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

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


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

ROSEE, EDITOR

with its lace front and cross over stocking stitch back, this stylish top is really something special. Worked in Rowan Kidsilk Haze and Fine Lace yarns, wear on its own or layered over a plain tee.

Materials

Yarn

Yarn A: 3 (4:4:5:5) x 25g balls

of Rowan Kidsilk Haze in Ghost (642) Yarn B: 2 (**2**:2:**3**:3) x 50g balls of Rowan Fine Lace in Cobweb (922)

Needles
 1 pair 5mm (UK 6, US 8)
 knitting needles
 Cable needle

Yarn detail

Kidsilk Haze

- ♦ 66% mohair, 27% silk, 4% polyester, 3% nylon
- + 25g/200m (437 yards)
- Dry clean only
- + £8.99

Fine Lace

- 80% alpaca, 20% merino wool
- 50g/400m (219 yards)
- Dry clean only
- + £8.29

Tension

18 sts and 24 rows to 10cm or 4in measured over st st using 5mm needles and one strand each of yarns A and B held together. Cable panel (119 sts) meas 41cm or 16in.

Pattern note

Back opening edges slope, so they overlap at neck edge and are approx 15cm or 6in apart at hem edge, but all back opening edge shaping is worked at opposite (side seam and armhole) end of rows.

Special abbreviation

C11B

slip next 6 sts onto cable needle and leave at back of work, k2, p1, k2, then work across 6 sts on cable needle as folls: (p1, k2) twice;

Ladder 1 Slip next st on left needle off needle and unravel this st back down to the yrn directly

below it, yrn

FRONT

Using 5mm needles and one strand each of yarns A and B held together, cast on 129 (137:147:159:171) sts.

Row 1 (RS): K1, *p1, k1, rep from * to end. Row 2: P1, *k1, p1, rep from * to end.

These 2 rows form rib.

Work in rib for a further 3 rows, ending with WS facing for next row.

Next row (WS): P5 (**9**:14:**20**:26), k2, (p2, k1) 3 times, p2, k2, *(p1, p2tog, yrn) 3 times, p2, k2, (p2, k1) 3 times, p2, k2, rep from * 3 times more, p5 (**9**:14:**20**:26).

Beg and ending rows as indicated, repeating the 26 st patt rep 4 times across each row and repeating the 24 row patt repeat throughout, cont in patt from chart as folls:

Work 70 (**72**:76:**78**:78) rows, ending with RS facing for next row. Front should meas approx 32 (**33**:34:**35**:35)cm or 12½ (**13**:13½:**13¾**:13¾)in.

SHAPE ARMHOLES (FRONT)

Keeping patt correct, cast off 2 sts at beg of next 2 rows. 125 (133:143:155:167) sts. Dec 1 st at each end of next and foll 2 alt rows. 119 (127:137:149:161) sts. Work 33 (35:35:37:39) rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE FRONT NECK

Next row (RS): Patt 38 (42:47:53:59) sts and turn, leaving rem sts on a holder.

Work each side of neck separately.

(Note: When working shaping and cast-offs across top of sts which would be dropped and unravelled later, drop and unravel this st as it is reached. Once unravelled, pick up the last unravelled "bar" of yarn and treat this "bar" of yarn as a st.)

Keeping patt correct, dec 1 st at neck edge of next 5 (5:6:6:6) rows, then on foll 0 (0:0:0:1) alt row.

33 (37:41:47:52) sts. Work 0 (0:1:1:1) row, ending with RS facing for next row. Armhole should meas approx 19 (20:21:22:23)cm or 7½ (8:8½:9:9¼)in.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Cast off 6 (6:7:8:9) sts at beg of next and foll 3 (0:1:0:0) alt rows, then – (7:8:9:10) sts at beg of foll – (3:2:3:3) alt rows and at same time dec 1 st at neck edge of next and foll 2 alt rows.

Work 1 row, ending with RS facing for next row.

Cast off rem 6 (7:8:9:10) sts.

With RS facing, slip centre 43 sts onto a holder, rejoin yarns and patt to end.



The lace pattern is worked using one strand each of the Kidsilk Haze and Fine Lace yarns held together

Complete to match first side, reversing shapings.

RIGHT BACK

Using 5mm needles and one strand each of yarns A and B held together, cast on 32 (36:42:46:54) sts.

Row 1 (RS): *K1, p1, rep from * to last 2 sts, k2.

Row 2: *K1, p1, rep from * to end.

These 2 rows form rib.

Work in rib for a further 3 rows,

dec 1 (1:1:0:1) st at beg of last row and ending with WS facing for next row. 31 (35:41:46:53) sts.

Next row (WS): Rib 7, p to end.

Next row: K1, m1, k to last 7 sts, rib 7. Last 2 rows set the sts - back opening edge

7 sts still in rib with all other sts now in st st. Work 3 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

Next row (RS): K1, m1, k to last 7 sts, rib 7. 33 (37:43:48:55) sts.

Working all side seam increases as set by last row, inc 1 st at side seam edge of 4th and 15 (15:16:17:17) foll 4th rows. 49 (53:60:66:73) sts.

Work 1 (3:3:1:1) rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE ARMHOLE

Row 1 (RS): Cast off 2 sts (one st on right needle), (m1) 0 (1:1:0:0) times, patt to end. 47 (52:59:64:71) sts.

Work 1 row.

Row 3: K2tog, (m1) 1 (0:0:1:1) times, patt to end. 47 (51:58:64:71) sts.

Work 1 row.

Row 5: K2tog, (m1) 0 (1:1:0:0) times, patt to end. 46 (51:58:63:70) sts.

Work 1 row.

Row 7: K2tog, (m1) 1 (0:0:1:1) times, patt to end. 46 (50:57:63:70) sts.

Work 3 (1:1:3:3) rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

Next row (RS): K1, m1, patt to end. Working all armhole increases as set by last row, inc 1 st at armhole edge of 4th and 7 (7:7:6:7) foll 4th rows. 55 (59:66:71:79) sts. Work 3 (7:9:13:13) rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE SHOULDER AND BACK NECK

Next row (RS): Cast off 3 (4:5:6:7) sts, k until there are 21 (24:28:32:37) sts on right needle and turn, leaving rem sts on a holder. Work each side of neck separately. Dec 1 st at neck edge of next 6 rows and at same time cast off 3 (4:5:6:7) sts at beg of 2nd and foli 0 (1:1:1:0) alt rows, then

4 (5:6:7:8) sts at beg of foll 2 (1:1:1:2) alt rows.

Work 1 row.

Cast off rem 4 (5:6:7:8) sts.

With RS facing, slip centre 25 (25:27:27:29) sts onto a holder, rejoin yarns and patt to end. 6 sts.

Dec 1 st at neck edge of next 4 rows. Next row (WS): P2tog and fasten off.

LEFT BACK

Using 5mm needles and one strand each of yarns A and B held together, cast on 32 (36:42:46:54) sts.

Row 1 (RS): K2, *p1, k1, rep from * to end. Row 2: *P1, k1, rep from * to end.

These 2 rows form rib.

Work in rib for a further 3 rows,

dec 1 (1:1:0:1) st at end of last row and ending with WS facing for next row.

31 (35:41:46:53) sts.

Next row (WS): P to last 7 sts, rib 7.

Next row: Rib 7, k to last st, m1, k1.

Last 2 rows set the sts - back opening edge 7 sts still in rib with all other sts now in st st. Work 3 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

Next row (RS): Rib 7, k to last st, m1, k1. 33 (37:43:48:55) sts.

Working all side seam increases as set by last row, inc 1 st at side seam edge of 4th and 15 (15:16:17:17) foll 4th rows.

49 (53:60:66:73) sts.

Work 1 (3:3:1:1) rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE ARMHOLE

Row 1 (RS): Patt to last 0 (1:1:0:0) st, (m1, k1) 0 (1:1:0:0) times.

Cast off 2 sts at beg of next row.

47 (**52**:59:**64**:71) sts.

Row 3: Patt to last 2 sts, (m1) 1 (0:0:1:1) times, k2tog. 47 (51:58:64:71) sts.

Work 1 row.

Row 5: Patt to last 2 sts, (m1) 0 (1:1:0:0) times, k2tog. 46 (51:58:63:70) sts.

Work 1 row.


Row 7: Patt to last 2 sts, (m1) 1 (0:0:1:1) times, k2tog. 46 (50:57:63:70) sts. Work 3 (1:1:3:3) rows, ending with RS facing

for next row. Next row (RS): Patt to last st, m1, k1. Working all armhole increases as set by last row, inc 1 st at armhole edge of 4th and

7 (7:7:6:7) foll 4th rows. 55 (59:66:71:79) sts. Work 3 (7:9:13:13) rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE SHOULDER AND BACK NECK

Next row (RS): Patt 6 sts and turn, leaving



rem sts on a holder.

Work each side of neck separately. Dec 1 st at neck edge of next 4 rows.

Next row (WS): P2tog and fasten off. With RS facing, slip centre 25 (25:27:27:29) sts onto a holder, rejoin yarns and k to end. 24 (28:33:38:44) sts.

Cast off 3 (4:5:6:7) sts at beg of next and foll 1 (2:2:2:1) alt rows, then 4 (5:6:7:8) sts at beg of foll 2 (1:1:1:2) alt rows and at same time dec 1 st at neck edge of next 6 rows. Work 1 row.

Cast off rem 4 (5:6:7:8) sts.

SLEEVES

Using 5mm needles and one strand each of yarns A and B held together, cast on 57 (61:65:69:73) sts.

Work in rib as given for front for 5 rows, inc 1 st at each end of 3rd and foll alt row and

ending with WS facing for next row. 61 (65:69:73:77) sts.

Beg with a p row, cont in st st as folls: Work 1 row.

SHAPE TOP

Cast off 2 sts at beg of next 2 rows. 57 (61:65:69:73) sts.

Dec 1 st at each end of next and foll alt row, then on foll row, ending with RS facing for next row.

Cast off rem 51 (55:59:63:67) sts.

INTERIM MAKING UP

Join right shoulder seam using back stitch, or mattress stitch if preferred.

(Note: Due to different st tensions, there will be more sts in front shoulder than in back shoulder but the two edges should be the same length.) Lay left back over right back

so that neck edges match.

NECKBAND


With RS facing, using 5mm needles and one strand each of yarns A and B held together, pick up and knit 12 (12:14:14:16) sts down left side of front neck, k across 43 sts on front holder as folls: k3, (k2tog, k1, k2tog tbl, k1) 6 times, k2tog, k2, pick up and knit 12 (12:14:14:16) sts up right side of front neck, and 7 sts down right side of back neck working through both layers of back sections, k tog first st of left back holder with first st on right back holder, (k tog next st on left back holder with next st on right back holder) 24 (24:26:26:28) times, then pick up and knit 7 sts up left side of back neck working through both layers of back sections. 92 (92:98:98:104) sts. Beg with row 2, work in rib as given for front for 3 rows, ending with RS facing for next row. Cast off in rib.


MAKING UP

Block out each piece of knitting following the instructions on the ball band. Set in sleeves using the shallow set-in method: place centre of cast-off edge of sleeve to shoulder seam; match decreases at beg of armhole shaping to decreases at top of sleeve; sew sleeve head into armhole, easing in shapings. <a>®

Join left shoulder and neckband seams.

BLOCKING DIAGRAM



become a designer? I first learned to knit when I was a teenager, and I've always experimented with my projects and made up my own patterns as I was going along. When I sold some of the scarves and hats I had created

to designer boutiques I realised that it had become more than a hobby for me.

Do you have a signature style?

I like to think that my signature style is simple and contemporary, with a sense of humour.

Do you have a favourite yarn? Why do you like it?

Hove using Rowan yarns for their wide range of different textures and colours. And Noro yarns are just amazing, too. Any yarn that has cashmere or silk in it has me hooked!

What's the best thing about being a designer?

It's very rewarding to get good reactions from customers, or feedback from knitters who have completed one of your designs. A Knit Today reader sent in a picture of the fox handbag that I had designed, and that she had knitted for a friend-I loved seeing that.

Where do you get your inspiration?

Vintage shops and old fashion photographs can give me ideas for designs, but I also get inspiration from visits to art galleries, or even some beautiful homeware shops.

What are your favourite projects to work on?

I love working on projects like tea cosies and iPad cases - anything for the home that doesn't take too long to finish.

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

9 (10:11:12:13:14:15:16) x 50g balls of Debbie Bliss Delphi in Mint (06)

Needles 1 pair 7mm (UK 2, US 10½) 1 pair 8mm (UK 0, US 11) knitting needles


Yam detail

BACK AND FRONT (BOTH ALIKE)

With 7mm needles, cast on 62 (65:68:72:75:78:82:85) sts. K7 rows.

Work in patt as follows:

Row 2: With a 7mm needle, k to end, dropping extra loops.

Rows 3 and 4: With 7mm needles, k to end.

Rows 5 to 8: Rep rows 1 to 4 once more. Row 9: With an 8mm needle, k to end, winding the yarn 3 times around the needle for each st.

Row 10: With a 7mm needle, k to end, dropping extra loops.

Rows 11 and 12: With 7mm needles, k to end.

Rows 13 to 16: Rep rows 9 to 12 once more.

Now work in yoke patt as follows:

Row 17: With an 8mm needle, k to end, winding the yarn twice around the needle for each st.

Row 18: With a 7mm needle, k to end, dropping extra loops.

Rows 19 and 20: With 7mm needles, k to end.

Rep rows 17 to 20 until back measures 42 (43:44:45:46:47:48:49) cm or 161/2 (17:171/4:173/4:18:181/2:19:191/4) in from cast on edge, ending with a row 20.

With 7mm needles, k 2 rows.

Next row: K15 (16:17:18:19:20:21:22), leave these sts on a spare needle, cast off next 32 (33:34:36:37:38:40:41) sts, k to end,

leave these 15 (16:17:18:19:20:21:22) sts on a spare needle.

SLEEVES

With 7mm needles, cast on 35 (37:39:41:43:45:47:49) sts. K7 rows.

Work in patt as follows:

Row 1: With an 8mm needle, k to end, winding the yarn twice around the needle for each st.

Row 2: With a 7mm needle, k to end, dropping extra loops.

Row 3: With 7mm needles, k to end.

Row 4: With 7mm needles k3, m1, k to last 3 sts, m1, k3.

Rep the last 4 rows 5 times more. 47 (49:51:53:55:57:59:61) sts.







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

CLOUD MOTIFS (MAKE 8)

Using 4mm needles and Yarn B, cast on 32 sts.

Work in moss st throughout and follow Cloud Front Chart (see page 33) for increases and decreases.

Cast off.

MAKING UP

Block the blanket and the cloud motifs. Using a tapestry needle, sew the cloud motifs onto the blanket with small running stitch, lightly stuffing them as you go.

With RS together, sew front to back of Sun Face, leaving a gap for turning. Turn RS out and stuff.

Using Yarn E (Black), embroider eyes and mouth onto Sun Face.

CLOUD FRONT

Using 4mm needles, and 2 strands of Yarn C held together, cast on 32 sts.

Working in st st throughout, follow Cloud Front chart for increases and decreases to create shape, from Row 1 to Row 28. Cast off.

CLOUD BACK

Using 4mm needles, and 2 strands of Yarn C held together, cast on 32 sts.

Working in st st throughout, follow Cloud

Back chart for increases and decreases to create shape, from Row 1 to Row 28. Cast off.

TO MAKE UP CLOUD

With RS together, sew Cloud Front to Cloud Back, leaving a gap for turning. Turn RS out and stuff. Sew up gap. Using Yarn E (Black), embroider eyes and mouth onto Cloud Front.

RAINDROPS (MAKE 4 PIECES)

Using 4mm needles, and 2 strands of Yarn D held together, cast on 6 sts. Working in st st throughout, follow Raindrops chart for increases and decreases to create shape, from Row 1 to Row 28. Cast off.

TO MAKE UP RAINDROPS

Make 2 Raindrops with RS together, sew 2 pieces together, leaving a gap for turning. Turn RS out and stuff. Sew up gap. Using Yarn E (Black), embroider eyes and mouth onto Raindrops.

RAINBOW

The rainbow is created by making i-cords in each colour and then stitching together in an arch shape.

Using 4mm dpn and 2 strands of Yarn F, make an i-cord 24cm or 91/2in long. Cast off.

Using 4mm dpn and 2 strands of Yarn B, make an i-cord 21cm or 81/4in long. Cast off.

Using 4mm dpn and 2 strands of Yarn A, make an i-cord 18cm or 7in long. Cast off.

Using 4mm dpn and 2 strands of Yarn G, make an i-cord 16cm or 61/4in long. Cast off.

Using 4mm dpn and 2 strands of Yarn H, make an i-cord 14cm or 51/2in long. Cast off.

Using 4mm dpn and 2 strands of Yarn J, make an i-cord 12cm or 43/4in long. Cast off.

TO MAKE UP RAINBOW

Sew each cord to the next, curving into a rainbow shape as you go. Using Yarn E (Black), embroider eyes and mouth onto Rainbow.

TO MAKE UP MOBILE

Thread invisible thread through each piece of the mobile (see picture). Hang from a coathanger.







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

STITCHES USED

CASTING ON USING THE CHANNEL ISLAND TECHNIQUE:

This technique uses 3 ends of yarn for casting on.

Stitch 1: Your right hand is holding the needle. Make a slip-knot at a suitable distance from the end of the yarn (approx.150cm or 59in for 100 sts) and attach to the needle. Keep the slip-knot fairly loose and thread the loose end of the tail through this first st (about 10cm or 4in) and pull the slip-knot firmly to secure the end, which you will later darn away. This end is now worked doubled. Bring the single yarn to the front from behind the needle as if to work a yfwd.

Subsequent stitches: **Hold the doubled yarn so that it lies between thumb and first finger. Wind the doubled yarn anticlockwise around the left thumb once. Hold the single yarn (attached to the ball) over the index finger of your right hand in preparation to knit. Insert the tip of the needle from below up through all the windings on your thumb (4 strands in total), wind the single thread around the needle point anticlockwise and fetch through the windings. Let the windings slide from your thumb, then pull the double yarn up, forming a knot. The 2nd stitch is now on the needle, with a small knot below.**

Repeat from ** to ** until you have the desired number of sts on the needle.

BACK

With 3.25mm needles cast on 102 (110:122: 130:138) sts using the Channel Island technique (see above).

Row 1 (WS): Work in g st for 11 rows, ending with RS facing for next row. Work in rib:

Rib row 1 (RS): K2, *p2, k2; rep from * to end.

Rib row 2: K1, p1, *k2, p2; rep from * to last 4 sts, k2, p1, k1. Rep these 2 rows twice more, ending with RS facing for next row and dec 1 st at end of last row.

101 (109:121:129:137) sts.

Change to 4mm needles and starting with a k row, work in st st until Back meas 30 (30:32:32:34) cm or

11¾ (11¾:12½:12½:13½) in, ending with RS facing for next row.

Work in textured patt A thus:

Row 1 (RS): P.

Row 2: K.

Row 3: K.

Row 4: *K1, p3; rep from * to last st, k1.

Row 5: K.

Row 6: P2, k1, *p3, k1; rep from * to last 2 sts, p2.

Row 7: K.

Row 8: *K1, p3; rep from * to last st, k1.

Row 9: K. Row 10: K.

Row 11: P.

Row 12: P.

Work in textured patt B, placing chart thus: Row 1 (RS): K1 (1:1:3:1), [p1, k3] 0 (1:1:0:0) time, [p1, k1, p1, k3] 2 (2:3:4:5) times, patt from chart as row 1, working the 22 sts 3 times across, [p1, k1, p1, k3] 3 (4:5:6:6) times, [p1, k1] 2 (1:1:0:2) times.

Row 2: P22 (26:32:36:40), patt from chart as row 2, working the 22 sts 3 times across, p13 (17:23:27:31).

These 2 rows form textured patt B and place patt from chart.

Cont in patt as set, repeating the 20 patt rows of chart until Back meas 36 (36:38:38:40) cm or 141/4 (141/4:15:15:153/4) in, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE ARMHOLES

Keeping patt correct, cast off 5 (7:7:9:9) sts at beg of next 2 rows. Dec 1 st at each end of next 5 rows 81 (85:97:101:109) sts. Work 1 row. Dec 1 st at each end of next and foll 2 (2:5:5:7) alt rows. 75 (79:85:89:93) sts. Work straight until armhole meas 18 (20:20:22:22) cm or 7 (8:8:83/4:83/4) in, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE SHOULDERS

Keeping patt correct, cast off 10 (10:11:12:13) sts at beg of next 2 rows, then 9 (11:11:12:13) sts at beg of foll 2 rows. Leave rem 37 (37:41:41) sts on a spare needle.

FRONT

Work as Back until 26 rows less than Back have been worked to start of shoulder shaping, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE NECK

Next row: Patt 28 (30:31:33:35), turn and work this side first. Keeping patt correct, dec 1 st at neck edge on next 6 rows, then on foll 3 alt rows. 19 (21:22:24:26) sts. Work 13 rows, thus ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Cast off 10 (10:11:12:13) sts at beg of next row. Work 1 row. Cast off rem 9 (11:11:12:13) sts.

With RS facing, slip centre 19 (19:23:23:23) sts on a spare needle, rejoin yarn to rem sts, patt to end. Work to match first side, reversing shapings, working an extra row





before shaping shoulder.

SLEEVES

With 3.25mm needles cast on 42 (46:46:50:50) sts in the normal way and work in rib as on Back for 4cm or 1½in, ending with RS facing for next row.

Change to 4mm needles and starting with a K row, work in st st, shaping sides by inc 1 st at each end of 7th and every foll 6th row until there are 74 (78:70:74:66) sts, then on every foll 4th row until there are 80 (84:88:92:96) sts.

Work straight until Sleeve meas 44cm or 171/4in, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE TOP

Cast off 5 (7:7:9:9) sts at beg of next 2 rows. Dec 1 st at each end of next 5 rows then at each end of every foll alt row 5 (6:7:8:7) times. 50 (48:50:48:54) sts.

Dec 1 st at each end of every foll 4th row 3 (2:2:3:3) times. 44 (44:46:42:48) sts.

Dec 1 st at each end of every foll alt row 5 (7:6:5:6) times. 34 (30:34:32:36) sts.

Dec 1 st at each end of next 5 rows. Cast off 5 sts at beg of next 2 rows. Cast off rem 14 (10:14:12:16) sts.

MAKE UP

Block pieces to measurements, cover with a damp cloth and allow to dry. Join right shoulder seam.


NECK BORDER

With 3.25mm needles, RS facing and starting at left shoulder, knit up 19 sts down left front, k19 (19:23:23:23) from front, knit up 19 sts up right front then k37 (37:41:41:41) from Back. 94 (94:102:102:102) sts. Starting with row 2, work in rib for 6cm or 2½in, ending with RS facing for next row.

Starting with a k row, work in st st for 6 rows. Cast off knitways.

Join left shoulder seam and Neck Border, reversing seam for roll-back. Join side seams, leaving 4cm or 1½ in open at each lower side edge for splits. Join sleeve seams. Insert Sleeves, matching seams at underarms.

Next row: (Inc in every st) to end. 28 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (Inc, k1) to end. 42 sts. Starting with a purl row, st st 3 rows. Next row: (Inc, k2) to end. 56 sts. Starting with a purl row, st st 3 rows.

Next row: (Inc, k3) to end. 70 sts.

Next row: Knit.

Starting with a knit row st st 4 rows checked pattern as folls:

*K1 in Sunshine, k4 in Meadow; rep from * to end, stranding colour not in use across the back of the work.

Change to Sunshine and st st 2 rows. Keeping checked patt correct, st st 10 more rows.

Next row: Using Sunshine, (k8, k2tog) to end. 63 sts.

Keeping checked patt correct, st st 7 rows. Next row: Using Meadow for decreases and keeping checked patt correct, (k7, k2tog) to end. 56 sts.

Keeping checked patt correct, st st 5 rows.

Next row: Using Meadow, for decreases and keeping checked patt correct, (k6, k2tog) to end. 49 sts.

Keeping checked patt correct, st st 3 rows. **Next row:** Using Sunshine only, (k5, k2tog) to end. 42 sts.

Next row: Purl.

BODY

Change to Pomegranate and work 8 rows st st.

SHAPING FOR ARMS

Next row: K8, k2tog tbl, k1, k2tog, k16, k2tog tbl, k1, k2tog, k8. 38 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: K7, k2tog tbl, k1, k2tog, k14, k2tog tbl, k1, k2tog, k7. 34 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: K6, k2tog tbl, k1, k2tog, k12, k2tog tbl, k1, k2tog, k6. 30 sts.

Next row: (P2tog) to end. 15 sts.

Cast off.

Turn outside in and run a length of yarn around cast on edge and pull up tightly. Sew seam along base and up back to waist. Turn right side out. Cut an 8cm or 31/4in diameter circle from cardboard and insert into body, pushing down to base. Add filling, a little at a time till body is filled to waist. Sew back to neck and cut yarn. Add more filling to top of neck. Ensure all ends are tied in securely.

BASE OF JACKET

Using Black, cast on 60 sts.

Row 1: K2tog, knit to last 2sts, k2tog. 58 sts. Change to Pomegranate and st st 4 rows. **Next row:** (K4, k2tog) to last 4 sts, k4. 49 sts.

Next row: (K3, k2tog) to last 4 sts, k4. 40 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Cast off.

Place coat around waist and join the cast off edge to first row of Pomegranate body.

Using Black, cast on 16 sts.

Next row: Cast off 6 sts, knit to end. 10 sts. Next row: Knit. Cast on 6 sts. 16 sts.

Place on body with 'fork' hanging down. Sew to body then sew each side to front

Cast off purlwise.

Fold together and sew seam. Turn right side out and stuff. Place snout over front of face so that the top of snout is sitting on the edge of the eye patches and pin in place. Sew snout securely to face.

NOSE

Using Black, work a few straight stitches across top of snout. Make a straight stitch line under nose 1cm or ¼in long then one straight stitch either side 1cm or ¼in long for mouth outline.



EARS (MAKE 2)

Using Black, cast on 5 sts.

Row 1: Knit. Row 2: Purl.

Row 3: K2tog, k1, k2tog. 3 sts. Row 4: Sl 1, p2tog, psso. 1 st.

Row 5: Inc twice in st. 3 sts.

Row 6: Purl.

Row 7: Inc in first st, knit to last st, inc. 5 sts.

Row 8: Purl. Cast off.

Fold ears in half and sew across side seams. Turn right side out and sew across cast on and cast off edges. Pin to sides of head about 3.5cm or 11/4in apart then sew in place securely. Sew a black bead on each eye patch next to snout for eyes, tying in ends in gap. Add a little more filling then sew rem seam. Sew head to body securely.

ARMS (MAKE 2)

Using Black, cast on 5 sts.

Purl one row.

Next row: Inc in every st. 10 sts. Starting with a purl row, st st 5 rows.

Change to Pomegranate.

Next row: (K1, inc in next st) to end. 15 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: Inc in first st, knit to last st, inc.

17 sts.

Starting with a purl row, st st 17 rows. Cast off 3 sts at beg of next 2 rows. 11 sts. Next row: K2tog, knit to last 2 sts, k2tog. 9 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Rep last 2 rows again. 7 sts.

Next row: K2tog, k3tog, k2tog. 3 sts.

Cast off purlways.

Using a length of yarn, gather up sts round cast on edge and pull up tightly. Sew seam to arm shaping. Turn right side round and stuff lightly. Pin arms to body angled in at the front. Attach securely to side of body, adding a little filling at the top.

COLLAR

Using Black, cast on 16 sts. Cast off. Place collar round neck and sew in place.

FEET (MAKE 2)

Using Black, cast on 6 sts.

Purl one row.

Next row: Inc in every st. 12 sts. Starting with a purl row, st st 13 rows.

Cast off.

Gather cast on sts and pull up tightly. Sew along seam to cast off edge. Turn right side out and over sew cast off edge. Place feet, angled, about 2cm or 3/4in apart on base with the back of the feet in line with the centre of the base. Sew in place.





BOY CUB

FEET AND LEGS (MAKE 2).

Using Black, cast on 4 sts.

First row: Purl.

Next row: Inc in every st to end. 8 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: K2, inc in next 4sts, k2. 12 sts.

St st 3 rows.

Next row: K2, (k2tog) x 4, k2. 8 sts.

Work 13 rows st st.

Put first leg on a st holder. Make second leg.

BODY

Change to White.

Row 1: Knit across sts on needle then knit across sts of first leg. 16 sts.

St st 13 rows.

Change to Black.

Next row: K3, k2tog, k6, k2tog, k3. 14 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: K2, sl1, k2tog, psso, k4, sl1,

k2tog, psso, k2. 10 sts. Next row: Purl.

Cut yarn and thread through sts. Pull sts up tightly and sew seam for about 2.5cm or 1in. Join foot and leg seams (leaving a gap in back for stuffing). Turn right side out. Add filling, a little at a time. Sew rem seam.

ARMS (MAKE 2)

Using Black, cast on 4 sts.

Row 1: Purl.

Next row: Inc in every st. 8 sts.

Next row: Purl. Next row: Knit. Next row: Purl.

Next row: K3, k2tog, k3. 7 sts.

St st 9 rows.

Next row: K2tog, knit to last 2sts, k2tog.

5 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Rep last 2 rows again. 3 sts.

Cast off.

Sew seam to armhole shaping. Turn right side out and stuff firmly using small pieces of filling at a time. Pin arms to sides of body and sew in place securely.

TROUSERS

LEGS (MAKE 2)

Using Green, cast on 14 sts.

Row 1: Knit. Row 2: Knit. Row 3: Knit. St st 12 rows.

Put first leg on st holder.

Next row: Knit across second leg then first

leg. 28 sts. Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K4, k2tog) to last 4sts, k4. 24 sts.

St st 5 rows.

Cast off.

Sew leg seams right up to crotch then sew body seam together. Turn right side out and place on cub. Sew in position.

WAISTCOAT

Using Lipstick, cast on 8 sts.

Row 1: Inc in first st, knit to last st, inc. 10 sts.

Row 2: Purl.

Rep first 2 rows again. 12 sts.

Next row: Cast off 7 sts, knit to end. 5 sts.

Next row: Purl. Next row: Knit.

Next row: Purl. Cast on 7 sts. 12 sts.

St st 10 rows.

Next row: Cast off 7 sts, knit to end. 5 sts.

Next row: Purl. Next row: Knit.

Next row: Purl. Cast on 7 sts. 12 sts. Next row: K2tog, knit to last 2 sts, k2tog.

10 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Rep last 2 rows again. 8 sts.

Cast off.

Join shoulder seams together. Turn right side out and place on cub. Sew centre seam together. Pull down 'points' of waistcoat and sew in position. Sew waistcoat at back on top of trousers. Tie in all loose ends.

BOW TIE

Using Meadow, cast on 4 sts.

Work 8 rows g st.

Cast off.

Use a length of Meadow yarn to tie a few strands tightly around centre of bow tie. Place on neck and sew in position securely.

HEAD

Starting at face and using White, cast on 7 sts.

Row 1: Inc in every st. 14 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: (K1, inc in next st) x 2 using White, (k1, inc in next st) using Black, then White, then Black, (k1, inc in next st) x 2 using White. 21 sts.

Next row: Purl using White for White sts and Black for Black sts.

Cont in White only.

Next row: (K2, inc in next st) to end. 28 sts.



Next row: (K3, inc in next st) to end. 35 sts. Work 5 rows st st.

Using White, cast on 5 sts.

Row 1: Inc in every st. 10 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Cast off.

Gather cast on sts and pull up tightly. Sew seam. Turn right side out and stuff with filling. Place on face so snout is just touching the eye patches. Sew in position and tie in all loose ends. Sew a small bead either side of snout for eyes on the eye patches. Take a length of Black and separate the strands. Use 2 strands to sew a few small straight stitches at the top of snout for nose and work a straight line under the nose and a curved mouth as for Mrs Panda.

EARS (MAKE 2)

Using Black, cast on 4 sts.

Row 1: Knit. Row 2: Purl.

Row 3: K2tog to end. 2 sts.

Row 4: P2tog. 1 st. Row 5: Inc. 2 sts.

Row 6: Purl.

Row 7: Inc in each st. 4 sts.

Row 8: Purl. Cast off.

PANDA FAMILY





Fold ears in half and sew across side seams. Turn right side out and sew across cast on and cast off edges.

Pin to sides of head about 3cm or 11/4in apart then sew in place securely.

Place head on body and sew in position.

Make another cub in the same way, wearing a dress instead of trousers.

Using Claret, cast on 40 sts.

Row 1: Knit.
Row 2: Knit.

St st 12 rows.

Next row: (K2tog, k2tog, k1) to end. 24 sts.

Next row: Knit.
Next row: Purl.
Next row: Knit.
Next row: Knit.
Next row: Knit.
Next row: Knit.
Change to Claret.

Next row: K5, cast off 2 sts, k10, turn.

Work on middle 10 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: K2tog, knit to last 2 sts, k2tog.

8 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: K2tog, knit to last 2 sts, k2tog.

6 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: K2, cast off 2 sts, k2.

Next row: P2. Cast off.

Rejoin yarn to rem 2 sts.

Next row: P2. Cast off.

Rejoin yarn to 7 sts on left-hand needle.

Next row: Cast off 2 sts, knit to end. 5 sts.

Work on these 5 sts. **Next row:** Purl.

Next row: K2tog, knit to end. 4 sts.

Rep last 2 rows again. 3 sts.

Work 3 rows st st.

Cast off.

Rejoin yarn to rem 5 sts and purl.

Next row: K2tog, knit to end. 4 sts.

Next row: Purl.

Rep last 2 rows again. 3 sts.

Work 2 rows st st.

Cast off.

FRILL

With right side facing, pick up and knit 2 sts and cast off one st, (make 4 chain sts, miss

a st and pick up one in next st, cast off) to last st, pick up one and cast off.

Sew seam from g st border to top.

Sew shoulder seams.

Turn right side out and place on cub.

Tie in all loose ends.

SLEEVES

Using Claret, cast on 5 sts.

Row 1: K3, turn.

Next row: Knit.

Next row: K4, turn.

Next row: Knit.

Next row: Knit.

Next row: Knit.

Next row: Knit.

Rep last 6 rows twice more.

Cast off.

Sew cast on edge, shaped edge and cast off edge to dress around front and back. Tie in all loose ends.

BOW



BACK

Row 2 (WS): K1, * p1, k1, rep from * to end. Rep these 2 rows 6 more times and inc 1 st at end of last row worked. 72 (78:84:90) sts

Change to 4mm straight needles.

Starting with a knit row, work in st st until work measures 20 (22:25:28) cm or 7¾ (8¾:10:11) in, ending with a purl row. Place marker at each end of last row worked, then dec 1 st at each end of next and foll 3 alt rows, work 1 more row in st st. Leave rem 64 (70:76:82) sts on a stitch holder.

FRONT

Work front the same as back.

SLEEVES

Using 3.25mm straight needles and MC, cast on 43 (47:51:55) sts and work in single rib in rows as follows:

Row 1 (RS): K1, * k1, p1 rep from * to last 2 sts, k2.

Row 2 (WS): K1, * p1, k1, rep from * to end. Rep these 2 rows 6 more times and inc 1 st at end of last row worked. 44 (48:52:56) sts.

Change to 4mm needles.

Starting with a knit row, work in rows of st st and inc 1 st at each end of every foll 6th row until there are 48 (54:60:66) sts, then cont without shaping until work measures 25 (28:31:34)cm or 10 (11:121/4:131/4) in, ending with a purl row.

Place marker at each end of last row worked, then dec 1 st at each end of next and foll 3 alt rows, work 1 more row in st st. Leave rem 40 (46:52:58) sts on a stitch holder. Work 2nd sleeve to match.

YOKE

(Change to shorter length circular needle as needed.)

Using longer 4mm circular needle and starting at the left sleeve, with RS facing, pick up and knit 40 (46:52:58) sts of left sleeve, 64 (70:76,:82) sts of front, 40 (46:52:58) sts of right sleeve and 64 (70:76:82) sts of back. Join work into a round and work 0 (0:6:10) rounds in st st (every round knit) on these 208 (232:256:280) sts.

Now cont in pattern as follows: (Starting pattern is a multiple of 8 sts x 26 [29:32:35] sts)

Rounds 29 to 32: As round 28. Round 33: Using A, knit.

1st size only:

Round 34: Using A, purl. Round 35: Using MC, * k2tog, k2, rep from * to end

of round. 78 sts.

Last 3 sizes only: Round 34: Using A, p1 wrapping yarn 3 times round needle, p3, rep from * to end of round.

Round 35: Using MC, * sl1yb dropping extra loops, k2tog, k1, rep from * to end of round. 87 (96:105) sts.

Round 36: Using MC, * sl1yb, k2, rep from * to end of round.

Rounds 37 to 40: As round 36.

Next round: Using B, knit and inc 1 (0:1) sts at end of this round. 88 (96:106) sts.

Next round: Using B, purl. Next round: Using MC, knit. [Yoke - 35 (43:49:53) rows is

12.5 (14.25:17.5:19) cm or 5 (51/2:63/4:71/2) in

yoke depth]

All sizes: Change to 3.25mm double pointed needles.

Divide the sts equally between three of the needles and work in single rib as follows:

Next round: *K1, p1, rep from * to end of rnd. Rep this last round until rib measures 8 (10:14:16)cm or 31/4 (4:51/2:61/4)in.


Cast off loosely ribwise.

MAKING UP

Pin out to size, dampen with cool water and leave to dry. Using small backstitches sew decreased edges above the stitch markers, sewing fronts to front sleeve and backs to back sleeve. Sew sleeve seams and side seams. Sew in all ends. <a>

LOOP STITCHES

made simple



Here's how to knit this trendy stitch pattern. By Rosee Woodland









oop stitches and tape yarns are both all over the high street this summer. But don't spend your money on a factory made garment. Instead, cast on this simple stitch to get an up-todate top that knits up super quick. Thanks to the large needles and even larger holes, loop stitch is a great choice for speedy results! Tape yarns are often made from cotton, which some knitters find hard on the hands. But because tape yarns are stretchy it's much kinder to you.



GET STARTED

Be prepared

Before you start any major project using this kind of stitch it's worth making a swatch. Tape yarns are stretchy and, although a needle size may have been recommended, you may find you need to go down a needle size or two to get the right tension. Here, we're using Debbie Bliss Delphi yarn, which recommends an 8mm needle, but we found a 7mm needle gave the right tension.

Insert your right hand needle into the first stitch, as if to knit it. 2 Wrap the yarn once around the needle as if you were



knitting it as normal. (3) Now, don't pull the new stitch off the top of the left hand needle. Instead, wind the working yarn around the needle for a second time. At this stage it doesn't matter what it looks like or whether the tape is neat and flat, as it won't be staying like this for long! O Now pull the new 'double' stitch through the old stitch... [3... and take it off the left hand needle, just as if you were

Once you've finished a row you can see how the extra loops are starting to drag down and create an elongated stitch, that's perfect for airy summer garments!

knitting as stitch as normal.



At the start of the next row, knit into the first of the two loops you have made for each stitch on the previous row. 8 Pull through the working yarn as if you were knitting normally. 1 Then pull the second of the two loops completely off the left hand needle. This may seem strange at first, as the resulting stitch is extremely baggy, but if it looks like this picture, then trust us, you're doing it right! 40 After a few stitches you'll be able to get an idea of what the finished stitch will look like. As you can see, extremely long stitches are produced! 4 Loop stitch works particularly well mixed up with sections of

garter stitch. Using garter stitch will also make your fabric completely reversible, but try to keep one side as the 'right side' and always work the first step of the loop stitch on this side. If it's hard to keep track, mark the right side with a scrap of paper or a sticky note pinned to it.

If you want to make longer loops, the process is exactly the same. Instead of winding the working yarn around twice, wind it as many times as you like! In this example, we've wound the working yarn around three times. 49 Then pull the new triple stitch through as you did before... 🚳 and off the needle.

Swatch it out

Not many knitters relish making a swatch, but with stitches as big as this, it's essential to check your tension!

Wash carefully

Fabric made from loop stitch will be very stretchy, especially if you're using tape yarn, so support when wet and always dry completely flat.







Row 6: K3, * p2, k3, rep from * to end.

Now work in patt as follows:

Row 1: P3, * k1, yfwd, k1, p3, rep from * to end.

Row 2: K3, * p3, k3, rep from * to end.

Row 3: P3, * k3, lift 3rd st on right needle over first and second sts and off right needle, p3, rep from * to end.

Row 4: K3, * p2, k3, rep from * to end.

These 4 rows form patt.

(Note: The number of sts varies whilst working patt. All st counts given presume there are 5 sts in each patt rep at all times and therefore do NOT include the extra st made on each rep of 1st patt row.) Cont in patt (throughout) until Back measures 26 (26:28:30) cm or 10¼ (10¼:11:11¾) in, ending with a WS row.

SHAPE RAGLAN ARMHOLES

Keeping patt correct, cast off 3 sts at beg of next 2 rows. 97 (107:117:127) sts.

Next row: K1, sl 1, k1, psso, patt to last 3 sts, k2tog, k1.

Next row: K1, sl 1, k1, psso, patt to last 3 sts, k2tog, k1.

Rep last 2 rows 3 (5:7:9) times more.

81 (83:85:87) sts.

Next row: K1, sl 1, k1, psso, patt to last 3 sts, k2tog, k1.

Next row: K2, patt to last 2 sts, k2. Rep last 2 rows 24 (24:25:24) times more. 31 (33:33:37) sts.

Cast off rem 31 (33:33:37) sts.

LEFT FRONT

Using 3.75mm needles and thumb method, cast on 52 (57:62:67) sts.

Work in g-st for 4 rows, ending on a WS row.

Change to 4mm needles.

Row 5: * P3, k2, rep from * to last 2 sts, p2.

Row 6: K2, * p2, k3, rep from * to end. Now work in patt as follows:

Row 1: * P3, k1, yfwd, k1, rep from * to last 2 sts, p2.

Row 2: K2, * p3, k3, rep from * to end.

Row 3: * P3, k3, lift 3rd st on right needle over first and second sts and off right needle, rep from * to last 2 sts, p2.

Row 4: K2, * p2, k3, rep from * to end. These 4 rows form patt.



Cont in patt (throughout) until Left Front matches Back to start of raglan armhole shaping, ending with a WS row.

SHAPE RAGLAN ARMHOLE AND FRONT SLOPE

Keeping patt correct, cast off 3 sts at beg and dec 1 st at end of next row. 48 (53:58:63) sts.

Work 1 row.

Working all raglan armhole decreases in same way as back raglan armhole decreases, dec 1 st at raglan armhole edge of next 9 (13:17:21) rows, then on foll 22 (22:23:22) alt rows AND AT SAME TIME dec 1 st at front slope edge of next and foll 3 (3:0:3) alt rows, then on 11 (12:15:14) foll 4th rows. 2 sts.

Work 1 row, ending with a WS row. Next row: K2tog and fasten off.

RIGHT FRONT

Using 3.75mm needles and thumb method, cast on 52 (57:62:67) sts.

Work in g-st for 4 rows, ending with a WS

row.

Change to 4mm needles.

Row 5: P2, * k2, p3, rep from * to end. Row 6: * K3, p2, rep from * to last 2 sts, k2. Now work in patt as follows:

Row 1: P2, * k1, yfwd, k1, p3, rep from * to end.

Row 2: * K3, p3, rep from * to last 2 sts, k2. Row 3: P2, * k3, lift 3rd st on right needle over first and second sts and off right needle, p3, rep from * to end.

Row 4: * K3, p2, rep from * to last 2 sts, k2. These 4 rows form patt.

Cont in patt (throughout) until Right Front matches Back to start of raglan armhole shaping, ending with a WS row.

SHAPE RAGLAN ARMHOLE AND FRONT SLOPE

Keeping patt correct, dec 1 st at beg of next row, then cast off 3 sts at beg of foll row. 48 (53:58:63) sts.

Working all raglan armhole decreases in same way as back raglan armhole decreases, dec 1 st at raglan armhole edge of next

9 (13:17:21) rows, then on foll 22 (22:23:22) alt rows AND AT SAME TIME dec 1 st at front slope edge of next and foll 3 (3:0:3) alt rows, then on 11 (12:15:14) foll 4th rows. 2 sts.

Work 1 row, ending with a WS row. **Next row:** K2tog and fasten off.

SHORT SLEEVES (BOTH ALIKE)

Using 3.75mm needles and thumb method, cast on 73 (77:85:89) sts.

Work in g-st for 4 rows, ending with a ws row.

Change to 4mm needles.

Row 5: K0 (0:1:0), p3 (0:3:1), * k2, p3, rep from * to last 0 (2:1:3) sts, k0 (2:1:2), p0 (0:0:1). Row 6: P0 (0:1:0), k3 (0:3:1) * p2, k3, rep from * to last 0 (2:1:3) sts, p0 (2:1:2), k0 (0:0:1). Now work in patt as follows:

Row 1: K0 (0:1:0), p3 (0:3:1), * k1, yfwd, k1, p3, rep from * to last 0 (2:1:3) sts, (k1, yfwd) 0 (1:0:1) times, k0 (1:1:1), p0 (0:0:1).

Row 2: P0 (0:1:0), k3 (0:3:1), * p3, k3, rep from * to last 0 (3:1:4) sts, p0 (3:1:3), k0 (0:0:1).

Row 3: K0 (0:1:0), p3 (0:3:1), * k3, lift 3rd st on right needle over first and second sts and off right needle, p3, rep from * to last 0 (2:1:3) sts, (k3, lift 3rd st on right needle over first and second sts and off right needle) 0 (1:0:1) times, k0 (0:1:0), p0 (0:0:1).

Row 4: P0 (0:1:0), k3 (0:3:1), * p2, k3, rep from * to last 0 (2:1:3) sts, p0 (2:1:2), k0 (0:0:1). These 4 rows form patt.

Cont in patt, shaping sides by inc 1 st at each end of next and 3 foll 8th rows, taking inc sts into patt. 81 (85:93:97) sts.

Cont straight until Sleeve measures 14 (14:15:15) cm or 5½ (5½:6:6) in, ending with a ws row.

SHAPE RAGLAN

Keeping patt correct, cast off 3 sts at beg of next 2 rows. 75 (79:87:91) sts.

Working all raglan decreases in same way as raglan armhole decreases (and keeping 2 sts in g-st at each end of every row), dec 1 st at each end of next and 3 (4:3:3) foll 4th rows, then on every foll alt row until 27 (29:29:31) sts rem.

Work 1 row, ending with a WS row.

Left Sleeve Only

Dec 1 st at each end of next row, then cast off 7 (8:8:8) sts at beg of foll row. 18 (19:19:21) sts.

Dec 1 st at beg of next row, then cast off 8 (9:9:10) sts at beg of foll row. 9 (9:9:10) sts.

Right Sleeve Only

Cast off 8 (9:9:9) sts at beg and dec 1 st at end of next row. 18 (19:19:21) sts.



Work 1 row.

Cast off 8 (9:9:10) sts at beg and dec 1 st at end of next row. 9 (9:9:10) sts. Work 1 row.

Both Sleeves

Cast off rem 9 (9:9:10) sts.

THREE-QUARTER LENGTH SLEEVES (BOTH ALIKE)

Using 3.75mm needles and thumb method, cast on 53 (55:57:61) sts.

Work in g-st for 4 rows, ending on a WS row.

Change to 4mm needles.

Row 5: (Inc in first st) 0 (0:1:1) times, k0 (1:1:0), p3 (3:3:1), * k2, p3, rep from * to last 0 (1:2:4) sts, k0 (1:1:2), p0 (0:0:1), (inc in last st) 0 (0:1:1) times. 53 (55:59:63) sts.

Row 6: P0 (1:0:0), k3 (3:1:3), * p2, k3, rep from * to last 0 (1:3:0) sts, p0 (1:2:0), k0 (0:1:0).

Now work in patt as follows:

Row 1: Inc in first st, p2 (3:0:2), * k1, yfwd, k1, p3, rep from * to last 5 (1:3:5) sts, (k1, yfwd, k1) 1 (0:1:1) times, p2 (0:0:2), inc in last st. 55 (**57**:61:**65**) sts.

Row 2: P1 (2:0:1), k3 (3:2:3) * p3, k3, rep from * to last 1 (2:5:1) sts, p1 (2:3:1) k0 (0:2:0).

Row 3: (Inc in first st) 0 (0:1:1) times, k1 (2:0:0), p3 (3:1:3), * k3, lift 3rd st on right needle over first and second sts and off right needle, p3, rep from * to last 1 (2:5:1) sts, (k3, lift 3rd st on right needle over first and second sts and off right needle) 0 (0:1:0) times, k1 (2:0:0), p0 (0:1:0), (inc in last st) 0 (0:1:1) times. 55 (57:63:67) sts.

Row 4: P1 (2:0:2), k3, * p2, k3, rep from * to last 1 (2:0:2) sts, p1 (2:0:2).

These 4 rows form patt and start sleeve shaping.

Cont in patt, shaping sides by inc 1 st at each end of next and foll 0 (0:1:0) alt row, then on 10 (13:13:14) foll 4th rows, then on 2 (0:0:0) foll 6th rows, taking inc sts into patt. 81 (85:93:97) sts.

Cont straight until Sleeve measures 28 (28:29:30)cm or 11(11:111/2:113/4)in, ending with a WS row.

Complete as given for Short Sleeves from Shape Raglan.

FRONT BAND

BACK BELT TAB

Cast off knitwise on WS.

TO MAKE UP

Join side and Sleeve seams. Along cast-off edge of front band along right front opening edge, make 3 button loops - top loop just below start of front slope shaping, lowest loop 3cm or 11/4in up from cast-on edge,

and rem loop evenly spaced between. Sew on buttons to left front to correspond with button loops. Using photograph as a guide, position Back Belt Tab onto Back and secure in place by attaching 2 buttons





Size XXL: 1 st 8 times every 8th row. Cont and work straight over the rem 38 (40:44:48:52) sts until work measures 46 (47:47:47:48)cm or 18 (18½:18½:18½:19)in. 80 (82:82:82:84) rows total.

SLEEVE CAP

Cast off at the beg of every row as foll: **Size S:** 2 sts twice, 1 st 16 times, 2 sts 4 times and the 10 rem sts.

COLLAR

Using 5.5 mm needles, cast on 70 (**70**:74:**74**:78) sts.
Work straight in 2/2 rib for 6 rows.
Leave all sts on hold on a spare needle.

Join shoulder seams.
Graft collar around neck edge using
Kitchener stitch.
Join shorter ends of collar.
Sew sleeves into position.



OVERTHE

Group-funding gave Susan Gibbs the money she needed to spin yarns. Cecilia Forfitt investigates

ot so very long ago, Susan Gibbs left her job as a network news producer in New York, filled with an overwhelming longing for a simpler, more meaningful way of life. Leafing through a copy of Storey's Guide to Raising Sheep one afternoon in a California bookshop, she felt a strong pull towards the countryside that she just couldn't ignore. A year later she left the city behind her for the rolling hills of Virginia, purchasing a small holding which she later named Juniper Moon Farm five sheep and a dog. "I knew instantly that it was my life's work," says Susan. "I think it's very rewarding to have the fate of your business, your livelihood, in your own hands." Susan threw herself into all aspects of running the farm, taking pleasure in

every little detail and technique. "The best part was definitely lambing season", she tells us. "Watching new lambs being born is the most magical thing I have ever experienced."

SHEAR GENIUS

Susan continued to add to her flock, but the proceeds from selling the yarn from her sheep weren't covering the cost of hay, food and medicine. Then, in 2007, Susan came up with a way to make ends meet, when Juniper Moon became the first farm to apply the community supported agriculture (CSA) alternative financing model to yarn and spinning fibres. The scheme allows people to invest in the farm's yarn harvest and receive a cut of the clip (annual shearing) in return, either


as finished yarn or as a less-processed form of wool for spinning themselves. People Susan had never met even helped name her sheep and goats! The move led to a front page article about Juniper Moon Farm in The Wall Street Journal, and soon after Juniper Moon Yarns started to become available in stores around the US - happily, it flew off the shelves.

BLEATING THE COMPETITION

A few years ago, though, Susan became ill, and was no longer able to take care of the sheep herself or work the 18 hour days she had been used to so she handed the running of the farm over to her friend Amy and began to focus on Juniper Moon Farm Yarns instead. The farm itself produced some of the best farm yarns in the US,







spun from fine wool and angora, but Susan was keen to expand the business, adding a line of carefully, ethically-sourced yarns spun from fibers grown in Peru, Argentina, Nepal, and Italy. "I get to produce some really amazing yarns from animals that we do not raise on the farm, like yak and llama, and work with some of the best mills in the world. It's a dream job!" says Susan.

Today, Susan lives outside Washington, D.C. and has a family. She still visits the farm on weekends and, during the week, tests new yarns,

picks colours and puts together pattern collections. Being involved in the business is still as important to her as ever, and she can't imagine leaving her fleecy friends

behind completely. When asked what she'd be doing if Juniper Moon Farm Yarns didn't exist she jokes: "Oh gosh! Maybe running an artisanal sheep's milk cheese farm? There would definitely be sheep involved!"

A HERD OF ADVICE

If reading about Susan's journey makes you feel inspired to start your own sheep-

to-sweater business, then she has some encouraging words for budding Bo Peeps: "If you are willing to work harder than you've ever worked

in your life, and to collect your rewards in something other than money, then go for it. It won't be easy to make a living, but it will be worth it!"

This year Juniper Moon's flock will be retiring - Susan believes it's high time she gave them a rest. Juniper Moon Farm Yarns are now being distributed in the UK by Intercontinental Yarns, so youcan see and squish them in a yarn shop near you! Just don't ask Susan to choose her favourite! "That's like asking me to chose my favorite child. I love Moonshine because it knits up so beautifully. Herriot is special to me because it has a unique construction that makes it unlike other baby alpaca yarns. And Findley was one of the first yarns we created and has become the go-to yarn for lace knitters. I really do love them all!"

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

Dec one st at armhole edge in every foll alt row 2 (2:2:3:3) times, AT SAME TIME dec one st at front edge in every foll alt row until 10 (15:18:18:18) sts rem, then in every foll 4th row until 9 (12:14:14:15) sts rem.

Cont without shaping until armhole measures same as Back to beg of shoulder shaping, ending with a purl row.

SHAPE SHOULDER -

Cast off 3 (4:5:5:5) sts at beg of next row and foll alt row.

Work 1 row.

Cast off rem 3 (4:4:4:5) sts.

RIGHT FRONT

Work as for Left Front to **. Work 1 row.

SHAPE ARMHOLE & FRONT SLOPE

Cast off 2 sts at beg of next row. 21 (23:25:27:29) sts.

Dec one st at armhole edge in next row, then in every foll alt row 1 (1:1:2:2) time/s, AT SAME TIME dec one st at front edge in next row, then in every foll alt row until 10 (15:18:18:18) sts rem, then in every foll 4th row until 9 (12:14:15) sts rem. Cont without shaping until armhole measures same as Back to beg of shoulder shaping, ending with a purl row. Work 1 row.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Complete as for Left Front Shoulder.

SLEEVES

Using 3.25mm needles and CC, cast on 27 (29:29:31:33) sts.

Work 8 rows rib as for lower band of Back. Break off CC.

Change to 4mm needles, using MC for rem. Work in stocking st, inc one st at each end of 3rd row, then in every foll 4th row until there are 35 (39:43:39:39) sts, then in every foll 6th row until there are 37 (43:45:47:49) sts. Cont in stocking st until work measures 13 (15:17:19:20) cm or 5 (6:63/4:71/2:73/4) in from beg, ending with a purl row.

SHAPE TOP

Cast off 2 sts at beg of next 2 rows. 33 (39:41:43:45) sts.

Dec one st at each end of next row, then in every foll alt row until 17 (25:23:23:27) sts rem, then in every row until 7 (7:9:9:9) sts rem. Cast off.

RIGHT FRONT BAND

Seam using mattress stitch unless otherwise stated.

Join shoulder seams.

With RS facing, using 3.25mm needles and CC, knit up 34 (40:44:46:52) sts evenly along right front edge to beg of front slope shaping, knit up 32 (34:38:40:40) sts evenly along front slope to shoulder, then knit up 9 (9:11:11:11) sts along half of back neck to centre. 75 (83:93:97:103) sts.

For a girl:

Row 1 (WS): K1, * p1, k1, rep from * to end. Row 2: Rib 3, yrn to make a st, rib 2tog, (rib 7 [9:10:11:9], yrn to make a st, rib 2tog) 3 (3:3:3:4) times, rib to end. 4 (4:4:4:5) buttonholes.



Work 3 rows rib. Cast off in rib.

For a boy:

Work 5 rows rib as for lower band of Back, beg with a 2nd row. Cast off in rib.

LEFT FRONT BAND

BLOCKING DIAGRAM

With RS facing, using 3.25mm needles and CC, knit up 9 (9:11:11:11) sts evenly along rem half of back neck, knit up 32 (34:38:40:40) sts evenly along left front slope, then knit up 34 (40:44:46:52) sts evenly along left front edge. 75 (83:93:97:103) sts.

For a boy:

Row 1 (WS): K1, * p1, k1, rep from * to end. Row 2: Rib to last 32 (38:41:44:49) sts, yrn to make a st, rib 2tog, (rib 7 [9:10:11:9], yrn to

make a st, rib 2tog) 3 (3:3:3:4) times, rib 3 ... 4 (4:4:4:5) buttonholes.

Work 3 rows rib. Cast off in rib.



CRISS CROSS CUSHION

I've just been on a coach tour and we visited a knitting shop which had an adjoining cafe. The sofas in the cafe all had knitted cushions and I saw a fabulous cushion knitted in a criss cross pattern - it looked sort of woven. I didn't have time to ask the owner of the knitting shop as we were in a hurry to leave. Any idea what stitch it is?

Olive Case, West Yorks

Jo says: It's sometimes called Criss Cross Stitch and sometimes Wicker Stitch. It's not too difficult to do but I would suggest using metal knitting needles as you have to knit into the back of the second stitch and sometimes you need a bit of strength! It can be knitted in a plain yarn but I think using a varigated yarn gives it much more interest. An aran or chunky yarn will work well with this stitch. If you make a swatch first you will be able to work out the number of stitches for

the width of your cushion. This is the best way as just going by the stitch count on the label will make a smaller cushion as the stitches in this pattern will pull in.

Cast on an even number of stitches.

Row 1: Kl, *knit into the back of the second stitch on left needle and then the front of the first stitch, slide them off together. Repeat from * to last stitch, kl.

Row 2: Purl into second stitch on left needle and then the into the first, slide them off together. Repeat to the end of the row.



CASTING OFF

When casting off on the wrong side of a stocking stitch piece, should I be using purl stitch to cast off?

Helena Turner, Manchester

Aneeta says:

It's actually better to use a knit cast off, as this gives a really nice finish on the right side of the work. Purl cast off gives a nice

finish on the right side of garter stitch. Otherwise, you'd normally only cast off in purl when you are casting off in a stitch pattern that has purl stitches in it.

YARN WINDING

My husband always used to hold my skeins of yarn while I wound them into a ball. He now has mild arthritis and finds it a bit difficult. Do you have an easy way for me to wind them myself?

Christine Jacobson, Devon.

Jo says: I find I manage quite well by hooking the skein around the arm of the sofa - with most of the skein lying on top of the arm and the bottom loop just below the

arm. Other knitters use the back of a chair and I also have a friend who just puts the skein on a hook on the bathroom door - I tried that once but I'm not tall enough! For the odd skein any of these methods work but if you regularly wind a lot of skeins it's worth investing in a ball winder. There are cheap yarn winders (about £11.99) available at www. amazon.co.uk but also at Amazon you will find the Lacis Yarn Winder (£32.78) which is a step up - it has a nice solid base that will clamp to a table and is quick and

quiet to use. Another big bonus is that balls of yarn can be pulled from the outside and inside - perfect for socks.



CASTING ON


I'm using a two needle cast on. The stitches are tight when I cast on then they seem to grow

when I knit the first row. From then on the knitting is looser, but I can't judge the final width of my knitting from the cast on stitches. I don't get what's happening. Can you help? Nicole Turner, Edinburgh

Aneeta says: Some cast on techniques knit the first stitch as you cast on. With a basic two needle cast on you are creating new stitches, but they don't count as a row of knitting so they are simply the starting line of stitches to build on. They don't have the bulk that is knitted into the first row. This makes

them seem tighter and narrower. In my experience, if you have 10cm of cast on stitches using the two needle method, in the first proper row of knitting this will grow by approximately 50 per cent to 15cm. Then your knitting width will remain 15cm. If you are following a pattern, keep to the stitches in the pattern and don't worry about the cast on width of the stitches as they will balance



given to children it's left out for safety. The yarn for the owls is multicoloured and chunky so it's quick to knit and the faux Fair Isle will cover up little mistakes. CROSSED STITCHES

I've come across an odd looking stitch that is obviously a mistake but I don't know what I did wrong. It looks like an X and if I count each strand of yarn separately I have an extra stitch. What have I done wrong?

Aneeta says: Work until you get to the X, then knit the two strands of the crossed stitch together. This will turn the two strands into one. When you get to the end of your row you should have the correct number of stitches. You made this mistake by picking up your stitch incorrectly. Take care to knit into the stitch precisely next to the knitting

needle; if you pick up the stitch in the wrong place you will see this mistake at the end of your row.

KNITTINGIN THE ROUND

Let Sarah Heys guide you through the best practices for circular techniques

SEAMLESS KNITTING

I was wondering what the best way is to join your knitting when working in the round?

Pamela Knowles, Leicester Sarah says: When knitting in the round your stitches on the left and right needles need to be joined at the start otherwise you would get a gap on the first row. There are couple of different ways to join knitting in the round. I think the best method is to swap over the first and last stitch. To do this, cast on the required number of stitches. Move the stitch you cast on first onto the right hand needle. Then lift the last cast on stitch on the right needle over the slipped stitch onto the left needle. This will close the join on

your first round.

I have a pattern for a stocking stitch hat on flat needles. I'd prefer to knit it in the round so I don't have to join the back seam. I've never altered a pattern before. What should I do? Sandra Rhodes, Dublin

Sarah says: As it's a stocking stitch pattern it shouldn't need too much altering. Instead of knitting across the row then purling, you should knit every row. You will need to remember to place a stitch marker so you know when you have knitted a round. When decreasing at the end of the hat you may have to change to dpns when your stitches

get too small for your cord. **ROOMY SNOODY**

I knitted myself a snood using circular needles having done a gauge swatch on flat needles and my finished snood was completely different size, how did this happen? Rachel Evans, Falmouth

Sarah says: You may be a tighter or looser knitter when purling or knitting. In the round you always knit on the same side so this can affect your tension. You should always knit a gauge swatch in the round before starting

knitting. This sounds like it would take a while but you can strand the yarn across the back of a flat piece(see pink swatch top left) rather than working a full round with lots of stitches.





Whether you gift him to a child or keep him for yourself, you're sure to be tempted to go the whole hog and knit up a charming piggy family!

Materials

Yarn

1 x 50g ball of Rowan Pure Wool DK in Dew (057) Tiny amount of Rowan Pure Wool 4ply in Black (404) for eyes, nose and trotters

Needles Pair of 3.25mm (UK 10, US 3) knitting needles Set of 3.25mm (UK 10, US 3)

16 sts.

Row 14: Purl.*

double pointed needles (for holding stitches)

 Accessories 2 pipe cleaners for legs Safety toy stuffing

Yam detail

Tension

Row 15: Cast off 6 sts, k to end (hold 6 sts on spare needle for Right Side of Body).

LEFT FRONT LEG

Work as for Right Front Leg to ***.

Row 15: K6, cast off 6 sts (hold 6 sts on spare needle for Left Side of Body).

RIGHT SIDE OF BODY AND HEAD

With Dew, cast on 18 sts.

Row 1: Knit.

Row 2: Inc, p16, inc, with WS facing p6 from spare needle of Right Front Leg. 26 sts.

Row 3: K25, inc, with RS facing k8 from spare needle of Right Back Leg, cast on 1 st. 36 sts.

Row 4: P36, cast on 14 sts. 50 sts.

Row 5: K49, inc. 51 sts.

Row 6: Purl.

Row 7: Cast off 3 sts, k47 icos, inc.

49 sts.

Row 8: P47, p2tog. 48 sts.

Row 9: K2tog, k45, inc. 48 sts.

Row 10: P46, p2tog. 47 sts.

Row 11: K46, inc. 48 sts.

Row 12: Purl.

Row 13: K2tog, k46. 47 sts.

Row 14: Purl.

Row 15: K2tog, k45. 46 sts.

Row 16: Purl.

Row 17: Cast off 5 sts, k to end. 41 sts.

Row 18: P39, p2tog. 40 sts.

Row 19: K2tog, k36, k2tog. 38 sts.

Row 8: K47, k2tog. 48 sts.

Row 9: P2tog, p45, inc. 48 sts.

Row 10: K46, k2tog. 47 sts.

Row 11: P46, inc. 48 sts.

Row 12: Knit.

RIGHT BACK LEG

With Dew, cast on 4 sts.

Beg with a k row, work 6 rows st st.

Row 7: K1, (inc) twice, k1. 6 sts.

Row 8: Purl.

Row 9: Inc, k4, inc. 8 sts.

Row 10: Purl.**

Row 11: K1, (inc) twice, k2, (inc) twice, k1. 12 sts.

Row 12: Purl.

LEFT BACK LEG

Work as for Right Back Leg to *.

Row 15: K8, cast off 8 sts (hold 8 sts on spare needle for Left Side of Body).

Row 13: K1, (inc) twice, k6, (inc) twice, k1.

Row 15: Cast off 8 sts, k to end (hold 8 sts

on spare needle for Right Side of Body).

KNITTED PIG





Row 13: P2tog, p46. 47 sts.

Row 14: Knit.

Row 15: P2tog, p45. 46 sts.

Row 16: Knit.

Row 17: Cast off 5 sts, p to end. 41 sts.

Row 18: K39, k2tog. 40 sts.

Row 19: P2tog, p36, p2tog. 38 sts.

Row 20: K2tog, k34, k2tog. 36 sts.

Row 21: Cast off 5 sts, p29 icos, p2tog. 30 sts.

Row 22: K2tog, k26, k2tog. 28 sts. Cast off.

TUMMY

With Dew, cast on 1 st.

Beg with a k row, cont in st st.

Row 1: Inc. 2 sts.

Row 2: Purl.

Row 3: (Inc) twice. 4 sts.

Row 4: Purl.

Row 5: Inc, k2, inc. 6 sts.

Row 6: Purl.

Row 7: Inc, k4, inc. 8 sts.

Work 41 rows st st.

Row 49: K2tog, k4, k2tog. 6 sts.

Work 7 rows st st.

Row 57: K2tog, k2, k2tog. 4 sts.

Work 3 rows st st.

Row 61: (K2tog) twice. 2 sts.

Row 62: P2tog and fasten off.

TAIL

With Dew, cast on 20 sts. Cast off.

EAR (MAKE 2 THE SAME)

With Dew, cast on 5 sts.

Row 1 (forms ridge on RS): Knit.

Row 2: Inc, k3, inc. 7 sts.

Row 3: Purl.

Row 4: K3, inc, k3. 8 sts.

Work 3 rows st st.

Row 8: K2tog, k4, k2tog. 6 sts.

Row 9: Purl.

Row 10: K2tog, k2, k2tog. 4 sts.

Row 11: Purl.

Row 12: (K2tog) twice. 2 sts.

Row 13: P2tog and fasten off.

TO MAKE UP

SEWING IN ENDS

Sew in ends, leaving ends from cast on and cast off rows for sewing up.

LEGS

With WS together and whip stitch, fold each leg in half and sew up legs on RS, starting at trotters.

BODY

Sew along back of pig and 5cm or 2in down bottom.

TUMMY

Sew cast on row of tummy to where you have finished sewing down bottom, and sew cast off row to nose.

Ease and sew tummy to fit body. Leave a 2.5cm or 1in gap between front and back legs on one side.

STUFFING

Pipe cleaners are used to stiffen the legs and help bend them into shape. Fold a pipe cleaner into a U-shape and measure against the two front legs. Cut to fit approximately, leaving an extra 2.5cm or 1in at both ends. Fold these ends over to stop the pipe cleaner poking out of the trotters. Roll a little stuffing around pipe cleaner and slip into body, one end down each front leg. Repeat with second pipe cleaner and back legs. Starting at the head, stuff the pig firmly, then sew up the gap. Mould body into shape.

TAIL

Attach tail to start of bottom. Twist tail around to curl in a pig-like way!

EARS

With knit side uppermost, sew cast on row of each ear to top of head, approximately level with centre of front legs and with 3 rows between the ears. The ears should flop forwards.

TROTTERS

With Black, sew 2 sts vertically down front of each trotter.

EYES

With Black, make a tiny horizontal stitch for each eye, 4 rows below centre seam.

NOSTRILS

With Black, sew tiny stitches for nostrils.



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


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
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MAKE A SLIPKNOT * YOUR FIRST CAST ON STITCH



Twist the yarn into a loop and form a second loop of yarn to pull through the first one.



Tighten the first loop into a knot around the second. This will be your first cast on stitch.

CAST ON - THUMB METHOD . USE THIS FOR A STRETCHY EDGE



Twist the yarn into a loop and form a second loop of yarn to pull through the first one.



Tighten the first loop into a knot around the second. This will be your first cast on stitch.



Wrap the ball end of the yarn anticlockwise around the needle. Push the needle through the loop.



Slide the loop off your thumb and tighten both ends. Repeat steps 2-4 for each stitch.

CAST ON – KNITTED ON METHOD * USE THIS FOR A STRONG, HARDWEARING EDGE



With the slipknot on your left needle, insert the right needle from front to back of the loop.



Wrap the ball end of the yarn anticlockwise around right needle and then pull this through the loop.



Now insert the left needle tip through the front of the new loop, dropping it off the right needle.



Repeat steps 1-3 as needed, forming new stitches from the top stitch on the left needle.

CAST OFF * HOW TO FINISH YOUR WORK



To begin, knit only the first two stitches in the cast off row.



Push the left needle through the first stitch, then lift it over the second stitch and off right needle.



With one stitch now on the right needle, knit another stitch and then Pull the tail through the final cast repeat step 2 until the row end.



Cut the yarn with a 15cm or 6in tail. off stitch.

KNIT * WORKED ON THE RIGHT SIDE IN STOCKING STITCH



Insert the right needle into the left needle's top stitch, from front to back with the yarn at the back.



Hold the yarn around your right index finger and then wrap it clockwise around the right needle.



Using the right needle, pull this new loop of yarn through the stitch on the left needle.



Ease the stitch off the left needle keeping the new stitch on the right needle. Repeat steps 1-4.

PURL * WORKED ON THE WRONG SIDE IN STOCKING STITCH



of the left needle's top stitch with the yarn in front.



Insert the right needle into the front With your right index finger, wrap the yarn anticlockwise around the top of the right needle.



Using the right needle, pull this new loop of yarn back through the front of the stitch.



Ease the stitch off the left needle, keeping the new stitch on the right. Repeat steps 1-4.



MATERIALS

Tells you recommended needle size, how much yarn for each size and whether you need any extra items, such as buttons or zips or other tools.

TENSION

How many rows and stitches per 10cm you need to knit your garment to the correct size. If you've got too many try a larger needle, if you've got too few, try a smaller needle.

ABBREVIATIONS

Special abbreviations are included with each pattern. All of our standard pattern abbreviations are listed on page 92 in this issue.

HOW 1	TO READ	KNITTING	CHARTS

Knitting charts follow the same rules unless the pattern states otherwise. Right side rows are usually odd numbers and are worked right to left. Wrong side rows are normally even numbers and are worked left to right. Pattern repeats will be contained in an area outlined in red and some charts will have further coloured outlines for different sizes. The key will give you each symbol and tell you what stitch it is.

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


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

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

BAG (MAKE 2 PIECES THE SAME)

With 5.5mm needles, cast on 86 sts.

Row 1 (RS): P2, * k2, p2; rep from * to end.

Row 2 and all WS rows: K2, * p2, k2; rep from * to end.

Rep last 2 rows once more.

Row 5: P2, k2, p2, *yb, insert right hand needle from front between 6th and 7th sts on left hand needle and draw through a loop, slip this loop onto left hand needle and knit it tog with the first st, k1, p2, k2, p2; rep from * to last 8 sts, (k2, p2) twice.

Row 7: As row 1. Row 9: As row 1.

Row 11: P2, * yb insert right hand needle from front between 6th and 7th sts on left hand needle and draw through a loop, slip this loop onto left hand needle and knit it tog with the first st, k1, p2, k2, p2; rep from * to last 4 sts, k2, p2.

Row 12: As row 2.

These 12 rows form the pattern.

Cont in pattern until work measures 29cm or 11½in (approx 10 repeats) ending on a RS row.

Next row (WS): (Make eyelets for drawstring) k2, *p2tog, yf, k2; rep from * to end.

Change to 5mm needles.

Next row: *P1, k1; rep from * to end. Rep last row until rib measures 6cm or 21/4in. Cast off.

MAKING UP

Sew in all loose ends.

Sew side and bottom seam of bag using mattress stitch.

Fold top rib over and in half and sew in place. Sew handles inside the bag on top rib.

Make a 35×46 cm or $13\% \times 18\%$ in fabric lining and attach inside the bag.

Sew a press stud to the middle top of the bag. Using the leather thread weave in and out of the holes at the top of the bag to finish centre front at both ends. Attach beads to the ends of the thread if desired.
