# Andy Warhol








Every Sunday morning, his mother would take him to church.

By the time the rest of the students had finished just one picture, he had put together a whole pile!







He took a train to New York, where he got a chance to publish his first illustration for a glamorous magazine. But they accidentally dropped the 'a' of his last name. And that's how Andy Warhola became...Andy Warhol!

Andy became known for drawing charming shoes, colorful make-up, and glamorous sunglasses for the best magazines in town. But as an artist, he liked to look at ordinary things. Especially the tomato soup he had for lunch every day.







Instead of creating just one painting—like most artists did—Andy decided to make 32 pictures of 32 soup cans. Each of them was a different flavor, but they all looked so much alike. It was hard to tell them apart!



His first exhibition looked more like a grocery store than an art gallery. Viewers were shocked by all the canvases placed in a line like products on shelves. They wondered if something so surprisingly every day could be called 'art.'










Of course it could! It was 'Pop Art'—the art for all—and soon, Andy was its king. Bottles, bills, famous faces...he produced hundreds of copies of the same pictures, and made each one unique with his interesting perspective and bright colors.



He opened a space called 'The Factory,' where the coolest musicians, actors, and models loved to hang out. But, for Andy, the hip crowd were his assistants. After all, he liked to work even when he was not working.










#### ANDY WARHOL

(Born 1928 • Died 1987)

Born in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, in August 1928, Andrew Warhola was the youngest of three brothers. His parents, Andrew and Julia, emigrated to the USA from the Slovak Republic in the 1920s. The Warhol siblings grew up in a smoky, industrial city during the Great Depression, where Andy learnt to draw. Aged six, he was confined to bed with sickness. With nothing else to do, he turned to images from magazines and newspapers, tracing them and cutting them out. At high school, Andy furthered his interest in art and design, and was the first member of his family to go to college. One summer, he worked dressing window displays, where he fell in love with high fashion. This also sparked an interest in illustration, which he went on to study at the Carnegie Institute. The night of graduation,

he caught a train to New York... and never left. Picking up illustration work for magazines such as Vogue, Andy caught the eye of art directors everywhere. Aged 32, he bought a four-storey townhouse and started to experiment with fine art, using newspaper images and advertising to make his own art. Turning soup cans into large scale screenprints, he also reimagined portraits of icons such as Marilyn Monroe, Jackie Kennedy, and Elvis. In doing so he became one of the world's most influential 'pop' artists, celebrating the idea that anything can be art. Andy went on to set up a studio called 'The Factory,' which became a hub for artists. He became world-famous, exhibiting both screenprints and film. Today, he is remembered as the artist who found beauty in everyday objects.
