



Change to 4mm needles and patt Row 1 (RS): K1 (0:1:1:1:0), (p1, k1) 0 (2:0:1:2:0:2) times, *yfrn, p2tog, (k1, p1) twice, k1, rep from * to last 3 (6:3:5:7:3:6) sts, yfrn, p2tog, k1, (p1, k1) 0 (1:0:1:2:0:1) times,

Row 2: K1 (1:1:0:2:1:1), (p1, k2) 0 (1:0:1:1:0:1) time, *yfrn, p2tog, k2, p1, k2, rep from * to last 3 (6:3:5:7:3:6) sts, yfrn, p2tog, (k2, p1) 0 (1:0:1:1:0:1) time, k1 (1:1:0:2:1:1).

These 2 rows form patt.

Cont in patt until Back measures
29 (29:30:30:31:31:32) cm or

SHAPE ARMHOLES

SHAPE SHOULDERS

Cast off 5 (**6**:7:**7**:7:8) sts at beg of next 4 rows, then 6 (**5**:6:**6**:6:8:9) sts at beg of foll 2 rows.

Leave rem 32 (**34**:34:**36**:36:38:38) sts on a stitch holder.

FRONT

Work as for Back from ** to **.

SHAPE ARMHOLES

Keeping patt correct, cast off 4 sts at beg of next 2 rows.



Dec 1 st at neck edge on next 6 rows, then on every alt row until 16 (17:20:20:20:22:25) sts rem.

Work straight until Front matches Back to start of shoulder shaping, ending at side edge.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Cast off 5 (6:7:7:7:8) sts at beg of next and foll alt row.

Work 1 row.

Cast off rem 6 (5:6:6:6:9) sts. With right side facing, rejoin yarn to rem sts, cast off centre 6 sts, patt to end. Complete to match first side, reversing shapings.

BUTTONHOLE BORDER

With right side facing and using 3.25mm needles, pick up and knit 25 sts up right front opening.

Row 1: K1, *p1, k1, rep from * to end. **Row 2:** K2, *p1, k1, rep from * to last st, k1. Rep row 1 once more.

Next row (Make buttonholes): Rib 3, (yrn, p2tog, rib 7) twice, yrn, p2tog, rib 2 (3 buttonholes made). Work 3 rows in rib. Cast off evenly in rib.





BUTTON BORDER

With right side facing and using 3.25mm needles, pick up and knit 25 sts down left front opening.

Row 1: K1, *p1, k1, rept from * to end. **Row 2:** K2, *p1, k1, rept from *to last st, k1. Rep these 2 rows twice more, then row 1again. Cast off evenly in rib.

COLLAR

Join shoulder seams.

With right side facing and using 3.25mm needles, starting at centre of Buttonhole Border, pick up and knit 4 sts across top of Border, k5 (**6**:6:**6**:**6**:**7**:7) sts from front, pick up and knit 22 (22:22:26:26:26:26) sts up right side of neck, k32 (**34**:34:**36**:36:38:38) sts from back dec 1 st at centre, pick up and knit 22 (22:22:26:26:26:26) sts down left side of neck, k5 (6:6:6:7:7) sts from front, then pick up and k4 sts to centre of Button Border. 93 (97:97:107:107:111:111) sts.

Row 1 (right side of collar): K2, *p1, k1,

rept from * to last st, k1.

Row 2: K1, *p1, k1, rept from * to end. Cont in rib as set and shape Collar as follows:

Next row: Rib 55 (**57**:57:**62**:62:**64**:64), turn.

Next row: SI1p, rib 16, turn. Next row: Sl1p, rib 24, turn. Next row: Sl1p, rib 32, turn.

Next row: SI1p, rib 40, turn.

Next row: Sl1p rib 48, turn. Next row: SI1p, rib to end.

Next row: Rib all sts.

Cont in rib across all sts until Collar measures 7cm or 23/4ins at front edge, ending with right side of Collar facing. Cast off evenly in rib.

ARMHOLE BORDERS

With right side facing and using 3.25mm needles, pick up and knit 115 (119:119:125:125:129:129) sts evenly all round entire armhole.

Starting with a row 2, work 5 rows in rib as for Back.

Cast off evenly in rib.

MAKING UP

Join side seams and Armhole Borders by top sewing.

Placing Buttonhole Border over Button Border, sew in place to cast off sts at base of front opening.

Sew on buttons.







What is it that makes this fabulous knit and crochet designer tick? We found out...



How did you start? I knitted a work colleague a cake for her birthday which I designed myself as I couldn't find a pattern. Everyone loved it and I was inundated with requests. I wrote down the pattern so that I could replicate them. Within a couple of years I was designing full-time.

What are your favourite projects to design?

I prefer projects that can be made in days rather than weeks such as homewares, accessories and toys and I'm currently using up my stash to design some pretty blankets and cushions. I've recently published an amigurumi crochet book called Once Upon a Time in Crochet, and I enjoyed creating each little character.

Do you have a signature style?

My designs are an eclectic mix, but I love clean lines and simplicity which is a theme that runs throughout my work. I tend to use subtle shades rather than bright colours and have a passion for Fair Isle designs.

What's the best thing about being a designer? I aim to inspire others to knit and crochet and love to see readers making my designs. Some of my toys have become favourites with children, creating lifelong friends. I also enjoy passing my skills to others so that they can create their own woolly wonders.

Do you have a favourite yarn?

Nothing can beat the feel and warmth of natural fibres. I'm currently working with three skeins of British Gotland DK which have been beautifully hand dyed, all ready to be turned into something warm and woolly. I also love DMC's Natura Just Cotton 4ply – it has a soft sheen and offers a great choice of colours.

Where do you get your inspiration?

I get inspiration everywhere - from nature; fashion; home style magazines; TV; surface (patterns and textures. Recently, the tiled fireplaces of a chateau in Bruges sparked an idea for a new collection of granny square projects.

3 sts Worked over the marked stitch and the stitch on either side of the marked stitch: insert RN through front of 2nd then 1st st on LN - as if to knit 2 together – slip these 2 sts onto RN, k1, then pass the 2 slipped sts over

Place stitch markers between each pattern repeat to help keep continuity when working shaping

Row 5: K1, *k2, k2tog, yo, k1, yo, skpo, k1, rep from * to last 2 sts, k2.

SHAPE RAGLAN SEAMS

Cont in pattern and cast off 5 (6:7:8:9) sts at beg of next 2 rows. 81 (87:93:99:105) sts. Cont shaping and keeping continuity of pattern work as follows:

Row 1 (RS): K2, skpo, pattern to last 4 sts, k2tog, k2.

Row 2: Purl.

Rep these last 2 rows 16 (18:20:22:24) more times 47 (49:51:53:55) sts. Leave these sts on a stitch holder.

FRONT

Work the same as back making sure that the lace pattern is worked the same during raglan shaping.

SLEEVES (WORK BOTH THE SAME)

Using 3.75mm needles, cast on 51 (**59**:67:**75**:83) sts and work in single rib as follows:

Row 1 (RS): K2, * p1, k1, rep from * to last st, k1.

Row 2: K1, * p1, k1, rep from * to end. Rep these 2 rows 4 more times.

Using a 3.75mm circular needle and starting with centre stitch of left hand sleeve, knit 8 (9:10:11:11) sts of left sleeve, pick up and knit one stitch from centre of raglan seam place marker in this stitch, knit 47 (**49**:51:**53**:55) sts of front, pick up and knit one stitch from centre of raglan seam place marker in this stitch, knit 15 (17:19:21:21) sts of right sleeve, pick up and knit one stitch from centre of raglan seam place marker in this stitch, knit 47 (49:51:53:55) sts of back, pick up and knit one stitch from centre of raglan seam place marker in this stitch, knit rem 7 (8:9:10:10) sts of left sleeve. 128 (136:144:152:156) sts. Work as follows, continuing in the round:

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

Next row: Inc in first st, rib to last st, inc.

10 sts.

Work 7 rows in rib.

Next row: K2tog, rib to last 2 sts, k2tog. 8 sts

Work 5 rows in rib.

Next row: K2tog, rib to last 2 sts, k2tog. 6 sts

Work 5 rows in rib.

Next row: K2tog, rib to last 2 sts, k2tog. 4

sts.

Work 3 rows in rib.

Next row: K2tog twice. 2 sts.

Work 3 rows in rib. **Next row:** K2tog.

Cut yarn and thread through.

Place a tail feather along one side of pigeon with the tip of the tail feather just past the end of the pigeon and pin in place. Put another on the opposite side in the same way. Pin a third in the centre of the back of the pigeon again with the tip just past the end. Sew all 3 in place. Pin the other 2 feathers on top of these, in between the 3 that have been sewn. Sew these in place securely. Ensure all ends are tied in.

WINGS (MAKE 2)

Using silver, cast on 8 sts.

First row: K1, p1 to end.

Next row: Inc in every st. 16 sts

Next row: P1, k1 to end. **Next row:** P1, k1 to end. These 2 rows set rib.

Next row: Inc in first st, rib to last st, inc.

18 sts.

Work 3 rows rib.

Next row: Inc in first st, rib to last st, inc.

20 sts.

Work 5 rows rib.

Next row: Rib 2tog, rib to last 2 sts, rib 2tog.

18 sts

Work 3 rows rib.

Change to Black.

Work 2 rows rib.

Change to Silver.

Work 2 rows rib.

Change to Black.

Work 2 rows rib.

Change to Silver.

Next row: Rib 2tog, rib to last 2 sts, rib 2tog.

16 sts

Work 3 rows rib.

Next row: Rib 2tog, rib to last 2 sts, rib 2tog.

14 sts

Work 3 rows rib.

Next row: Rib 2tog, rib to last 2 sts, rib 2tog.

12 sts

Next row: Rib to end. Rep last 2 rows till 2 sts rem.

Cast off.







Pin one wing at an angle at one side of pigeon with the top front starting about 8 rows below the top of the shirt and the tip placed on top of the tail feathers. Sew cast on edge and sew tip. Curve the wing so that the top of the feather sits out from the body. Rep with the second wing. Ensure all ends are tied in.

LEGS (MAKE 2)

Using Silver, cast on 8 sts. Work 6 rows st st. Cast off.

LARGE TOES (MAKE 2)

Using Silver, cast on 8 sts. Work 4 rows st st. Cast off.

SMALL TOES (MAKE 4)

Using Silver, cast on 4 sts. Work 4 rows st st. Cast off.

Cut a length of pipe cleaner 3 times longer than legs, then fold twice. Insert into leg with reverse st st to front and sew seam and ends. Rep with other leg. Cut a length of pipe cleaner the size of the large toe and small toes and sew into toes as for legs. Sew 2 small toes to centre of large toe then attach foot to leg securely. Rep with second foot.

SHORTS (MAKE 2)

Using Cloud Blue, cast on 12 sts.

First row: Knit.

Starting with a knit row, work 4 rows st st. Cast off.

Fold shorts and sew seam and with g st to

bottom, place on leg and sew in position.

Rep with second leg.

TENNIS RACQUET

MESH

Using Cream, cast on 8 sts.

First row: SI1, (yfwd, k2tog) to last st, k1.

HANDLE AND FRAME

Using Crimson, cast on 52 sts. St st 4 rows. Cast off.

Place mesh inside frame with reverse st st to front and sew from one side of frame through to the other, curving into shape as you go. Cut a 12cm or 4¾in length of pipe cleaner and fold and twist together. Insert pipe cleaner into handle and sew seam. Using a length of cream yarn, wrap yarn around base of handle about 6 times tightly. Secure at back of racquet. Rep again 1cm or ½in up handle. Place in under wing and sew securely.

TENNIS BALLS (MAKE 2)

Using Lemon, cast on 3 sts. First row: Inc in every st. 6 sts

Next row: Purl. Next row: Knit. Next row: Purl.

Next row: K2tog to end. 3 sts Cut yarn and thread through.

Join seam with reverse st st to front. Stuff firmly with filling. Sew rem seam. Rep with second ball. Sew tennis balls to other wing. Check all loose ends are tied in to finish.

SORT OUT YOUR stripes



Stripes are a simple way of injecting some colour into your knits. Here's how to do it in style. By Rosee Woodland

efore I could knit 'properly' stripes were one of my favourite ways to customise my knits. I love wearing bright colours (see evidence top left!) and stripes were a great way to add visual interest before I got to grips with cables, lace and Fair Isle. But fairly early on I came unstuck with a seamless top-down dress I was designing as I went along. I was using cotton yarn and changing stripes at the side, but as you can see from the picture overleaf, hiding the changes wasn't working very well! In the end I ripped the whole thing out and gave away the yarn. Here's how to avoid repeating my mistakes!



A RIGHT CARRY ON

Let's start with the basics. You create a stripe by changing the colour of yarn you are knitting with. But what do you do at this point? There are different schools of thought. Some patterns advise you to carry the yarn not in use up the side of the work, ready to use it again when you change back to your original colour.

This method has a couple of advantages. Firstly, it's economical. You're only leaving a short length of yarn unused - so good if you're not sure if you've got enough yarn. Secondly, there's much less weaving in of ends, as you only weave in two ends of yarn per colour, the first and last time you use it. For a garment like our striped cardi on page 37, that makes good sense. Otherwise you'll be there forever darning in countless ends and may give up! But the problem with this method is that it's hard to control the tension of the yarn you're carrying on up - too tight and the edge of the garment will bunch up. Too loose and it'll be hard to keep it looking nice and neat.

So what are the alternatives? Personally I never carry yarn up the side of the work. I always cut it and start a new length. It will take longer, but I know I can get a better finish that way, and I am a fussy knitter! Some knitters start the new colour by knitting with both ends together for one or two stitches. This is a very secure method, but you will be able to spot it 10 and if

> It's quicker if you only weave in two ends of yarn per colour, but not as neat...

you're using thick yarn it'll look very lumpy. Instead, you could try knitting with the old colour for the first stitch of the row, and then changing colour on the second stitch 2 + 3. After a couple of rows you won't even be able to see the change 40 and the single stitch in the old colour will disappear when you seam your piece.

Alternatively, you can be even braver and just drop the first colour at the end of the row and start with the new colour on the new row. Yikes! Believe it or not, this is what I do now every single time when I'm knitting flat pieces. Yes, it means more weaving in of ends (more













on that in a bit) but it means I have the most control possible over the tension at the edges of my work. I don't darn in these ends as I go - I leave them all until the end, and then pop on a long film and sit there and patiently weave them all in. It's more work, but like I said, I am fussy! When I come back to all those loose threads, I first grab one in each hand and pull them gently against each other, to tighten them to the desired tension 5. Once I'm happy that the tension is correct, I weave them in, one by one. The neatest way to do this is with reverse duplicate stitch. This sounds complicated, but it

isn't. Duplicate stitch, also known as Swiss darning, basically means you use a needle and yarn to follow the path of existing stitches. With reverse duplicate stitching you do this on the wrong side of the work, going up 6 and down 7 through the back of your stitches. Make sure you only stitch on top of the same colour, and if you're really worried it'll show on the right side, you can 'skim' by splitting the plies of the stitches you're working on top of. This works particularly well with thicker yarns. While you're doing this, don't forget to pinch the second colour you're going to weave in at the side of the work, to keep

the right tension. Once you've woven in the first end, repeat with the second, again, only working on top of the same colour. When you've finished, your woven ends will be invisible on both sides of your work and you will have a perfect crisp finish to the edges of your stripes $\mathbf{8} + \mathbf{9}$. Very satisfying!

WORKING AROUND

Seamless stripes present other problems, as I found out with my dress – just look at that mess around the armholes! In our swatch up you can see the difference between jogged and jogless joins in the



round. The top two changes have been made without any adaptation, and there are clear holes and jogs visible. The bottom two changes are much neater. Here's how... On the first round of your new colour, drop your old colour and knit with the new one When you get back to the start of the round, slip the first stitch of the new colour purlwise, and then carry on knitting as normal 12. This pulls the first stitch of the first round up slightly, disguising the jog between the colour changes. It won't be perfect, so, as with flat pieces, leave both ends cut and come back later and sort out the tension and weave them in using

reverse duplicate stitch. Depending on your yarn, you may still be able to see the jog very slightly 😉, in which case, soak your piece in warm water when it's finished, and tug this area gently until you are happy with the stitch alignment.

This technique does mean you are working a narrower stripe every time on the first stitch and this can show over a large area when you are working skinny stripes. You can deal with this with blocking, or change the start of the round by one stitch each time you change colour. Just move your stitch marker one stitch in the same direction every time and you'll be fine! 🧐

working stripes in the round, but some yarns can be unforgiving. The lack of elasticity in cotton yarn makes it hard to hide the 'jogs' at colour changes. Hazy or fluffy yarns are your friend here. The smoother the yarn, the more obvious your colour changes will be. If in doubt, pick an animal fibre, not plant based, or synthetic.

Stick to the end

You should never start a new ball of yarn half way through a row, and this applies to stripes too! Ran out of yarn half way through that first row of your new stripe? Time to rip back if you want to stop it looking messy! If you are using a self striping yarn and the colour changes at mid-row, consider breaking and rejoining at the side of the work where it won't show.

Row 17 and 18: K using yarn E.

Cast off 13 (**15**:18:**20**) sts in patt at beg of next 2 rows. 63 (69:73:81) sts Cast off 14 (**16**:18:**20**) sts in patt at beg of next 2 rows. 35 (37:37:41) sts Cast off rem 35 (37:37:41) sts in patt.

LEFT FRONT

Using 3.25mm needles, thumb method and yarn E, cast on 90 (100:110:120) sts.

Row 2: * K1, cast off 3 sts, rep from * to end. 36 (40:44:48) sts.

Row 3: K1, cast on 1 st, * k2, cast on 1 st, rep from * to last st, k1. 54 (60:66:72) sts. Knit 3 rows, dec 2 sts evenly across last row. 52 (**58**:64:**70**) sts.

Change to 4mm needles.

Row 1 (RS): Using yarn A, knit to last 5 sts

and leave rem 5 sts on a stitch holder. 47 (53:59:65) sts. **

Beg with 2nd row, cont in patt as given for back until left front measures 25 (25:27:29) cm or 93/4 (93/4:103/4:111/2) in, ending with a WS row.

SHAPE NECK

Work 6 rows dec 1 st at neck edge (end) of 1st and foll 4th row. 45 (51:57:63) sts.

SHAPE ARMHOLE

Work 5 (6:7:7) rows dec 1 st at armhole edge of every row AT THE SAME TIME dec 1 st at neck edge of 3rd and foll 0 (0:4th:4th) row. 39 (44:48:54) sts. Work 25 (24:11:31) rows dec 1 st at neck edge only on 2nd (1st:4th:4th) and every foll 4th row. 33 (38:46:47) sts. Work 31 (**37**:55:**37**) rows dec 1 st at neck

edge only on 1st and every foll 6th row. 27 (31:36:40) sts.

Cont without shaping until armhole measures 21(23:25:26) cm or 81/4 (9:93/4:101/4) in, ending with a WS row.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Next row (RS): Cast off 13 (15:18:20) sts in patt, patt to end. 14 (16:18:20) sts Next row (WS): Patt.

Cast off rem 14 (**16**:18:**20**) sts in patt.

RIGHT FRONT

Using 3.25mm needles, thumb method and yarn E, cast on 90 (100:110:120) sts.

Row 1: Knit.

Row 2: * K1, cast off 3 sts, rep from * to end. 36 (**40**:44:**48**) sts.

Row 3: K1, cast on 1 st, * k2, cast on 1 st, rep from * to last st, k1.

Cast off 1 (2:2) sts at beg of next 2 rows.

20 (20:22) sts

Cast off 2 (1:1) sts at beg of next 2 rows.

16 (**18**:20) sts

Cast off 3 (3:2) sts at beg of next 2 (2:4) rows.

10 (**12**:12) sts

Cast off rem 10 (12:12) sts.

Next row: *K15, k2tog, rep from * to last st,

For 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th sizes only

Next row: *K14, k2tog, rep from * to last st,

k1. 121 sts.

Next row: Purl.

For all sizes

Next row: *K13, k2tog,

rep from * to last st, k1.

113 sts

Next row: Purl.

Next row: *K12, k2tog,

rep from * to last st, k1.

105 sts

Next row: Purl.

Next row: *K11, k2tog, rep from

* to last st, k1. 97 sts

Next row: Purl.

Continue dec 8 sts in every alt row as before (k10, k2tog, then k9, k2tog etc. to last st, k1)

until 9 sts remain.

Fasten off with a long tail and pull tail through remaining sts to inside.

TO MAKE UP

Join back seam. Cover with a clean, damp tea towel, pull into shape while damp and leave until dry. Using the ribbon tie a small bow and attach it to the bottom edge of the hat as shown. See ball band for washing and further care instructions.



Pattern notes

The navy stripes are worked in stocking stitch, highlighting them against the ribbing. The first round of white after each navy stripe is also worked in stocking stitch - this is because purling creates bumps in the colour of the previous round, so you need a plain round of white before starting the ribbing again to create smooth bands of colour. To avoid a 'jog' when you change colours, work the first round in a new colour as normal, but when you knit the second round in that colour, slip the first stitch without knitting it. Left and right socks are identical except that the cable is worked to the front for the left sock, and to the back for the right.

Finished sizes

To fit a foot/leg circumference of approx. 20 (23:25) cm or 8 (9:10) in Foot length is adjustable

Size M only

Rounds 1 to 12: (K2, p2) to end.

Size L only

Rounds 1 to 12: (K3, p2, k3, p2, k2, p2, k2, p2) to end.

LEG

Rounds 13 to 15: With A, k to end. Round 16: With MC, k to end. **Rounds 17 to 21:** (K4 [6:8], p2, k6, p2) to end.

Round 21: (K4 [6:8], p2, c6, p2) to end. Rounds 22 to 24: (K4 [6:8], p2, k6, p2) to end.

Rounds 25 to 36: As Rounds 13 to 24. Rounds 37 to 39: With A, k to end. Rounds 40 to 44: With MC, (k4 [6:8], p2, k6, p2) to end.

Round 45: (K4 [6:8], p2, c6, p2) to end. Rounds 46 to 53: (K4 [6:8], p2, k6, p2) to end.

Round 54: (K4 [6:8], p2, c6, p2) to end. Rounds 55 to 63: As Rounds 46 to 54. **Rounds 64 to 66:** (K4 [6:8], p2, k6, p2) to end.

Pattern establishes a cable round every ninth round.

After turning the heel you will continue this pattern as established down the foot of the sock, while working the sole plain.

HEEL

K2 (3:4), turn.

Row 1: Sl1 pwise, p27 (31:35), turn. Row 2: (Sl1, k1) 14 (16:18) times, turn. Repeat these two rows 13 (15:17) more times 28 (**32**:36) rows in total.

Next row: Sl1 pwise, p16 (**18**:20), p2tog, p1, turn.


Next row: Sl1, k7, ssk, k1, turn. Next row: SI1, p8, p2tog, p1, turn. Next row: Sl1, k9, ssk, k1, turn.

Continue in this way until all the sts have been used up.

GUSSET

Resume working in rounds as follows: **Next row:** Pick up and knit approx 16 (18:20) stitches down left side of flap,





place marker (M1), work across top of foot in pattern, place marker (M2), pick up and knit approx 16 (18:20) stitches up right side of flap.

You should pick up one stitch in every slipped stitch down the sides of the heel flap, then one extra stitch at the join between the heel and the instep stitches. This reduces the likelihood of a hole appearing at this join.

It doesn't matter if the exact number you pick up is different to the numbers given above, as long as you pick up the same number on each side.

When knitting the next round, for this round only, knit the stitches that you picked up at each side of the heel flap through the back loop.

This tightens them up and avoids holes in the fabric.

For all further rounds, knit these stitches normally.

Dec round: K to 3 sts before M1, k2tog, k1, work across top of foot in pattern to M2, k1, ssk, k to end.

Plain round: Work in pattern as established. Repeat these two rounds until 28 (32:36) sts remain on sole of foot.

M1 marks new start of round. Continue to work in pattern until foot measures approximately 6.5cm or 2½ in less than the desired length, finishing ready to work a cable round.

Next round: (K2 [3:4], p2, c6, p2, k4 [6:8], p2, c6, p2, k2 [3:4]), slip marker, knit to end. Work five more rounds in rib pattern.

TOE

Dec round: K1, ssk, k to 3 sts before M2, k2tog, k2 (1 st either side of M2), ssk,

k to 3 sts before M1, k2tog, k1.

Plain round: Knit.

The cable pattern runs

from just above the toe

needle tip.

Now, 'cast off' 1 stitch at the end of each needle, lifting the very end stitch over the one next to it, then off the needles.

This helps to avoid the ends

of the toe sticking out in little points once the sock is finished. Graft the remaining 16 (20:24) sts using Kitchener stitch, then weave in all ends. @

Over any number of stitchess

Row 1 (RS): Knit.

Row 2 (WS): Knit.

Row 4: Knit, winding yarn around needle twice for each stitch.

Row 5: Knit, dropping extra loops off needle as you go.

Row 6: Knit, pulling your stitches as you go to even them out.

You can make your loops bigger by winding the yarn around the needle any number of times on Row 4. Just remember to drop them the next row.



Row 7: P3, * sl1, k1, psso, k1, k2tog, p3, repeat from * to the end of the row.

Row 8: K3, * p3, k3, repeat from * to the end of the row.

Row 9: P3, * sl1, k2tog, psso, p3, repeat from * to the end of the row.

Row 10: K3, * p1, k3, repeat from * to the end of the row.

Row 11: P3, * k1, p3, repeat from * to the end of the row.

Row 12: K3, * p1, k3, repeat from * to the end of the row. 103 sts













COAT HANGER COVER

Hanger 1: Main colour D, contrast colour E. Hanger 2: Main colour C, contrast colour A.

Hanger 3: Main colour B, contrast colour F.

Using main colour and 4mm needles, cast on 90 sts.

Bag 3: Main colour B, contrast colour F. Using main colour and 4mm needles, cast

Work 2 rows in st st.

Knit 2 rows.

Work 2 rows in st st.

Begin Chart 9 and work in st st from Row 1 to Row 28.

Work 6 rows in st st.

Cast off.

TO MAKE UP

Fold bag in half at garter stitch ridge and sew up side seams.

Insert cotton lavender bag.

Sew up bottom seam.

Attach ribbon to top of bag and hang round Coat Hanger hook.

PEG BAG

LOWER FRONT RUFFLE

Using B and 4mm needles, cast on 183 sts.

Row 1: P3, * k9, p3, repeat from * to the end of the row.

Row 2: K3, * p9, k3, repeat from * to the end of the row.

Row 3: P3, * sl1, k1, psso, k5, k2tog, p3, repeat from * to the end of the row.

Row 4: K3, * p7, k3, repeat from * to the end of the row.

Row 5: P3, * sl1, k1, psso, k3, k2tog, p3, repeat from * to the end of the row.

Row 6: K3, * p5, k3, repeat from * to the end of the row.

Row 7: P3, * sl1, k1, psso, k1, k2tog, p3, repeat from * to the end of the row.

Row 8: K3, * p3, k3, repeat from * to the end of the row.

Row 9: P3, * sl1, k2tog, psso, p3, repeat from * to the end of the row.

Row 10: K3, * p1, k3, repeat from * to the end of the row.

Row 11: P3, * k1, p3, repeat from * to the end of the row.

Row 12: K3, * p1, k3, repeat from * to the end of the row. 63 sts

Change to C.

Knit 4 rows.

Begin Chart 5 and work in st st from Row 1 to Row 32.

Change to C.

Knit 4 rows.

Change to B.

Knit 4 rows.

Cast off.

UPPER FRONT AND BACK

Using B and 4mm needles, cast on 63 sts. Knit 4 rows.

Begin Chart 6 and work in st st from Row 1 to Row 18.

Change to B.

Knit 4 rows.

Begin Chart 7 and work in st st from Row 1 to Row 32, then work in st st from Row 3 to Row 32.

Cast off.

TO MAKE UP

Join Bottom Front to Bottom Top, leaving a gap of 12cm or 41/4in in the centre.

Fold peg bag over at garter stitch ridge and sew side seams.

Sew bottom of peg bag at the back to the top edge of the ruffle.

Insert trouser hanger into opening and position at top of Peg Bag.

Push hanger hook through stitches at centre of garter stitch ridge. 🕼



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
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


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











Some knits are destined to become seasonal essentials that you'll wear again and again. This lace poncho is definitely one of those knits. Worked in a yarn that blends the appeal of hemp fibre with super sparkly sequins, it's such a fun garment, and eminently practical too as it can be worn over any outfit, with or without adding a waistcinching belt.

Materials

Yarn

8 x 50g balls of Bergère de France Estivale in Beige (shade 296.761)

Needles 1 pair 4.5mm (UK 7, US 7)

 Accessories Stitch markers

Yarn detail

- 4 ply weight 21% hemp, 29% polyester, 50% acrylic
- + 50g/143m (156yds)
- Machine wash at 30°C

Tension

19 sts and 31 rows over st st for a 10cm or 4in square using 4.5mm needles.

LACE STITCH

STITCHES USED

Over a number of sts divisible by 6+1. Row 1 (RS): K1, *yo, k2togtbl, k1, k2tog, yo, k1*. Rep from * to*.

Row 2 and every even row: P.

Row 3: K1, *yo, k1, sl1, k2tog, psso, k1, yo, k1*.

Rep from * to *.

Row 5: K1, *k2tog, yo, k1, yo, k2togtbl, k1*. Rep from * to*.

Row 7: K2tog, k1, yo, k1, * yo, k1, sl1, k2tog, psso, k1, yo, k1*. Rep from * to*, ending with yo, k1, k2togtbl. After row 8 rep from Row 1.

BACK

Cast on 151 sts. Work in rev st st (purl on RS, knit on WS) for 2 rows. Cont in Lace stitch until work measures 28cm or 11in or 86 rows total.

ARMHOLES

Place a marker in first and last st for beg of armholes.

Continue and work even until work measures 53cm or 21in or 164 rows total.

SHOULDERS AND NECK EDGE

For shoulders, cast off at the beg of every row as foll:

5 sts 8 times, 6 sts 10 times.

AND AT THE SAME TIME, when working first shoulder dec for neck edge, cast off center 33 sts and cont working each side separately casting off on neck edge every 2nd row as foll:

3 sts once, 2 sts once, 1 st 4 times.

FRONT

Work as for back.

FINISHING

Join right shoulder seam.

NECK BORDER

Pick up and knit 110 sts along neck edge.


K 1 row on WS of work.

Cast off all sts purlwise on RS of work. Join left shoulder seam.


ARMHOLES BORDER

BACK AND FRONT ALIKE

Using 3.25mm needles, cast on 92 (100:108:116:126:140) sts. Work in k1, p1 rib for 6cm or 2½in.

Purl 1 row, decreasing to 72 (80:88:96:104:116) sts as follows:

1st size: P7 (p2tog, p2) to last 9 sts, p2tog,

p7.

2nd size: P2, p2tog, (p3, p2tog) to last 1, p1. **3rd size:** P6, p2tog, (p3, p2tog) to last 5, p5. **4th size:** P10, p2tog, (p3, p2tog) to last 9, p9.

5th size: P8 (p3, p2tog) to last 8, p8. 6th size: P10 (p3, p2tog) to last 10, p10.

Change to 4mm needles and, beginning with a Row 1, work in Faux Cable Lace pattern to 33 (34:35:36:37:38) cm or 13 (**13½**:13¾:**14**:14:**14½**:15) ins.

SHAPE SLEEVES

Cast on 6 sts at beg next 2 rows. 84 (92:100:108:116:128) sts Cont in pattern for a further 10 (10:11:11:11) cm or 4 (4:41/4:41/4:41/2) ins, ending after a 3rd or 6th row

SHAPE NECK

Knit 33 (37:40:43:47:52), leave centre 18 (18:20:22:22:24) on holder, knit to end. Working on last set of sts, dec 1 st at neck edge of every row to 27 (33:35:36:39:42) sts. Cont until armhole measures 18 (**18**:19:**20**:22 **23**) cm or 7 (**7**:7½:**8**:8½:**9**) in, ending with a WS row.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Cast off 17 (20:21:22:23:26) at beg of next row. Cast off rem 10 (13:14:14:16:16) sts. Return to sts for second shoulder and work to match.

NECK EDGING

Join right shoulder.

Using 3.25mm needles, pick up and knit 18 (18:20:20:22:22) down left side of front neck, 18 (18:20:22:24) from holder, 18 (**18**:20:**20**:22:**22**) up right side of front neck, 18 (18:20:20:22:22) down right back neck, 18 (18:20:22:24) from holder, and 18 (18:20:20:22:22) from left back neck. 108 (108:120:124:132:136) sts Work 5 rows k1 in p1 rib and cast off. Join left shoulder and neck edge.

OPTIONAL EDGING FOR SLEEVES

Using 3.25mm crochet hook, work 1 row dc around armholes.

Sew up side seams.

Darn in all ends. 49





PENNIES FOR thought...

Join the wonderful p/hop knitting community and help save lives while doing what you love By Kirstie Sleight

/hop is a charity knitting project that raises funds for the emergency medical aid organisation Médecins Sans Frontières/Doctors Without Borders (MSF). Why p/hop? It's short for Pennies Per Hour of Pleasure, and this is how it works...

Designers kindly donate their knitting and crochet patterns, which are then available for anyone to download. There's no fixed price as the idea is that you donate depending on how many hours of pleasure you'll get from knitting your p/hop pattern.

MSF saves lives by providing rapid response medical help where it's needed most - in armed conflicts, epidemics, famines and natural disasters. The charity also tackles long-term health crises and currently has projects running in over 60 countries, including the current ebola epidemic in Sierra Leone.

"You can donate whatever you can afford for one of our patterns, every little really Barrie.

"I started out by helping at event stalls, taking part in online yarn swaps, and knitting samples." Larissa became the project's coordinator in September 2014.

"The p/hop community gets together

online, through our very active Ravelry group, Twitter,

Facebook page, and the p/hop blog," explains Larissa.

"A few times a

year we hit the road and travel to yarn and

fibre events across the UK, which is a wonderful chance to meet up with our knit and crochet supporters face to face. I love seeing people wear the projects they've made.

"People are really quite amazed at how much p/hop has raised since we began in 2008. We are now tantalisingly close to raising a total of £50,000 since p/hop's inception!

"One of the most wonderful elements

of p/hop is that it's a real community project. It's fantastic to be able to tell nonknitters just how brilliantly the knitting community pulls together to raise money 'just from knitting'!" Everything p/hop has

raised has been the result of thousands of knitters each making a contribution.

To date, p/hop has nearly 60

patterns including shawls, mitts, socks, hats and more. "Shawls are very popular," says Larissa. "Although our all-time most popular pattern must be the Cranford Mitts; there are currently 911 Cranford Mitts projects listed on Ravelry.com!" (\$\square\$

Tension

17 sts and 24 rows to 10cm or 4in on 6mm needles.

Pattern notes

Due to the elastic nature of the yarn, work should be measured hanging from needles rather than laid flat.

Special abbreviations

M1r make one stitch by picking up horizontal loop before next stitch and knitting into the front of it

M1I make one stitch by picking up horizontal loop before next stitch and knitting into the back of it.

Change to 6mm needles.

Beg with a k row, work in st st as folls: Work 6 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

Working all increases as set by last row, inc 1 st at each end of foll 10th row.

75 (83:93:103:115) sts

Cont straight until back meas 18 (**19**:20:**21**:22) cm or 7 (**7½**:8:**8¼**:8¾) in, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE ARMHOLES

Working all decs as set by last 2 rows, dec 1 st at each end of next row, then on 2 foll alt rows.

57 (65:75:85:97) sts

Cont straight until armhole meas 20 (21:22:23:24) cm or 8 (81/4:83/4:9:91/2) in, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE SHOULDERS AND BACK NECK

Next row (RS): Cast off 6 (8:10:13:15) sts, k until there are 10 (12:14:16:19) sts on right needle and turn, leaving rem sts on a holder. Work each side of neck separately. Cast off 3 sts at beg of next row.

Cast off rem 7 (9:11:13:16) sts.

With RS facing, slip centre 25 (25:27:27) sts onto a holder, rejoin yarn to rem sts and k to end.

Complete to match first side, reversing all shapings.

Using 5mm needles, cast on 42 (46:50:56:62)

Row 1 (RS): *K1, p1, rep from * to last 2 sts, k2.

Work in rib for 6cm or 2½in, ending with RS facing for next row.

Change to 6mm needles.

Row 1 (RS): K to last 7 sts, (p1, k1) 3 times,

Next row (RS): Cast off 4 sts, k to last 7 sts, (p1, k1) 3 times, k1. 40 (**44**:48:**54**:60) sts Work 1 row.

Working all decs as set by back, dec 1 st at

armhole edge of next 3 rows, then on foll 2 alt rows.

35 (**39**:43:**49**:55) sts

Cont straight until 27 (27:29:29:31) rows less have been worked then on back to beg of shoulder shaping, ending with WS facing for next row.

SHAPE FRONT NECK

Next row (WS): Rib 7 and slip these 7 sts onto a holder (for neckband), cast off next 4 (4:4:5:5) sts, p to end. 24 (28:32:37:43) sts Working all decs as set by back, dec 1 st at neck edge of next 3 rows, then on foll 7 (7:6:6:7) alt rows, then on 1 (1:2:2:2) foll 4th rows.

13 (**17**:21:**26**:31) sts

Work 5 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE SHOULDER

Cast off 6 (8:10:13:15) sts at beg of next row. Work 1 row.

Cast off rem 7 (9:11:13:16) sts.

Mark positions for 5 buttons on front rib - first button to come 5 rows up from cast-on edge and last to come 4 rows into neckband, and rem 3 buttons evenly spaced between.

RIGHT FRONT

Using 5mm needles, cast on 42 (46:50:56:62) sts.

Row 1 (RS): K2, *p1, k1, rep from * to end.

Row 2: *P1, k1, rep from * to end.

These 2 rows form rib.

Work 2 rows more in rib, ending with RS facing for next row.

Next row (RS): Rib 3, work 2 tog, yon (to





make buttonhole), rib to end. Working 3 more buttonholes to match markers on left front, cont as folls: Cont until rib measures 6cm or 2½in, ending with RS facing for next row.

Change to 6 mm needles.

Row 1 (RS): K1, (k1, p1) 3 times, k to end. **Row 2:** P to last 7 sts, (k1, p1) 3 times, k1. These 2 rows set sts – st st with rib at front edge.

Cont as set, working all increases as set by back as folls:

Work 4 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

Inc 1 st at end of next and foll 10th row. 44 (48:52:58:64) sts

Cont straight until right front matches back

to beg of armhole shaping, ending with WS facing for next row.

SHAPE ARMHOLE

Next row (WS): Cast off 4 sts, p to last 7 sts, (k1, p1) 3 times, k1.

40 (**44**:48:**54**:60) sts

Working all decs as set by back, dec 1 st at armhole edge of next 3 rows, then on foll 2 alt rows.

35 (**39**:43:**49**:55) sts

Cont straight until 28 (28:30:30:32) rows less have been worked then on back to beg of shoulder shaping, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE FRONT NECK

Next row (RS): Rib 7 and slip these 7 sts onto a holder (for neckband), cast off next 4 (4:4:5:5) sts, k to end. 24 (28:32:37:43) sts Complete to match left front reversing shapings.

SLEEVES

Using 5mm needles, cast on 49 (**53**:57:**61**:65) sts.

Work in rib as given for back for 3cm or 11/4in ending with RS facing for next row.

Change to 6mm needles.

Beg with a k row, work in st st as folls: Work 2 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

SHAPE SLEEVE TOP

Cast off 4 sts at beg of next 2 rows. 41 (**45**:49:**53**:57) sts

Dec 1 st at each end of next 3 rows, then on foll 3 alt rows, then on 5 foll 4th rows, then on 2 foll alt rows, then on every row until 9 sts rem.

Cast off rem 9 sts.

MAKING UP

Press your finished pieces following any instructions on the ballband. Join shoulder seams using back stitch, or mattress stitch if preferred.

NECKBAND

If you've not set in sleeves

before try joining the side

seams after you've pinned and sewn in the sleeves,

not before.

It's much easier!

With RS facing, using 5mm needles, slip 7 sts on holder for right front neck onto needle, rejoin yarn and pick up and knit 25 (25:27:27:29) sts up right side of front neck, 3 sts down right side of back neck, k across 25 (25:27:27) sts from back holder, pick up and knit 3 sts up left side of back neck and 25 (25:27:29) sts down left side of front neck, then rib across 7 sts from left front holder.

95 (95:101:101:107) sts

Work in rib as set by front borders for 3 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

Next row (RS): Rib 3, work 2 tog, yon (to make buttonhole), rib to end.

Work 4 rows more in rib, ending with WS facing for next row.

Cast off in rib on WS.

Set in sleeves, join side seams and sew on buttons.



Row 1: Knit.

Row 2: Knit.

These 2 rows form the garter stitch pattern. Continue in this pattern throughout.

With C knit a further 18 rows. Then work the following rows with the following colours:

Rows 19 - 20: B.

Rows 21 - 22: D.

Rows 23 - 24: B.

Rows 25 - 28: A.

Rows 29 - 30: B.

Rows 31 - 32: D. Rows 33 - 34: B.

Rows 35 - 54: C.

Cast off loosely.

MAKING UP

Stitch the cast on edge along the cast off edge to form a tube and then stitch the two ends of the tube together to form your sweatband. Make sure the cast on edge/cast off edge seam sits at the centre back of your sweatband so they will be tucked away and not visible from the outside and therefore the central blue stripe should sit in the centre of your sweatband.

To form the visor, cut out the required shape from a thin piece of plastic. We found one of those bendy chopping boards was perfect and they come in lots of fun colours. Then, using a hole punch, punch holes evenly all around the outside of your shaped piece of plastic approx 1cm or ½in apart.

Then, using a 4mm crochet hook, double crochet all the way round the outside using A and then stitch this to the centre of your sweatband along the bottom edge.

WRISTBANDS

With 3.25mm needles and A cast on 35 sts.

Row 1: Knit.

Row 2: Knit.

These 2 rows form the garter stitch pattern. Continue in this pattern throughout.

With A knit a further 26 rows. Then work the following rows with the following colours:

Rows 29 - 32: B.

Rows 33 - 34: C.

Rows 35 - 36: B.

Rows 37 - 42: D.

Rows 43 - 44: B. Rows 45 - 46: C.

Rows 47 - 50: B.

Rows 51 - 78: A.

Cast off loosely.

MAKING UP

To construct your wristbands stitch the cast on edge along the cast off edge to form a tube and then stitch the two ends of the tube together to form your wristbands. Make sure the cast on edge/cast off edge seam sits at the centre back of your wristband so they will be tucked away and not visible from the outside and therefore the central coral stripe should sit in the centre of your wristband. 🚭

LEARNING TO KNIT

My eight-year-old daughter really wants to learn how to knit. I've bought her some chunky needles but she's having difficulty holding the needles while putting the yarn around to make the stitch. What can I do to help her?

Veronica Fisher, Cheadle.

Jo says: The problem is most likely with the needles being too thick and maybe too long as well. As both needles need to be held together during the stitch process she will have more success with 4mm needles and double knitting yarn.

The reason they need to be fairly short is that she needs clearance between her chest and the knitting - if she doesn't have this she will hold the knitting out too far, her arms will start to ache, and she'll soon give up! Try any standard double knitting yarn in a bright colour (not fluffy or novelty yarn) and a pair of these children's knitting needles from Pony.

Each pair is available in 3.25mm and 4mm sizes and they measure 18cm long. To buy them for £1.95 go to www.johnlewis.com.

LIGHTWEIGHT CHUNKY

I'm looking for a yarn that is chunky but light as I want to make a throw for my elderly mother. Do you have any ideas? Sarai Jameson, Dundee

Jo says: Cocoon by Bèrgere de France would be fabulous for a throw. It's made from 70% acrylic, 25% mohair and 5% alpaca, which has great stitch definition so it would lend itself to cables or textures. The knitting will be very quick as the tension is 14 sts and 17 rows per 10cm or 4in knitted on 6.5mm needles.

There are 15 very soft colours to choose from and although it's not cheap, at £5.10 for a 50g ball, Bergère de France often have seasonal offers of 20% off their yarn. It's worth checking out their website regularly for their promotions - signing up to their newsletter will keep you informed, too. To buy it go to www.bergeredefrance.co.uk

There are two different types of clasp frames you can use, so it depends which you have bought to which method you should use to attach your knitting to the frame.



You can buy two different kinds of clasp frames

For knitting I tend to use the sew on bag clasps; with this clasp you use the holes down the side of the frame to sew your knitting to the frame, usually using the yarn you knitted the purse with, or you can use a contrasting colour.

The other method is to use a glue in frame; for this you glue around the frame then insert your knitting and leave to set. I hope this helps you!

Aneeta says: I think you'd be best choosing designs with a set-in sleeve. A raglan sleeve would make your shoulders look wider and more rounded and a





dropped sleeve will lengthen your shoulders' appearance. Choose a style that's quite fitted around the top

of your frame as this will give more structure to your upper body area.

PETITE PROBLEM

I'm very petite and find that if I follow a knitting pattern they fit around my width, but often end up way too long around the sleeves and length. I'm not sure how to tailor patterns to my height. Jilly Harper, Wells

Aneeta says: There will be part of most patterns that instruct you to knit to a particular length, for example, 'cont straight to 30cm'. When you see an instruction like this, you can make the knitting shorter (or longer) to suit you. If you are knitting the body section of a bottom-up jumper, then work the piece so it's the length you want from your underarm to your

waist. And for the sleeves, hold the knitting up to your underarm and measure to your wrist. Take care to note any changes you make so you can make both sleeves and the front and back of your knitting equal!

ARMHOLES

Cast off at the beg of every row as foll: 0 (3:3:3) sts 0 (2:2:2) times, 2 sts 4 (2:2:4) times, 1 st 8 (8:10:10) times. Cont on the rem 46 (**50**:55:**59**) sts until work measures 44 (50:56:62) cm or 17¼ (**19¾**:22:**24½**) in or 136 (**154**:172:**190**) rows total, ending with a WS row.

NECK

Next row (RS): Work 16 (17:18:19) sts, cast off the central 14 (16:19:21) sts for neck, work to end.

Next row (WS): Work to cast off sts and put rem sts on a stitch holder, work will now be completed in 2 sections.

Cont to cast off at the beg of every RS row (neck edge) as foll: 3 sts once, 2 sts once, 1 st twice.

Cont on the rem 9 (10:11:12) sts until work measures 48 (54:60:66) cm or 19 (**21**1/4:231/2:**26**) in or 148 (**166**:184:**202**) rows total, ending with a WS row.

SHOULDER

Leave remaining 9 (10:11:12) sts on a spare needle.

With WS facing pick up sts left on stitch holder.

Cont to cast off at the beg of every WS row (neck edge) as foll: 3 sts once, 2 sts once, 1 st twice.

Cont on the rem 9 (10:11:12) sts until work measures 48 (54:60:66) cm or 19 (**21**1/4:231/2:**26**) in or 148 (**166**:184:**202**) rows total, ending with a WS row, then leave sts on a spare needle for shoulder.

FRONT

Work as for Back until after armhole decreases.

Cont on the rem 46 (**50**:55:**59**) sts until work measures 39 (45:50:56) cm or 151/2 (18:193/4:22) in or 120 (138:154:172) rows total.

NECK

Next row (RS): Work 18 (**19**:20:**21**) sts, cast off the central 10 (12:15:17) sts for neck, work to end.

Next row (WS): Work to cast off sts and put

rem sts on a stitch holder, work will now be completed in 2 sections.

Cont to cast off at the beg of every RS row (neck edge) as foll: 3 sts once, 2 sts once, 1 st 2 (2:1:1) times, then on every foll 4th row cast off 1 st 2 (2:3:3) times.

Cont on the rem 9 (10:11:12) sts until work measures 48 (54:60:66) cm or 19 (211/4:231/2:26) in or 148 (166:184:202) rows total, ending with a WS row.

SHOULDER

Leave remaining 9 (10:11:12) sts on a spare needle. With WS facing pick up sts left on stitch holder and work as for right front, rev all shaping as before.

NECKBAND

Using 3mm needles and A cast on 119 (123:134:138) sts. Work in g st for 2 rows then leave on a spare needle.

ARMHOLE BORDERS (2)





Row 1 (RS): * K1, p1, rep from * to last st, k1. **Row 2:** * P1, k1, rep from * to last st, p1. These two rows from 1/1 rib, rep until work measures 2cm or ¾in or 8 rows, ending with a WS row.

Change to 3mm needles and, starting with a knit row continue in st st until work measures 19 (22:25:28:31) cm or 71/2 (81/2:93/4:11:121/4) in or 66 (76:86:96:106) rows, ending with a WS row.

Change to 2.5mm needles and work 2cm or ¾in or 8 rows in 1/1 rib. Cast off all the sts.


STRAPS (MAKE TWO)

Using 2.5mm needles cast on 7 sts. Work 21 (23:25:27:29) cm or 81/4 (9:93/4:101/2:11) in of 1/1 rib, starting and ending with k2. Cast off all the sts.

TO MAKE UP

Sew the straps to the WS of the Front and Back top borders, spacing them 7 (8:9:10:11) cm or 2¾ (3¼:3½:4:4½) in apart. Sew the side seams of the top. Secure and weave in all ends.

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MAKE A SLIPKNOT ◆ YOUR FIRST CAST ON STITCH



Twist the yarn into a loop and form a second loop of yarn to pull through the first one.

CAST ON - THUMB METHOD ◆ USE THIS FOR A STRETCHY EDGE



Twist the yarn into a loop and form a second loop of yarn to pull through the first one.

Wrap the ball end of the yarn anticlockwise around the needle. Push the needle through the loop.



Slide the loop off your thumb and tighten both ends. Repeat steps 2-4 for each stitch.

CAST ON – KNITTED ON METHOD ◆ USE THIS FOR A STRONG, HARDWEARING EDGE



With the slipknot on your left needle, insert the right needle from anticlockwise around right needle front to back of the loop.



Wrap the ball end of the yarn and then pull this through the loop.



Now insert the left needle tip through the front of the new loop, dropping it off the right needle.



Repeat steps 1-3 as needed, forming new stitches from the top stitch on the left needle.

CAST OFF + HOW TO FINISH YOUR WORK



To begin, knit only the first two stitches in the cast off row.



Push the left needle through the first stitch, then lift it over the second stitch and off right needle.



With one stitch now on the right needle, knit another stitch and then repeat step 2 until the row end.



Cut the yarn with a 15cm or 6in tail. Pull the tail through the final cast off stitch.

KNIT ◆ WORKED ON THE RIGHT SIDE IN STOCKING STITCH



Insert the right needle into the left needle's top stitch, from front to back with the yarn at the back.



Hold the yarn around your right index finger and then wrap it clockwise around the right needle.



Using the right needle, pull this new loop of yarn through the stitch on the left needle.



Ease the stitch off the left needle keeping the new stitch on the right needle. Repeat steps 1-4.

PURL * WORKED ON THE WRONG SIDE IN STOCKING STITCH



Insert the right needle into the front With your right index finger, wrap of the left needle's top stitch with the yarn in front.

Using the right needle, pull this new loop of yarn back through the front of the stitch.

Knitting charts follow the same rules unless the pattern states otherwise. Right side rows are usually odd numbers and are worked right to left. Wrong side rows are normally even numbers and are worked left to right. Pattern repeats will be contained in an area outlined in red and some charts will have further coloured outlines for different sizes. The key will give you each symbol and tell you what stitch it is.

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
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
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
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Sunshine knit blues

ummer is traditionally a time many knitters struggle with. No one in their right mind wants to sit with a huge, half finished mohair jumper on their lap when the sun's shining. It's a surefire

way to get yourself into a sweaty mess!

Hats, gloves and socks are perfect portable projects and are ideal for takeaway holiday knitting. But how many of these wintery accessories do we really need at this time of year? Hopefully very few.

So what to knit? For me, summer is a great time to practise my lace knitting. All

those lovely intricate patterns make for light, if not quick work. Combine them with a plant fibre yarn and it all makes sense. Julie Ferguson's gorgeous

lamp shade for Knit Today issue 106 has been a personal favourite ever since it arrived in the office. Taking only one ball of Rowan Linen, it should be a speedy project and allow me to save my pennies for a cheeky Pimms and lemonade or two while I'm watching Wimbledon.

Talking of Wimbledon, a few years ago there was a huge hoo ha over a women daring to knit while she watched a crucial Andy Murray third round match.
Personally, I find knitting is an ideal pastime when I'm watching the tennis. I'm normally sporting a pair of simple socks on my needles come Finals day as I can pretty much knit them without thinking.

Other tips I've heard for keeping cool while knitting in the summer include putting your projects in the freezer for half an hour first (!), keeping a tea towel on your lap to act as a barrier between you and your yarn, only knitting with cotton, or sticking to baby projects in bamboo yarn.

But summer is usually the time I decide to embark on some massive chunky jumper

ready to wear in autumn. I'm not a slow knitter, but I suffer from start-itis so it takes ages to finish anything as I'm always casting on something
