 40 (**45**:50) sts.

Change to 4.5mm needles.

Beg patt.

Work 6 rows patt as for Back.

Keeping patt correct (6 rows form patt rep) and working extra sts into patt, inc one st at each end of next row, then in every foll 6th (10th:14th) row until there are 48 (53:58) sts. Cont in patt without shaping until work measures approx 12 (15:19) cm from beg, ending with a 6th patt row.

SHAPE RAGLAN

Keeping patt correct, cast off 1 (1:2) st/s at beg of next 2 rows. 46 (51:54) sts.

Size 0-3 months only

Row 3: K1, p1, patt to last 2 sts, p1, k1. **Row 4**: P1, k1, patt to last 2 sts, k1, p1.

All Sizes

Next row: K1, p2tog, patt to last 3 sts, p2tog tbl. k1

Next row: P1, k1, patt to last 2 sts, k1, p1. Rep last 2 rows until 32 (**35**:38) sts rem. Work 1 row, thus ending with a 6th patt row. Leave rem sts on a stitch holder for Yoke.

YOKE

With WS facing, slip sts from stitch holders onto a 3.75mm needle in the foll order: Left Front, first Sleeve, Back, 2nd sleeve, Right Front. 175 (**197**:215) sts.

Row 1: K6 (**5**:6), * k2tog, k2, rep from * to last 9 (**8**:9) sts, k2tog, k7 (**6**:7). 134 (**150**:164) sts. Knit 3 rows garter st.

Row 5: K1, k2tog, yfwd, knit to end – buttonhole.

Knit 3 rows garter st

Row 1: K6 (**5**:6), * k2tog, k2, rep from * to last 9 (**8**:9) sts, k2tog, k7 (**6**:7). 134 (**150**:164) sts.

Knit 3 rows garter st.

Row 5: K1, K2tog, yfwd, knit to end – buttonhole.

Knit 3 rows garter st.

** Row 9: Knit.

Row 10: K5, purl to last 5 sts, k5.

Rep last 2 rows 0 (1:2) time/s. **

Next row: K6 (5:6), * K2tog, k1, rep from * to last 8 (**7**:8) sts, k2tog, k6 (**5**:6). 93 (**103**:113) sts.

Knit 1 row.

Next row: K1, k2tog, yfwd, knit to end. 2nd buttonhole.

Knit 1 row.

Rep from ** to ** once.

Next row: K5 (7:6), * k2tog, k1, rep from * to last 7 (9:8) sts, k2tog, k5 (7:6). 65 (73:79) sts.

Knit 8 rows garter st, working a buttonhole (as before) in the 4th row. 3 buttonholes in all.

Next row: Cast off 5 sts, knit to end.

Next row: Cast off 5 sts, K4 (**3**:1) (incl st already on needle after casting off), k2tog, * yfwd, k3, k2tog, rep from * to last 4 (**3**:1) st/s, yfwd, k4 (**3**:1). 55 (**63**:69) sts.

Knit 2 rows garter st.

Cast off loosely knitways.

HOOD OPTION

Using 4.5mm needles, cast on 44 (49:54) sts.

Row 1: Knit

Row 2: K15, * p4, k1, rep from * to last 4 sts, p4.

Row 3: * K3, p2, rep from * to last 14 sts, k14.

Row 4: K17, * p2, k3, rep from * to last 2 sts, p2.

Row 5: * K1, p4, rep from * to last 14 sts, k14.

Row 6: Knit.

Rows 1 to 6 incl form patt.

Keeping 14 sts at front edge in garter st correct, cont in patt until work measures approx 27 (33:37) cm from beg, ending with a 6th patt row. Cast off loosely knitways.

MAKING UP

Use mattress stitch seam unless otherwise stated

Join raglan seams.

Join side and sleeve seams.

Sew in all ends.

Sew on buttons.

Using 3 lengths of yarn, each 152 cm long, make a twisted cord. Thread through eyelet holes at neck, beg and ending at fronts.

ATTACHED HOOD

Fold hood in half and join back seam.

Fold 7 sts at front edge to RS and secure at each end

Sew cast on and cast off edges to neck edge of yoke, easing any extra fullness to back neck. If desired, make a tassel and attach to top of hood as pictured on Style 3.

Sew in all ends

SEPARATE HOOD

Work as for Hood Option of Jacket. Fold hood in half and join back seam.

Fold 7 sts at front edge to RS and secure at each end

Edging: Using 4.5mm needles, cast on 40 sts and knit across these sts, with RS facing, knit up 60 (**72**:82) sts evenly along cast on and cast off edges of hood noting to work through both thicknesses of turn back, turn, cast on 40 sts. 140 (**152**:162) sts.

Knit 5 rows garter st.

Cast off knitways.

Make a tassel and attach to top of hood as pictured.

HAT





EAR FLAP (make 2)

Using 4mm needles, cast on 6 sts.

Row 1 (WS): Knit.

Row 2 (RS): K2, M1, knit to last 2 sts, M1, k2. 8 sts.

Row 3: Knit.

Row 4: K2, M1, knit to last 2 sts, M1, k2.

Row 5: K2, M1, knit to last 2 sts, M1, k2. 12 sts.

Row 6: K2, purl to last 2 sts, k2.

Row 7: K2, M1, knit to last 2 sts, M1, k2. 14 sts.

Row 8: K2, purl to last 2 sts, k2.

Row 9: K2, M1, knit to last 2 sts, M1, k2. 16 sts.

Row 10: K2, purl to last 2 sts, k2.

Row 11: Knit.

Rep last 2 rows until Ear Flap measures 16 (18) cm from beg, working last row on WS. Leave sts on a stitch holder.

MAIN PIECE

Using 4mm needles, cast on 17 (18) sts, turn, with RS facing knit across sts from first Ear Flap stitch holder, turn, cast on 39 (41) sts, turn, with RS facing knit across sts from second Ear Flap stitch holder, turn, cast on 17 (18) sts. 105 (109) sts.

Next row (WS): K19 (**20**), p12, k43 (**45**), p12,

k19 (**20**).

Next row: Knit.

Next row: K19 (**20**), p12, k43 (**45**), p12, k19

(20).

Work in stocking st (beg with a knit row) for rem until Main Piece measures 14 (15) cm from beg, ending with a purl row and dec 0 (4) sts evenly across last row. 105 sts.

SHAPE CROWN

Row 1: K1, * k2tog, k6, rep from * to end. 92 sts.

2nd and foll alt rows: Purl.

Row 3: K1, * k2tog, k5, rep from * to end. 79 sts.

Row 5: K1, * k2tog, k4, rep from * to end. 66 sts.

Row 7: K1, * k2tog, k3, rep from * to end. 53 sts.

Row 9: K1, * k2tog, k2, rep from * to end. 40 sts.

 $\textbf{Row 11:} \ \text{K1, * k2tog, k1, rep from * to end.}$

Row 13: K1, * k2tog, rep from * to end. 14 sts.

Row 14: * P2tog, rep from * to end. 7 sts.

Break off yarn leaving a long end. Run end through rem sts, draw up tightly and fasten off securely.

SQUIRREL EARS (MAKE 2)

Using 4mm needles, cast on 7 sts.

Row 1 (RS): Inc knitways in first st, knit to last st, inc knitways in last st. 9 sts.

Row 2: Purl.

Row 3: As Row 1. 11 sts.

Row 4: Inc purlways in first st, purl to last st, inc purlways in last st. 13 sts.

Work 4 rows stocking st, beg with a knit row. Dec one st at each end of every row until 5 sts rem.

Inc one st at each end (as before) of every row until there are 13 sts

Work 4 rows stocking st.

Dec one st at each end of every row until 7 sts rem

Work 1 row

Cast off.

FOX EARS (MAKE 2)

Using 4mm needles, cast on 13 sts.

Work 4 rows stocking st.

Cont in stocking st, dec one st at each end of next row, then in foll Row 4. 9 sts.

Work 1 row.

Dec one st at each end of next row, then in every foll alt row until 3 sts rem.

Work 1 row.

Inc one st at each end of next row, then in every foll alt row until there are 9 sts.

Work 3 rows stocking st, beg with a purl row.

Next row: Inc in first st, knit to last st, inc in last

st. 11 sts.

Rep last 4 rows once more. 13 sts.

Work 3 rows stocking st, beg with a purl row. Cast off

MAKING UP

Use mattress stitch seam unless otherwise stated.

Join side edges together to form centre back seam. Make 2 pompoms and attach 1 pompom securely to end of each Ear Flap as pictured. For Squirrel and Fox, fold Ears in half across centre and join side edges. Pinch sides of cast on edge together and stitch in position as pictured. Using black yarn, embroider eyes and nose as pictured.

Sew in all ends.

ANIMAL MITTS (MAKE 2)

(With optional Squirrel or Fox Ears)

Using 3.25mm needles, cast on 29 (33) sts.

Row 1 (RS): K2, * p1, k1, rep from * to last st, k1.

Row 2: K1, * p1, k1, rep from * to end.

Rep 1st and Row 2s until work measures 3 cm from beg, ending with a Row 2.

Change to 4mm needles.

Work in stocking st until work measures 13 (15) cm from beg, ending with a purl row.

SHAPE TOP

Next row: K2tog, k10 (**12**), sl 1, k1, psso, sl 1, k2tog, psso, k10 (**12**), sl 1, k1, psso. 24 (**28**) sts. Next row: P2tog, p8 (**10**), (p2tog) twice, p8 (**10**), P2tog. 20 (**24**) sts.

Next row: (K2tog, k6 (**8**), sl 1, k1, psso) twice. 16 (20) sts.

Next row: P2tog, p4 **(6)**, (p2tog) twice, p4 **(6)**, p2tog. 12 **(16)** sts.

Next row: (K2tog) 6 (8) times. 6 (8) sts. Break off yarn leaving a long end. Run end through rem sts, draw up tightly and fasten off securely.

SQUIRREL EARS (MAKE 4)

Using 4mm needles, cast on 4 sts.



Row 2: Inc purlways in first st, p4, inc purlways in last st. 8 sts. Work 2 rows stocking st.

Row 5: K2tog, k4, k2tog. 6 sts. ***

Row 6: P2tog, p2, p2tog. 4 sts. Rep from ** once.

Cast off.

FOX EARS (MAKE 4)

Work as for Squirrel Ears to ***.

Work 3 rows stocking st, beg with a purl row.

Row 9: K2tog, k2, k2tog. 4 sts.

Row 10: Purl.

Row 11: (K2tog) twice. 2 sts.

Row 12: Purl.

Row 13: Inc knitways once in each st. 4 sts.

Row 14: Purl.

Row 15: Inc in first st, k2, inc in last st. 6 sts. Work 3 rows stocking st, beg with a purl row.

Row 19: Inc in first st, k4, inc in last st. 8 sts. Work 2 rows stocking st, beg with a purl row.

Row 22: P2tog, p4, p2tog. 6 sts. **Row 23**: K2tog, k2, k2tog. 4 sts.

Cast off purlways.


MAKING UP

Use mattress stitch seam unless otherwise stated.

Fold mitts in half and join seam, leaving a 4 cm opening for thumb approx 1 cm above rib band.

For Squirrel and Fox fold ears in half across centre.

Sew outside edges together. Pinch sides of cast on edge together and stitch in position on top side of mitts. Using black yarn, embroider facial features as pictured. Sew in all ends.

Row 2: K1, * p1, k1, rep from * to end.

Rep Row 1 and 2, 4 (**4**:5:**5**:6) times. 10

(10:12:12:14) rows rib in all.

Change to 4mm needles.

Using A, work 0 (4:8:14:14) rows stocking st.

Beg stripes: Work 70 rows stocking st in stripes of 10 rows each B, A, C, B, A, B and A.

SHAPE ARMHOLES

Using B, cast off 4 (**4**:4:5:6) sts at beg of next 2 rows. 67 (**73**:79:**83**:85) sts.

Dec one st at each end of next row, then in every foll alt row 2 (3:3:3:3) times. 61 (65:71:75:77) sts. Using C, work 10 rows stocking st,

Sizes 10 and 12 only: dec one st at each end of Row 1. 61 (**65**:71:**73**:75) sts.

Using A, work 10 rows stocking st, completing stripes.

Using B for rem, cont in stocking st until armhole measures 15 (**16**:18:**18**:19) cm, ending with a purl row.

SHAPE SHOULDERS

Cast off 6 (6:7:7:7) sts at beg of next 4 rows, then 5 (6:6:7:7) sts at beg of foll 2 rows.

Leave rem 27 (29:31:31:33) sts on a stitch holder.

FRONT

Work as for Back until there are 7.5 cm (approx 22 rows) less than Back to beg of shoulder shaping, ending with a purl row.

SHAPE NECK

Keeping stripes correct as for Back:

Next row (RS): K23 (24:26:27:27), turn.

** Cont on these 23 (24:26:27:27) sts.

Dec one st at neck edge in every foll alt row until 17 (18:20:21:21) sts rem.

Cont without shaping until armhole measures same as Back to beg of shoulder shaping, ending

with a purl row.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Cast off 6 (**6**:7:**7**:7) sts at beg of next row and foll alt row.

Work 1 row. Cast off rem 5 (**6**:6:**7**:7) sts. ** Slip next 15 (**17**:19:**19**:21) sts onto a stitch holder and leave.

With RS facing, join appropriate colour yarn to rem sts and knit to end.

Rep from ** to **, working 1 row more before shoulder shaping.

SLEEVES

Using 3.25mm needles and A, cast on 37 (**39**:41:**43**:43) sts.

Work 10 (10:12:12:14) rows rib as for lower band of Back

Change to 4mm needles.

Using A, work 4 (20:32:38:42) rows stocking st. Sizes 6, 8, 10 and 12 years only: inc one st at each end of Row 3 then in every foll (8th:8th:10th:10th) row (2:3:3:3) times. 39 (45:49:51:51) sts.

Beg stripes: Work 70 rows stocking st in stripes as for Back, inc one st at each end of 5th (**7th**:5th:5th:1st) row, then in every foll: 6th (**8th**:10th:10th:10th) row until there are 57 (**59**:61:61:63) sts.

SHAPE TOP

Keeping stripes correct as for Back, cast off 2 (2:2:2:3) sts at beg of next 2 rows. 53 (55:57:57:57) sts.

Dec one st at each end of next row, then in every foll alt row until 31 (29:25:25:23) sts rem.

Sizes 4, 6, 8 and 10 years only: then in every row until 21 (23:23:23) sts rem.

Size 12 years only: Work 1 row.

All sizes: Cast off 3 sts at beg of next 4 rows. Cast off rem 9 (11:11:11) sts.

NECKBAND

Use mattress stitch seam unless otherwise stated.

Join right shoulder seam. With RS facing, using 3.25mm needles and A, knit up 22 sts evenly along left side of neck, knit across sts from front stitch holder, knit up 22 sts evenly along right side of neck, then knit across sts from Back stitch holder: inc one st in centre. 87 (91:95:95:99) sts. Work 7 rows rib as for lower band of Back, beg with a Row 2. Cast off loosely in rib.

MAKING UP

Join side, left shoulder, neckband and sleeve seams, matching stripes.

Sew in sleeves.

Sew in all ends.

HAT

Using 4.00mm Needles and A, cast on 105 (109:111) sts.

Work 10 (**12**:14) rows rib as for lower band of Back of Sweater.

Change to 3.25mm needles.

Work a further 9 (11:13) rows rib (RS will be facing when brim is turned back), thus completing brim.

Change to 4mm needles.

Beg stripes.

Work 20 rows stocking st in stripes of 10 rows each B and A.

Using C, work 4 rows stocking st, dec 5 (0:2) sts evenly across last row. 100 (109:109) sts.

BEG CROWN SHAPING

Row 1: Using C, K1, * k2tog, k9 (**10**:10), rep from * to end. 91 (**100**:100) sts.

2nd and foll alt rows: Purl.

Row 3: K1, * k2tog, k8 (**9**:9), rep from * to end. 82 (**91**:91) sts.

Row 5: Using B, K1, * k2tog, k7 (8:8), rep from * to end. 73 (82:82) sts.

Row 7: K1, * k2tog, k6 (**7**:7), rep from * to end. 64 (**73**:73) sts.

Row 9: K1, * k2tog, k5 (**6**:6), rep from * to end. 55 (**64**:64) sts.

Row 11: K1, * k2tog, k4 (**5**:5), rep from * to end. 46 (**55**:55) sts.

Row 13: K1, * k2tog, k3 (**4**:4), rep from * to end. 37 (46:46) sts.

Using A, **Row 15**: K1, * sl 1, k2tog, psso, rep from * to end. 13 (**16**:16) sts.

Row 17: K1 (0:0), * k2tog, rep from * to end. 7 (8:8) sts.

Row 18: Purl.


Break off yarn leaving a long end. Run end through rem sts, draw up tightly and fasten off securely.

MAKING UP

Use mattress stitch seam unless otherwise stated. Join side edges together, noting to match stripes and reversing seam for half of rib rows for brim. Turn back brim. Using A, make a pompom and attach to top of hat as pictured. Sew in all ends.
