#### Living Fossils at Underwater World Singapore

Underwater World Singapore (UWS) is pleased to present an exhibition of aquatic creatures, whose ancestors first appeared on our planet millions of years ago. Their ancestors have defied the ravages of time and the environmental upheavals that drove other species to extinction. They have been aptly called "living fossils".

Fossils have captivated mankind through the ages and there are valuable lessons to be drawn from them. This display of living fossils is part of our efforts to promote awareness of the importance of marine life and its conservation. Some of these living fossils on display are:

- **Chambered Nautilus (***Nautilus pompilius***)** lives at great depths in the Indian and Pacific Oceans but can also be found, occasionally on shallow reefs. The nautilus first appeared more than 400 million years ago.
- Australian and African Lungfishes (*Neoceratodus forsteri* and *Protopterus sp.*) are rare living representatives of the lobe-finned (fleshy finned) fishes. Lungfishes are believed to be related to the tetrapods like amphibians and reptiles. Ancestors of modern lungfishes appeared about 400 million years ago in the Devonian period.
- **Sponges (***Phylum: Porifera***)** first appeared during the Cambrian period more than 500 million years ago. There are about 5000 known species of sponges around the world.
- Mangrove and Coastal Horseshoe Crab (*Carcinoscorpius rotundicauda*) and (*Tachypleus gigas*), are found in Southeast Asia and even in our own backyard at Chek Jawa. The ancestors of horseshoe crabs can be traced back to more than 300 million years ago.
- Arapaima (Arapaima gigas) is one of the largest freshwater fish in the world. The Arapaima belongs to the Osteoglossidae ("bony tongue") family of fishes. The oldest osteoglossid fossil found is about 140 million years old.
- Alligator Gar (*Lepisosteus spatula*) is an ancient looking fish which is found in the Mississippi River Basin and Gulf of Mexico. The oldest gar fossil is from the Cretaceous period, about 140 million years ago.
- **Bichir** (*Polypterus sp.*) can be found at the banks of rivers and lakes in Central Africa and Zaire and is a primitive example of ray-finned fishes. Ray-finned fishes first appeared some 395 million years ago.





• Flower Ray (*Potamotrygon sp.*) is a stingray found in South America. Rays first appeared in the Jurassic period, about 200 million years ago.

## Fun and Stimulating Special Interactive Displays for the Children

**Puzzle Challenge** – There are two puzzles, showing pictures of a Trilobite and an Ancient Fish fossil. Each square-shaped puzzle, measuring 66cm by 66cm, consists of 8 slabs and one empty slot to allow maneuvering to form a complete picture of the fossil.

**Fun Shading Corner** – Children can place a sheet of paper over slabs of "fossils" of ancient marine animals and use a pencil to shade over the paper to get the imprint of the animals.
