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Scavengers of the Deep, Critters of the Sea

at Underwater World Singapore

Singapore, 2 June 2009 - Underwater World Singapore (UWS) unveiled its newest

crustacean exhibit today: 52 hair-raising 14-legged Isopods scuttle and crawl in a specially

constructed dome-shaped tank with a connecting children's crawling tunnel.

The pre-historic Isopod, scientifically known as the Bathynomus, belongs to the crustacean

family of shrimps and crabs and dates back to some 160 million years ago. On display at

UWS are 50 small 8-centimetres-long Isopods and 2 Giant Isopods that measure an

impressive 28-centimetres each.

Generalist scavengers, Isopods typically feed on dead sea animal carcasses which commonly

include dead whales, fishes and squids. Able to survive without food for over eight weeks, the

Isopod lives in extremely harsh conditions and are found in the coldest (as low as 4 degree

Celsius) and deepest (at depths of 1,000 metres) parts of the ocean, where water pressure is

extremely high and food is scarce. Its complex mouth with four sets of jaws catches and

shreds food swiftly and its soft body is protected by a flexible segmented hard shell.

Due to extremely low levels of light in its natural habitat, the Isopod is equipped with giant

compound aviator-shades-like eyes with over 4,000 reflective individual facets and can hunt

for food in pitch darkness.

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Mr Wah Yap Hon, Curator of UWS, commenting on the Isopod species, "As a deep sea

scavenger, the Isopod plays an important role in ocean ecology, recycling waste and returning

them as nutrients to the ocean ecosystem. It is very interesting and 'cool-looking' with its

unique 'sunglasses' eyes."

To replicate the deep sea habitat of the Isopods and create a heightened sensory experience

for visitors, UWS had specially designed and built a dome-and-tunnel tank to house the

swarming critters for individuals to enter inside the exhibit and observe the Isopods in close

proximity from all angles.

Mr Kwek Meng Tiam, General Manager of UWS, remarked about the "Critters of the Deep"

display, "The Isopod tank is built in such a way that it allows the child to interact with the

display fully and be fascinated by the sight of the Isopods 'crawling' overhead; a new

experience that is fun-filled and educational."
