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

### **BACK**

Using 2.75mm needles, cast on 159 (**195**:215) sts.

**Row 1 (RS):** \*K1, p1, rep from \* to last st, k1. **Row 2 (WS):** \*P1, k1, rep from \* to last st, p1.

These 2 rows form rib.

Work 15 rows more in rib, ending with WS facing for next row.

**Next row (WS):** P1 (**13**:8), inc in next st, (p2, inc in next st) 52 (**56**:66) times, p1 (**13**:8). 212 (**252**:282) sts.

Change to 3.25mm needles.

**Row 1 (RS):** P2, \*sl 1, k2, psso the 2 k sts, p2, rep from \* to end.

**Row 2:** K2, \*p1, yrn, p1, k2, rep from \* to end.

**Row 3**: P2, \*k3, p2, rep from \* to end.

**Row 4:** K2, \*p3, k2, rep from \* to end. These 4 rows form patt.

Cont in patt inc 1 st at each end of 3rd row, then on - (2:5) foll 4th rows, then on - (1:–) foll alt row, working inc sts in st st until there are enough to work in patt.

214 (**260**:294) sts.

Work 5 (1:3) rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

\*\*Inc 1 st at each end of next row, then on foll 2 alt rows, then on foll row, rep from \*\* 20 (20:19) times more taking inc sts into patt: Change to circular needle when required. 382 (428:454) sts.

Place markers at both ends of last row to denote armhole openings.

Cont straight in patt until back measures 12 (**14**:15) cm or 4¾ (**5½**:6) in from markers, ending with RS facing for next row.

## **SHAPE SHOULDERS**

Keeping patt correct (see pattern note), cast off 7 (**8**:8) sts at beg of next 28 (**26**:4) rows, then 8 (**9**:9) sts at beg of foll 4 (**6**:28) rows. 154 (**166**:170) sts.

## SHAPE BACK NECK

**Next row (RS):** Cast off 8 (**9**:9) sts, patt until there are 28 (**31**:31) sts on right needle and turn, leaving rem sts on a holder.

Work each side of neck separately.

Dec 1 st at neck edge of next 4 rows and at same time cast off 8 (9:9) sts at beg of 2nd row and foll alt row.

Work 1 row, ending with RS facing for next row.


Cast off rem 8 (9:9) sts.

With RS facing, slip centre 82 (**86**:90) sts onto a holder, rejoin yarn to rem sts and patt to end.

Complete to match first side, reversing shapings.

Using 2.75mm needles, cast on 79 (97:107) sts.

Work 17 rows in rib as given for back, ending with WS facing for next row.

Next row (WS): Rib 5 and leave these sts on a holder, p2 (10:10), (inc in next st) 0 (1:1) times, (p1, inc in next st, p2, inc in next st) 13 (14:16) times, (p1, inc in next st) 1 (0:1) times, p5 (11:9). 101 (121:136) sts.

## Change to 3.25mm needles.

Row 1 (RS): P2, \*sl 1, k2, psso the 2 k sts, p2, rep from \* to last 4 sts, sl 1, k2, psso the 2 k

Row 2: K1, \*p1, yrn, p1, k2, rep from \* to end.

**Row 3:** P2, \*k3, p2, rep from \* to last 4 sts, k3, p1.

**Row 4:** K1, \*p3, k2, rep from \* to end. These 4 rows form patt.

Cont in patt inc 1 st at beg of 3rd row, then on – (2:5) foll 4th rows, then on – (1:-) foll alt row, working inc sts in st st until there are enough to work in patt. 102 (125:142) sts. Work 5 (1:3) rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

\*\*Inc 1 st at beg of next row, then on foll 2 alt rows, then at same edge of foll row, rep from \*\* 3 (2:0) times more, taking inc sts into patt and ending with RS facing for next row. 118 (137:146) sts.

Leave these sts on a holder. Do not break off yarn.

## **RIGHT SECTION**

Using 2.75mm needles, cast on 79 (97:107) sts.

Work 17 rows in rib as given for back, ending with WS facing for next row.

**Next row (WS)**: P5 (11:9), (inc in next st, p1) 1 (0:1) times, (inc in next st, p2, inc in next st, p1) 13 (14:16) times, (inc in next st) 0 (1:1) times, p2 (10:10), turn and leave rem 5 sts on a holder. 101 (121:136) sts.

## Change to 3.25mm needles.

**Row 1 (RS):** P1, \*sl 1, k2, psso the 2 k sts, p2, rep from \* to end.

**Row 2:** K2, \*p1, yrn, p1, k2, rep from \* to last 3 sts, p1, yrn, p1, k1.

**Row 3:** P1, \*k3, p2, rep from \* to end.

Row 4: K2, \*p3, k2, rep from \* to last 4 sts, p3, k1.

These 4 rows form patt.

Cont in patt inc 1 st at end of 3rd row, then on – (2:5) foll 4th rows, then on – (1:-) foll alt row, working inc sts in st st until there are enough to work in patt. 102 (125:142) sts. Work 5 (1:3) rows, ending with RS facing for ◆◆

## **ROWAN JUMPER**

next row.

\*\*Inc 1 st at end of next row, then on foll 2 alt rows, then at same edge on foll row, rep from \*\* 3 (2:0) times more, taking inc sts into patt.

118 (137:146) sts. Break off yarn.

## JOIN SECTIONS

## Change to circular needle when required.

With RS facing and working on 118 (**137**:146) sts of left front section, inc in first st, patt to end, turn and cast on 10 sts, turn and patt across 118 (137:146) sts of right front section inc in last st. 248 (286:304) sts.

Inc 1 st at each end of 2nd row, then on foll alt row, then on foll row, ending with RS facing for next row. 254 (292:310) sts. \*\*Inc 1 st at each end of next row, then on foll 2 alt rows, then on foll row, rep from \*\* 15 (16:17) times more, ending with RS facing for next row. 382 (428:454) sts.

Place markers at both ends of last row to denote armhole openings.

Cont straight in patt until front matches back to beg of shoulder shaping, ending with RS facing for next row.

## Sizes S/M and L/XL only **SHAPE SHOULDERS**

Cast off 7 (8:-) sts at beg of next 8 (4:-) rows. 326 (396:-) sts.

## All sizes

## SHAPE SHOULDERS AND NECK

Next row (RS): Cast off 7 (8:8) sts, patt until there are 122 (156:185) sts on right needle and turn, leaving rem sts on a holder. Work each side of neck separately. Dec 1 st at neck edge of next 6 rows, then on 2 (4:6) foll alt rows, then on 3 foll 4th rows and at same time cast off 7 (8:8) sts at beg of 2nd row, then on 8 (9:-) foll alt rows, then 8 (9:9) sts at beg of 2 (3:14) foll alt rows. 32 (**36**:36) sts.

Work 1 row, ending with RS facing for next row.

Cast off 8 (9:9) sts at beg of next and foll 2 alt rows.

Work 1 row.

Cast off rem 8 (9:9) sts.

With RS facing, slip centre 68 sts onto a holder, rejoin yarn to rem sts and patt to end.

Complete to match first side, reversing shapings.

## **MAKING UP**

Block out each piece of knitting and



following the instructions on the ball band, press the garment pieces, omitting the ribs. Take special care to press the edges, as this will make sewing up easier and neater. Join right shoulder seam using back stitch, or mattress stitch if preferred.

## **NECKBAND**

With RS facing and using 2.75mm needles, pick up and knit 21 (23:26) sts down left side of front neck, knit across 68 sts on front holder dec 1 st at centre, pick up and knit 21 (23:26) sts up right side of neck, 5 sts from right side of back neck, knit across 82 (86:90) sts from

back holder and pick up and knit 5 sts from left side of back neck.

201 (209:219) sts.

Beg with row 2 of rib as given for back, work 5 rows.

Cast off in rib.

Join left shoulder and neckband seam.

## Armhole borders (both alike)

With RS facing using 2.75mm needles, pick up and knit 61 (73:79) sts evenly along armhole edge between markers denoting base of armhole openings.

Beg with row 2 of rib as given for back, work 5 rows. Cast off in rib.

## **LEFT FRONT BORDER**

With RS facing, using 2.75mm needles, rejoin yarn to 5 sts on left front holder. Cont in rib until left front border fits up open section to 10 cast-on sts, ending with RS facing for next row.

Cast off in rib.

## **RIGHT FRONT BORDER**

With WS facing, using 2.75mm needles, rejoin yarn to 5 sts on right front holder.

Cont in rib until right front border fits up open section to 10 cast-on sts, ending with RS facing for next row.

Cast off in rib.

Slip stitch in place and join cast-off edges to 10 cast-on sts.

## **FINISHING**

Stitch the pieces together. Use a seam stitch such as a back stitch or mattress stitch for all main knitting seams and join all ribs and neckband with mattress stitch. @



## KNITTED BREAST IS THE BEST

For some women, breastfeeding is straightforward, while for others, it can be a real struggle. If baby latches on just a little bit wrong, it is often very painful, which can leave struggling women feeling like failures and worrying about bonding with their baby. It's a topic packed with emotion and debate. There is nothing like laughter to cut through it all - and knitted boobs are undeniably a bit funny!

These are tools to show mums how to hold and position their breast when feeding help baby latch on. If a single knitted boob raises a smile, the mountain of 150 of them, being knitted in Tolsta Chaolais on the Isle of Lewis, is pretty comical – but a bit sobering too.

The Knit and Natter group of the tiny village have knitted up the boobs for a a governmentfunded breastfeeding campaign. Demand across the country for these teaching aids is high. This group hopes to get to 250 boobs before they rest their needles, but any knitters out there who want to help can contribute to this campaign. Staffordshire and Stoke on Trent partnership, and Norfolk community Health and Care NHS trusts are all currently calling for donations. Other NHS trusts and maternity units need them too. You can download the pattern and instructions for a knitted boob from the website of the Lactation Consultants of Great Britain, www. lcgb.org. Remember, you don't need to stick to sensible colours - as long as the areola comes in a contrasting shade, anything goes! Spots, stripes, or brights, it could well be the crazier the better for a struggling mum learning with a smile.

## **RIGHT FRONT**

Using 3.25mm needles, cast on 50 (**54**:54:**58**:58:**62**:62) sts. Work 2x2 rib as

Row 1 (RS): K2, p2 to last two stitches, k2. Row 2 (WS): P2, k2 to last two stitches, p2. Cont as set for 15cm or 6in, ending with RS facing for next row.

Set up row (RS): K2, p1, inc in next, p4, k2, p2tog, k2, p7, k to end.

Next row (WS): Change to 4mm needles and work sts as set.

## START CABLE PATTERN

Row 1 (RS): K2, p7, C5R, p7, pm, k to end. Rows 2, 4, 6, 8, 10 (WS): Work sts as set. **Row 3**: K2, p6, C3R, k1, C3L, p6, k to end. Row 5 (dec): K2, p5, C3R, k1, p1, k1, C3L, p5, k1, ssk, k to end.

Row 7: K2, p4, C3R (k1, p1) twice, k1 C3L, p4, k to end.

Dec 1 st (using 2nd and 3rd st from edge) at same edge, next 4 (5:5:5:6:6:8) rows. Cont to 16.5 (17.5:18:20:21:22.5:25.5) cm or 61/2 (7:71/2:8:81/2:9:10) in, still dec at front edge until 20 (22:23:24:25:25:25) sts rem.

## **SHAPE SHOULDER**

Cast off 6 (7:7:8:8:8:8) sts at start of next row. Cast off 7 (7:8:8:8:8) sts at start of next row. Cast off rem 7 (8:8:8:9:9:9) sts.

## **LEFT FRONT**

Using 3.25mm needles, work in  $2 \times 2$  rib to 15cm or 6in and then work one more row, ending with a RS row.

## **SHAPE SHOULDERS**

Cast off 6 (**7**:7:**8**:8:**8**:8) sts at start of next 2 rows

Cast off 7 (7:8:8:8:8) sts at start of next 2 rows.

Cast off 7 (**8**:8:**8**:9:9:9) sts at start of next 2 rows.

Leave rem 30 (**32**:34:**36**:36:4**2**:42) sts on holder.

## **SLEEVES (MAKE TWO)**

Using size 3.25mm needles, cast on 46 (**50**:50:**50**:54:**54**:58) sts.

Work 2x2 rib until work measures 10cm or 4in.

Change to 4mm needles and work st st. Inc into 2nd st from each end, every 5th row to 82 (88:90:92:96:98:100) sts.

Work even until work measures 42 (**43**:44.5:**45**: 45.5:**47**:47) cm or 161/2

(17:171/2:171/2:18:181/2:181/2) in.

## **SHAPE CAP**

Cast off 5 (5:5:5:5:6:6) sts at start of next 2 rows. Cast off 3 sts at start of next 2 rows. Dec (using 2nd and 3rd st from edge) on every alt row until 54 (56:58:58:58:60:60) sts rem. Cast off 2 sts at start of next 12 rows. Cast off 3 sts at start of next 4 rows.

Cast off rem 18 (20:22:22:24:24) sts.

## **BORDERS**

Using 3.25mm needles, pick up and knit 33 sts along ribbed section and 93 (95:97:99:101:103:105) sts along right front, 30 (32:34:36:36:42:42) sts from back neck, and 93 (95:97:99:101:103:105) sts along left front to ribbing; pick up 33 sts from ribbing. Work 3 rows 2x2 rib.

**Buttonhole row:** Rib 5, (cast off 3 sts, rib 5 including st on needle) 3 times, cast off 3 sts, rib to end.

Work 4 more rows rib, casting on sts over those cast off in 4th row. Cast off.





## **MAKING UP**

Join shoulders, set in sleeves, sew side and sleeve seams. Sew on buttons and darn in all ends.



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

Mrs Otter has dressed her kits in their Sunday best and is taking them out to the park to play. Toy making is such an enjoyable aspect of being a knitter as you tell a story and create characters in your makes. Despite their elegant garments, this trio are not too complicated to make, and you can finish each in just a few evenings.

## **BODY**

Work 11 rows st st.

Change to I

Next row: K8, k2tog tbl, k1, k2tog, k16, k2tog tbl, k1, k2tog, k8. 38 sts.

Next row: Purl. Next row: Knit.

Next row: (P2tog) to end. 19 sts.

Find the centre 2 sts right where body starts. Using a length of black, work a line of swiss darning sts up either side of those centre 2 sts. Now, missing another 2 sts either side of these black lines, work another 2. Turn outside in and run a length of yarn around cast on edge and pull up tightly. Sew seam along base and up back to waist. Turn right side out. Cut an 8cm or 3in diameter circle from cardboard and insert into body, pushing down to base. Add filling, a little at a time till body is filled to waist. Sew back to neck and cut yarn. Add more filling to top of neck. Ensure all ends are tied in securely.

## **LACE PANEL**

Using B, cast on 61 sts.

Row 1: Knit. Next row: Knit. Change to A.

Next row: (K1, yfwd, p1, p3tog, p1, yfwd) to last st, k1.

Next row: Knit.

Next row: K1, purl to last st, k1.

Next row: (K1, yfwd, p1, p3tog, p1, yfwd) to last st, k1.

Next row: K1, purl to last st, k1.

Change to B. Next row: Knit. Change to A. Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K1, yfwd, p1, p3tog, p1, yfwd) to last st, k1.

**Next row:** K1, purl to last st, k1.

Next row: Knit.

**Next row:** K1, purl to last st, k1.

Next row: (K1, yfwd, p1, p3tog, p1, yfwd) to last st, k1.

Change to B. Next row: Purl. Change to A.

Next row: (Inc, k1) to end. 42 sts. Starting with a purl row, st st 3 rows. Next row: (Inc, k2) to end. 56 sts. Starting with a purl row, st st 3 rows. Next row: (Inc, k3) to end. 70 sts.

Next row: Knit.

Starting with a knit row st st 14 rows. Next row: (K8, k2tog) to end. 63 sts. Work 7 rows st st.

Next row: (K7, k2tog) to end. 56 sts.

Work 5 rows st st.

Next row: (K6, k2tog) to end. 49 sts. Work 3 rows st st.

Next row: (K5, k2tog) to end. 42 sts.

### **HEAD**

Starting at face and using I, cast on 6 sts.

Row 1: Inc in every st. 12 sts. **Next row:** Using I, p5, H p2, I, p5. **Next row:** Using I, (k1, inc in next st) x 2, using H, k4, using I (inc in next st, k1) x 2. 16 sts.

Next (and every alt) row: Use I to purl the I sts and H to purl the H sts unless stated otherwise.

**Next row:** Using I, (k2, inc in next st) x 2, using H, k4, using I (inc in next st, k2) x 2.

**Next row:** Using I, (k2, inc in next st) x 2, k1, using H, k6, using I k1, (inc in next st, k2) x 2. 24 sts.

**Next row:** Using I, (k2, inc in next st) x 3, using H, k6, using I, (inc in next st, k2) x 3. 30 sts.

Next row: Using I, p11, using H, p8, using I, p11.

**Next row:** Using I, (k3, inc in next st) x 2, k3, using H, inc in next st, k6, inc in next st, using I, k3, (inc in next st, k3) x 2. 36 sts .

Cont in H only.

Next (and every alt) row: Purl.

**Next row:** (K4, inc in next st) x 3, k6, (inc in next st, k4) x 3. 42 sts.

**Next row:** (K5, inc in next st) x 3, k6, (inc in next st, k5) x 3. 48 sts.

Work 5 rows st st.

Next row: (K6, k2tog) to end. 42 sts.

Work 3 rows st st.

Next row: (K5, k2tog) to end. 36 sts.

Work 3 rows st st.

Next row: (K4, k2tog) to end. 30 sts. Next row (and every alt): Purl. Next row: (K3, k2tog) to end. 24 sts. Next row: (K2, k2tog) to end. 18 sts. Next row: (K1, k2tog) to end. 12sts. Next row (omit purl row): P2tog to end. 6 sts.

Cut yarn and thread through sts.

Pull up tightly and sew seam for about 3cm or 11/4 in. Gather round cast on sts and pull up tightly. Sew seam, leaving a gap. Turn right side out and stuff with filling. Sew 2 beads for eyes at sides of face, about 3 rows above last row of cream and about 2 sts in from each end of cream panel. Using a length of black yarn, work about 4 or 5 straight sts for nose where the cream meets the toffee at nose end. Work a little line below nose then 3 straight sts either side, slightly curving up, for mouth. Tie in ends securely through gap.

## EARS (MAKE 2)

Using 2 strands of H tog, cast on 8 sts. Cont with one strand only.

Row 1: Knit.



Row 2: P2tog to end. 4 sts. Cut yarn and thread through.

Pull up sts tightly then sew across straight edge to make it firmer. Pin ears to sides of head with top of ears level with eyes, about 8 rows behind eyes. Sew in place securely.

## **NECK**

Using I, cast on 22 sts.

Row 1: Using H, k6, I k10, H, k6. **Next row:** Using H, p6, I p10, H, p6.

Rep last 2 rows 2 times.

Cast off in the correct colours.

Sew seam. Turn right side out. Pin neck to body with cream in centre front, in line with the black stripes. Sew in place. Stuff. Sew head to neck, with cream matching cream, adding a little more filling if necessary.

## **ARMS (MAKE 2)**

Using H, cast on 6 sts.

Row 1: Inc in every st. 12 sts.

Starting with a purl row, st st 15 rows.

Next row: (K3, inc) to end. 15 sts. Starting with a purl row, st st 9 rows. Cast off 3sts at beg of next 2 rows. 9 sts. **Next row:** K2tog, knit to last 2 sts, k2tog.

7 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: K2tog, knit to last 2 sts, k2tog.

5 sts.

Next row: P2tog, p1, p2tog. 3 sts.

Cast off

Gather up sts round cast on edge and pull up tightly. Sew seam to first set of cast off sts. Turn right side round and stuff lightly.

## **SLEEVES (MAKE 2)**

Using A, cast on 16 sts.

Purl one row.

**Next row:** Inc in every st. 32 sts.

Next row: Purl. Next row: Knit.

Next row: P2tog to end. 16 sts.

## Cast off.

Sew seam then turn right side out. Place on arms with top of sleeve lined up with the first set of cast off sts. Sew in place. Pin arms to body angled in at the front with the top of sleeve in line with top of body where violet ends. Attach securely to side of body, adding a little filling at the top.

### **FINISHING BAND**

Using B, cast on 56 sts. Cast off.
Pin band in place in line with top of body
where violet ends and across tops of sleeves.
Sew ends tog at back. Sew band securely.

### **SKIRT BUSTLE**

Using A, cast on 8 sts.

Row 1: Purl.

Next row: (Inc in every st) to end. 16 sts.
Starting with a purl row, st st 7 rows.
Next row: (Inc, k1) to end. 24 sts.
Starting with a purl row, st st 9 rows.
Next row: (Inc, k2) to end. 32 sts.
Starting with a knit row st st 15 rows.

## **FRILL**

Cast off.

With right side facing, pick up and knit 2 sts and cast off one st, (make 4 chain sts, miss a st and pick up one in next st, cast off) to last st, pick up one and cast off.

Place cast on sts at centre back and sew in position. Sew edges of lace panel either side of bustle and sew down to cast on sts of lace panel. Sew bustle edges to body where lace panel ends then continue down to bottom of dress, puffing out bustle as you go. Tie in all loose edges.

## FEET (MAKE 2)

Using H, cast on 6 sts. Purl one row. **Next row**: Inc in every st. 12 sts. Starting with a purl row, st st 13 rows. Cast off.

Gather round cast on sts and pull up tightly. Sew along seam to cast off edge. Turn right side out and oversew cast off edge. Place feet, angled, about 2cm or ¾in apart on base with about half of the feet showing at the front. Sew in place.

## **GIRL KIT (FEET AND LEGS, MAKE 2)**

Using H, cast on 4 sts.

Row 1: Purl.

**Next row**: Inc in every st to end. 8 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: K2, inc in next 4 sts, k2. 12 sts.

St st 3 rows.

**Next row**: K2, (k2tog) x 4, k2. 8 sts.

Work 13 rows st st. Put first leg on a st holder.

### **BODY**

**Row 1:** Knit across sts on needle then knit across sts of first leg. 16 sts.

St st 13 rows.

**Next row**: K3, k2tog, k6, k2tog, k3. 14 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: K2, sl1, k2tog, psso, k4, sl1, k2tog,

psso, k2. 10 sts. **Next row**: Purl.

Cut yarn and thread through sts. Pull sts up tightly and sew seam for about 2.5cm or 1in. Join foot and leg seams (leaving a gap in back for stuffing). Turn right side out. Add filling, a little at a time. Sew rem seam.

### **ARMS (MAKE 2)**

Using H, cast on 4 sts.

Row 1: Purl.

Next row: Inc in every st. 8 sts.

Next row: Purl. Next row: Knit. Next row: Purl.

Next row: K3, k2tog, k3. 7 sts.

St st 11 rows.

Next row: K2tog, knit to last 2sts, k2tog. 5

o+o

Next row: Purl.

Rep last 2 rows again. 3 sts.

Cast off.

Sew seam to armhole shaping. Turn right side out and stuff firmly using small pieces of filling at a time. Pin arms to sides of body and sew in place securely.

## **NECK**

Using I, cast on 12 sts.

Use 2 small black beads for eyes, placed either side of head, level with ears and with about 10 sts in between. Make nose and mouth as for Mrs Otter only smaller.

Using C, cast on 40 sts.

G st 3 rows. St st 14 rows.

Next row: (K2tog, k2tog, k1) to end. 24 sts.

Next row: Purl.

**Next row**: K5, cast off 2sts, k10, turn.

Work on middle 10 sts. **Next row**: P2, k6, p2.

Next row: K2tog, knit to last 2 sts, k2tog. 8 sts.

**Next row**: P2, k4, p2.

**Next row**: K2tog, knit to last 2 sts, k2tog.

I love sewing almost as much as I love knitting, but the Spring Knitting and Stitching Show hasn't quite lived up to its name of late. Happily, this year's March event saw a renewed yarn presence, and other gorgeous new stalls too.

Toft Alpaca brought along their yarn jungle, bringing bright colour to their stand for the first time (see Knitting News for more). In fact, colour was the thing that really stood out at the show. 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"These lacy panels are like pleats - great for running about in!"



CHARLENE,

Little girls can be rather particular about what they wear. But you won't get any complaints with this gorgeous lacy dress. If you can, use interchangeable circular needles, so that you can reduce the cord length from 60cm to 40cm as the stitch count drops.

Alternatively, use the Magic Loop method.

#### Materials

- Yarn
- 4 (**4**:5:**5**) x 50g ball of Louisa Harding Cassia in Sorbet (shade 109)
- Needles 1 set 3.75mm (UK 9, US 5) circular needles 1 set 4mm (UK 8, US 6) circular needles
- Accessories 16 (18:20:22) stitch markers

#### Yarn detail

- ♦ 75% wool, 25% nylon
- DK weight
- 50g/133m (145yds)
- Machine wash at 40°C

#### Tension

22 sts and 30 rows to 10cm or 4in square measured over st st using 4mm needles.

We recommend using a stitch marker to mark the beg/end of each lace and rev st st rep as indicated in the patt.

#### Special abbreviations

SSK slip 2 stitches knitwise, one at a time, from the left needle to right needle, insert left needle tip through both front loops and knit together from this position (1 stitch decrease).

**SSM** slip stitch marker

Next round: Knit removing all but last

Work in st st until work measures 31.5 (33:34.5:37) cm or 12½ (13:13½:14½) in from cast on edge.

#### BACK (DIVIDE FOR BACK AND FRONT, **NOW WORKED IN ROWS)**

#### **SHAPE ARMHOLES**

Cast off 3 sts, k until 49 (55:62:68) sts on needle, turn work, leaving rem sts on a holder

Cast off 3 sts, p to end, turn work. 46 (52:59:65) sts.

Dec 1 st at each end of next row and 0 (1:2:3) sts foll alt row. 44 (48:53:57) sts. Work without further shaping until work measures 11.5 (11.5:14:14) cm or 4½ (4½:5½:5½) in from start of armhole shaping, ending with RS facing for next row.

#### SHAPE SHOULDERS AND BACK NECK

Next row (RS): Cast off 4 (4:5:5) sts, patt until 7 (8:9:10) sts on RH needle, turn, work both sides of neck separately.

Next row (WS): Cast off 3 sts, p to end. Cast off rem 4 (5:6:7) sts.

With RS facing slip centre 22 (24:25:27) sts onto a holder for back neck, rejoin yarn and k to end.

**Next row (WS):** Cast off 4 (**4**:5:**5**) sts, p to end. **Next row (RS):** Cast off 3 sts, k to end. Cast off rem 4 (5:6:7) sts.

#### **FRONT**

Rejoin yarn to sts left on holder for front and work as for back until front is 10 (10:12:12) rows shorter than back to shoulder shaping, ending with RS facing for next row.

#### SHAPE FRONT NECK

Next row (RS): Patt 15 (16:18:19) sts and turn, leaving rem sts on a holder.

Next row (WS): Cast off 3 sts, patt to end. 12 (13:15:16) sts.

Dec 1 st at neck edge on next 4 rows.

8 (9:11:12) sts.

Work until front matches back to shoulder shaping, ending with RS facing for next row.

#### **SHAPE SHOULDER**

**Next row (RS):** Cast off 4 (4:5:5) sts. Work 1 row. Cast off rem 4 (5:6:7) sts. With RS facing slip centre 14 (16:17:19) sts onto a holder and k to end.

Next row (WS): Patt 15 (16:18:19) sts and turn, leaving rem sts on a holder.

**Next row:** Cast off 3 sts, patt to end. 12 (13:15:16) sts.

Dec 1 st at neck edge on next 4 rows. 8 (9:11:12) sts.

Work until front matches back to shoulder shaping, ending with WS facing for next row.

#### SHAPE SHOULDER

Next row (WS): Cast off 4 (4:5:5) sts. Work 1 row. Cast off rem 4 (5:6:7) sts.

#### **MAKING UP**

Block pieces according to ballband instructions (see page 49 for blocking tips). Sew together both shoulder seams.

#### **NECK EDGING (WORKED IN ROUNDS)**

With RS facing and using 3.75mm circular needle pick up and knit 10 (10:12:12) sts down left front neck, k across 14 (16:17:19) sts from holder for front neck, pick up and knit 10 (10:12:12) sts up right front neck to shoulder, pick up and knit 3 sts down right back neck, k across 22 (24:25:27) sts from holder for back neck, pick up and knit 3 sts up left back neck to shoulder. 62 (66:72:76) sts.

Round 1: Purl.

Round 2: Knit.

Round 3: Purl.

Round 4: Knit.

Turn work and work picot cast off on WS as

Cast off 3 sts, \*slip st on RH needle back onto LH needle, cast on 2 sts, then cast off 5 sts, rep from \* to end.

**Row 15:** SI wyif, ssk, (yo, ssk, k1) 3 times, k2tog, yo, k3, k2tog, yo, k2, (k1, yo, k1, sl1, k2tog, psso, k1, yo, k5, [daisy st, k1] twice, k3), k1, yo, k1, sl1, k2tog, psso, k1, yo, k1, k2tog, yo, k4, yo, ssk, (k1, k2tog, yo) 3 times, k2tog, k1.

Row 16: Repeat row 8.

**Row 17:** SI wyif, ssk, (yo, ssk, k1) twice, yo, sl1, k2tog, psso, yo, k4, k2tog, yo, k2, (k2, yo, sl1, k2tog, psso, yo, k2, [k1, daisy st] 3 times, k1), k2, yo, sl1, k2tog, psso, yo, k2, k2tog, yo, k5, yo, sl1, k2tog, psso, (yo, k1, k2tog) twice, yo, k2tog, k1.

Row 18: Repeat row 6.

**Row 19:** SI wyif, ssk, (yo, ssk, k1) twice, yo, ssk, k4, k2tog, yo, k2, (yo, k2, sl1, k2tog, psso, k2, yo, k4, [daisy st, k1] twice, k3), yo, k2, sl1, k2tog, psso, k2, yo, k2tog, yo, k6, (yo, k1, k2tog) twice, yo, k2tog, k1.

Row 20: Repeat row 4.

**Row 21:** SI wyif, ssk, (yo, ssk, k1) twice, yo, ssk, k3, k2tog, yo, k2, (k1, yo, k1, sl1, k2tog, psso, k1, yo, k1, [k1, daisy st] 3 times, k1), k1, yo, k1, sl1, k2tog, psso, k1, yo, k1, k2tog, yo, k4, (k2tog, yo, k1) twice, k2tog, yo, k2tog, k1.

Row 22: Repeat row 2.

Row 23: SI wyif, ssk, (yo, ssk, k1) twice, yo, ssk, k2, k2tog, yo, k2, (k2, yo, sl1, k2tog, psso, yo, k6, [daisy st, k1] twice, k3), k2, yo, sl1, k2tog, psso, yo, k2, k2tog, yo, k3, (k2tog, yo, k1) twice, k2tog, yo, k1.

**Row 24:** SI wyif, k1, p9, k2tog, yo, k2, p7, ([p1, {p2w} 5 times] 3 times, p8), k2tog, yo, k2, p10, k2.

#### Final pattern repeat only:

**Row 24:** SI wyif, k1, p9, k2tog, yo, k2, p to last 16 sts, k2tog, yo, k2, p10, k2.

#### **SHAWL PATTERN**

Cast on 90 sts, using a stretchy cast on. (Long tail cast on holding 2 needles together is recommended).

Row 1 (RS): K to end. Row 2: SI wyif, k to end. Rep last row 2 more times.







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## SEWING UP MADE SIMPLE

If you're a knitter who hates sewing up, look no further! We've got the tricks you need to make everything easier. By *Rosee Woodland* 

ewing up is one of those jobs that has to be done. Unless you knit everything seamlessly at some point you will have to pick up a needle and stitch your knitted pieces together. Even the most experienced knitter can come unstuck at this point, but there's really no need. A few simple techniques make all the difference between a lumpy seam and a virtually invisible one. And loose ends can be made to disappear in moments. To start with, you may find these methods take a little longer, but it's worth it for the professional finish you'll get, and pretty soon they'll be second nature. Have faith!



#### **BLOCKING**


Blocking is used to improve the finish of your knitted fabric. If you've ever knitted a stocking stitch swatch you'll know that the edges curl in at the top and bottom edges and out at the side edges. Trying to sew a seam or a sleeve head when the edges of your fabric are curling every which way just makes things a lot harder and there's no need. You can see the difference between a blocked and unblocked swatch over the page 1. Yes, blocking is an extra process and you won't be able to stitch up your work immediately but if you can be a little patient you'll get a much better end result.

If you're using natural fibres or natural/ synthetic mixes there are a couple of choices. For wool, alpaca and silk, take your knitted pieces and place them in warm (not hot) water, preferably with some non-rinse wool wash - it will give your finished garment a fresh smell. Leave the pieces to soak for about 20 minutes and then lift them out. Leaving it this long lets the water completely soak in. It's important that you lift them out flat, so that the weight of the water isn't dragging the edges down. Space each piece out across a clean dry towel, place a second towel on top and then roll the whole lot tightly. This squeezes out plenty of water without twisting the pieces. Now lay them flat to dry on another towel. If you've made something lace which you want to 'open up' or the pieces are really out of shape you

can pin them out while they dry. Quilter's T-pins are good for this as they are extra strong and don't rust 2. You can buy blocking mats but interlocking children's playmats are brilliant as you can change their layout and they're cheap!

This method of blocking is fairly slow as your pieces won't be dry for at least 24 hours, and possibly longer. For a quicker method, which is also better for cotton yarns, place each piece on an ironing board and put the iron on the lowest steam setting. Hold the steaming iron about 2cm (lower if you have a steady hand!) over the knitted pieces and let the steam work into them. For cotton



yarn, which soaks up a lot of water and gets really heavy, this is much more manageable than soaking. For either method do check the fibre content of the yarn you're using, as anything with more than 50 per cent synthetic fibres may not block out fully. Take extra care if you are using the iron method as synthetic fibres can melt if they are heated up!

#### FALSE GRAFTING

Back stitching shoulder seams can make them very lumpy. False grafting creates an extra row of stitches between the two shoulder seams and helps them lie flatter.

To work false grafting hold your two pieces so that the top edges are touching. Take a length of matching yarn (see Tips) and go under the two legs of the top stitch 3 and then under the two legs of the bottom stitch 4. When you've worked across all the stitches you have two options. By working the false neatly and at the same tension you can leave a row of extra stitches, invisibly joining the two pieces. 5. This works best on lighter fabrics where there isn't much weight pulling the pieces downwards. For thicker yarn (aran weight and heavier) consider creating an invisible

seam, which will be stronger. When you've

finished your false graft grab the yarn at both ends and pull it gently 6. This will pull the yarn through all the stitches, locking them together and creating an invisible join 7. It's a really neat finish!

#### **WEAVING IN**

Your weaving in should hide your yarn end and secure it so that it doesn't come out later and unravel your knitting. We've done our weaving in on the middle of the swatch to make it really clear, but ideally you should only start a new ball at the beginning/ end of a row to minimise its appearance. Try working a duplicate



stitch on the reverse of your work. Follow the pattern of your stitches up 8 and down 9 until you've worked all but a few centimetres of your yarn end. Clip this off after you've blocked your finished pieces (as blocking can pull yarn ends into your work) 10. As you can see when using contrasting yarn, this method can show a little on the right side of the work if you're using a fairly bulky yarn 👊 (the two yarns here are both aran weight). For a truly invisible finish you can split the plies of the stitches you are working into the back 12. This is more fiddly, but is almost impossible to spot in matching yarn. 13

#### **MATTRESS STITCH**

Great at reducing bulk on vertical seams. Place your two pieces right sides up and side by side. Take your needle under the ladder of a stitch on your right hand piece 44 and then again under the opposite ladder on your left hand piece 15. Work your way up the seam, keeping your stitches slightly loose so that you can see them, working up the same ladder throughout. Try working every two ladders, which is quicker and still looks good. When you get to the top take both ends 16 and pull them gently until the stitches disappear 17. You have an invisible seam!

#### Size matters

If the yarn your knitting is worked in is fairly bulky consider either splitting the plies for sewing up or using a finer yarn in a matching colour

#### **Block twice**

Block your knitted pieces and then give your garment a final steam when it's sewn up for a professional finish

Work in 2/2 rib for 5cm or 2in or 16 rows and on the final row inc 1 (3:3:1) sts.

**Change to 4mm needles** and cont in lozenge pattern st on the 71 (**77**:81:**87**) sts obtained, following the chart on page 58 as follows:

**6 yrs**: From the 3rd row of chart starting at st 9.

**8 yrs**: From the 1st row of chart starting at st 6.

**10 yrs**: From the 1st row of chart starting at st 4.

**12 yrs**: From the 1st row of chart starting at st 1.

#### **ARMHOLES**

When work measures 22 (**26**:30:**34**) cm or 8¾ (**10**¼:12:**13**½) in or 62 (**72**:84:**96**) rows total, cast off at the beg of every row as foll: 3 sts twice, 2 sts twice, 1 st 6 (**8**:8:**8**) times. Cont on the rem 55 (**59**:63:**69**) sts until work

measures 38 (43:48:53)cm or 15 (17:19:21)in or 104 (118:132:146) rows total.

#### **SHOULDERS & NECK**

Cast off 4 (4:4:5) sts, work 18 (19:20:21) sts, cast off the central 11 (13:15:17) sts for the neck, work rem 22 (23:24:26) sts. Each side will now be completed separately.

**Next row (WS)**: Cast off 4 (4:4:5) sts, work to central cast off sts and put rem sts on a stitch holder.

Next row (RS): Cast off 3 sts at neck edge, work to end.

**Next row (WS)**: Cast off 4 (4:5:5) sts, work to end

Next row (RS): Cast off 2 sts at neck edge, work to end.

Next row (WS): Cast off 4 (5:5:5) sts. Work 1 row straight.



When work measures 17 (18:18:18) cm or ` 6¾ (7:7:7) in or 48 (52:52:52) rows total leave on a spare needle.

Pick up the 17 (16:16:16) sts from 2nd stitch holder, work 5 (3:3:3) sts, then place the 31 (**36**:38:**41**) sts on the 3rd needle at front of work. With the right needle knit or purl together the 1st st from each needle until all sts from the front needle have been used then work to end.

Cont in patt as est on the 36 (39:41:44) sts obtained until work measures

22 (26:30:34) cm or 8¾ (10¼:12:13½) in or 62 (72:84:96) rows total.

#### **NECK**

Cast off at the beg of every RS row as foll: 5 (6:7:8) sts once, 3 sts once, 2 sts once, 1 st once.

Cont on the rem 17 (18:19:21) sts until work measures 38 (43:48:53) cm or 15 (17:19:21) in or 104 (118:132:146) rows total.

#### **SHOULDER**

Cast off at the beg of every RS row as foll: 4 (4:4:5) sts 3 (2:1:3) times, 5 (5:5:6) sts 1 (2:3:1) times.

#### **LEFT FRONT**

Using 3.5mm needles and A cast on 36 (38:40:44) sts.

Work in 2/2 rib for 5cm or 2 in or 16 rows starting with k2 for all sizes and inc 1 st on the final row for sizes 8 and 10 yrs.

Change to 4mm needles and cont on the 36 (39:41:44) sts obtained as foll: 35 (38:40:43) sts lozenge patt st starting as



Cast off at the beg of every RS row as foll: 3 sts once, 2 sts once, 1 st 3 (4:4:4) times. Cont on the rem 28 (30:32:35) sts to 34 (39:44:49) cm or 13½ (15½:17½:19¾) in.

#### **NECK**

Cast off at the beg of every WS row as foll: 5 (6:7:8) sts once, 3 sts once, 2 sts once, 1 st once. Cont on the rem 17 (18:19:21) sts until work measures 38 (43:48:53) cm or 15 (17:19:21)in. 104 (118:132:146) rows total.

#### **SHOULDER**

Cast off at the beg of every WS row as foll: 4 (4:4:5) sts 3 (2:1:3) times, 5 (5:5:6) sts 1 (2:3:1) times.

#### **SLEEVES**

Using 3.5mm needles and A cast on 42 (**46**:46:**50**) sts.

Work 5cm or 2in or 16 rows in 2/2 rib and inc 2 sts on the final row for sizes 6 and 10 yrs. 44 (**46**:48:**50**) sts.

**Change to 4mm needles** and starting with a knit row cont in st st for 10 rows.



Cont to work 2 less sts on every row another 18 times, then 3 less sts another 6 times.

Work 1 row across all sts then leave on a spare needle.

#### **TO MAKE UP**

Around the pocket openings using D and crochet hook work as foll:

Row 1: 17 (19:19:19) sl st.

**Row 2**: 1 ch, then 1 dc into each sl st then fasten off.

Join shoulder seams.

Graft neckband around neck edge.

Sew sleeves into armholes.

Sew side and sleeve seams.

Sew the back of pockets to the WS of fronts. Sew on zip.

Fold the neck band to the RS and hold in place with a few sts using sewing needle and thread. Secure and weave in all ends.



very time you start knitting a story begins to unfold. There are the characters in the story (you and the people you knit for) and a history behind the yarn itself, the stitches and the garment you're making. Even the designer has his or her tale to tell.

This story begins in Slaithwaite, West Yorkshire, where Spectrum Yarns' working mill produces yarns for high-end fabrics that make their way into bespoke suits sold in Savile Row. Just over 18 months ago Richard Brown, chairman of Spectrum Yarns, joined forces with a star cast of knitting know-it-alls: Stephen Sheard, founder of Rowan Yarns, Juliet Bernard, former editor of The Knitter, sales and marketing director Annabelle Hill and designer and creative director Amanda

Crawford. Starting with a blank sheet of paper, they began to imagine the perfect yarn. What would it look and feel like? What would it be like to knit with?

#### **SPIN A YARN**

The romance of yarn is brought to life in the

Yarn Stories brand. Cecilia Forfitt discovers

the tale behind these designer wools

The team began to work together closely, making use of Richard's technical expertise to create samples using fine Australian merino - a bright fibre that takes colour beautifully. Rather than working from what the spinning machines could produce, they were keen to involve experienced knitters and crocheters and to see what they could achieve collectively. Balls of yarn were sent out to designers like Jane Crowfoot, then the machines were tweaked according to their observations. After studying the feedback

DK and 4ply, the team added a soft merino and baby alpaca blend in both DK and aran weights. And so, the Yarn Stories brand was born.

#### A COLOURFUL TALE

Now that they had their ideal yarns, the team had to come up with a colour palette that would appeal to knitters and crocheters alike. A huge fan of Kaffe Fassett and a keen knitter herself, sales and marketing director Annabelle Hill travels to Pitti Filati twice a year to look at colour trends, and you'll see her discoveries coming through in the current Yarn Stories designs.

After creating a huge 'in an ideal world' palette, she narrowed it down to a selection of colours that work together in countless different combinations, but also look great on their own - from cobalt blue and punchy orange to leaf green and burnt toffee. "We agreed we'd pick just 16 shades" says Annabelle, "and ended up compromising and going for 20. Once you start playing around with colours it becomes addictive - you just want to add more and more!"

#### **MAIN CHARACTERS**

In her five years as editor of *The Knitter* magazine Juliet Bernard worked with countless designers, and she continues to be involved in the global knitting scene. This means she has an address book bursting with big names, and has been able to recruit some fantastic well-known designers for the new brand, as well as some young, up-and-coming knitters.

One designer Juliet is very excited to have on board is Lily France, who at just 17 is the youngest in the Yarn Stories gang. That's not to say she's just starting out though – Lily has been designing her own knits since she

was just 10 years old. Juliet describes the first time she met her: "This young girl walked past our stand at an event in Grasmere, wearing an amazing garment. Her mum explained that it was her daughter's own pattern – we couldn't believe it. She was only 13!" You'll find Pleach, Lily's design, on the Yarn Stories website – it's an intriguing knit with a moss stitch plait for the newish knitter, in vibrant apple green.

Bigger names are being added all the time – we're told Michelle Wang is a big fan of the yarns and Sue Bartley Kyle is just about to add a children's collection to the mix.

#### YARN FEATURE

Having worked for The Knitter for so long, Juliet knows how hard it is to make a living as a designer, and is committed to supporting them in their work - Yarn Stories pay the contributors a fee for a design, but also a revenue share from the downloads of their patterns.

The team have been careful to cater for knitters of all ages and abilities, and have made sure that there are lots of wardrobe staples and classics as well as unusual statement pieces. There are simple patterns for those just starting out and trickier projects for knitting

'super heroes' to get their teeth into, plus garments for all sorts of body shapes.

Many different techniques are explored, too: there are top-down sweaters, and plenty of colourwork pieces, including the beautiful County by Sasha Kagan, which sees colour motifs blended with moss stitch. Carrying on the story theme, the collections are named after characters from The Chronicles of Narnia, films starring Grace Kelly and female pioneers from the worlds of science, literature and human rights - women with inspirational stories to tell. Spring will see two new design stories being added: Marine, which will feature garments in aqua tones, and Skylark, a floral-themed collection.

#### THE NEXT CHAPTER

So, what's next? "You'll definitely be seeing us at lots of shows this year," says Juliet. "The most important thing is to get the yarn into people's hands so they can feel it. When I go to shows I always try to have some yarn on my needles so people can try knitting with it. They just want to carry on and on, though - they never stop at just one row!" There will also be a new yarn with a silk content, and some pretty exciting names added to the trusty team of knitters.



This luscious lawender batwing top is worked seamlessly from the top down on circular needles, so it really is knitted from top to bottom! This means there is no stitching up to do at the end - an added bonus. This is one lightweight knit that you are bound to wear again and again, with its flattering batwing shape.

#### Materials

◆ Yarn7 (8:8:8:9:9:10:10) x 50gballs of Yarn Stories Fine

Merino DK in Lilac (shade 2511)

4mm (UK 8, US 6) circular

#### Tension

20 sts and 30 rows or rounds to 10cm or 4in square in st st on 3.5mm needles.

#### Pattern notes

This sweater is worked seamlessly from the top down. First the neck ribbing

is worked in the round and then the neck is shaped by working short rows back and forth. When all the neck shaping is done the yoke is again worked in the round. After all raglan increases are done, sleeve sts are placed on hold to work the body first to the lower 1x1 rib. Sleeve sts are picked up again to work the sleeves top down in the round to the 1x1 rib cuffs.

#### Using stitch markers

The different shaping areas are indicated with stitch markers that are placed onto the needle and slipped on every round. To begin, use one colour of stitch marker to mark the raglan sleeves, and a different colour for the marker at beg of rnd.

#### **SPECIAL TECHNIQUES**

#### **GERMAN SHORT ROWS**

On a RS row: Knit the number of stitches as stated in the pattern, turn work, bring yarn to front, slip the first st as if to purl, bring yarn over the needle to the back of your work and pull tight. This creates the double stitch (DS). Bring yarn to front.

On a WS row: Purl the number of stitches as stated in the pattern, turn work, bring yarn to front, slip the first stitch as if to purl, bring yarn over the needle to the back of your work and pull tight. This creates the double stitch (DS).

To work a DS into the knitting: When working over double stitches treat them as a single stitch, by knitting through both legs of the DS on a RS row, purling through both legs of the DS on a WS row.

#### **SWEATER**

Using a 3.5mm circular needle, cast on 124 (**124**:124:124:132:132:132) sts. Place a marker to indicate BOR. Join to work in the round, being careful not to twist.

#### PLACE RAGLAN MARKERS

Next rnd: K23 (23:25:25:25:25:25) (half back), place a marker, k17 (15:15:13:13:15:15:15) (right sleeve), place a marker, k45 (47:47:49:49:51:51:51) (front), place a marker, k17 (15:15:13:13:15:15:15) (left sleeve), place a marker, k22 (24:24:24:24:26:26) (half back), slm.

**Next rnd:** \* K1, p1; rep from \* to end, slipping all markers.

Rep the last rnd 3 more times.

Change to 4mm circular needle.

Knit 1 rnd.

Start raglan increases and short row shaping for back:

Short row 1 (RS): K to 1 st before next marker, M1R, k1, slm, p1, k1, M1L, k to 2 sts before next marker, M1R, k1, p1, slm, k1, M1L, k2, turn.

Short row 2 (WS): DS, p to marker, slm, k1, p to 1 st before next marker, k1, slm, p to BOR marker, slm, p to 1 st before next marker, M1L (purl), p1, slm, k1, p1, M1R (purl), p to 2 sts before next marker, M1L (purl), p1, k1, slm, p1, M1R (purl), p2, turn.

Short row 3 (RS): DS, k to marker, slm, p1, k to 1 st before next marker, p1, slm, k to 1 st before next marker, M1R, k1, slm, p1, k1, M1L, k to 2 sts before next marker, M1R, k1, slm, p1, k1, M1L, k to 2 sts before next marker, M1R, k1, p1, slm, k1, M1L, k to DS,

k through both legs of DS as one, k1, turn.

Short row 4 (WS): DS, p to marker, slm, k1, p to 1 st before next marker, k1, slm, p to BOR marker, slm,

p to 1 st before next marker, M1L (purl), p1, slm, k1, p1, M1R (purl),

p to 2 sts before next marker, M1L (purl), p1, k1, slm, p1, M1R (purl),

p to DS, p through both legs of the DS as one, p1, turn.

Rep Short rows 3 and 4 three more times. 55 (57:57:59:59:61:61) sts (on each of front and back, counting DS as 1 st), 27 (25:25:23:23:25:25) sts (each sleeve).

Short row 11 (RS): DS, k to marker, slm, p1, k to 1 st before next marker, p1, slm, k to BOR marker, slm,

k to 1 st before next marker, M1R, k1, slm, p1, k1, M1L, k to 2 sts before next marker, M1R, k1, p1, slm, k1, M1L, k to DS, k through both legs of the DS as one, k2, turn.

Short row 12 (WS): DS, p to marker, slm, k1, p to 1 st before next marker, k1, slm, p to BOR marker, slm,

p to 1 st before next marker, M1L (purl), p1, slm, k1, p1, M1R (purl),

p to 2 sts before next marker, M1L (purl), p1, k1, slm, p1, M1R (purl), p to DS, p through both legs of the DS as one,

Rep Short rows 11 and 12 two more times. 61 (63:63:65:65:67:67:67) sts (each front/back, counting DS as 1 st), 33 (31:31:29:29:31:31) sts (each sleeve).

Short row 17 (RS): DS, k to marker, slm, p1, k to 1 st before next marker, p1, slm, k to BOR marker, slm,

k to 1 st before next marker, M1R, k1, slm, p1, k1, M1L, k to 2 sts before next marker, M1R, k1, p1, slm, k1, M1L, k to DS, k through both legs of the DS as one, k3, turn.

Short row 18 (WS): DS, p to marker, slm, k1, p to 1 st before next marker, k1, slm, p to BOR marker, slm,

p to 1 st before next marker, M1L (purl), p1, slm, k1, p1,

M1R (purl), p to 2 sts before next marker, M1L (purl), p1, k1, slm, p1, M1R (purl), p to DS, p through both legs of the DS as one, p3, turn.

Next row (RS): DS, k to marker, slm, p1, k to 1 st before next marker, p1, slm, k to BOR marker, slm.

63 (65:65:67:67:69:69) sts (each front/back, counting DS as 1 st), 35 (33:33:31:31:33:33) sts (each sleeve) Resume knitting in the round.

**Next rnd:** K to 1 st before next marker, M1R, k1, slm, p1, k1, M1L,

M1R, k1, slm, p1, k1, M1L,

k to 2 sts before next marker, M1R, k1, p1, slm, k1, M1L, k to 1 st before next marker, M1R, k1, slm, p1, k1, M1L, k to 2 sts before next marker,

M1R, k1, p1, slm, k1, M1L,

k to BOR marker, slm.

**Next rnd:** \* K to next marker, slm, p1, k to 1 st before next marker, p1, slm; rep from\* once more, k to BOR marker, slm. Rep the last 2 rnds 1 (3:6:7:10:11:15:18) more times.

69 (75:81:85:91:95:103:109) sts (each front/ back), 41 (43:49:49:55:59:67:73) sts (each sleeve).

**Next rnd:** K to 1 st before next marker, M1R, k1, slm, p1, k1, M1L, k to 2 sts before next marker, M1R, k1, p1, slm, k1, M1L, k to 1 st before next marker, M1R, k1, slm, p1, k1, M1L, k to 2 sts before next marker, M1R, k1, p1, slm, k1, M1L, k to BOR marker, slm.

Next rnd: \* K to next marker, slm, p1, k to 1 st before next marker, p1, slm; rep from\* once more, k to BOR marker, slm. Rep the last rnd 2 times more.

Rep the last 4 rnds 15 (15:14:14:13:13:12:11) more times



**Next rnd:** \* K to next marker, slm, p1, k to 1 st before next marker, p1, slm; rep from\* once more, k to BOR marker, slm.



101 (107:113:119:123:129:135:143) sts (each front/back), 73 (75:79:79:83:87:93:97) sts (each sleeve).

#### **SEPARATE SLEEVES AND BODY**

Next rnd: K to marker, slm, slip following 73 (**75**:79:**79**:83:**87**:93:**97**) sleeve sts onto a stitch holder, remove marker, k to next marker, slm, slip following 73 (75:79:79:83:87:93:97) sleeve sts onto a stitch holder, remove marker, k to BOR marker, remove BOR marker, k to next marker (new BOR marker), slm. To avoid holes at the joining points, you will pick up 1 st at each underarm in the following rnd as follows:

Next rnd: \* Lift loop between stitches from front and purl through the back loop, k to next marker, slm; rep from\* once more.

102 (108:114:120:124:130:136:144) sts (each front/back).

Continue on these sts only for the body as follows:

Next rnd: \* P1 (side seam st), k to marker, slm; rep from\* once more.

Rep this rnd 4 more times.

Next rnd (dec rnd): \* P1, k2, k2tog, k to 4 sts before marker, ssk, k2, slm; rep from\* once more.

100 (106:112:118:122:128:134:142) sts (each front/back),

Rep this dec rnd every 6th rnd 3 more times

94 (100:106:112:116:122:128:136) sts (each front/back).

Work in st st, always purling the seam st, until body measures 20cm or 8in from underarm, or 4cm or 1½in less than required length.

Change to 3.5mm circular needle. Next rnd: \* P1, k1; rep from\* to end. Rep the last rnd until rib measures 4cm or 1½in.

Next rnd: K to end. Cast off loosely knitwise.

#### **SLEEVES**

Divide 73 (75:79:79:83:87:93:97) sts equally on four 4mm double pointed needles. With RS of work facing, rejoin yarn to centre of underarm on body and pick up and k 1 st, k the sleeve sts, place a marker for BOR.

74 (76:80:80:84:88:94:98) sts.

Next rnd: P1 (seam st), k to BOR marker, slm. Rep this rnd 2 more times.

Next rnd (dec rnd): P1, k2, k2tog, k to 4 sts before BOR marker, ssk, k2, slm. Rep this dec rnd on every 2nd rnd 0 (0:1:1:3:6:9:10) more times, then every 4th rnd 10 (12:13:12:12:10:9:8) more times, then every 6th rnd 2 (0:0:0:0:0:0:0) more

48 (50:50:52:52:54:56:60) sts.

Work in st st, always purling the seam st, until sleeve measures 20cm or 8in from underarm, or 4cm or 1½in less than required length.

Change to 3.5mm circular needle. Next rnd: \* P1, k1; rep from\* to end. Rep the last rnd until rib measures 4cm or 1½in.

Next rnd: K to end. Cast off loosely knitwise.

#### TO MAKE UP

Sew in all yarn ends neatly. Pin out the sweater using the blocking diagram above as a guide. Cover it with clean, damp tea towels and leave to dry.

ne of the longest running animal charities is getting its 2015 campaign up and running - and they need your help. It also reached out to more than 50,000 schoolchildren in

developing countries, educating them to ensure a better future for their working animals.

SPANA are asking for your help in their 2015 'Big Knit for Vet



Cont straight until sleeve meas

Using 4mm circular needle cast on 164 (**180**:204:**228**:256) sts but do not join. **Row 1 (RS):** P1, k2, \*p2, k2, rep from \* to last st, p1.

These 2 rows form rib.

Cont in rib for a further 12 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

#### Change to 4.5mm circular needle.

**Row 1 (RS):** K41 (**45**:51:**57**:64), place marker, k82 (**90**:102:**114**:128), place marker, k41 (**45**:51:**57**:64).

Beg with a p row, slipping markers as you go, cont in st st for a further 3 (5:5:9:9) rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

**Next row (WS):** \*K to 3 sts before marker, M1L, k6, M1R, rep from \* once more, k to end.

(4 sts increased) 168 (**184**:208:**232**:260) sts. Working increases as set by last row, inc 4 sts on 18th and foll 18th row.

176 (192:216:240:268) sts.

Work 1 row, ending with RS facing for next row.

#### SHAPE FOR FRONT NECK

Next row: K to last 11 (12:13:13:14) sts, wrap next st (by slipping next st from left needle to right needle, taking yarn to opposite side of work between needles and



then slipping same st back onto left needle - when working back across wrapped sts, work the wrapping loop and the wrapped st tog as one st) and turn.

Next row: P to last 11 (12:13:13:14) sts, wrap next st and turn.

Next row: K to last 15 (16:17:18:19) sts, wrap next st and turn.

Next row: P to last 15 (16:17:18:19) sts, wrap next st and turn.

Next row: K to last 19 (20:21:23:24) sts, wrap next st and turn.

Next row: P to last 19 (20:21:23:24) sts, wrap next st and turn.

Next row: K to last 23 (24:25:28:29) sts, wrap next st and turn.

Next row: P to last 23 (24:25:28:29) sts, wrap next st and turn.

Cont in this way working 4 (4:4:5:5) less sts on every row before wrapping next st and turning, until the foll row has been worked:

Next row: P to last 43 (44:49:58:64) sts. wrap next st and turn.

Next row: K to end. Next row: P to end.

(Body should meas approx 30 (31:32:33:34) cm or 11¾ (12¼:12½:13:13½) Oin at centre

Break yarn and leave sts on a holder.

#### **MAKING UP**

Block out each piece of knitting, following the care instructions on the label.


With RS facing, using 4.5mm circular needle, work across sts of body and sleeves as folls: K first 40 (44:50:56:63) sts of body – these sts form right front section, slip next 8 sts of body onto a holder (for right underarm) and, in their place, k across 56 (60:64:68:72) sts of first sleeve, k next 80 (88:100:112:126) sts of body - these sts form back section, slip next 8 sts of body onto a holder (for left underarm) and, in their place, k across 56 (60:64:68:72) sts of second sleeve, k rem 40 (44:50:56:63) sts of body - these sts form left front section.

272 (296:328:360:396) sts.

Beg with a p row, cont in st st as folls: Work 1 row, ending with RS facing for next row.

Size XXL only **Next row (RS):** K- (-:-:-:1), k2tog,

#### **BLOCKING DIAGRAM**



(k-(-:-:-:38), k2 tog) - (-:-:-:9) times,k- (-:-:-:33). - (-:-:-:386) sts. Work - (-:-:-:1) row.

Next row (RS): K-(-:-:17:23), sl 1, k1, psso, (k- (-:-:18:18), sl 1, k1, psso) - (-:-:17:18) times, k-(-:-:1:1). - (-:-:342:367) sts. Work - (-:-:3:3) rows.

Sizes M, L, XL and XXL only Next row (RS): K-(1:1:1:1), k2tog, (k-(35:17:17:17), K2 toq) – (7:16:17:18) times, k-(34:21:16:22). - (288:311:324:348) sts. Work - (1:3:3:3) rows.

#### All sizes

Next row (RS): K17 (15:20:15:39), sl 1, k1, psso, (k16 (16:16:15), sl 1, k1, psso) 14 (15:16:17:18) times, k1.

257 (272:294:306:329) sts.

Work 3 rows.

Next row (RS): K1, k2tog, (k15, k2 tog) 14 (15:16:17:18) times, k16 (14:19:14:20). 242 (256:277:288:310) sts.

Work 3 rows.

Next row (RS): K15 (13:18:13:19), sl 1, k1, psso, (k14, sl 1, k1, psso) 14 (**15**:16:**17**:18) times, k1. 227 (240:260:270:291) sts. Work 3 rows.

Next row (RS): K1, k2tog, (k13, k2 tog) 14 (15:16:17:18) times, k14 (12:17:12:18). 212 (224:243:252:272) sts. Work 3 rows.

Next row (RS): K13 (11:16:15:3), sl 1, k1, psso, (k12 (12:12:11:12), sl 1, k1, psso) 14 (15:16:18:19) times, k1. 197 (208:226:233:252) sts.

Work 3 rows.

Next row (RS): K1, k2tog, (k11 (11:10: 10:11), k2 tog) 14 (15:17:18:19) times, k12 (10:19:14:2). 182 (192:208:214:232) sts. Work 3 rows.

Next row (RS): K11 (9:18:13: 20), sl 1, k1, psso, (k10 (10:9:9:9), sl 1, k1, psso) 14 (15:17:18:19) times, k1. 167 (176:190:195:212) sts.

Next row (RS): K1, k2tog, (k9 (9:8:8:8), k2 tog) 14 (15:17:18:19) times, k10 (8:7:12:19). 152 (160:172:176:192) sts.

Next row: Knit.

Work 3 rows.

Now work in rib as given for body for 8 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

Next row (RS): K5 (1:7:1:1), sl 1, k1, psso, (k2, sl 1, k1, psso) 35 (39:39:43:47) times, k5 (1:7:1:1). 116 (120:132:132:144) sts. Next row: Knit.

Now work in rib as given for body for 6 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

Next row (RS): K11 (5:3:3:12), k2tog, (k2 (2:2:2:1), k2tog) 23 (27:31:31:39) times, k11 (5:3:3:13). 92 (92:100:100:104) sts.

Next row: Knit.

Now work in rib as given for body for 4 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

Next row (RS): K11 (11:8:9:11), sl 1, k1, psso, (k1, sl 1, k1, psso) 23 (23:27:27) times, k10 (10:9:8:10). 68 (68:72:72:76) sts. Cast off knitwise (on WS).

Join underarm seams by grafting tog the 2 sets of 8 sts left on holders.

#### **BUTTON BAND**

With RS facing and using 4mm needles, pick up and knit 82 (86:90:94:98) sts evenly down left front opening edge, from cast-off edge to cast-on edge.

**Row 1 (WS):** P2, \*k2, p2, rep from \* to end. **Row 2:** K2, \*p2, k2, rep from \* to end. These 2 rows form rib.

> Cont in rib for a further 7 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

Cast off in rib.

#### **BUTTONHOLE BAND**

With RS facing and using 4mm needles, pick up and knit 82 (86:90:94:98) sts evenly up right front opening edge, from cast-on edge to cast-off edge.

Work in rib as given for the button band for

3 rows, ending with RS facing for the

Row 4 (RS): Rib 4, \*work 2 tog, yrn (to make a buttonhole), rib 16 (17:18:19:20) sts, rep from \* 3 times more, work 2 tog, yrn (to make 5th buttonhole), rib 4.

Cont in rib for a further 5 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

Cast off in rib.

#### A SLIP OF THE SOCK

I'm knitting a ribbed pair of socks which I had nearly finished when I noticed a jog in the ribs a couple of rounds down on the leg. I haven't touched it since because I'm not sure how to correct

the mistake. Can you help?

Sarah says: To correct a mistake a couple of rows back you will need to unravel your knitting back to the row below the mistake and re-knit. This process is called frogging. The best way to unravel back a couple of rows is to insert your needle (or a needle with a smaller gauge depending how tightly you knit) through the stitching on the row below the mistake. You can then remove the needle you were knitting with and gently frog back to the needle you inserted. Once you have done this you can carry on knitting and finish your socks! Frogging can be frustrating if you've knitted a lot more before you notice

Use a 'babysitter' needle to guard correct stitches

the mistake, but it is really worth it to get a perfect finish in your project.



**KNIT PETITE** 

l'm very petite and find that if I follow a knitting pattern they fit around my width, but often end up way too long around the sleeves and length. I'm not sure how to tailor patterns to my height. Chloe Taylor,

Aneeta says: There will be part of most patterns that instruct you to knit to a particular length, for example, 'cont straight to 30cm'. When you see an instruction like this, you can make the knitting shorter (or longer) to suit you. If you are knitting the body section of a bottom-up jumper, then work the piece so it's the length you want from your underarm to your waist. And for the sleeves, hold the knitting up to your underarm and measure to your wrist. Take care to note any changes you make so you can make both sleeves and the front and back of your knitting equal!

#### **CROSSING YOUR TEES**

I have been given some Hoopla t-shirt yarn as a present from a friend and I was wondering if you could recommend what's best to knit with it? Rachel Wilkins, Newcastle

Sarah says: T-shirt yarn is great to use because it is eco-friendly – it's made using off-cuts from the textile industry. As it is knit on 10mm or larger needles, your projects will knit up nice and quick! As you

can see from this sample, it gives a thick and sturdy knit which is good to use for bags, bath mats and headbands. It's easy to make a headband – cast on eight

Expect chunky finishes from t-shirt yarn

stitches and knit in garter stitch until your headband will stretch around your head.

#### KNIT IT NEAT

I've just learnt to cast on and I think my knitting looks a bit untidy. There is a row of loops under the cast on that won't seem to disappear even though I'm knitting as tightly as I can. I'm not sure what I'm doing wrong. Kimberley Clarke, Watford

Aneeta says: It seems to me that you are casting on using the two needle method. This is a great way for a beginner to learn to cast on as it's very similar to a 'knit' stitch. Those little loops are a side

> effect of that type of cast on - you aren't doing anything wrong! What you could try is the thumb method as

when you are unravelling

it's a little neater and doesn't have the little loops. There are so many different types of casting on. Some will of course have their pros and cons, so I suggest you have a go at another method and see if you can find one you prefer.

#### **MAKING IT COUNT**

I'm knitting up a pattern and I just can't get the numbers correct. I'm sure that there's something wrong in the pattern but I'm not sure what it is. What can I do to get some help?

#### Rita Parkinson, Swindon

Aneeta says: The first thing I would do is an internet search with the name of the pattern, the designer, and the word 'errata'. This means that if any mistakes and corrections have been printed for the pattern you may be able to find them online. If that doesn't work then try looking at the website of the designer or where the pattern was printed. That way you can directly contact someone who can help you. I often get emails from knitters who have questions about my patterns. I'm always happy to help someone make sense of the instructions, as are most other pattern writers.



#### CRAFTING IN THE FAMILY

I've been thinking about teaching my little girl how to knit as she wants to join in when I am knitting. Can you recommend any ways to get her involved as she may find knitting and purling a bit tricky.

Sarah says: A good way to get children involved with your knitting is to use a knitting doll. These knit a snake of yarn (similar to i-cords), which can be used to make flowers, finger puppets and jewellery.

They are really easy to use and should get your daughter used to the process of knit stitches before moving on to knitting on needles. I really like the Rico Knitting Dolls because of the cute characters. They are available from good knitting shops or online at www.

## CABLE CONUNDRUMS

Don't let cables tie you up in knots! Jo Benner gets to grips with tricky tangles

#### **FUZZY PATTERN**

I've just started a cabled baby cardi in a wonderful mohair/acrylic mix DK yarn but I can hardly see the knitted cable!

Mila Snook, Trafford

Jo says: Change to a yarn with more definition. Anything fancy with lace or cables needs a yarn that shows the changes in the stitches. I usually go for a smooth varn in wool or a wool/ cotton mix as a cotton-only yarn with cables can make a heavy garment! I love Baby Cashmerino DK yarn by Debbie Bliss; it's a mixture of 55 per cent merino, 33 per cent acrylic and 12 per cent cashmere. At £4.95 for a 50g ball, it's not the cheapest yarn on the market but well worth it when you consider the time it takes to make a cabled cardi – and you won't need much for a baby cardi! Buy from www.johnlewis.com

#### **COBBLED CABLE!**

I'm in the middle of a scarf and I can see that I twisted a cable the wrong way. Do I have to pull the whole thing out to get to the mistake or can I rectify just that section?

Liane Massey, London

Jo says: It depends on how complicated the

design is and how far down the mistake is. If it is a simple twist and not too far down you can drop the stitches down to the row before the mistake and rework them with the dropped threads – it's quite easy to do with a crochet hook. Carefully change the direction of the

cable, making sure that the stitches don't unravel any more (the crossing of the stitches can pull some of the stitches out). For all knitting mistakes (including cables!) buy KnitFix by Lisa Kartus – it has fab reviews at www.amazon.co.uk where you can find it for £14.99 (spiral bound) or is absolutely free to download if you're a member of Kindle Unlimited.

**Next row (RS)**: Cast off 4 sts, work 63 (67:75:79) sts, cast off the 2 central sts, work to end.

**Next row** (**WS**): Cast off 4 sts, work to central cast off sts and put rem sts on a stitch holder. Work will now be completed in 2 sections.

Next row (RS): Cast off 2 (1:1:1) sts, work to end.

Next row (WS): Cast off 3 sts, work to end. Next row (RS): Cast off 1 st, work to end. Next row (WS): Cast off 2 (2:2:3) sts, work to end.

**Next row** (**RS**): Cast off 1 st, work to end. **Next row** (**WS**): Cast off 2 sts, work to end. **Next row** (**RS**): Cast off 1 st, work to end. **Next row** (**WS**): Cast off 1 (1:2:2) sts, work to end.

**Next row** (**RS**): Cast off 1 st, work to end. **Next row** (**WS**): Cast off 1 (1:1:2) sts, work to end.

Next row (RS): Cast off 1 st, work to end. Cont to cast off 1 st at the beg of every row another 12 (12:16:16) times. 35 (40:43:45) sts. The armhole shaping is now complete, cont to cast off 1 st at the beg of every RS row (neck edge) another 13 (15:15:16) times. Continue on the rem 22 (25:28:29) sts until work measures 56 (58:60:62) cm or 22 (23:23½:24½) in. 166 (174:178:184) rows.

#### SHOULDER

Cast off at the beg of every WS row as foll: 5 (6:7:7) sts 2 (3:4:3) times, then 6 (7:0:8) sts 2 (1:0:1) times.

With WS facing pick up sts left on stitch holder and work left front as for right front reversing all shaping.

#### **NECKBAND**

Using 3.5mm needles, cast on 153 (161:173:181) sts. Work in 1/1 rib for 9 rows, switch to a contrasting yarn (not acrylic or nylon) and work a few rows of stocking stitch, then leave sts on hold on a spare needle.

#### **ARMHOLE BORDERS**

Using 3.5mm needles, CO 83 (**88**:99:**105**) sts. Work in 1/1 rib for 2 rows.

**Next row (inc)**: Work 1 st, inc 1, work to last st, inc 1, work 1 st.

Rep this in on every foll RS row 3 more times.

Work 1 row straight, switch to a contrasting yarn (not acrylic or nylon) and work a few rows of stocking stitch, then leave the 91 (**96**:107:**113**) sts obtained on a spare needle.

#### **MAKING UP**

Join shoulder seams. Take the neckband sts off the needle and press the stocking stitch section with a warm iron under a damp cloth to prevent it from unraveling. Pin the border to the finished garment, matching the stitches. Unravel all but the last row of stocking stitch.

Now graft the neckband around neck edge starting at the front centre, unravelling the last row of stocking stitch as you go. To graft, bring the needle from back to front through the centre of the second stitch, work a back stitch into the first stitch and bring the needle out again at the centre of the third stitch; now work a backstitch again into the second stitch and continue thus with backstitching as far as the last stitch.


End by pinching and sewing the seam at an angle to form a point.

\*\*Next row (RS): K2, sl 1, k1, psso, work to last 4 sts, k2tog, k2.

Next row (WS): P3, work in patt as est to last 3 sts, p3.\*\* Rep from \*\*to\*\* another 16 (12:10:13:11) times AND AT THE SAME TIME work neck as follows:

#### **NECK**

When work measures 58 (60:62:64:66) cm or 23 (231/2:241/2:25:26) in or 160 (166:170:176:182) rows total cast off the central 34 (36:40:42:46) sts for neck, then cont each side separately and cast off at neck edge on every alt row as foll: 4 sts once, 2 sts once, 1 st once and rem 4 sts.

#### **LEFT SLEEVE**

#### Read the whole of the following section before continuing.

Using 3.5mm needles and A, cast on 49 (51:53:55:57) sts. Work in 1/1 rib for 8cm or 31/4in or 24 rows.

Change to 4mm needles and starting with a knit row work 2 rows of st st.

Change to 4.5mm needles and work 44 rows of Fair Isle A, foll chart and centre st 14.

#### Change to 4mm needles and cont in st st using A AND AT THE SAME TIME:

When work measures 12cm or 43/4in or 32 rows work next RS row as foll:

Next row (inc): Work 2 sts, inc 1, work to last 2 sts, inc 1, work 2 sts.

Rep from \*to\* another 7 (6:5:5:3) times, then rep the dec at each edge on every foll RS row 2 (7:11:14:21) times. 21 sts rem.

Next row (RS): K2, sl 1, k1, psso, work to end. Next row (WS): Cast off 6 sts, work to end. 14 sts rem.

Next row (RS): K2, sl 1, k1, psso, work to end. Next row (WS): Cast off 3 sts, work to end.

Next row (RS): K2, sl 1, k1, psso, work to end. Next row (WS): Cast off 2 sts, work to end. 7 sts rem.

Next row (RS): K2, sl 1, k1, psso, work to end. Next row (WS): Cast off 2 sts, work to end. Cast off rem 4 sts.

#### **RIGHT SLEEVE**

#### Read the whole of the following section before continuing.

Using 3.5mm needles and A, CO 49 (51:53:55:57) sts. Work in 1/1 rib for 8cm or 31/4 in or 24 rows.

Change to 4mm needles and cont in st st for 28.5cm or 111/4in.

Change to 4.5mm needles and work 30 rows of Fair Isle B, foll chart and centre st 14 AND AT THE SAME TIME:

When work measures 12cm or 43/4in or 32 rows total work inc as for left sleeve. Cont on the 63 (69:75:81:89) sts obtained until work measures 50cm or 1934in or 128 rows.

Raglan: Change to 4mm needles and cont in st st using A. Work raglan as for left sleeve, rev all shaping.

#### **NECKBAND**

Using 3.5mm needles and A, CO 99 (103:107:111:115) sts. Work in 1/1 rib for 10 rows then work a few rows of stocking stitch using a contrasting yarn (not acrylic or nylon) and leave on a spare needle.

#### **MAKING UP**

Join raglan seams. Graft the neckband around the neck edge tightening the neck slightly above the honeycomb st section as follows:


Take the work off the needle and press the stocking stitch section with a warm iron under a damp cloth to prevent it from unraveling. Pin the border to the finished garment, matching the stitches. Unravel all but the last row of stocking stitch.


Now graft the stitches, waving the tapestry needle in and out, and unravel the last row of stocking stitch as you go. Bring the needle from back to front through the centre of the second stitch, work a back stitch into the first stitch and bring the needle out again at the centre of the third stitch; now work a backstitch again into the second stitch and continue thus with backstitching as far as the last stitch.

Join short edges of neckband.

Sew side and sleeve seams. @

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

#### MAKE A SLIPKNOT → YOUR FIRST CAST ON STITCH



Twist the yarn into a loop and form a second loop of yarn to pull through the first one.



Tighten the first loop into a knot around the second. This will be your first cast on stitch.

#### CAST ON - THUMB METHOD → USE THIS FOR A STRETCHY EDGE



Twist the yarn into a loop and form a second loop of yarn to pull through the first one.



Tighten the first loop into a knot around the second. This will be your first cast on stitch.



Wrap the ball end of the yarn anticlockwise around the needle. Push the needle through the loop.



Slide the loop off your thumb and tighten both ends. Repeat steps 2-4 for each stitch.

#### CAST ON - KNITTED ON METHOD ◆ USE THIS FOR A STRONG, HARDWEARING EDGE



With the slipknot on your left needle, insert the right needle from front to back of the loop.



Wrap the ball end of the yarn anticlockwise around right needle and then pull this through the loop.



Now insert the left needle tip through the front of the new loop, dropping it off the right needle.



Repeat steps 1-3 as needed, forming new stitches from the top stitch on the left needle.

#### CAST OFF → HOW TO FINISH YOUR WORK



To begin, knit only the first two stitches in the cast off row.



Push the left needle through the first stitch, then lift it over the second stitch and off right needle.



With one stitch now on the right needle, knit another stitch and then repeat step 2 until the row end.



Cut the yarn with a 15cm or 6in tail. Pull the tail through the final cast off stitch.

#### KNIT • WORKED ON THE RIGHT SIDE IN STOCKING STITCH



Insert the right needle into the left needle's top stitch, from front to back with the yarn at the back.



Hold the yarn around your right index finger and then wrap it clockwise around the right needle.



Using the right needle, pull this new loop of yarn through the stitch on the left needle.



Ease the stitch off the left needle keeping the new stitch on the right needle. Repeat steps 1-4.

#### PURL WORKED ON THE WRONG SIDE IN STOCKING STITCH



Insert the right needle into the front With your right index finger, wrap of the left needle's top stitch with the yarn in front.

Using the right needle, pull this new loop of yarn back through the front of the stitch.

#### HOW TO READ KNITTING CHARTS

Knitting charts follow the same rules unless the pattern states otherwise. Right side rows are usually odd numbers and are worked right to left. Wrong side rows are normally even numbers and are worked left to right. Pattern repeats will be contained in an area outlined in red and some charts will have further coloured outlines for different sizes. The key will give you each symbol and tell you what stitch it is.

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

# Oops I did it again...

Can this many mistakes happen to one knitter? Unfortunately it's all too easy, says Rosee Woodland ...



Legendary knitting pioneer Elizabeth Zimmermann suggested that hats were a great alternative to swatches. Well, ves, but swatches don't take four evenings to make, do they? So now my husband is demanding

a replacement, when the first one was meant to be a surprise.

I wish I could claim that I don't usually make knitting mistakes. After all, with years working on knitting magazines, plus experience as a tech editor and a designer I should know what I'm doing. So how do I manage to still make silly errors?

I dug out a few of my disasters/poorly judged efforts to prove this point. There's the knitted necklace I made when I was a crafts tutor - great for teaching stitch patterns, but makes me look bonkers. The weirdly fitting red hat which



me look like a gnome"

resembled a military cap and I couldn't even give away (it went to a charity shop in the end). Then there's the adult sized version of the Northern Lights cape by Asami Kawa. I loved this pattern, which was designed for toddlers and knitted in 4ply yarn. So

Knitted necklace - in real life it's huge!; the toosmall shawl that's good for nothing; my giant stripey jumper which took two months to make; the tragically baggy socks that always fall off; gnome hooded cape - another labour of love; and military cap I literally couldn't even



I sized it up by using aran yarn to make a much larger version. Even sewing in the ends took THREE HOURS. But because it was steeked I couldn't try on the hood until I'd already finished. It made me look like a gnome. All that work and it hibernates permanently in my sweater drawer. Then there's the gorgeous shawl which I made in the smallest size as I was worried about not having enough yarn. I ended up with plenty left over and a tiny shawl that's unwearable. Finally, the seamless stripy raglan which I designed for myself before I learnt that garments knitted in the round tend to stretch over time. It's now like a sack.

Will I ever stop making mistakes? Well, they are part of learning. And without my errors I wouldn't have learnt why socks need to be smaller than your foot - and preferably only use half of the available yarn so you have enough to make the second! Time to cast on another hat then...

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

**Row 17:** K1, \* k2tog, rep from \* to end. 9 (**10**:11:**11**) sts.

Row 18: Purl.

Break off yarn leaving a long length.

Run end through rem sts, draw up tightly and fasten off securely.

#### MUZZLE

Using 4mm needles and CC, cast on 8 sts.

Working in st st (beg with a knit row), inc one st at each end of every row until there are 18 sts. Work 5 rows st st (beg with a purl row).

Dec one st at each end of every row until 10 sts rem.

Cast off.

#### **DOG EARS (MAKE 2)**

Using 4mm needles and MC, cast on 8 sts.

Work 2 rows st st.

Row 3 (RS): Inc in first st, knit to last st, inc in last st.

10 sts.

Row 4 (WS): Purl.

Rep last 2 rows

3 times more.

Work 8 rows st st.

Row 19: K2tog, knit to last 2 sts, k2tog.

14 sts.

Work 3 rows st st, beg with a purl row.

Rep last 4 rows 4 times more. 6 sts.

**Row 39:** As row 19. 4 sts.

Row 40: Purl.



**Row 41:** Inc in first st, knit to last st, inc in last st. 6 sts. Work 3 rows st st, beg with a purl row.

Rep last 4 rows 5 times more. 16 sts.

#### **MAKE UP**

Use mattress stitch to sew up the seams. Join the side edges of the hat together to form the centre back seam. Attach the ears to the top of the hat as pictured.

Sew the muzzle in position as pictured, placing a small amount of filling inside muzzle before closing.

Using black DK yarn, embroider the dog's features onto the front of the hat as pictured, to finish. &

Re-insert down in the frst piece where the yarn originally was drawn up and pass the needle under 2 rows and up to the front of work.

Repeat this zig zag action, always taking the needle under



loops that correspond exactly to the opposite side.
Work loosely, leaving seam stitches 1cm or ½in wide.
When seam is about 2cm or 1in long, pull thread gently to close seam.



Cont in stocking st (beg with a purl row), inc one st at each end of every foll 4th row until there are 49 (49:55:63:61) sts, then in every foll 6th row until there are 53 (57:63:67:69) sts.



Place right front over left front and sew press stud in position. Cut ribbon into 2 lengths and sew one length to right front lower edge and other length to left front at garter st lower edge.



Sew arm seams, leaving shaped edge at shoulder open, stuff and attach to body. Fold legs in half, so the seam runs over centre top of foot and up centre front leg. Position soles of feet and sew into place. Sew up the seam at front of each leg, insert stuffing and attach legs to front base of body.

Make one long stitch through Head, below ears, and pull up slightly to keep head shape narrow.

Using contrast colour, embroider eyes, nose and mouth as in photograph, tie ribbon round neck if desired.

Cont in st st, starting with a k row, until work measures 18 (20:21:21.5:22) cm or 7 (8:81/4:81/2:83/4) in, ending on a WS row.

#### **SHAPE ARMHOLE**

Cast off 3 (3:4:4:5) sts at beg of next two rows.

64 (68:70:74:76) sts.

Dec 1 st at each end of next and foll 3 (3:3:4:4) RS rows.

56 (**60**:62:**64**:66) sts.

Cont in st st until armhole measures 9 (**9.5**:10:**10.5**:12) cm or 3½ (**3¾**:4:**4**:4<sup>3</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub>) in, ending on a WS row.

Cast off 8 (8:9:9:9) sts at beg of next two rows.

Cast off 7 (8:8:8:9) sts at beg of next two rows.

Leave rem 26 (**28**:28:**30**:30) sts on holder or scrap yarn.

#### **LEFT FRONT**

Using 3mm needles and B, cast on 34 (**36**:38:**40**:42) sts.

Cast off 3 (3:4:4:5) sts at the beg of next row.
31 (33:34:36:37) sts.
Dec 1 st at beg of next and foll 3 (3:3:4:4) RS rows.
27 (29:30:31:32) sts.
Cont in st st until armhole measures 5 (5.5:5.5:6:7) cm or 2 (21/4:21/2:21/2:21/4) in, ending on a WS row

**Next row**: K to last 4 (**5**:5:**6**:6) sts, turn, leaving these sts on holder.

Cast off 3 (3:4:4:5) sts at the beg of next row.
31 (33:34:36:37) sts.

#### **NECKBAND**

Join shoulder seams. With RS facing, using 3mm needles and B, k4 (**5**:5:**6**:6) from Right Front holder, pick up and k 12 (14:14:16:16) sts up Right Front neck, k26 (28:28:30:30) from Back holder, pick up and k 12 (14:14:16:16) sts down Left Front neck, k4 (5:5:6:6) from Left Front holder. 58 (66:66:74:74)sts. Row 1: P2, [k2, p2] to end. Row 2: K2, [p2, k2] to end.

Row 1: P2, [k2, p2] to end. Row 2: K2, [p2, k2] to end. Work two more rows in rib as set.

Cast off in rib.

#### **BUTTON BAND**

With RS facing, using 3mm needles and B, pick up and k 82 (**86**:90:**94**:98) sts along Left Front edge.

Row 1: P2, [k2, p2] to end. Row 2: K2, [p2, k2] to end. Work two more rows in rib as set. Cast off in rib

#### BUTTONHOLE BAND

With RS facing, using 3mm needles and B, pick up and k 82 (**86**:90:**94**:98) sts along Right Front edge.

Next row: P2, [k2, p2] to end. Next row: Rib 5 (5:5:7:7) sts, \*yrn, rib 2tog, rib 16 (17:18:18:19) sts; rep from \* three more times, yrn, rib 2tog, rib 3 (3:3:5:5) sts.

Work 2 rows in rib as set. Cast off in rib.

#### TO MAKE UP

Sew side and sleeve seams. Sew sleeves in place. Weave in ends.
